Rainfall in Santa Anna during the month of March totaled 4.55 inches, a great increase over the March 1978 total of .45 inch. The total for 1979 is 7.70 inches, compared to a meager 2.88 inches for the same period last year.

City, Contractors Confer On Water Project Bid Total

The bid opening for the Santa Anna City water improvement project last Thursday was just that -- as the one bid for the complete project was nearly half a million dollars above the total proposed for the construction project.

Clouse Construction Co. of Odessa was the only bidder on the entire project with a bid of \$2,391,165.20. The FmHA loan and federal grant for the project is \$1,926,600.00.

Panhandle Construction Co. of Lubbock submitted a bid for the pipeline construction only.

Santa Anna officials and Sparkman Engineers met with Clouse representatives Tuesday to discuss alternatives and changes in the project that would cut the cost to meet the amount. One item on which the bid was above the engineers' estimate was the Lake Brownwood pump station on which the Odessa company set \$340,000.000. There were other items on which the bid could be decreased, officials said.

In an invitational tournament in Coleman last weekend, several Santa Anna players were winners. Terry Day and Tommy Harris were first in the varsity competition, and Dick Smith and Don Eubank were runners-up.

Danny Guerrero was first in the boys varsity singles, and Rusty Buzzard was a semi-finalist.

Lori Herring was consolation winner in girls singles, making her first appearance since fracturing a bone in her knee during basketball season. Juliann Jones was first in girls freshmen doubles, and Lisa and Teresa Rolfe were second in freshmen doubles.

Mayor, Two Councilpersons To Be Chosen By City Voters

Voters in Santa Anna will be going to the polls Saturday, April 7, to choose two Councilpersons and a Mayor. The election will be held at City Hall with voting to be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Montie Guthrie III is election judge.

Thomas M. Hays, a City Councilman, is the only candidate for Mayor. Candidates for the two City Council posts are Dale

Bradley, an incumbent, and also Scott Patterson, Pearl Wilson, Cynthia Hill, Dickie Horner and Bill Watson. The two winning candidates will be selected for two-year terms.

Gale Brock, a ten-year Councilperson, and Mayor Glen Copeland are not seeking re-election.

Four Candidates Are Vying For Two ISD Posts

Four candidates are running for the two positions to be filled on the School District Board of Trustees. They are incumbent Jay Weathers, Max Eubank, Sammie Joe Powers and Donald Strickland. Felton Martin, the other incumbent, is not seeking re-election.

Eubank and Powers are former members of the ISD Board. Eubank serving as president for several years.

The ISD election will be held at Lions Club building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. April 7. Rose Bass will serve as election judge.

Mrs. Minnie Wilson has served as postal clerk at the office since 1958, and was acting Postmaster of the office from May 2, 1927 until June of 1929.

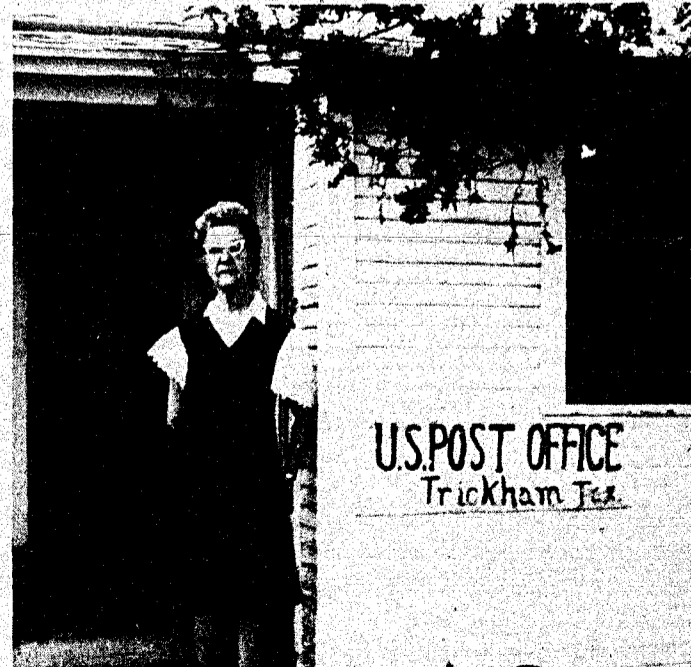
Trickham is the first town settled in Coleman County, established at about the time Camp

The pageant will be held at the Coleman High School auditorium with the Coleman Exchange Club and mothers of the Coleman High School Flag Corps as sponsors.

