Science, Math Students Score Well in Contests

Santa Anna students competing in the Angelo State University Math and Science Meet last Saturday, scored well in their respective events, three returning with medals and four with certificates of merit.

Mike Wetsel, son of Mr. Mrs. Charles Wetsel, secured the gold medal in Freshman Science. Mike Ballard, a senior and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hershell Ballard, won second place in Veteran Science as well as eighth place in number sense (mental arithmetic). Claiming a bronze medal in Novice Science and sixth in Math was D'Aun Arp, a junior.

Seniors receiving certificates were Dick Smith, fourth in Senior Math; Linda Key, sixth in Veteran Science; Joe Bass, fifth in Sophomore Math; and James Culpepper, sixth in seventh grade Science.

The local students competed with students from Class B - AA schools in the high school division; junior high and freshmen students were in competition that included those from all classifications B through 4A.

Water Project Progressing; Bids To Be Sought Soon

The new water system for the City of Santa Anna is in the final stages of planning, according to a report given at the City Council meeting Thursday, November 9. The specifications and forms for bids are at the printers and will be advertised in the near future, following approval of the forms and plans by the HUD agency. All but two easements have been secured, according to the report by Sparkman Engineers.

The City Council meeting was led by Mayor Glen Copeland with all members present.

Routine bills and accounts were approved for payment, and a

report was given on the sale of the old police car.

A report was given on the new housing project that is being planned for the town. Work is expected to start soon on the moving of the little league ball park from the present location near the Civic Center where some of the proposed housing units are to be built. The ball park will be re-located just east of the old ball park and a block from the present location.

Approval was given for a street light to be erected in the South First - North Santa Fe area, and plans were made to gravel some streets in town that need improvements.

The Santa Anna Christmas opening will be held next week, Friday, December 1, and entries are still sought in the parade and in the window-decoration competition.

The windows are to be decorated by Friday morning, December 1, and those taking part will be judged for cash prizes. Decorations are to be removed from the downtown windows by January 2.

Floats for the 2:30 p.m. parade are to be listed so that a parade schedule may be planned. Cash prizes will also be given winning float entries.

The Lions Club pancake fiesta will be held that day as well as the PTO Bazaar and Bake Sale.

City Sales Tax Shows Increase

The Santa Anna City Sales Tax rebate has been received for the month of October and shows an increase over the same period last year.

The payment for the month ending October 26 totaled \$1,298.56.

The 1978 sales tax rebate for the first 10 months was \$13,228.04. The amount for the same period last year was \$11,475.65, a 15 per cent increase.

The Santa Anna basketball teams have started the season well, winning five of the six games played during the first two outings.

At Rising Star last Thursday night, the Girls Junior Varsity and the Boys Varsity teams won over the Wildcats, with the Varsity Girls losing to the Rising Star team.

Monday night the Junior High girls won their first game over the Bangs girls, and the Girls Jayvees and the Varsity also defeated the Bangs teams.

In games Monday night at Bangs, the Junior High girls defeated the Bangs JHS team 24 - 19. The Junior Varsity girls won over the Dragons 12 - 10; and the SAHS Varsity team won their first game by a 22 - 20 score.

Texas Parks & Wildlife News

AUSTIN—A public hearing will be held at 2 p.m. November 30 in Austin to obtain public comments on the bobcat pelt tagging system which was adopted on an emergency basis October 12 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission.

The hearing will be in the main hearing room of the department's headquarters building at 4200 Smith School Road.

W. C. Brownlee, the department's nongame program leader, said the department will accept written or telephone comments on the tagging system until January 3. The comments may be sent to Dr. Harold Irby, program director, Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept., at Austin.

The tagging system will allow bobcat pelts taken in Texas during the November 15 through February 15, 1979 season to be sold on the international market.

The Endangered Species Scientific Authority has allowed an unlimited quota of bobcat pelts for Texas during the 1978 - 79 season. However, all pelts must be tagged prior to their sale. Pelts will be tagged by department personnel at designated locations only on Tuesdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. during the season. The animal's head must also be brought with the pelt for identification and

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Former S-Anna Resident Recalls Early-day Air Corps

(The following is from a feature story from the October 9 issue of Waco Tribune-Herald.)

