More Rainfall In Community

Part of the Santa Anna community measured rainfall Saturday, July 7, but none was registered at the official gauge in town. In an early-morning shower Tuesday, July 10, the local measurement was .22 inch.

The month of June brought a total of 3.48 inches of rain at the official gauge in Santa Anna. The largest one-day amount was 1.55 inches on June 27.

The first six months of the year had a total of 14.99 inches.

Bids Are Sought For Housing Units

Twelve new duplex buildings for Santa Anna Housing Authority will be constructed in the coming months with bids for the construction being sought until August 7. Prospective bidders may secure contract documents at the Santa Anna Housing Authority office at Mountain City Center.

The brick buildings will be of one- to three-bedroom size, with nine of the buildings located at the Civic Center (Armory) area and the other three on South Lee Street. Construction is expected to start soon after the contracts are let.

Funded by Farmers Home Administration loans and aided by funds from the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the new units will bring to 86 the number in Santa Anna. The present 62 units are all occupied and there is a waiting list most of the time.

Bids on the construction will be opened Tuesday, August 7, at the Housing Authority office.

Coleman Rodeo In Progress

Performances Set Through Saturday

Float Parade Slated Friday Afternoon

The 42nd annual Coleman Rodeo is underway and will continue through Saturday with performances at 8:30 each evening. Contractor for the 1979 event is the B Bar J and Flying I Rodeo Co. of Lamar, Colorado and Cleburne, Texas. Kenneth Simmons is announcer.

The annual rodeo is approved by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association and the Girls Rodeo Association. Over 200 professional cowboys and cowgirls are expected to take part in the four-night rodeo that includes bareback and saddle bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, bull riding and girls barrel race.

David Burnham and Wright Howington are clowns for the rodeo, and Leon and Vicki Adams are providing specialty acts with their Brahman bull and paint horse acts.

Queen of the 1979 rodeo is Janet Wilkinson of Coleman, the

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Don Wilkinson.

The second of the two downtown parades will be at 5:30 Friday afternoon. Decorated floats and bicycles will be

featured in the parade, along with the local riding clubs and others on horseback.

Following each rodeo performance a dance will be held at the outdoor pavillion at the rodeo grounds. The Heart of Texas Road Gang from Waco will provide music for the dances each evening.

Dog Tag, Vaccination Law To Be Enforced In S-Anna

In a effort to control stray dogs in town, the City of Santa Anna will be enforcing the ordinance requiring the vaccination and registration of all dogs running loose in town. Dogs not properly tagged will be picked up and destroyed if not claimed. The enforcement of the ordinance is planned to prevent an outbreak of rabies in the community.

For the convenience of area

people, a rabies vaccination clinic will be held Saturday, July 14 at City Hall. Dr. Kathy Pearce will be on duty to vaccinate dogs and cats from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Distemper vaccination will be available upon request.

Proof of rabies vaccination is required for the issuance of the dog tag. Cost for the tag registration is \$1 per animal.

Sunday Mishap Injures Two Near S-Anna

Two women were taken to Brownwood Community Hospital Sunday afternoon by Henderson ambulance for treatment of injuries they received in an auto mishap south of Santa Anna.

Jo McNeil Smith, 48, of Austin was driver of the Ford sedan that went out of control, crossed the highway and went through a fence at the Virgie Brown farm four miles south of town. The vehicle remained upright during the mishap. Mrs. Smith's mother, Mrs. Katie M. Cochran of Kingsland, was a passenger in the auto.

According to Patrick Hosch, Emergency Medical Technician, the women were not seriously injured and were released after emergency treatment at the hospital. Highway patrolmen investigated the accident that occurred about 4:45 p.m.

Dogs, Hogs Are Discussed At City Council Meeting

The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session Thursday, July 5, at City Hall with Mayor Thomas Hays presiding. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and bills and accounts for the month of June were approved for payment.

