

SAHS Defeats Robert Lee

West Zone Title On The Line In Friday Night Home Clash

The name of the game is the line of scrimmage, and Friday night at Robert Lee an agressive Mountaineer offensive line took charge of the scrimmage line and led the locals to a stunning 30 - 22 upset of the Number 9 rated team in the State. The victory for Santa Anna also threw the Zone race into a three-way tie, giving the Mountaineers a chance to take it all this coming Friday night as they entertain Bronte on the local field.

The Mountaineers jumped off to a two-touchdown lead in the first

quarter Friday night, the first touchdown came on a one-yard plunge by Quarterback Tommy Harris, the second on a nine-yard pass from Harris to Rusty Buzzard. Jerry Culpepper kicked the PAT following both touchdowns.

By halftime the Steers had scored two touchdowns and had also converted both times, making the score 14 - 14.

The small but enthusiastic crowd of Mountaineer boosters greeted the team as it opened the second half with Mike Warnock returning the kick-off 15 yards to the 34 yard line. Ten plays later Jerry Cuppepper took the ball into the end zone capping the 66-yard drive. Tommy Harris elected to keep on the outside veer and spun into the end zone for the two-point

Robert Lee, not to be denied, came back with eight points of their own and the game was again knotted 22 -22.

Still in the third quarter the Mountaineers collected their pride once more and marched 63 yards in five plays. Scoring on a 44-yard run by Dwayne Warnock, the touchdown play looked like one you see in a coaching manual as (See FOOTBALL, Page 3)

Activity Starting Soon At Rockwood Coal Mine

According to a report in the last week's issue of Coleman Democrat Voice, activity is slated to start soon on the coal mining operation near Rockwood.

Joe Williams of San Saba stated that four bids have been received for the construction of the wash plant, and a contract was expected to be awarded and construction to start in a few weeks.

Specifications call for the wash plant to be completed within a year. The actual mining of coal will begin two to three months prior to completion of the wash

At the mining site water wells have been drilled and water is to piped to the site. Work is also expected to start soon on an entrance road to the plant site.

The mining operation will begin slowly, Williams stated, with production increased on a planned schedule, as effeciency increases.
