## Suggestions Are Offered For Social Security Visits

Have you ever had the experience of calling social security and getting a busy signal for hours? Or, have you had occasion to walk into a social security office and find yourself at the end of a long line?

If you have suffered either of these incidents, then chances are you are trying to conduct your social security business at a time when the office is most likely to be its busiest. People who don't have urgent business with their social security office should not have to fight busy phones or long lines. They can pick and choose the time they conduct their business.

On the other hand, we know for sure the time of the month when people are most likely to have urgent business with social security—that's somewhere around the first week of the month when checks arrive. Lost checks, delayed checks, checks in an amount different from that expected, are the basis of anxious questions that we handle around the first of the month as quickly and as graciously as possible.

So the best time to call or visit the district office, if you don't have urgent business, is during the last 2 weeks of the month. Generally the latter part of the

week is less busy than the first part of the week, and afternoon hours get less traffic than morning hours.

We have personnel available at all times to handle applications and other social security business in the Brownwood social security office. However, for most people it saves time to conduct their business by phone.

In recent years we have streamlined our procedures so that almost any social security business can be handled by phone.

Even if you know you need to come to the office, it's still a good idea to call first. That way we can tell you what documents you need to bring and perhaps even handle part of the business right on the phone.

Starting in July a representative of the Brownwood office visits Santa Anna once a month on the 2nd Wednesday. The representative can be found at the Housing Authority Office. The office hours are 9:30 a.m. until 12:00 noon. You can call the Brownwood office with no charge. Dial Operator and ask for Enterprise 67536. Many matters can be handled by phone, even filing an application.

Monument Valley Hospital in Arizona is a well-established mission station. There the physical needs are cared for as well as carrying on regular school activities.

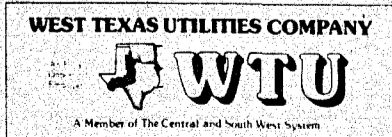

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Rare, old printing now at Texas A&M

COLLEGE STATION — The oldest examples of printing known to exist are among 85 rare books and pieces donated to Texas A&M University by Loran L. Laughlin, Salt Lake City businessman and antiques dealer.

One of the books is the world's only known copy of "Jun Mun Gyo," a Korean book reportedly printed with moveable metal type in 1439, almost 20 years before the famed Gutenberg Bible.

The claim has sparked discussion among rare book scholars and enthusiasts because the Gutenberg date of 1455 is generally regarded as the beginning of moveable type printing. The Salt Lake City collector remains convinced that the work is authentic, however.

# Little League Mom Gets Turn At Bat

## Santa Anna Native Writes of Problems

The following article is by Shirley Hale Willis of Poway, Calif., a Santa Anna native who is currently a senior student at San Diego State University and was published in the San Diego Evening Tribune, May 19. She is the daughter of Mrs. Floyd Hale, now of Fort Worth.

When I was a child and baseball captains chose teams, I would go straight to the Man at the Top for help.

"Dear God," I would say, "see that red-headed kid over there? She can't play ball either. Please let her be chosen last this time."

God and I, however, must have had a poor connection, for invariably I was left standing alone until the losing captain begrudgingly called my name, and my team groaned.

Sandlot baseball was what we played, and the rules were not the same as they are for modern baseball. Our game provided no bench; all players who were not in the infield played the outfield. Of the seven or eight of us who played leftfield, all at the same time, I was the one most "far-out." Like Shakespeare's Kent when he was restrained in the stocks, part of the time I slept out, the rest I whistled.

When our team was "up" and

I was at bat, my sleep was interrupted, for I had the loudest cheering section in town. "Let four balls pass!" they would roar. By our strange rules, I could walk to first base just by letting four balls pass without swinging my bat, regardless of how well the balls were thrown. Then when I reached first base, my captain would meet me with Suzy Longlegs. "I am going to let Suzy run this one for you," she would say kindly.

Years passed. I married and had children of my own. At last I could laugh at my childhood experiences. When my son, at nine years of age, announced that he wanted to play Little League baseball, I was delighted. After all, the baseball I had played was the sandlot variety with rules made up by children, and children are proverbially cruel. With adults supervising the game, my son would have the opportunities I had never had. I could even see him taking his turn in the pitcher's box, for adults understand that "turn about is fair play."

