Slide Presentation, Program Sunday At Northside Church

It required 24 years of trying to get in—but Ira Y. Rice, Jr., missionary of the Church of Christ to Southeast Asia for the past quarter-century, finally was admitted into mainland China this January and will present a slide-report of his journey to the Northside Church in Santa Anna at 7:00 o'clock the evening of May 27. The public is invited.

If Communist China had been open to missionaries, when Rice first carried the gospel of Christ into the Far East, in 1955, he would have gone there to begin. Since the door at the time was closed, he first preached in Singapore, later in Malaysia, and still later in Taiwan.

Having helped found Four Seas College of Bible and Missions in 1965 in Singapore, he later served as its president for two years, and

Adventists Oppose New Constitution

In the wake of Proposition 13, 27 state legislatures have called on the U. S. Congress to convene a new constitutional convention in order to guarantee a balanced federal budget. Only seven more are needed before Congress can call such a convention.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church opposes this drive. Calling a new constitutional convention would give the writers an unlimited mandate to scrap the existing Constitution and the Bill of Rights.

W. Melvin Adams, director of religious liberty for the adventist denomination, with headquarters at Washington, D. C., says the delicate balance of freedom of religion embodied in the first amendment could be wiped away in a single stroke by the new convention. In addition, freedom of speech and the press, freedom of assembly and the right to bear arms are all found in the first ten amendments to the present Constitution.

As important as a balanced budget is, the church believes the way to mandate it is for Congress to pass a constitutional amendment and the states to ratify it, if they choose. Going the route of a new convention to rewrite the Constitution is too dangerous to think about.

"Blue Sunday" Laws could easily come in, and Texas has already experienced what that can mean to many businesses. Santa Anna has been free from such experiences so far. It will be well to keep affairs this way.

Jimmy Riddle, representative for the Christian Braille Foundation, Inc., visited in Santa Anna over the weekend, in the interest of the blind.

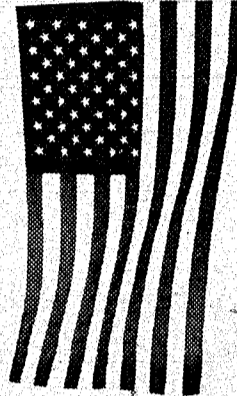

P.O. Regulations Set For Undersized Envelopes

"Use your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15, 1979," Postmaster John C. Gregg urged U. S. Postal Service customers recently. This is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Santa Anna Postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/2 inches high or 5 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed. The postmaster said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"However, many customers are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Gregg said.

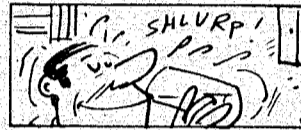
The new regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future cards must be at least seven-thousandth (.007) of an inch thick. The official postal

card sold by the Postal Service, for instance, has a thickness of nine-thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.

The standards also affect oversized and odd-shaped pieces of mail, the postmaster said. For first-class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces measuring more than 6 and one-eighth inches high or 11 1/2 inches long.

For more information, the postmaster suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.

Choose SS Info For Accuracy

Some books sold as social security information are useful, but there are others that are inaccurate, misleading, overpriced, and deceptively advertised. Ms. Tercero, social security branch manager in Brownwood, said recently.

The Social Security Administration doesn't discourage the sale of commercial publications, Tercero said. At the same time, we don't endorse any non-government publication. People can get free, accurate, up-to-date publications and other information about social security at any social security office.

Social security information is organized and illustrated in a different way in some commercial books. Some of them are well done, but the information in them isn't "secret" or "inside". If advertising suggests it is, the advertising is false.

Some advertising hints that a publisher has an official connection with the Social Security Administration and has access to people's social security records, Tercero said. This is never true. No advertiser has access to other people's social security records. These records are confidential under the law.

Dramatic claims for books can be misleading, Tercero said. For example: an advertisement says readers will learn "how to collect \$300 a month from social security at age 30 while you are working full time." The book tells you what any social security office will tell you without charge: if a young father and mother are both working under social security and one dies, their children may get monthly social security payments.

People can call, write, or visit any social security office for information about the retirement, disability, survivors, Medicare, and supplemental security income programs.

A representative of the Brownwood office visits Santa Anna every 2nd and 4th Wednesdays. The representative can be found at the Housing Authority Office. The office hours are 9:30 a.m. until 12:00 noon.

IT'S A FACT!

Producing from the Cross Cut pay, it had an absolute flow of 2,200,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily.

Production is from perforations at 1,356-68 feet.

