## Summer Recreation Activities Start Swimming Classes Start Monday At New Coleman County Pool

Coleman County youngsters will start summer swimming classes at the new Coleman Pool next Monday, June 4.

Santa Anna children will be transported to Coleman by bus each weekday morning for the lessons. Cost will be 75 cents per day that will include transportation and instruction.

Monday through Friday, June 4

- 15, classes will be held from 9 to 10 a.m. for intermediate and advanced swimmers, from 11 - 12 for beginning swimmers, and from 12 to 1 for advanced beginners. The bus will leave Santa Anna at 8:30 each morning and return after 1 o'clock. All students must have had at least one year of school to qualify for these classes.

June 18 - 29 there will be a basic rescue and water safety (Junior Lifesaving) lessons for those 11 years of age and above, and from 10 to 11 a.m. there will be a class for toddlers (children out of diapers and accompanied by a parent or other adult).

From 11 to 12 there will be a class for children who completed kindergarten the previous year. From 12 - 1 p.m. a class for exceptional children will be taught.

There is no advance registration for classes except the exceptional children.

Added to the program for children is a class for adult

swimming (beginners and basic survival) to be held June 11-22, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. Water Safety Instructor Aid course and other programs will be announced later.

Qualified instructors will be teaching the classes at the new city-county facility located at Coleman City Park. No swimming classes were held last year, so response is expected to be good this year. About 65 Santa Anna children are expected for the first two-week session.

Mrs. Charles Hosch is chairman of the local committee making arrangements for the swimming program. Parents are asked to bring their children to school by 8:15 a.m. Monday so that they may be enrolled and so parents may be assigned a day to ride the bus to the pool.

Buses have not been reserved for the second session, June 18 - 29, so parents of toddlers and kindergarten children should make plans to take their children or organize car pools to provide transportation.

## Tennis Lessons Are Scheduled For Local Students and Adults

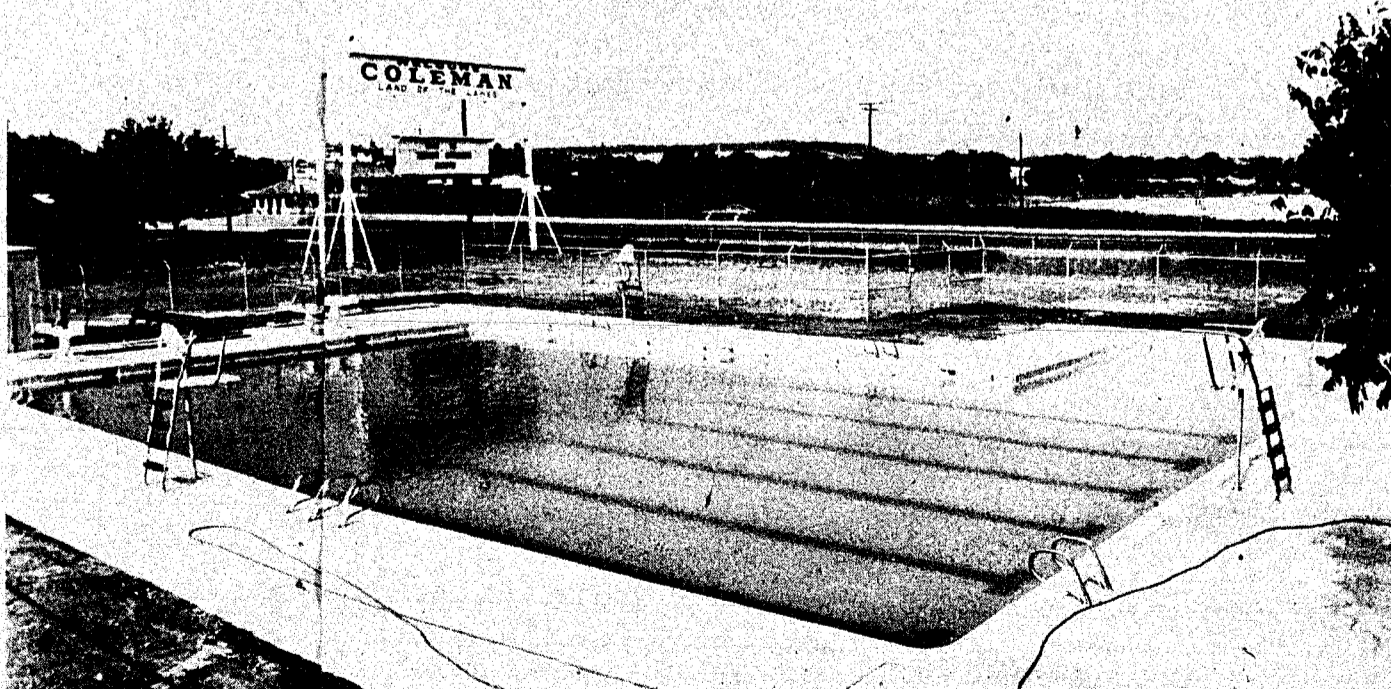

Drowning took the life of a ten-year-old Texas City boy last week, a former Santa Anna resident.

