SAHS Players To State Meet

Local Tennis Entries Advance To State Tournament Next Weekend

For the fourth year in a row and most likely setting some sort of Interscholastic League record, a boys tennis doubles team will be competing in the State Class B tennis tournament. Adding to the interest here is the return trip of another doubles team and a singles entry, bringing to nine the number of state tennis entries during the past five years.

Tommy Harris and Terry Day, runners-up for the Class B state title last year, won the regional meet last week in Abilene, gaining a berth in the state meet in Austin May 11. Runners-up for the regional title were Dick Smith and Don Eubank. Dick's partner last season was Jimmy Young, who graduated last year. Dick and Jimmy qualified for the state meet in 1978 but were eliminated

in the preliminaries.

Danny Guerrero, a sophomore at SAHS, was second in the region meet, losing in the finals to the Rule entry that was a regional winner last year.

In Abilene last week, Harris and Day won over Strawn 6-0, 6-0; defeated Eula 6-1, 6-0; and went into the finals after winning over Paint Rock 6-0, 7-5.

Smith and Eubank drew a bye in the first round, then won over Masonic Home 6-0, 6-1, then defeated Miles 6-1, 6-3. In the finals, Harris and Day won over Smith and Eubank 6-1, 6-2.

Guerrero defeated the Godley entry 6-3, 6-1, then won over Poolville 3-6, 6-3, 6-3. His next games were won over Crum 6-3, 6-2, and in the semi-finals he won

over Eden 6-1, 6-0. Rule won the finals 6-2, 6-2.

R. C. Smith, coach of the Santa Anna tennis teams, announced this week that the doubles teams will play at 9 a.m. Friday, May 11, at the Texas University Intermural Tennis Center in Austin, and the singles entries will play at 11 a.m. Finals will be on Saturday, May 12. There will be eight teams in each event.

Rockwood-Whon Area Damaged By Wind-Hail

Crops and gardens in the south part of Coleman County were destroyed and some damage suffered by homes and outbuildings in a storm during the early hours last Sunday. The storm left up to three inches of rain in the Whon area and about two inches in the Rockwood community.

The storm damage was in an area from east of Whon to Leaday in the west part of Coleman County, damaging a strip several

miles wide along the Colorado River.

The worst damage to buildings and structures was apparently in the Rockwood area where a barn and the home of Joe W. Wise were damaged, and at the Billy Deed place where the former home of the Charles Zabel family was damaged. Damage was also reported at the Tony Rehm place and the Jack Cooper place south of Rockwood.

Train Derailment Near S-Anna

Derailment in Liberty Community Spills Sulphur On Right-of-Way

Eighteen cars of a Galveston-bound freight train derailed in the Liberty Community east of Santa Anna last Thursday, the second train derailment in our

community in recent months.

Liquidified sulphur from several of the 18 derailed cars leaked along the right-of-way, causing a fire to cross ties and wreckage at

the site. The first car to derail was about 40 cars back from the engine. None of the four crewmen of the Santa Fe train was injured in the mishap.

Although the liquid sulphur is not toxic, the extreme heat of the

Santa Anna Child Killed By Accidental Gunshot

A Santa Anna child died Wednesday of last week from an accident gunshot would he suffered at his home about 7:45 p.m.

Charles Anthony Kirven, aged five, was dead on arrival at Brownwood Community Hospital where he was taken by ambulance. He received emergency treatment at Ranger Park Hospital immediately following the incident, before being sent to Brownwood.

According to reports here, the little boy found a loaded pistol in the family car and was shot just below his nose. He was in the vehicle with some younger brothers and sisters at the time.

Born in Brownwood February 24, 1974, he had enrolled the previous day for the fall kindergarten class at Santa Anna.

Funeral services were held Saturday, April 28, at Coleman with burial in Santa Anna Cemetery. Holman Funeral Service of Brownwood was in charge of arrangements. Rev. J. H. Robinson, pastor of St. Willow Baptist Church of Santa Anna, officiated at the services.

Survivors are his parents; Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Kirven Jr. of Santa Anna; three sisters; Ulanda Jean, Dilcey Ann and Julia; four brothers, Johnny III, Lonnie, Jackie and Calvin Kirven, all of Santa Anna.

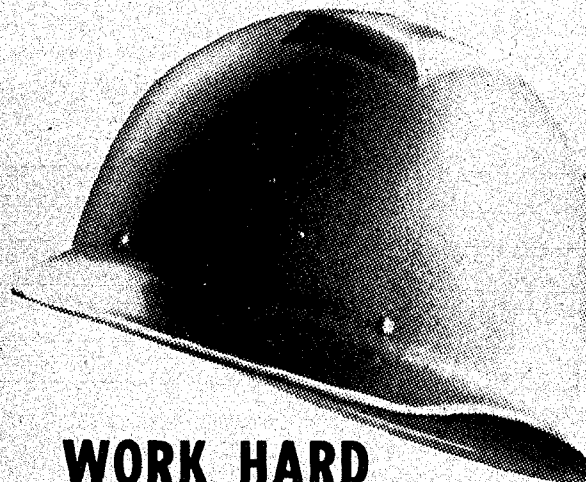

liquid resulted in injuries to one workman who was sent to the site for the clean-up. George Hamrick of Fort Worth received severe burns on his legs and hands when he stepped into some of the hot sulphur while helping clean up. He was taken to Brownwood Community Hospital for treatment. Another man was treated and released for minor burns.