The first game arrived. The coach's son, who was seven years old, was the pitcher; the manager's son, also seven, was the catcher; my nine-year old son played left field. Halfway through the game, the pitcher and the catcher exchanged positions, and my son was sent to the bench. The lineup for the remainder of the season was similar.

Little League coaches and managers realize that they have a responsibility to teach the boys sportsmanship. They do this by having the boys throw their hats in the air and give a cheer for the other team after each game. It is necessary for the parents to be good sports, too, and I tried to be. I tried to ignore the tears that sat on the rims of our son's eyes after the games, but sport unfortunately, has never been my forte.

I decided it was my turn at bat. Voices of my childhood came back to me: Let four balls pass." But I picked up my pen and struck. "Dear Editor:" I began. Not wanting to embarrass my son, I asked that my name be withheld. In that letter I asked that the boys be given equal opportunities.

"A Little League manager is a teacher — a teacher of baseball," I wrote. "We all know what would happen if a teacher of reading allowed a slow child to read only half as much as the fast one." I also said, "Any teacher has a better chance of succeeding if his student's self-confidence remains intact."

The president of the league replied to my letter in the next

week's newspaper. His was a spitball. "Little League uses baseball as a tool for sharpening a boy's reaction to stress, because baseball is fun and holds the boy's interest. But Little League is not every boy's 'bag.' Some boys give up quietly, this should be vital information to the interested parent," he wrote.

I eyed the ball and picked up my pen. The voices came back to me: "Let four balls pass!" Instead I struck. "A good teacher," I wrote, "would see to it that the boys 'do not give up quietly.'" I urged the president and the governing board to consult a professional psychologist concerning the effects of their methods upon the boys.

Another man replied to my second letter, and he aimed right at me. He attacked me because I had withheld my name from my letter. He repeatedly referred to me as "Mr. Nobody."

For the third time, I picked up my pen. "Let four balls pass!" the voices roared. "Steady," I told myself. "Keep your eye on the ball, and don't let your emotions get the best of you." I decided to be poised and eloquent. I quoted Dickens:

"In the little world of children in which children have their existence, whosoever brings them up, there is nothing so finely perceived and so finely felt, as injustice." Then I boldly signed the letter: "Mrs. Somebody."

My third and last letter received no reply, and since that time eight years ago, Little League has continued on its course. I had known before I wrote the letters that I was not enough of a batter to change the powerful Little League, but I had ignored social opinion and come out swinging.

I was a poor sport, I was unpopular, and I had struck out, but at last the voices of my childhood were stilled. I remembered the maxim:

"When the One Great Scorer comes to write against your name — He marks not that you won or lost — but how you played the game."

I had lost the game, an important one, but I had given it everything I had. I had played like a champion. There would be other ball games, and I too, would have a turn at bat.

### THE LOST MINES OF SAN SABA

Legends about the buried treasure or rich gold and silver mines somewhere around San Saba have been told over and over since the 1700's. They are oral tradition — true legendary lore — as verified facts touching the mines are few.

In 1756, a Spanish Lt. General of the province of Texas reported mineral riches in the regions around San Saba and established a mission near there. In 1769, the site was abandoned after constant terror and seige by Comanche or Lipan warriors. The Spanish supposedly left old shafts and smelters used in the mines and the Indians stored the silver and gold there.

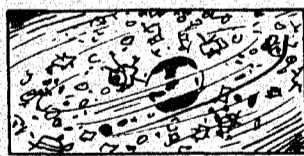
Other tales say that the Spaniards loaded all the gold they could carry, supposedly on 30 donkeys, and started to San Antonio. However, in the rough hills of San Saba County they hid their treasure in a cave and covered its mouth with heavy rocks, hoping to return later.

Some refer to one of the San Saba mines as the Bowie mine, not because he owned it, but because he fought for it. Legend says he became a Lipan Indian by adoption. He heard tales of Lipan braves trading chips of silver bullion for supplies in San Antonio.

After he plied the location of the mine from the Indians, and saw the amount of silver in it, he recruited a small army of 10 men and returned, but he was met by 160 Indians. He never reached the mines. Legendary tradition has made much of the part of James Bowie in searching for the Lost Mines of San Saba. (courtesy of the San Saba Historical Museum)

## FmHA Loans Not Restricted To Farmers

Over the years, the Farmers Home Administration has made loans to assist over 750,000 low and moderate income rural and smalltown families buy, build, or repair a home.