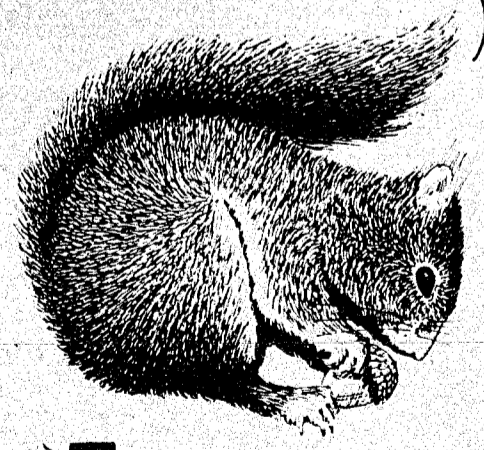

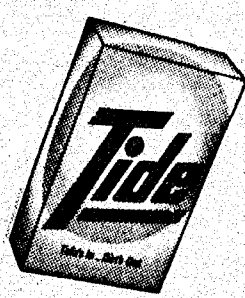


Albert Salazar is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Salazar. He has attended school at Santa Anna since enrolling in the first grade.

He lists baseball, fishing, hunting, skiing, football and tennis as his hobbies.

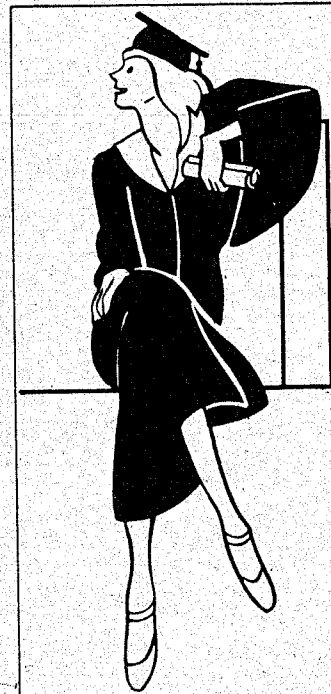

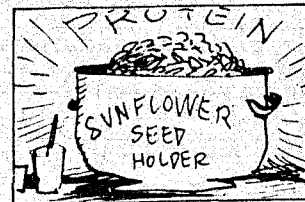
Don Eubank, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Eubank, has attended school in Santa Anna since starting in first grade.

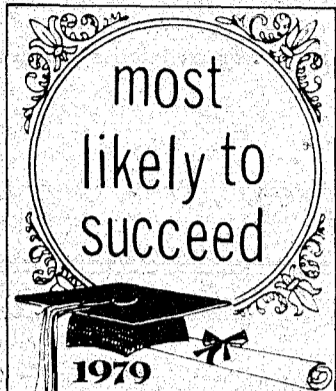

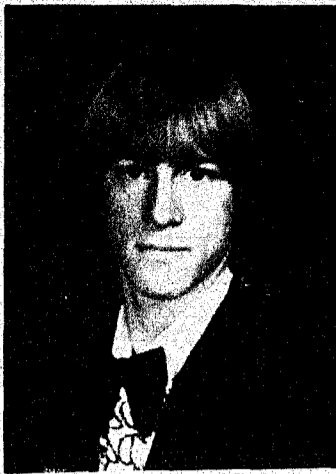

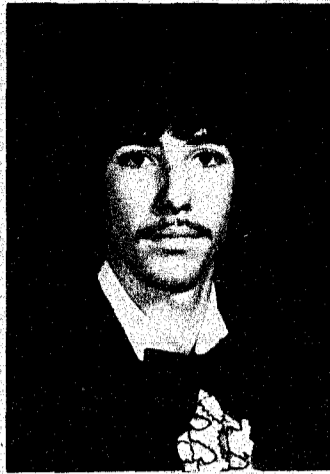

Her plans are to work this summer, then to decide on future plans.