Paul Dwayne Switzer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Switzer of Texas City, was pronounced dead on arrival at Danforth Memorial Hospital in Texas City Tuesday, May 22. The child fell into a canal near the Switzer home while playing with a friend.

Funeral services were held Thursday, May 24, with burial in Galveston Memorial Gardens in Hitchcock.

The child was born June 27, 1969 in Brady while the family was living in the Whon Community. They moved from Coleman County when Paul was ten months of age and had resided in Texas City the past four years. He was a fourth grade student.

Survivors are his parents; three brothers, Ronnie Switzer of Webster, Gerald and Steve of the home; a sister, Mrs. Debbie Little of Texas City; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. T. R. Brown of Reedley, Calif.; his paternal grandfather, A. E. Switzer of Santa Anna.

## Local Methodists Slated To Attend Conference

Balloting for delegates to represent the 121,184 member Central Texas Annual Conference at next year's quadrennial meetings of the United Methodist General Conference and the eight-state regional South Central Jurisdictional Conference is expected to extend throughout the four-day meeting of the annual conference opening June 3 at Waco's Convention Center.

The Central Texas Annual Conference is one of seven Methodist conferences meeting within a four-week period in Texas and New Mexico. The conferences are composed of an equal number of clergy and laity.

This annual session will elect six clergy and six laity delegates to represent them at the denomi-

nation's law-making General Conference scheduled for April 15-25, 1980, in Indianapolis.

Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, resident bishop of the Dallas-Fort Worth area, convenes the Central Texas Annual Conference at 7:00 PM, Sunday, June 3 in Chisholm Hall of the Convention Center in Waco. The conference continues through Wednesday noon, at which time Bishop Stowe reads the pastoral appointments for the new year.

Representatives from the Santa Anna United Methodist Church who will attend will be Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Lowe and the pastor, Rev. Ellis Holden Jr. and son, Wendell.

## SDA School Term Ended Thursday

The Santa Anna Seventh-day Adventist Church School under the direction of David Morris, closed last Thursday for the summer vacation.

Since there were no eighth grade pupils the past year, there was no graduation service. Dean Cabansag was taking ninth grade work and will be going on to a full Academy area next fall.

The Santa Anna school is one of a "chain" of schools operated by the Seventh-day Adventist denomination throughout the entire world. They operate the second largest Protestant church school system in the United States and the largest Protestant in the overseas.

The church's system of higher education dates back to 1874 when their first college began at Battle Creek, Michigan. Elementary schools were operated before that.

The membership in the local school has not been large, only seven this year. It is not to compete with public schools, which they hold in very high esteem. But the Bible is taught in every grade, from first to the highest year in the universities. This is not done in the public schools and should not be taught there.

David Morris, the teacher, has contracted to teach the local school during the next term.

In London, Portland or Brownwood a stock dog commanded to "come by" will run right. "Steady" will bring the dog to a straight walk while "there" will order him to stop and lie down.

world the public rarely gets to see. The chance comes up June 2 at the Texas Sheep Dog Trials near Zephyr. Dogs from Texas, and as far away as Arizona, will be competing at the Loy Miller ranch near Zephyr Saturday, June 2. The dogs will be judged on how they gather and herd sheep through a course of gates, into a pen.

"It's not a speed contest," Miller explains. "Speed helps, but the real test is precision. How smoothly the dog handles the stock and how directly he guides them through the course."

Loy Miller trains registered border collies for the stock work, but the Texas Sheep Dog Association is not confined to collies. The border collie is probably the most common stock dog, but certainly not the only breed.

A well trained dog often brings a price between four and seven hundred dollars. Some sell as high as \$1,000. Miller begins training his animals between ten months and one year. He says he can have an animal obeying commands by three months of work. But a minimum of another year is needed to ready the dog for trial competition.

