More Rainfall In S-Anna Area

The largest single rain this year was reported Wednesday, falling during the night. The official gauge at the R. W. Balke home measured 1.35 inches.

Other moisture during the past week includes 1.05 inches Friday and Saturday, March 16 and 17, and an additional .25 inch Monday, March 19, making a total for the week of 2.65 inches.

South of Santa Anna in the Leedy Community 2.50 inches was reported Tuesday night, with an additional inch during the previous weekend. Other areas had from two to three inches during the past week.

March rainfall in Santa Anna now stands at 3.17 inches.

City Sales Tax Shows Increase

Although the city sales tax receipts in most Texas towns dropped slightly during the first three months of 1979, Santa Anna had a 19 percent increase over the same period last year.

Sales tax funds collected with the State tax and returned to Santa Anna for the period ending March 1 was \$3,031.47; the tax collection for the same period in 1978 was \$2,463.48.

The sales tax receipts for Santa Anna for 1979 have totaled \$4,762.83.

Improvements On US 283 Planned To County Line

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed improvement of U. S. Highway 283, from 1.0 mile south of Rockwood, South to the Colorado River.

Since the Federal Highway Administration has concurred in the Social Economic and Environmental Assessment of this project work will begin on the next phase

of engineering necessary for the development of the project.

The proposed improvement will provide an improved grade line, structure widening, additional base and a two course surface treatment. The improvement will provide 2-12 ft. traffic lanes with 8 ft. paved shoulders. The southerly 1.6 miles will require additional right of way from both sides.

This project is being developed cooperatively with the Federal Highway Administration, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and Coleman County.

Work on Highway 283 from Santa Anna to Home Creek was completed last year, and rebuilding of the Home Creek to Rockwood portion is now underway.





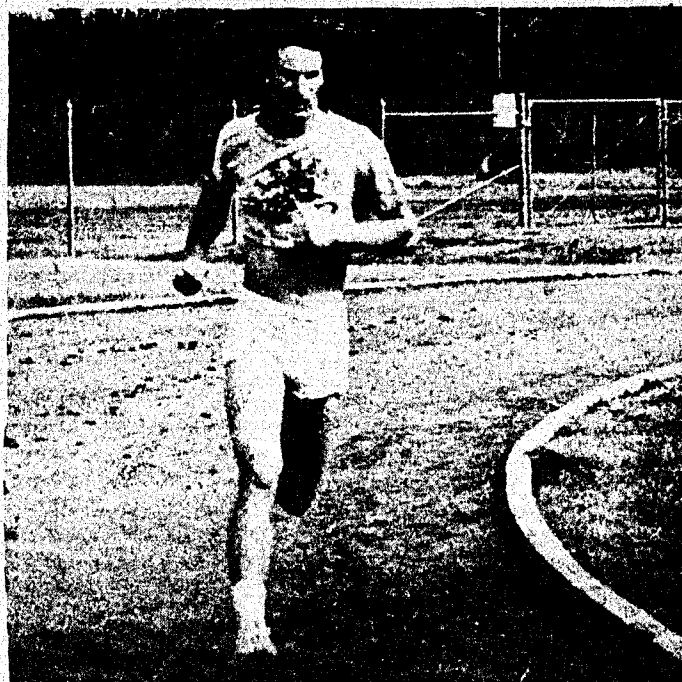
