Mountaineers Win 36 - 28

Santa Anna Team Takes Victory Over Miles HS Friday Night

Two minutes into the football game at Miles last Friday night, Miles tailback Modesto Salinas began a power sweep to the side, found no running room, reversed his field and scooted down the left sideline to the end zone for a 64-yard touchdown. The PAT made the score 7-0.

Three minutes, sixteen seconds into the game Mountaineer Dwayne Warnock began a power sweep to the right, found no room, reversed his field and scooted down the left sideline for a 53-yard TD. The PAT by

Jerry Culpepper was good. Score 7-7.

Albert Collins, Curtis Fellers, Phil Johnson and other 'Neers dropped the Bulldog QB in the endzone for a safety with five minutes left in the first quarter. Score then stood 9-7 in favor of Santa Anna.

With less than three minutes left in the quarter, number one Mike Warnock dove into the endzone from three yards out for another TD. The PAT failed.

The rest of the first half belonged to the Miles men. Late in the first quarter they covered a nuffed punt on the Santa Anna 2 yard line and two plays later the touchdown came. The PAT failed. Early in the second quarter Miles recovered a Santa Anna fumble on the 18 yard line, three plays later the 'Dogs scored on a 16-yard screen pass, then kicked the extra point. Later in the second quarter they scored again on a power play from the two-yard line, then tacked the two extra points, making the halftime score Miles

28 - Santa Anna 15.

Santa Anna took the kickoff opening the second half, ran seventeen consecutive plays that ended when Dwayne Warnock hauled the ball into the endzone from six yards out. Tommy Harris elected to keep on the outside option and hoofed the ball over the goal line for the two extra points. Score was then 28-23.

Rusty Buzzard's third interception of the year gave the 'Neers the ball on their own 35 yard line with seven minutes left in the game. Seventeen plays later Mike Warnock, on a counter play, carried the ball into the endzone, giving the Mountain Men a 29-28 lead. The PAT failed.

Traffic Accident Injures Woman

Mrs. Frankie McCarthy of Santa Anna is in Rollins-Brooks Hospital in Lampasas being treated for injuries she received in a pedestrian-car accident that occurred in downtown Santa Anna Wednesday of last week.

Mrs. McCarthy, who was crossing Wallis Avenue toward the apartment complex where she resides, was struck by a car driven by Cindy Greenlee of Rockwood. According to reports, Mrs. McCarthy walked into the path of the Greenlee vehicle that had the right-of-way at the intersection. The elderly woman was taken by Henderson ambulance to Brownwood Community Hospital where she received emergency treatment, then on to the Lampasas hospital for treatment of a broken leg and other injuries. Reports early this week indicated the Santa Anna woman was getting along as well as could be expected.

The vehicle came to a stop at the garage at the home, causing no damage to the vehicle or injury to the child inside.

It is the No. 9 Vaughn, located on a 937-acre lease in the E. Smith Survey 222, A-614.

Norman Pautsky of Wichita Falls will drill the No. 2-C Kingsbery in the Coleman County Regular Field.

The planned 1,500 foot venture is located on a 189 acre lease seven miles southeast of Santa Anna in the Wharton CSL Survey 496.

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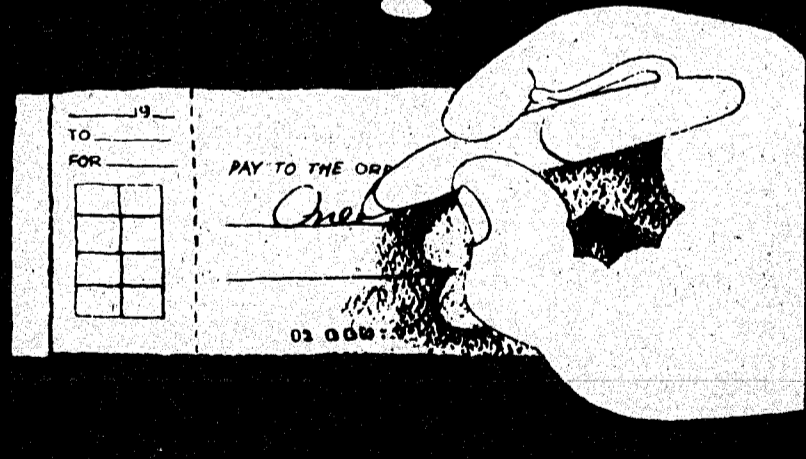
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S-Anna Native Dies October 18 In Washington



Mrs. Lora Rollins and R. W. Balke reported on the curtain projects. A report was given on the salad supper for the homecoming reunion for the Class of 1926.

