Ginning Season Ends In S-Anna

The 1978 cotton season reached well into 1979 as ginning continued though this week at Santa Anna Co-op Gin.

Manager William Brown reported a total of 925 bales this season, well over 568 ginned here last year. Price for cotton ended at 49-53 cents per pound, slightly above the previous season.

Most of the cotton ginned here was from the Gouldbush area. Small amounts were from Trickham, Shields and a few bales from Brown County.

Gin workers are now preparing the local facility for the idle spring and summer months.

Track Meet Scheduled Here

Friday and Saturday will be busy days in Santa Anna as the annual track meet will be held. Friday will be competition for high school teams, and Saturday will be the annual A. D. Donham Memorial Relays for junior high teams. Both boys and girls teams will participate.

Coach Bill Jennings will serve as meet director. Pete Simmons will be announcer.

The Booster Club is sponsor of the meet, and Mrs. James Perry will serve as chairman of the

concession stand committee, having the stand open all day both days.

The track meet will get underway Friday with field events starting at 9 a.m. Preliminary running events will start at 10 o'clock, and finals are set for 2 p.m.

Thirty-four schools are to have teams at the Friday meet. They include Evant, Moran, Mertzon,

Divide, Mullin, Rising Star, Rule, Blanket, Paint Rock, Abilene Christian, Gustine, Eden, Bronte, Miles, Rochester, Water Valley, Baird and Christoval.

The Winning relay teams and the high point teams will be awarded trophies in the high school division. Medals will be awarded first through third place winners.

R-wood Coal Mining Permit Issued Amistad Company

Amistad Fuel Company of San Antonio has been issued the permit to surface mine sub-bituminous coal in the Rockwood area. The permit was approved several months ago but issuance was delayed on completion of bonding requirements by the firm.

From reports, foundation work on the processing plant will begin in April. Electric lines have been run to the area. It is also likely

that test pit work will begin soon to demonstrate the ability of equipment to take off the overburden.

The company, a subsidiary of Kaiser Cement and Gypsum Corp. of Oakland, Calif., expects to mine 200,000 tons of coal per year, most of which will be used at the Kaiser Cement plant in San Antonio.

The mine location is southwest of Rockwood.

Rochester Man Dies Here Of Apparent Heart Attack

Odell R. Cox, 72, City Manager of Rochester in Haskell County, died Sunday near Santa Anna of an apparent heart attack. He was pronounced dead of natural causes by Justice of the Peace Gale Brock.

Mr. Cox and his wife were enroute home from San Antonio when their auto had a flat tire

about ten miles south of Santa Anna. Mr. Cox collapsed while changing the tire, at about 11:30 a. m.

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Newman were first at the scene and summoned Henderson ambulance.

Funeral services were pending Monday in Rochester.

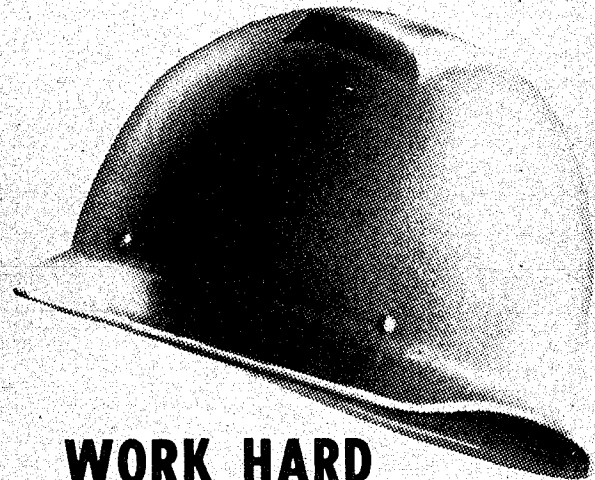
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Volunteers Sought For 'Block Homes'