The loans are not restricted to farmers, as most people seem to think, they are for persons with reasonable and dependable income of not more than 115,600 adjusted a year.

A program has also been established to assist senior citizens — 62 years of age or older — to repair or improve their existing dwellings.

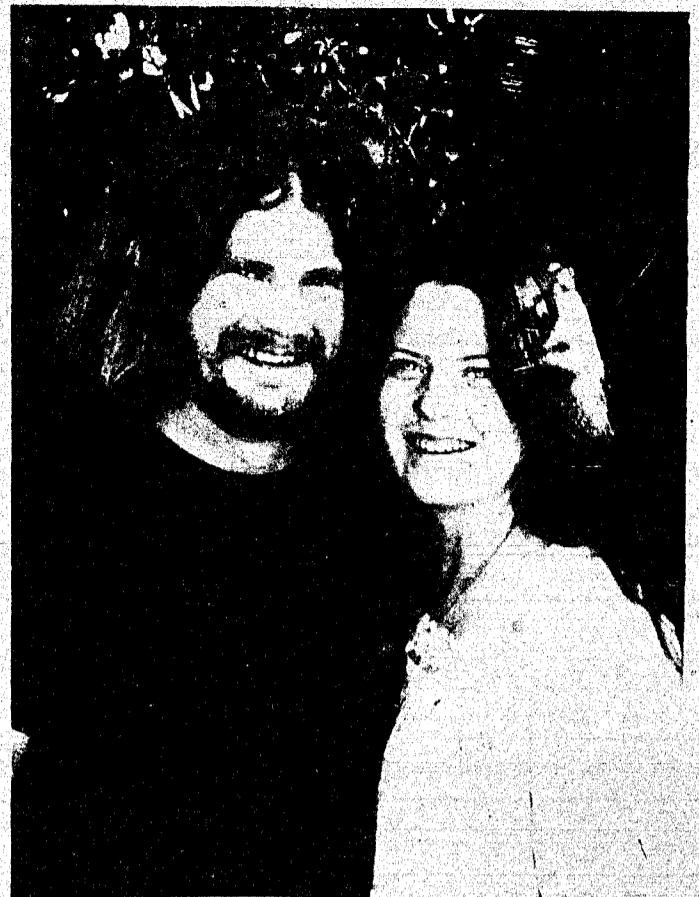
The loans are made up to a period of 33 years, and 100 percent of the FmHA appraised value. The present interest rate is nine percent, with the possibility of reducing interest rate for an applicant who received income of less than \$11,200 per year.

The major objective of the FmHA is to provide families with safe, decent and sanitary homes.

Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, repair or rehabilitate rural homes and related facilities, and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Funds are also used to modernize homes, add bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens, and other improvements, such as drive-ways and foundations plantings. Home ownership loans are also offered to help families with low and moderate income. These families must:

- (1) Be without decent, safe, and sanitary housing.
- (2) Be unable to obtain a loan from private lenders on terms and conditions that they can reasonably be expected to meet.
- (3) Have sufficient income to pay house payments, insurance premiums and taxes and maintenance, other debts and necessary living expenses. Persons with inadequate repayment ability may obtain co-signers for the loan.
- (4) Possess the character, ability, and experience to meet loan obligations. FmHA loans make it possible for families of low and moderate income to become owners of adequate homes.

## Few Screwworms During Month

Mission, June 29: A thin but stubbornly persistent screwworm population in the Karnes-DeWitt county area, and one in Medina County brought the June Texas count to seven, reports Dr. James E. Novy.

The director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Laboratory says this is the lowest number of samples identified in Texas during any June since the Eradication Program began in 1962. "It even beats the count of eight cases in June of 1977" comments Novy.

Since mid-May eight cases have been recorded in Karnes and four in DeWitt County, says Novy. No wild screwworm flies have been trapped there, but the trapping effort is being expanded with more traps spread over a wider area.

Both sterile screwworm flies and Screwworm Adult Suppression System (SWASS) pellets have been steadily released in the 400 to 600 square mile area known to have wild screwworms since the population was first discovered May 13.