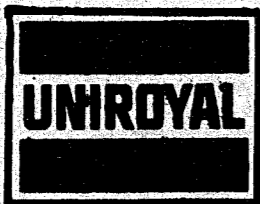

Insects Invade Small Grain

Small grain producers need to be on the lookout for several insects that are damaging small grain at this time in Coleman County.

The most prevalent insect now working is armyworms and loopers. These pests have been severe but seem to be letting up at his time. Nonetheless, they are still present in damaging populations and producers should be on the watch. They are fairly easily controlled by spraying, but if you're going to spray you need to get them when they first hit the field, not after they have wiped it out.

There are also greenbugs working. These pests can be very damaging and cold weather doesn't slow them down. However, good populations of lady bug beetles and their larvae can

She also raised turkeys and chickens and always had a big garden for home use and canning.

Mrs. Hodges never learned to drive a car, but she could drive a team of horses when she was needed.

She did all kinds of handwork -- tatting, knitting, embroidery, crochet and piecing quilts and quilting. She did all her sewing for herself and the three girls until her eyesight began to fail. Her hearing is also failing and she is not in very good health now.

Lela started to school at Polecat Ridge, then went to Cleveland School until she married. She is a Methodist, baptized by Rev. J. W. Bowden July 7, 1901 at Cleveland.

She says she has made many moves in her lifetime. After moving to Santa Anna in 1942 she worked in cafes for 25 cents an hour, and if she had not done that, she would not have had any Social Security now, as prior to that she lived on the farm.

Farming did not pay into Social Security at that time, and it was all the family could do to make a living, working lots of long hours and for very little profit.

Mrs. Hodges still walks across town to the bank, drug store, post office and grocery store. She is never slow and goes at full speed.

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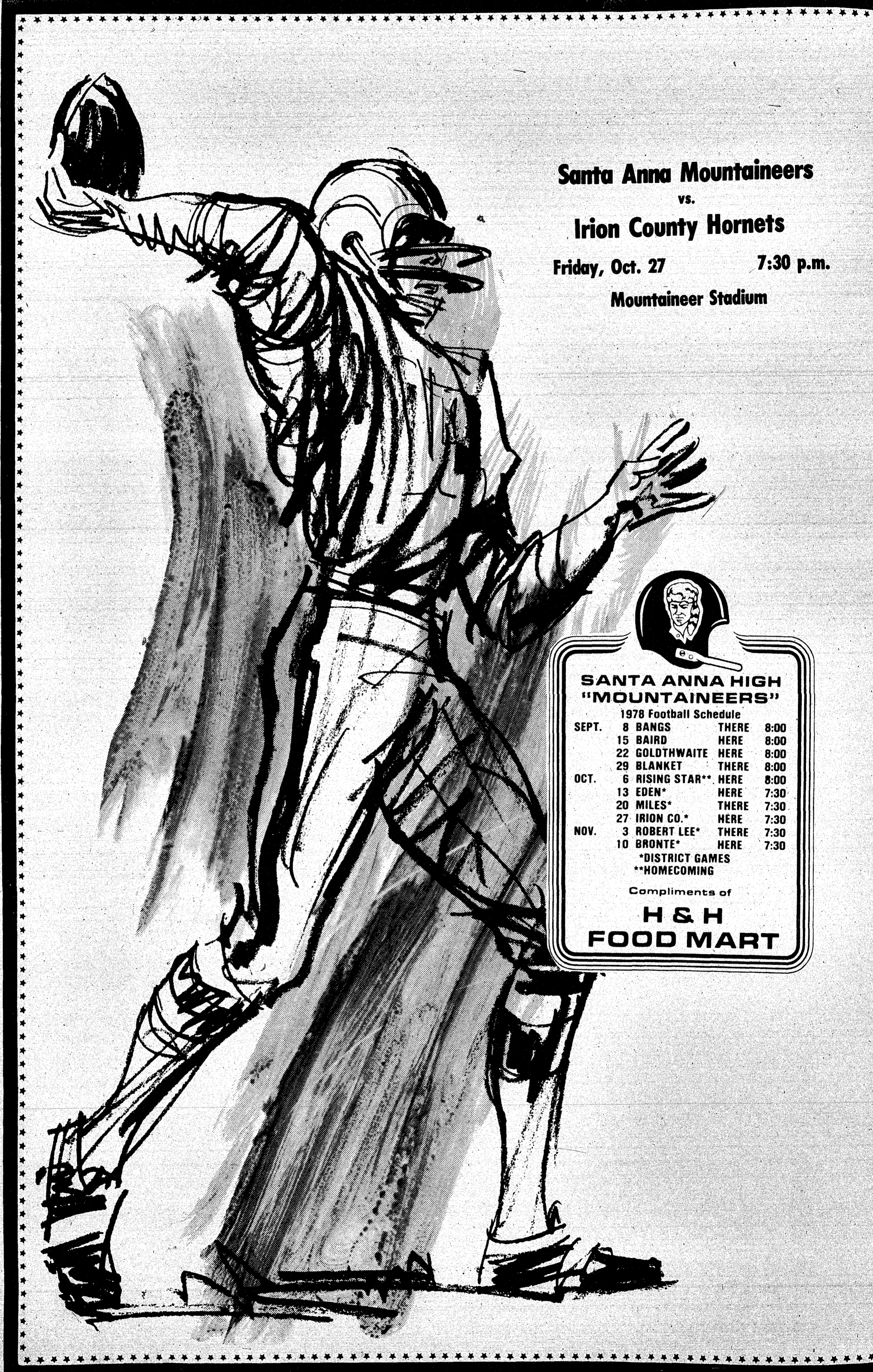