Dr. Virgil A. Kelley of 1225 North Sixteenth in Waco would have felt right at home at a recent air show and antique airplanes display at James Connally Airport.

He is one of the few remaining World War I aviators who trained at Kelly Air Base in 1918, and the only Waco member of the national air society, Daedalus.

Daedalus is exclusively for persons who started flying before 1918 when aviation was young.

Kelley was 24 when he started flying. He will be 85 in December. He has practiced medicine in Waco, on the seventh floor of the Amicable building, for 53 years.

Kelley was born and raised in Santa Anna.

Two years of pre-medical school at Daniel Baker College in Brownwood were behind Kelley when he enlisted in October of 1917, six months after the United States declared war on Germany.

"There was such a thing as patriotism in those days, and I thought I would be doing something for my country by joining," he said.

Between October of 1917 and March of 1918, Kelley received his restricted military aviator and junior military aviator wings and was made a field instructor at Love Field in Dallas. He was an instructor at the field until he left active duty in January 1919.

"We were totally unprepared for the war," Kelley maintains. "We had 55 airplanes and 51 were considered obsolete."

In fact, there was no such thing as an "air force" when Kelley enlisted in 1917. There was an aviation division of the Signal Corps, but it didn't amount to much, he said.

In Kelley's flying heyday, airplanes were far from the sleek, powerful, gleaming machines they are today.

"We used biplanes made of

wood and canvas," he said. "They had 90-horsepower engines and could go about 75 miles an hour."

As an instructor, Kelley taught semi-experienced pilots acrobatics before they were sent to Europe to join the fighting.

Kelley said during the war the air force sought young men full of "zip" and "not a lot of restraint." It took those qualities and mental quickness to make a good fighter pilot, he said.

"We had an intensive, eight-week cram session in aviation which included learning about telegraphy, machine guns, plane engines, military law, meteorology and ground work so you had to be able to catch things pretty quick," he said.

Like many pilots, Kelley has had his share of hair-raising experiences.

His closest call occurred when he was practicing gliding techniques at Love Field one day.

"I was diving and I couldn't get my stick (the device used to control the plane) to budge. All I could see was Bachman Creek and the rocks in it. I finally got it to move and swooped upward just before I killed myself on those rocks.

Kelley said the phrase "flying by the seat of the pants" is no fable. "The pressure on and off our seats -- that's how we used to tell our flight speed and altitude."

Kelley summed up his short aviation career:

"I was in the air and in the war only a year, but I lived a long time while I was there."

New Hope For Cataract Patients

Potentially blinding eye
cataracts can now be removed
by a revolutionary new surgi-
cal program that sharply
reduces hospitalization and
recuperation time.

A cataract patient can be
admitted, operated on and
discharged within a 22-hour
period under a new surgical
program developed by oph-
thalmologist Dr. Joseph
Spina, Jr. at Bryn Mawr Hos-
pital, Bryn Mawr, PA. Using
space-age microsurgical tech-
niques, the clouded-over lens
or cataract lens is removed
virtually without pain. No
five to seven day hospital stay
or long recuperation period,
common to conventional
cataract surgery, is needed.

A patient may be admitted
to the hospital early Friday,
be operated on, be discharged
the same day or Saturday
morning. In many cases, he'll
be back at work on Monday.
The new surgery is called
Phacoemulsification. It in-
volves a Phaco emulsifier
machine placing a small ultra-
sonic probe or needle into the
eye through a microscopic
incision. The probe is then
vibrated at an ultrasonic
speed, liquifying the cataract
inside the eye. The probe
then draws out the cataract.
Only one or two stitches are
required.

According to 36-year old
Dr. Spina, Medical Director
of the Cataract Research In-
stitute, "The advantage is
that the amount of trauma to
the eye is minimal and the
incision heals quickly because
it is so small."

To compensate for the loss
of the lens, patients are fitted
with special glasses, contact
lenses or an intraocular lens
implant, a tiny lens which fits
inside the eye.

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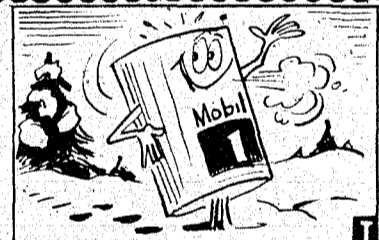