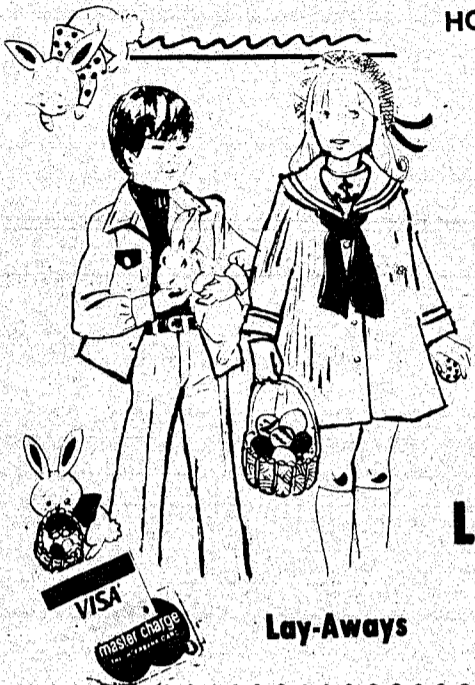

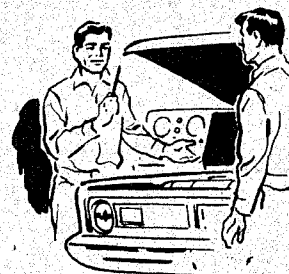

Local Historian Relates Post Office History

(The following story is from the book, "Discord, Texas on Camp Creek, and Other Stories" by Gladys N. Hunter, and printed with the author's permission.)

Trickham Post Office was established April 10, 1879, with Theron M. Taber as first postmaster, according to the National Archives and Records Service, Washington, D. C.

The post office was discontinued July 31, 1958 and since that time is a branch of the Santa Anna office.

Mrs. Minnie Wilson was appointed by the Regional Office in Dallas August 4, 1958 and is still serving.

Postmasters listed by the Records Service are: Theron M. Taber, Howard D. Walker, Charles H. Featherston, Robert J. Bridges, William Hunter, W. H. Carr, Clairence W. Carr, Nancy G. Featherston, Elsworth Henderson, Morgan J. Stacy, Layfayette E. Page, Mary E. Wilson, James H. Rodgers, Amanda F. Vollintine, Mrs. Lucy E. Drury, Roy L. Armstrong, Edward B. Featherston, Minnie Laughlin, Henry L. Driskill and Elmer Glenn Haynes.

Different stories are told of the name Trickham. It was sent to Washington "Trick'em" due to jokes of the cowboys. It was called Tricum, too, according to Coleman County records.

Trickham was the first town settled in the county, about the time Camp Colorado was established near the town of Whon in 1856 by the Second Cavalry. It was on Mukewater Creek (named for the Indian Chief, Mukewaka, whose tribe ranged this area) in the southeast part of the county. First stores were on the creek, south of the present town, started for the convenience of cattle drives, sometime in the late fifties.

The settlers got their mail from Camp Colorado at first, but probably had a post office long before 1879. Bill Franks was first postmaster, according to Mrs. Gay in her book "Into the Setting Sun."

The 29 lock boxes are collectors items. They were bought about 1914 during the tenure of Mrs. Vollintine. The combinations have been lost to about half of them. In general delivery department, there are 20 "call" boxes. A patron looks through the little glass window to see if he has a letter.

The Trickham post office has seen lots of turbulent times, wars, men killed in the streets by Indians, and now men on the moon.

Spring Season Turkey Hunting Set April 21-29

Prospects are good for the largest spring turkey hunting season ever in Texas, with 57 counties offering an open season on gobblers April 21-29.

Last spring, an estimated 6,500-plus hunters participated in spring turkey hunting in the Edwards Plateau and Possum Kingdom Regulatory Districts. Hunters harvested almost 3,000 gobblers in those districts.

The season was the largest to date in terms of hunter participation, percent success and total harvest, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The season limit statewide for the spring season is one gobbler only. To determine which counties offer a spring season, consult the department's 1978-79 Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations booklet available where hunting licenses are sold.

Wildlife Division officials are pleased with the growing importance of the spring season in Texas. "It's a completely different kind of hunting from fall turkey hunting," points out Horace Gore, turkey project leader. "Spring gobbler hunting almost requires the use of a call."

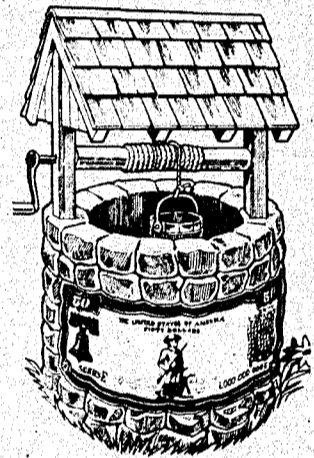

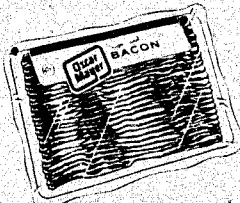