They sampled 153 issues from 31 newspapers and found out that the papers were covering alcoholism in the abstract very well. But many of them hesitate to report involvements of alcohol in serious accidents and crimes. These produce a waste of thousands of lives and billions of dollars a year.

It would be helpful if citizens will ask the press to give reports of these shocking relations. The author of the study concludes, "We cannot deal with the problem until we recognize it-- and the press can help us to see this one."

This does not include those pensioners who have not in previous years received a card.

This will include veterans over 72 years of age and children receiving pension in their own behalf. It is imperative, according to C. O. Fleming, Coleman County Service Officer, that Veterans Administration beneficiaries receiving a non-service pension immediately contact the Social Security Administration and or any agency from which they are receiving retirement benefits.

These expenses include doctor, hospital, dental, drugs, hospitalization premiums, glasses and cost of nursing home care.

Completion of the annual income questionnaire card will be mandatory by the recipients or benefits will be terminated effective January 1, 1979.

Trooper Recruitment Is Underway By DPS

Major Ira Dees, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety's 49-county West Texas Region, announced last week that an intensive effort is being made to recruit men and women for a Law Enforcement Training Class to begin at the Department's Academy in January.

Major Dees said the Department has been successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to the position of Trooper. Efforts to recruit from these groups are continuing for this school.

All persons making application for the position of Trooper must be at least 20, but not more than 35 years of age; weight proportionate to height, and visual acuity no worse than 20-40 correctable to 20-20. A person must be of good moral character, excellent physical condition, and must have a minimum of 60 semester hours of college credit.

Persons selected as recruits

be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school beginning January 9, 1979, at the Homer Garrison Jr. Law Enforcement Academy. Successful graduates will be assigned to either the Highway Patrol Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, or the Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference.

The salary during training is \$876 per month. Room and board while at the academy will be approximately \$60 per month.

When a person is commissioned as a Trooper, his salary will increase to \$1,000 per month. Troopers also receive longevity pay after one year of service, a monthly uniform cleaning allowance, and travel expenses when away from their home stations.

Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee, and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Troopers participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as well as Social Security. Vacation, holidays and sick leave are provided.

Major Dees said interested men and women in this area should contact the Abilene DPS office for an application. After completing the application, it should be presented to that DPS office for the examinations.

Anyone interested should contact the office as soon as possible.

Two Women Known Here Noted For Library Work

Two of the nicest ladies in Copperas Cove are also two of the town's hardest workers -- they are Mrs. Mildred Holt and her daughter, Mrs. Nancy Mitchell, and both are librarians.

Mrs. Holt is known for her extensive work in establishing the Copperas Cove Public School Library system, and since her retirement in 1972, Mrs. Mitchell has expanded on that base.

As a result, the Copperas Cove school district has one of the finest library systems in the nation.

When she retired, Mrs. Holt had plans for assisting her husband, R. D. Holt, in his work. Mr. Holt is a writer-historian, and has had many of his articles printed and has had several books published.

The Holts were born and reared in Coleman County and Mrs. Holt writes, "we still feel like it is

home."

Asked if she had time now to read, Mrs. Holt said, "Yes, but it has to be something worthwhile." She prefers historical fiction and religious books, noting that she collects Bibles and religious literature. She and Mr. Holt are still active as Reference Librarians.

Carrying on in her mother's tradition is Nancy Mitchell, who is currently Director of Library Services for the school district, which includes eight schools. She and her staff are responsible for ordering, receiving, cataloging and processing all the books for the Cove Schools.

The Central Library office also houses the Professional Library, a collection of books and periodicals for the faculty of the schools in the district. Over 30 magazines written for the teaching profession are available, and the center maintains a telephone service for those teachers who need "on the spot" information.

Another duty of the Central Library Office is the Reading Is Fundamental (RIF) Program, whereby youngsters in elementary schools are allowed to choose, without adult supervision, a paperback book for his own. Federal funds are used to match donations that are received by this program.

The Holts and their daughter have contributed a great deal to Copperas Cove.
