The recent rainfall is appreciated more than ever when we remember in early March of last year Santa Anna residents were being restricted on water use. Later in the year water was strictly rationed.

Although Lake Brownwood is full to capacity for the first time since June of 1975, the Santa Anna city lakes have not filled. Approximately one and one-half feet of water has been added, but that is a higher level than in about two years.

Most tanks, creeks and ponds in the community are full of water -- quite a site to see.

Aid with the project has been pledged by County Precinct Two and the City of Santa Anna. The Boy Scout Troop and several individuals have also promised to help with the project.




