SAHS Girls To Compete In Regional Track Meet

Seven Santa Anna girls will be taking part in the Regional UIL Track Meet this weekend at McMurry College in Abilene. The meet will be Friday and Saturday at Indian Stadium.

Girls who qualified in field events are Loretta Collins and Celeste Simmons in both discus and shot put, and Gayla Pritchard in the triple jump.

Loretta set a new district record in discus with 104'7". Gayla also set a new district record by covering 33'6 3/4" in the triple jump event. She also was first in the district long jump with 15'3 1/2". Belinda Phillips was second and also to compete at regional. Celeste will also

represent Santa Anna in the high jump event.

Loretta will compete in the 100 yard dash and is a member of the 440 and 880 yard relay teams that will seek the regional title. Others on the relay teams are Gayla Pritchard, Belinda Phillips and Carolyn Lewis.

Others who will compete this week are Grace Siller, 880 yard dash; Gayla Pritchard, 220 yard dash; Belinda Phillips and Teresa Rolfe, 80 yard hurdles.

Benefit Bike-A-Thon Event Planned Here On Saturday

"Wheels for Life" is the name of the Bike-A-Thon to be held in Santa Anna on April 21 and 28 at the school track field. The event is a benefit for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tenn.

This event is sponsored by the Blue Bird Camp Fire Girls group and will be well supervised at all times by adults. The boy or girl entering needs an entry form filled out and signed by a parent and a sponsor sheet, which may be picked up at school in Santa Anna or by calling Mrs. James Puckett at 348-3450.

Manufacturing Plant To Open In Brownwood

FMC Corporation announced last week that it will build a new manufacturing facility for valves and wellhead products at Brownwood, Texas. The announcement was made by Charles T. Jones, Vice President and General Manger for FMC's Petroleum Equipment Group, which is headquartered in Houston. Jones said that the new plant reflects the growing worldwide demand for wellhead products.

Plans call for a 90,000-square foot facility, combining office and manufacturing space, located close to Brownwood's southern boundary, off Highway 377.

Construction will begin immediately, with completion scheduled for early 1980. When fully operational, the plant will employ approximately 300.

"We chose Brownwood after very extensive consideration of numerous sites," Jones said. "We found in Brownwood the combination we had been looking for--dedicated municipal officials, a good labor force, a convenient plant site, and the type of overall community environment FMC always looks for when considering a new operating location. We are confident that our decision to build in Brownwood makes good sense for us and for the community, and we look forward to a long and mutually rewarding relationship."

The Brownwood plant will be part of the Wellhead Equipment Division of FMC's Petroleum Equipment Group. Other Well-

head manufacturing operations are in Houston; Lafayette, La.; Singapore; Cordoba, Argentina; and Dunfermline, Scotland.

A major manufacturer of products for the petroleum industry, FMC's Petroleum Equipment Group produces swivel joints, unions, truck and tank car loading equipment, marine loading systems, butterfly valves, plug valves, safety relief valves, wellhead equipment, gate valves, and sub-sea wellhead systems.

Cong. Stenholm To Visit County

Congressman Charles Stenholm will be in Coleman April 21 as guest of the Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District, according to Ben Wilson, Chairman of the district board. Beginning at 9:30 that morning, Stenholm will make a tour of farms in the district to observe conservation on the land and the public is invited to make the tour, Wilson said.

The group will assemble on the parking lot near the Agricultural office in the Rhone Building west of the Coleman County Courthouse. The tour will last about two hours and will conclude about four miles east of Coleman, Wilson continued.

The outing will afford the Congressman an opportunity to examine conservation work on the land under various programs sponsored by the SWCD and give citizens of the area a chance to hear the views of the Congressman firsthand, Wilson concluded.

Power Outage Here Friday

The second power outage in less than a week had as many as 43 West Texas Utilities customers without electricity Friday. A distribution primary line on Bowie Avenue was apparently struck by a vehicle and broken, causing the outage that lasted as long as five hours for some of the customers in the neighborhood.

The power went off at 8:45 a.m. and was completely restored soon after noon by a crew that came from Abilene.

