Bradford is currently associate secretary of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, the church's world headquarters. with a responsibility for North America. In his new job he will replace Neal Wilson, who took office as president of the world church on January 4.

Rural Census Is Underway

Final preparations are underway at the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. for the next Census of Agriculture which will begin in January to canvass farm and ranch activities across the Nation for the calendar 1978. Every household which conducts agricultural operations will receive its form in the mail at the turn of the year.

Report forms for the 1978 reduced from the 22 pages of the try in 1950. last farm census. In this census, 21st in a series that started in 1840, most farm and ranch operators will receive a four-page form in the mail, while some will receive a five-page version.

On the report form, each farmer or rancher will need answer only questions that apply to his or her operation. The form is arranged so that individual questions or sections dealing with crops and livestock not produced can be skipped.

The overall time required by farmers to complete the form has been reduced an estimated one-

Completed forms should be mailed back as soon as possible in January in the confidential, postage-paid envelopes provided. Estimates are acceptable and should be reported in the absence of firm records.

Sophisticated Poachers Nabbed After Long Vigil

AUSTIN-- Poachers sometimes will go to great lengths to shoot a deer illegally and escape detect-

But as three poachers in Edwards County discovered recently, game wardens also will go to great lengths to catch them.

At. 10:30 one evening in late December, Texas parks and Wildlife Department Warden Roger Long of Rocksprings saw a shot fired from a van into a pasture alongside Highway 674. The van left the scene, and Long searched the area where the shot was fired, discovering a six-point buck.

Long then parked his car a short distance away and started a seven-hour vigil. Just before daylight, the van returned and a man carrying a briefcase jumped out and headed for the deer.

Shortly afterward, the van came back by and picked up the man, and Long stopped the vehicle. They still had not picked up the deer carcass, but the briefcase containing a knife, gloves and coveralls added extra evidence to an already clear-cut

Long discovered the fielddressed buck and the trio paid a total of \$619:50 in fines and costs for their night's efforts.

Long said most road hunters just shoot a deer and throw the carcass in their vehicle rather than engaging in so much furtive clothes-changing and other maneuvers to avoid detection. But that, Long figures, just made the arrest that much more satisfying.

Q. Is there a good general rule on when to replace old tires?—N.M., Waco

A. Tires wear out at different rates, depending on quality, road conditions, and driver habits. Some tires have built-in "wear bars" which appear as smooth bands across the face of the tire when only 1/16-inch of tread remains. You can measure the tread yourself. If no ruler is handy, just take out a Lincoln head penny; hold it by the neck side (head pointing down) and insert it into the groove between the treads. If the top of Abe's head shows, the tread is probably worn below the danger line. You should also check with tire dealers and mechanics.

Q. Do tractor and farm vehicles require license plates?—D.B., Midland

A. No. According to Texas law, tractors and other farm vehicles do not have to display a license plate if they are operated only temporarily on the highways such as when driving from one field to another. The farm's pick-up, being a regular road vehicle, needs a license.