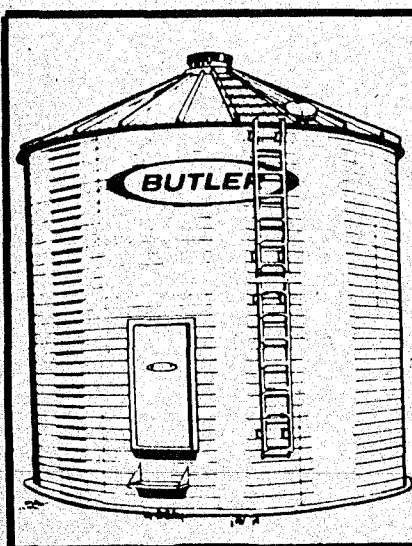

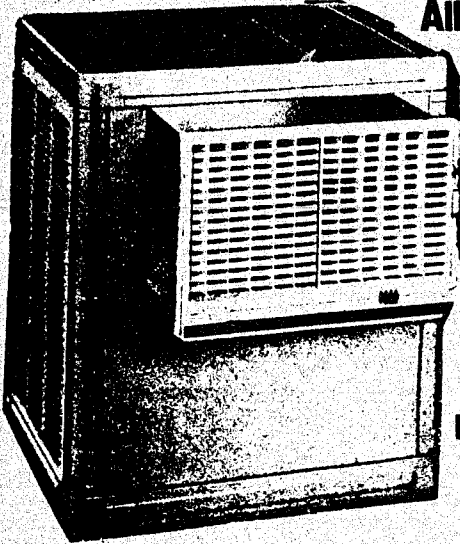

## TWC Rehearing Set Soon On Stacy Reservoir Project

AUSTIN— The Texas Water Commission has granted a rehearing -- in order to change language to meet a court decision regarding what constitutes a "final" order -- in its decision on Stacy Reservoir.

The three-member commission granted the request for rehearing to amend two sections of its order granting water rights to Colorado River Municipal Water District, in order to make the changes.

The permit required that the district furnish an operating manual on the reservoir for TWC

approval, but attorneys contended that under a court decision, that provision meant that the approval of the permit was not "final" -- because it was conditioned upon some future condition being met.

Therefore, the commission granted the rehearing, and altered the language in the permit.

A formal order was to be issued, last week with the opponents of the project -- principally the Lower Colorado River Authority and the City of Austin -- having another 15 days to request a further rehearing, and CRMWD having 10 days from that 15 days to enter a reply.

## S-Security Spouse Benefits Are Listed By Officials

Recent changes in the Social Security Act liberalize benefits paid to spouses of social security beneficiaries. In early 1977, Congress passed several amendments to the Social Security Act, making substantial changes in the requirements necessary for a husband or wife of a worker to draw benefits. These changes include the length of marriage requirement in the case of divorced spouses, the rate of the benefit for a remarried widow or widower, the necessity of filing for benefits in the month of a worker's death, and the newly established offset of benefits for a spouse who is also receiving a public pension.

In 1965, the law was amended to allow a divorced spouse to receive benefits on the former marriage partner, so long as there was no current marriage and they had been married at least 20 years. The 1977 amendments reduced this length of marriage requirement to 10 years effective January, 1979. This is true whether the worker is alive or deceased.

Changes were also effective in January 1979 with respect to the amount of money a remarried widow or widower may receive. Prior to these amendments a widow or widower who remarried after the age 60 was often subject to a reduction in their social security benefit. They were limited to one-half of the deceased

spouse's primary benefit except in the case of a minimum benefit case. This often meant a reduction to their social security benefit. The law, as amended, provides that a widow or widower who remarries after age 60, can now either continue to receive their full survivors' benefit or a spouse's benefit on the current husband or wife, which ever is larger. This will prevent reduction in benefits due to remarriage after the age of 60.

The amendments also limit possible retroactivity. Effective 1978, it is no longer possible to be assured of several month's retroactive benefits prior to the month the application is filed. This is especially important in the event of the death of a worker. Potential widows and widower beneficiaries should contact their local social security office during the month of the worker's death.

This will prevent the possible loss of benefits to them. The new amendments provide that reduced benefits, in most cases, can only be paid starting with the month of filing. A telephone call to your local social security office can prevent any possible loss of benefits.

More information concerning these changes and any other questions may be obtained by contacting your local social security office.

## Boating Safety Is Stressed During Summer

Governor William P. Clements, Jr. has proclaimed June 1-7, 1979, as "Texas Safe Boating Week" in conjunction with National Safe Boating Week.

The National Safe Boating Council has designated June 1-7 as National Safe Boating Week in recognition of the growing number of Americans who spend their recreational time on the water. The idea behind this campaign is that boating for the amateur, as well as the professional sportsman, can be more fun if it is done right, with safety in mind.

But safety is very important in the large industry. Last year, 96 Texans -- 88 men and 8 women -- died in boating related accidents. Thirty-nine percent of the accidents occurred in lakes, 20 percent in rivers and 10 percent in the Gulf of Mexico. Various creeks, ponds, tanks, bayous and other bodies of water accounted for the remainder of the accidents.

Mrs. Jeffee Palmer, water safety consultant for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in Austin, reminded boaters to carry at least one flotation device or life preserver for each individual in a boat while on the water, as required by Texas Law.
