This time last year our town was almost out of water and everyone was eager for a good rain.

This year, with weather conditions favorable and an extra-good grain crop to harvest, most folks are hoping for a few more days of clear weather in which to complete the harvest.

Estimates are in excess of five million dollars as the value of the county grain crop. The county wheat yield has been estimated as high as 1,200,000 bushels.

The harvest is thought to be more than half completed at this time.

More Resignations Here; Seven Vacancies In ISD

Four faculty members for the Santa Anna schools have submitted resignations during the past month, bringing to seven the vacancies in the local system for the coming term.

Resignations from Montie Guthrie III, Sandra Guthrie, Bettye Slaughter, and Janie Stone were accepted by the Board of Trustees at their June meeting last week.

Montie and Sandra Guthrie have been in the local system two years, he teaching remedial work in high school and Sandra an English teacher. Mrs. Stone, a one-year member of the faculty, was with special education in kindergarten through sixth grade. Mrs. Slaughter was teacher of the special education in the self-contained class at the Civic Center.

School Calendar Approved; New Term To Start Sept. 4

The 1979-80 school calendar was approved by the Board of Trustees at the June 12 business meeting. The new school term will start Tuesday, September 4.

Also included at the session last week was the approval of Henry Collyer as school auditor; John Skelton as ISD tax assessor-collector; and the Santa Anna National Bank as school depository bank.

Resignations of Sandra and Montie Guthrie III, Bettye Slaughter and Janie Stone were read and accepted.

Bills for the month were approved for payment totaling \$12,000. Major expenditure was the annual insurance premium for the school property that was over \$6,200.

Salaries and summer improvement projects were discussed but no action taken.

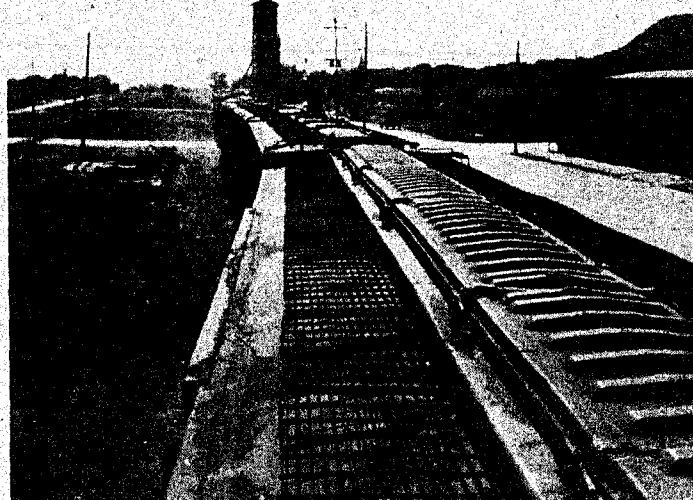
Water Project Work To Start

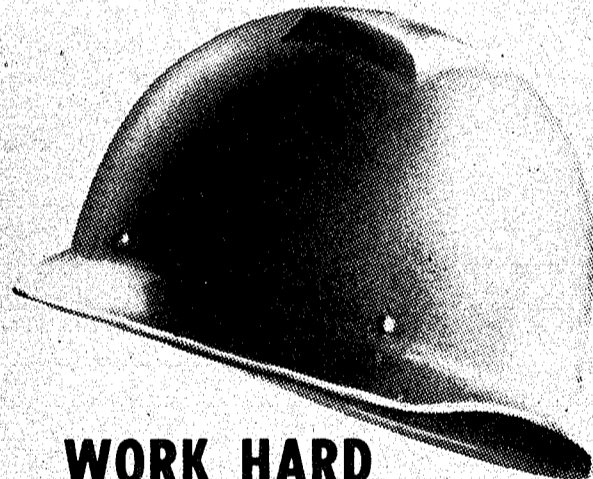

Local entries are invited in the parade, and more information may be obtained at the Coleman Chamber of Commerce office.

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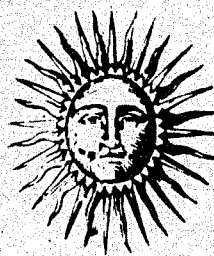

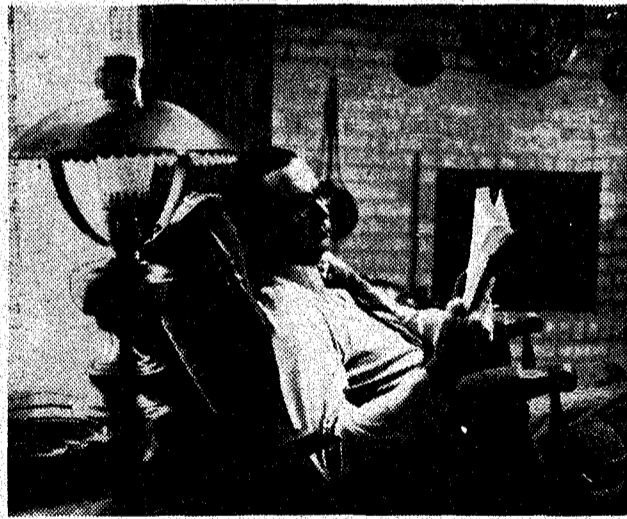

Safe Boating Is Stressed During June

June is "Safe Boating Month" in Texas, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department joins with the U. S. Coast Guard in asking boaters to learn the basic causes of boating accidents and how to prevent them.

The Coast Guard said that boating fatalities usually involve experienced, freshwater boaters in small, low-powered craft or boaters in powered craft which can't be stopped automatically. The victim frequently does not know how to swim, has no personal flotation device (life preserver) available, or has consumed some alcoholic beverage or drug.

"Injuries tend to occur to occupants of boats larger than 16 feet, with appreciable horse power, moving at high speed. In fatalities, the victim either falls or is thrown from the boat, or the boat capsizes. Injury victims in larger boats are not as likely to be thrown into the water. They usually are thrown about inside their boat when it is struck by another craft," the Coast Guard said.

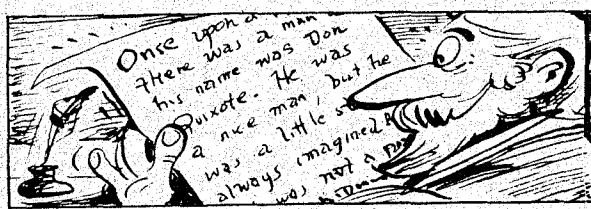
The primary causes of boating injuries are collisions with an object on or under the water, or with another boat. Collisions are caused overwhelmingly by operator error or inattention, especially when boats are moving at high speeds.

Operator vision impairment, or delayed reaction to an emergency situation are involved in most injury cases.

Stress factors such as vibration, glare, exposure to wind and weather, heat, noise and alcohol, can in an average boating day, (approximately three hours) increase an operator's reaction time to twice that of his normal, rested state.