Combined bank deposits in Coleman County as of March 31 are at another all-time high, up slightly from the year-end report and up almost \$6 million from a year ago.

The combined deposit figure for First-Coleman National Bank, Coleman Bank and Santa Anna National Bank is \$57,597,814.16.

Loans at \$31,118,826.60 are down slightly from the year-end report but are up in excess of \$5 million from a year ago.

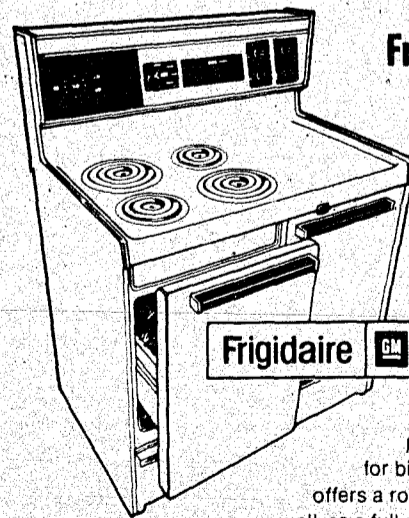
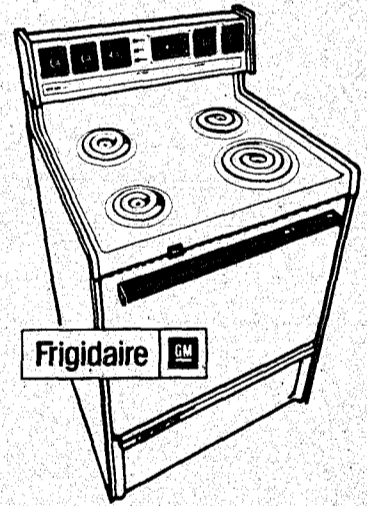

WTU Coal-powered Plant Set For Vernon Area

West Texas Utilities Co. Thursday announced the purchase of a site eight miles southeast of Vernon for construction of a new coal-fired electric generating plant.

The plant will be built on a 1920-acre tract purchased from the W.T. Waggoner Estate. Center of the site is about three miles southwest of Oklaunion and the same distance from the Fort Worth and Denver Railway.

The land purchase agreement was signed Thursday, April 12 at the Waggoner Building in Vernon by Jerry J. Johnson, WTU vice president and director of administrative services, and Killen Moore, trustee of the W.T. Waggoner Estate.

First indication that a power plant would be constructed somewhere in the Lake Kemp-Lake Diversion area came in December, 1976, when it was announced that WTU had contracted for water rights from the lake system. The contract with the City of Wichita Falls and the Wichita County Water Improvement District Number Two provides for WTU to use up to 20,000 acre feet of water per year for power generation. A permit also has been granted by the State Water Rights Commission.

West Texas Utilities is an investor-owned electric company which serves in a 53-county area extending from the Red River to the Rio Grande. General offices are in Abilene. Vernon is in the Company's Panhandle District, which is headquartered in Childress, with A. D. Green as district manager.

The new power plant will be operated by WTU, but is presently being considered as a joint

project to be shared by other companies in the Central and South West System. Engineering design and construction of the new plant will be managed by CSW.

No date has been set for actual beginning of construction, but Meller said preliminary environmental impact studies will start immediately.

Present plans call for an ultimate generating capability of about 2 million kilowatts. This would make it one of the largest power plants in the state, and by far the largest in WTU territory.

The plant will consist of three generating units, to be built successively, which means that construction work at the site possible will be under way for about 15 years. Total cost is expected to exceed \$1 billion.

The first of the generating units is expected to be in commercial operation by 1987.

The decision to turn to coal for future generation was made after the Railroad Commission of Texas ruled that natural gas could not be used as boiler fuel in new plants, and that the use of gas in existing plants must be reduced beginning in 1981.

WTU's plans call for use of low sulphur western coal. The coal probably will come from Wyoming or Colorado.

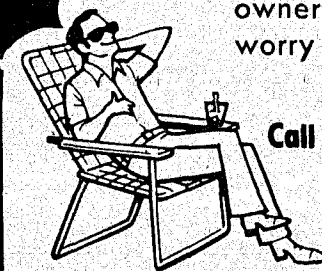
