## Electric Power Disrupted By Fire

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department answered a call early Monday morning on Parker Street near the railroad where a West Texas Utilities Co. pole caught fire. Firemen stayed on the scene until the pole burned in two, then power was discontinued for several hours while service was restored.

## New City Water Rates To Take Effect Soon

Santa Anna City Water customers will have the second rate increase this spring after city officials were notified last week of a ruling that is to take effect concerning the Farmers Home Administration loan.

Although the principal payments on the water project loan are deferred two years, payments of interest on the loan are to start when the bid is let for the project. The increased water service payments will have to start this year, the first to be billed in June, according to city leaders.

The new rate will be \$12.50 for the minimum water bill (the first 3,000 gallons). Additional water will be \$1.40 per 1,000 gallons for

## Thomas Hays Elected Mayor; Horner and Bradley to Council

Thomas M. Hays was elected Mayor of Santa Anna Saturday, receiving 148 votes in the unopposed election. He succeeds Glen Copeland who did not seek re-election. Hays has been a member of City Council one term. The Santa Anna native is in the contracting business here and also has farming and ranching interests.

For City Council places, Dickie Horner led the six-person ballot

with 100 votes. Taking the second place was incumbent Dale Bradley with 86. Scott Patterson received 60 votes; Bill Watson polled 43; Pearl Wilson received 24; and Cynthia Hill, 19. In the election Saturday, 169 people voted.

The Council will appoint someone to fill the unexpired term of Hays at the next meeting. Other council members are Quinton Daniel and Stanley Hartman.

## Max Eubank, Weathers Elected To ISD Board

Former School Board member Max Eubank was returned to the Board of Trustees Saturday when he led the ballot with 159 votes. A total of 207 voters went to the polls in the annual election. Eubank retired from the Board a year ago after serving three terms and as president several years.

Taking the second place to be vacated was Jay Weathers, incumbent, who polled 93 votes. The other incumbent, Felton

Martin, did not seek re-election this year.

Other candidates in the race were Donald Strickland with 85 votes and Sammie Powers with 67.

The newly elected board members will be sworn into office this week for three-year terms.

Others on the ISD Board are Orabeth McIver, Joe Riley, Glen Scarborough, Eddie Hartman and Donnie Neff.

## S-Anna Presbyterians Welcome New Pastor

The Rev. Hugh Walter Sanders has accepted the pastorate of United Presbyterian Church in Santa Anna and has moved this week to the church manse on Willis Street. He is filling the pastorate vacated by Rev. John Gordon who moved to Tennessee last August. Rev. Sanders has been filling the pulpit here the past two months, commuting each Sunday from near Llano.

Rev. Sanders and his wife, Dorothy, are natives of Arkansas. He is a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin, Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and San Francisco Theolog-

ical Seminary. He has been in the ministry 19 years, and prior to that time was in the U. S. Postal Service 22 years. He has served churches in Pleasant Hill, Mo., Llano and Lampasas. They moved here from Sunrise Beach in Llano County.

Rev. Sanders has been active in community groups and is a past Lions Club District Governor in Missouri. The couple have two children, a son, H. W. Sanders Jr. who is assistant manager of Texas Electric Cooperatives in Austin, and a daughter, Eleanor, who is a December graduate of Austin Theological Seminary and an ordained Presbyterian minister in Anderson, Ind.

## Construction Project Bid Approval Expected Friday

Santa Anna City Council voted Thursday in regular session to award the city water project contract to Clouse Construction Co., Inc. of Odessa, pending approval by Farmers Home Administration. Approval of the contract is needed after revisions in specifications were necessary to meet the proposed cost of the project.

City officials, the city engineer, representatives of the Clouse company and FmHA will meet Friday to review the new contract and make a final decision on the project. Clouse will be given the contract if the revisions are

approved by FmHA officials. The Clouse original bid was over the estimated project cost, and revisions were necessary to stay within the \$1,926,600.00 figure. If the contract is approved this week, construction on the major project is to start within 30 days.

Also at the Thursday night meeting, Judy Jennings and Sharon Cheaney, teachers in the elementary school, were granted permission to use a city street for a "Bicycle Rodeo" to climax bicycle safety week in May. The site of the event will be announced later.

## Swim Classes Planned If Pool Is Completed

The construction of the new swimming pool in Coleman is being watched with interest by children in the county, as plans are being made to have swimming classes in June if construction is completed. The new pool is a county-wide project located at Coleman City Park.

Mrs. Charles Hosch, Santa Anna Summer Recreation chairman, announced this week the tentative schedule will include classes during the first two weeks in June for children from first grade and above. The second two weeks of the month a class is planned for pre-school children. The learn-to-swim classes for the younger group have never been held before in the county.

If the pool is completed on schedule, a course will be held in

late May for Junior Lifesaving certification for those who will be teaching in the learn-to-swim classes.

Parents of children interested in the swimming instruction should watch for further announcements of the program. If the classes are scheduled, buses will be used to transport local children to Coleman each day for the classes.

While tornado funnels dipped around the Coleman and Brown County area Tuesday night, the Santa Anna community only received a good shower and very light hail.

Twisters did considerable damage in the Coleman area Tuesday night, destroying a house near Hords Creek Lake, tearing down power lines along the Winters Highway west of Coleman, and damaging barns and outbuildings north of that city. There were no injuries from the storm.

Damage was reported north of Brownwood during the evening as the city of Brownwood was in a storm alert area and residents were urged to seek safety from a tornado that was reported headed for the town about 11 p.m.

In Santa Anna Tuesday night, .50 inch of rain was measured, with very light hail.

**Stacy Dam Given TWC Approval Last Tuesday**

After a marathon 18-month hearing, the Texas Water Commission in Austin granted unanimous approval Tuesday of the Stacy Dam and Reservoir to built in south Coleman County. The project on the Colorado River has support of Coleman County and most of West Texas but is opposed by downstream groups and cities.

Permit No. 3866 grants approval for the construction of a dam to impound 554,300 acre feet of water. A steam-electric generating station is also proposed for the site.

The permit requires the Water District to begin construction of the facility within two years if plans have the Commission's approval. Opponents of the project have about 45 days to seek a hearing for the appeal of the decision.