Animal control was the main topic of discussion, with the Council voting to strictly enforce the dog license ordinance. It was noted that only 26 dogs have been licensed in Santa Anna this year as required by the ordinance. Plans are being made for all un-tagged dogs to be picked up and impounded. They will be destroyed if not claimed by their owners within three days of impoundment.

Volunteers have offered to help care for the dogs until they

are claimed, and additional space has been found to keep the dogs.

Complaints were heard from residents about hogs being kept within the city limits. People with hogs are asked to note the ordinance concerning livestock and abide by sanitation requirements.

A report was given on the city water project, showing work underway to secure the forms needed to start the project. John (Kit) Pearce was chosen to be Resident Inspector for the project as required by the contract.

The Council voted to pay part of the cost of uniforms for the City Sanitation workers, with the new uniforms to be worn starting about August 1.

Announcement was made of the meeting of the Tax Board of Equalization, and approval given for the current tax rate that is 50 percent of assessed valuation.

The next meeting of City Council will be Thursday, August 9.

Mrs. John Perry, president of the local group, took part on the program, and Mrs. Gary Lawrence, district president, led the session.

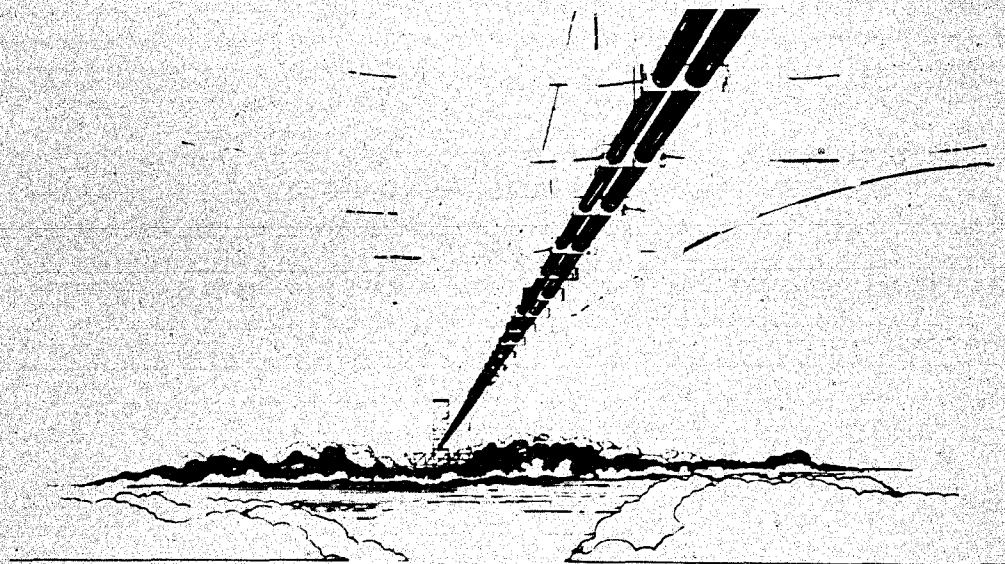

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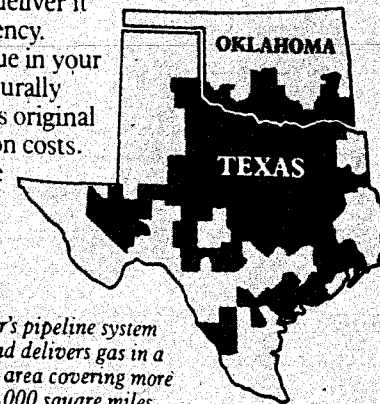


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Ranger Park Inn News

Outdoor Antennas Cause Accidents

"Breaker one-nine" for a warning on CB radio base station antennas. They pose a death threat — by electrocution. Antennas for television and CB radio base stations are the number-one hazard.

Most deaths linked with antennas happened when the device hit an overhead power line as the victim put it up or took it down.

