

Saturday Train Derailment Results In Chemical Spill

east of Santa Anna Saturday, causing ten freight cars to leave the track and damaging approxiamately 600 feet of track.

Three tank cars containing the Chemical isotentene, used to make synthetic rubber and other synthetics, caused concern when they were overturned and one tank started leaking the substance from the dome top.

A chemical expert from the Bureau of Explosives of in Houston was rushed to the site to determine the danger and to give advice on the clean-up operation. The spill was limited to the immediate area and created no problem, according to Dave Reynolds, Santa Fe Trainmaster from Brownwood. The county road near the site was blocked following the derailment and until the clean-up began.

The mishap, for which the exact cause has not been listed. occurred about 8 a. m. Saturday. The location is adjacent to the Jess Howard farm and about a mile south of Highway 84, one and one-half miles east of town.

Trains were back in operation by noon Sunday, and the entire site was cleared of all damage by 5 p. m. that afternoon.

The Warren Aldridges, who live nearest the site, did not know of the derailment until they saw the crews and equipment working at the site that is about a mile from their home.



Census Jobs

Coleman County

The U.S. Census Bureau has a number of temporary jobs open during the next few weeks in Coleman County to help prepare address lists for use during the 1980 census.

Temporary census workers will work three to four weeks each and will be paid on a per-address collected basis. For an eight-hour day, the average worker will earn \$27 to \$30 per day plus 17 cents per-mile for any driving done in a private vehicle. Applicants for the jobs must be 18 years old or over. a U. S. citizen, and pass a written

The work involves driving or walking to compile lists of addresses of each dwelling unit in designated areas of the county. These address lists will play a vital role in taking the 1980 census. They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionaires to be sent to each household in America on March 28, 1980. Then, a few weeks following the April 1 Census takers must then be sent to each non-responding household to collect the information required on the census form.

The 1979 address collection activity in the county is part of a Census Bureau program involving 35,000 temporary workers nationwide to compile lists containing approximately 30 million addresses. Another 50 million addresses have been purchased from commercial mailing list companies.


