Football Coach, Teacher Employed For Santa Anna

Roger Goodwin has been hired as head football coach for Santa Anna High School for the coming year. He was chosen by the Board of Trustees at their called meeting last week.

A native of Rising Star, Goodwin is a graduate of Tarleton State University and has ten years coaching experience at Rankin, Rocksprings and Snyder, spending three years in Snyder.

At his latest post, he was varsity assistant and track coach.

Goodwin and his wife, Sharon, are parents of two children, Merideth, aged nine, and Toby, seven. The family will be

moving soon to the Alice Louise Walker home on North Eighth Street.

In other business at the recent school board meeting, the tax rate was approved as the past year, \$2.05 per \$100 valuation. Of that amount, \$1.50 is for general operation and 55 cents is for bonded indebtedness.

Five other vacancies remain to be filled for the coming year, and applications will be studied at the regular meeting July 10.

Work Delayed On Construction

Construction of the new Santa Anna water system has been delayed temporarily due to a delay in receiving some of the contract forms from the Farmers Home Administration office. Work is expected to begin shortly after the final paperwork is completed.

Clouse Construction Co. of Odessa is contractor for the major project and will build the seven miles of new water lines from Lake Brownwood. Sub-contracts have been let for the rebuilding of the present filtration plant at the City Lake and the construction of the new pump station at Lake Brownwood. Work by all three contractors should start at about the same time. The final portion of the project will be the new water lines within the city of Santa Anna.

Former S-Anna Resident Killed In Abilene Accident

Michael Dean Edwards, 17, son of a former Santa Anna band director, died Sunday, June 24, as a result of injuries received in a Saturday night motorcycle accident in Abilene. Also injured in the mishap was a 17-year-old companion, Marshall Newcombe III of Abilene, who was in critical condition in an Abilene hospital Monday.

Known here as Mike, the youth was the son of the late Aubrey Edwards and Lu Edwards who lived in Santa Anna several years. Mr. Edwards, a Methodist minister, died October 17, 1977.

Tragedy struck the Edwards family in 1970 when their young son, David, was struck and killed by an auto in Zephyr where Edwards was serving as pastor of the Methodist Church.

Survivors are his mother, Lu Edwards of Abilene; a sister, Adriane, also of Abilene; and his

maternal grandfather, O. W. Cook of Waxahachie.

Mike's grandmother, Mrs. O. W. Cook, suffered a heart attack and died while being notified of the young man's death Sunday night.

The youth was a junior at Cooper High School where he was active in band.

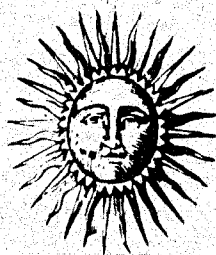

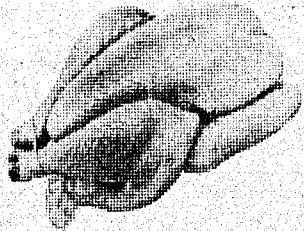

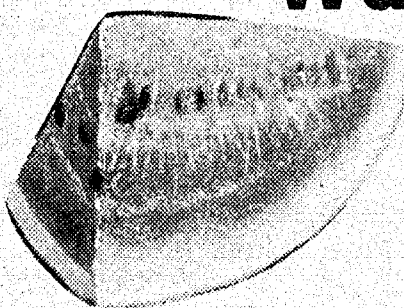
