## Rain Last Weekend Delays

### Excellent Area Grain Harvest

What is expected to be one of the largest grain harvests in years should be well underway by the end of this week if there is no additional rain. The combining started last week in this area, then was stopped by rains in the area Friday and Saturday.

Central Texas Grain Co. in Santa Anna has already shipped about five railroad cars of grain at mid-week. Also receiving the grain are buyers in Coleman and

Brownwood, and some grain will be stored on the farms.

On Tuesday the price of good oats was \$1.70 a bushel; wheat was priced at \$3.75.

Santa Anna had very light showers Friday, but Saturday night there were showers in the south part of the community with Rockwood receiving about one-half inch and at Trickham as much as two inches were reported.

## ISD To See Little Change Under New School Tax Bill

The newly-adopted school finance legislation is expected to have little affect on the income for the Santa Anna Independent School District next year, according to Superintendent R. C. Smith.

The first figures received here on the new school finance bill shows the local school to gain only \$400 over the previous year. This is based on the average daily attendance (ADA) for the 1977-78 school year. However the past year's ADA was down by about 30 over the previous year, so the revenue could possibly be several hundred dollars less than the stated figure.

According to the new figures, three Coleman County schools will benefit greatly from the new tax and finance structure. Coleman is shown to gain \$44,500; Mozelle is to be increased by \$37,400 and Talpa-Centennial will increase \$27,600. Novice, the smallest district in the county, will lose \$1,500 under the first projected figures.

Supt. Smith attributed the difference to be in the agricultural land use valuation, with local farm and ranch land always taxed at nearer productive value than at market value. Also causing a decrease locally will be the homestead and over-65 exemptions that will cut half or more from the taxes of homes valued at \$10,000 or less. Local property is already taxed at only 40 percent of market value.

The new figure is based on an additional \$13,300 in state aid, then reduced by as estimated \$12,900 created by the exemptions.

Another figure being eyed by school administrators and trustees is a reduction by some two million dollars in mineral evaluations in the Santa Anna District. There has been less oil and gas exploration and production in the district than in previous years.

Supt. Smith will be in San Angelo Wednesday of next week to take part in a meeting on school finance.

## Emergency Farm Loans Available Through FmHA

Emergency loans for farmers and ranchers are available through the county office of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA). Mr. Harold D. Kennedy, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Mr. Kennedy asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the tornado, April 10, 1979, and winstorm and hail, April 29, 1979, make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at the Rhone Building, Coleman, Texas.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay.

Loans may be made to

applicants to cover actual losses and expenses for damaged or destroyed farm property and production. Such loans may be used to repair, restore, or replace damaged or destroyed farm property and supplies; for expenses incurred for crop production; and to pay farm debts owed to other creditors.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until January 17, 1980 for physical losses and April 21, 1980 for production losses.

Farmers Home Administration office is open five days a week - Monday through Friday - 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

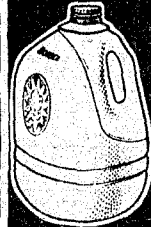

### Screwworms Are Confirmed During Month

Screwworms made their first laboratory-confirmed appearance of 1979 in Karnes and DeWitt counties during May as the Texas count reached 13, says Dr. James E. Novy, director of the Screwworm Laboratory.

The newly developed Screwworm Adult Suppression System (SWASS) is being used to reduce adult screwworm fly populations in these counties. Novy says SWASS is a pellet developed by the Science and Education Administration to reduce Adult screwworm populations to a level which allows the sterile male release technique to be effective.

Novy warns that screwworms appear to be moving north in some parts of Mexico. One case has been recorded just south of El Paso in Municipio Juarez and another on the Mexico side of the Rio Grande near Eagle Pass.

Stressing that the Screwworm Laboratory urgently needs to know about any new or suspected screwworm infestations in Texas, Novy asks producers or veterinarians to use the new toll free telephone line (1-800-292-7563) to notify the Laboratory when they find a suspicious infestation in a wound of any warm blooded animal.

## Coleman County Oil Production

### Recorded For 1978

Coleman County, which has had recorded production since 1902, last year produced 901,244 barrels of crude oil at the rate of 2,469 barrels per day. Production in 1978 boosted Coleman County's production total through the end of the year to 76,251,910 barrels.

In 1978, 24 counties produced more than 10-million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of two counties from 1977; a decrease of three from 1976, and six from 1975.

The following chart shows 1978 production figures for the state's five top producing counties, all with production in excess of 47-million barrels. Yoakum retained its spot as the state's top producing county, while Gaines, moving from fourth to second, exchanged places with Scurry County. Ector remained in third place and Hockley in fifth place for the fourth consecutive year.

1. Yoakum, 71,164,311 bls.
2. Gaines, 60,706,710 bls.
3. Ector, 59,227,760 bls.
4. Scurry, 58,074,266 bls.
5. Hockley, 47,426,886 bls.

Gregg County, the first Texas county to produce more than two-billion barrels of crude oil in the history of recorded production, remains the all-time leader with a cumulative total through 1978 of 2,642,750,960 barrels. Ector County, through the end of last year, had produced 2,195,128,255 barrels.

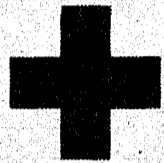

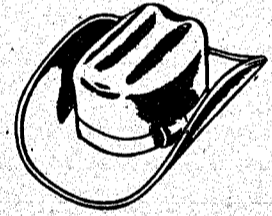

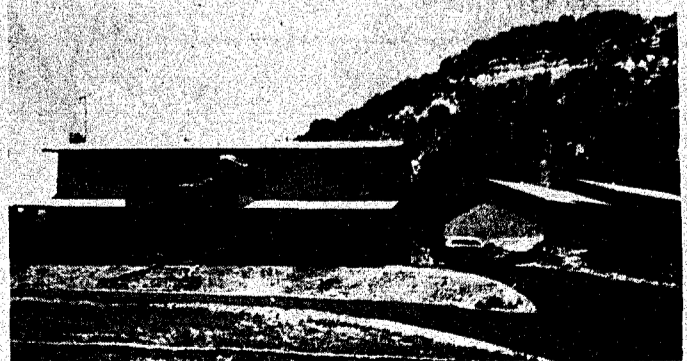

## Loans Available Through SBA For Coleman Co.

The Administrator of the Small Business Administration has issued a declaration making Coleman County and adjacent counties eligible for disaster assistance to victims of the April 10 tornados and flooding, with 7 and three-eighths percent interest loans.

Emly S. Atkinson, District Director, SBA Dallas District Office, has announced the opening of a temporary office at the County Courthouse, Coleman, Coleman County Sheriff's office on Thursday, June 7, to assist applicants in applying for disaster loans. Persons whose homes and/or personal property and

business, or inventory, were damaged or destroyed, are eligible for such loans to make repairs or obtain replacements. The loans may run for as long as 30 years in some cases; however, they are expected to be repaid in the shortest period possible without creating undue hardship to the borrower. The amount of the loan is limited to verifiable damage, less any insurance funds received, and to that amount which will restore the disaster victim's property to its original, pre-disaster condition.

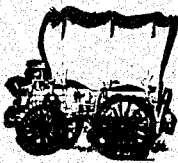