As a result, the U. S. Consumer Product Safety Commission now requires manufacturers and importers to include warning labels—and insulation instructions—with all outdoor television antennas and those for CB base stations.

They must do the same with masts or other devices intended to support these antennas.

NEW FUNDING FOR SOCIAL SECURITY?

Everyone who pays Social Security taxes has been hard hit by recent increases in the tax rates. They dread the day when these rates will be increased even more — and there are already built-in increases in the law.

On the other hand, people who receive Social Security benefits are worried about not getting all the benefits which the present law promises. They are worried there will not be enough money in the Social

Security trust fund to cover all their benefits.

There is no question that the financial problems of Social Security must be dealt with. One proposed solution is the imposition of a Value Added Tax (VAT).

Simply put, a VAT is a multi-stage levy based on the value which is added in each stage of production and distribution. In other words, as iron ore becomes steel then becomes an automobile, a tax would be added at each stage on the increased value of the original iron ore.

Interest in a VAT is in-

creasing. Both Senator Russell Long, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Congressman Al Ullman, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, have expressed an interest in examining the feasibility of a VAT in financing Social Security.

As this tax would add to the final cost of a product, it is a regressive tax. But the Social Security tax, as now constituted, is a regressive tax. Also by adding to the cost of a product, a VAT would thus add to the cost of living. But if Social Security taxes could be held down or possibly reduced even slightly, it would give workers more take-home pay. The workers could then determine what they want to buy and thus have a little more personal control over their earnings.

In addition, it has been suggested that the amount paid by an individual through VAT could be computed much like the amount paid in state sales tax is now computed for deduction from income taxes.

There are arguments against the tax. Some feel, as this is a hidden tax, people will not realize how much in taxes they are paying. Also because it is a hidden tax, government might find it too easy to increase the rates. There are those who argue, and with good reason, that to give certain lawmakers a new tax then they will surely find new ways to spend the money.

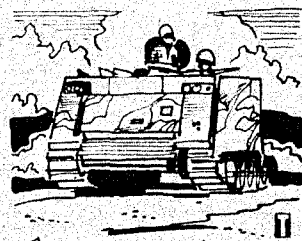

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Canned Goods Storage Noted During Summer

Don't store canned goods in a hot place, cautions Mary K. Sweeten, a foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Whether moving, going on vacation or having just too many canned goods on hand, storing them in the trunks of cars, garages, attics, near steam pipes, radiators, furnaces or kitchen ranges is not recommended, the specialist points out.

The best storage for all canned goods is a moderately cool, dry place.

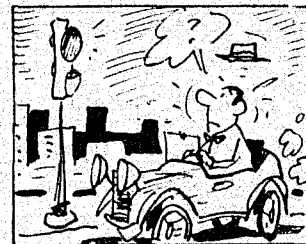
In canned goods, these thermophilic bacteria can survive the heating process. They cause gas formation in the canned good and a poor-quality product, Mrs. Sweeten explains.

The increase in temperature caused by storage in warm places may permit thermophilic organisms to grow. They grow best at temperatures between 15 and 250 degrees F. (8.3 to 13.9 degrees C.).

However, they do not cause any significant public health threat. No toxins such as those produced by food poisoning organisms are produced by these bacteria, she adds.

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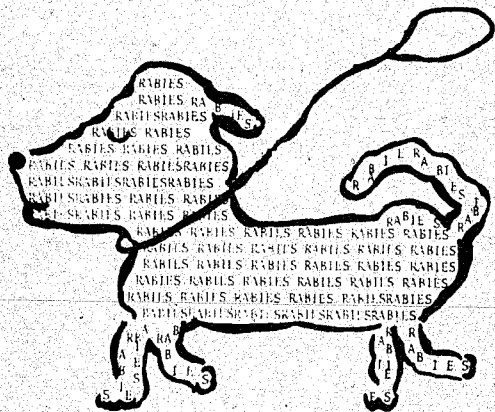