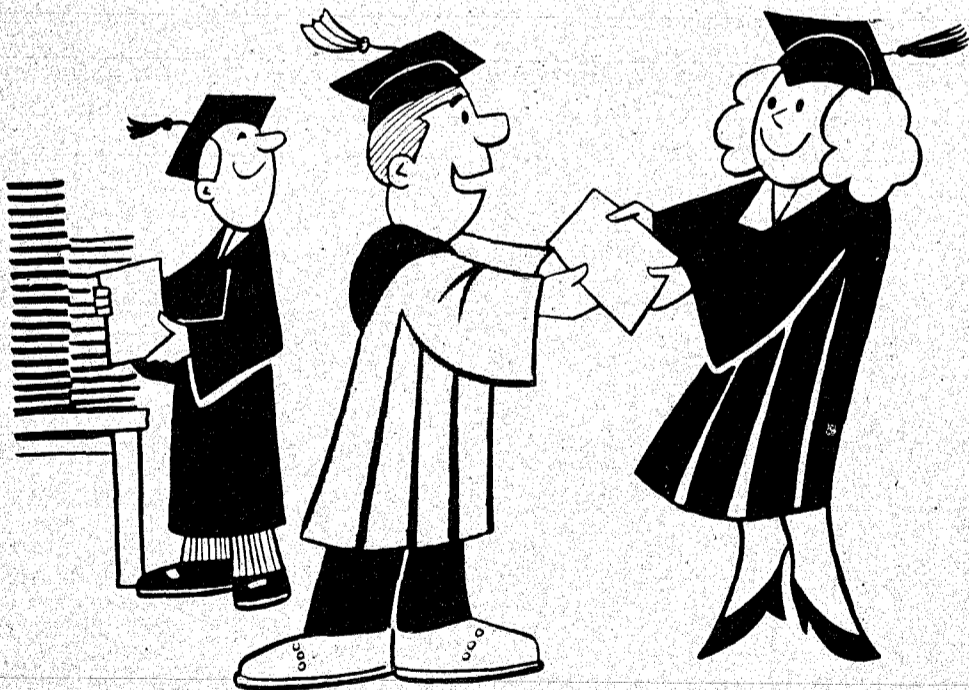
DAVID WAYNE THOMPSON

She is a member of the Band and Stage Band.

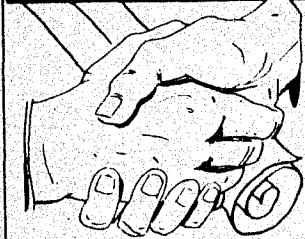
Grace wants to have a career in health, working toward a degree in nursing. She will enroll in Angelo State University this fall.

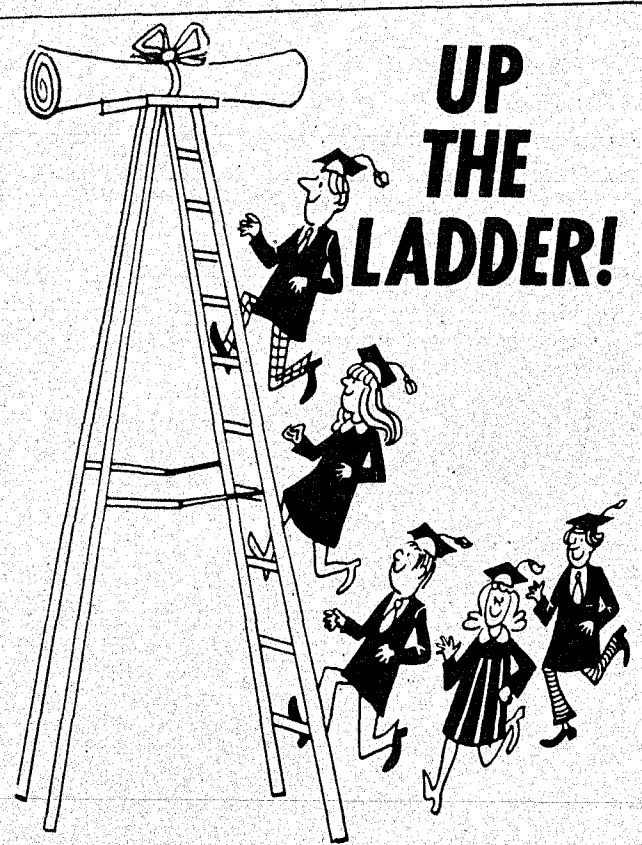
Rodeoing, horse training and working as a jockey are main interests of the SAHS senior. He plans to enroll in Angelo State University this fall to study animal science.

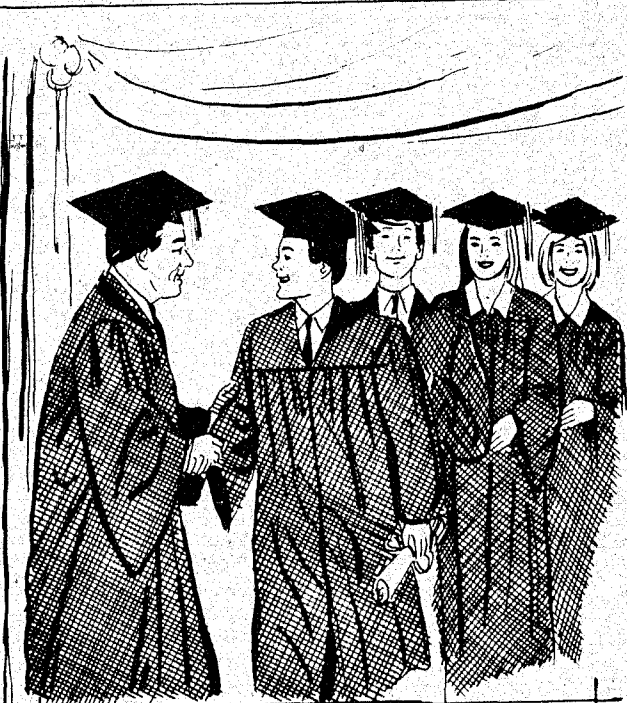