The cause of the mishap was not known, but the train was traveling only 22 miles per hour at the time of the 10 p.m. accident, according to a report from Jack Tiehen, superintendent of the Fort Worth Division of Santa Fe. Traffic was restored on the line about 4 p.m. Friday. Dirt was pushed up around the spills to contain the chemical.

The Thursday derailment was east of the Duggins Crossing in

the Liberty Community, about a quarter-mile south of the Santa Anna-Bangs highway and approximately six miles east of Santa Anna.

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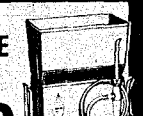
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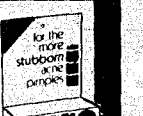

SAHS Graduate Successful In State-wide Disco Empire

Herbert Graham, a 1958 graduate of Santa Anna High School has founded a prosperous disco empire from his present home in Odessa, Texas. Graham is married to the former Virginia "Ginger" Haynes who also graduated at Santa Anna in 1960. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Haynes still reside in Santa Anna.

The following is from a recent story in the "Odessa American." In New York City, they do it at Studio 54 and at the Copacabana, and in Hollywood they do it at Scandals. It's done in West Texas, too, due in a large part to the foresight of a local truckdriver turned entrepreneur.

The IT is disco and the WHO is Odessan Herbert (Herb) Graham, who opened the first disco in Odessa.

The disco rage has swept the country and has evolved from a fad to a serious entertainment medium. Last year there were 12,000 discos in the United States, constituting a \$4 billion industry.

But there were many skeptics to contend with in the beginning. Graham opened his first disco, The Other Place in the winter of 1973, and said "A lot of people thought I was crazy."

He now is at the helm of an entertainment empire which runs 18 nightclubs throughout the state—a number which will probably grow to 30 by the end of the year.

Graham opened his first club, The Shadows in Odessa in 1968—an \$1,800 investment. As a measure of how far both Graham and disco technology have advanced — his newest club in Arlington cost more than \$980,000.

Quite impressive for a former Sunset Motor Lines truck driver. "I went through junior high and high school here in Odessa, except for my last two years of high school," Graham said. "After I graduated from Santa Anna, I moved back to Odessa and began working as a truck driver."

He continued driving trucks until 1969, but in 1964 he started managing and booking bands. This led to his opening the Shadows.

A club in Waco was next on the agenda for Graham, and he opened one there in 1973. It was then that he decided disco was the way to go.

"I had never been in a disco in my life before I opened The Other Place," he said, "But I just didn't see how bands could compete with them."

So although discos were new in the country and unknown in West Texas, Graham Associates opened The Other Place. "I just felt that disco was the up and

coming thing," he said.

Obviously he was right, as the club has been open seven days a week for six years.

Graham presently has clubs in Odessa, Midland, San Angelo, Abilene, El Paso, Amarillo, Longview, Wichita Falls, San Antonio and Arlington. He says that new clubs are under construction in El Paso, Abilene and Albuquerque, N. M.

He attributes his phenomenal success to his management techniques. He pulls out a thick manual outlining procedures, job descriptions and general operations.

"The managers we hire are trained in all aspects of running a club, regardless of whether they have been in the club business before," Graham said.

He adds that he hires professionals as club managers, but that the majority of them have backgrounds in restaurants and management rather than nightclubs.

Graham himself does not really measure up to the stereotype one might have of a nightclub magnate — he neither smokes or drinks.

The 40-year-old Graham clearly has a keen eye for what the public wants, and he realizes that not everyone is going to get off to disco music. Because of this, he owns three country and western clubs — the Stardust Clubs in Odessa, Midland and Wichita Falls.

"The country and western crowd is extremely consistent, and these clubs will never lose their appeal to that group," he said.

And just how much money is there to be made in the disco business? Graham certainly isn't having any problems making ends meet.

"Last year, Graham Associates grossed more than \$10 million," he said. But he is quick to explain that it is expensive to set up or

He looks on the building of new clubs as an art — one that he has mastered. The technology and refinements have come a long way since The Other Place opened, he said. Many innovations have come along to make the clubs better and more attractive, he added.

The design and construction of new clubs is a family affair, with three of Graham's brothers getting in on the act. Gary is in charge of finding new locations and recruiting personnel, Graham said, while Philip is in charge of construction and Terry is the general office manager.

Their combined efforts have paid off, and Graham feels they will continue to pay off.

"I never dreamed I'd come this far," he said, "But now I can't see any limitations at all."

Graham wasn't convinced, he said until 1974. "Since then it has been smooth sailing."

He adds that his goal is for 50 clubs in Texas, and that he will probably branch out into all the large New Mexico cities and possibly into Arizona.

When asked about the future of disco, Graham said he feels it will be around in some form or another for quite some time.

In the event that it isn't, Graham won't be without alternatives. "My clubs are adaptable and will work for most any kind of entertainment," he said.

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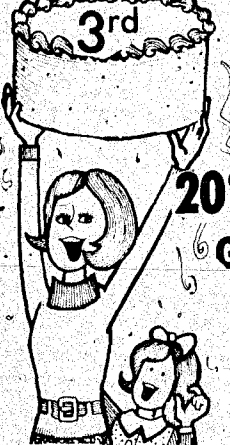

Stacy Dam Opponents File Another Appeal

As expected, opponents of the \$60 million Stacy Dam Project have filed a motion for a rehearing before the Texas Water Commission in an attempt to block creation of the proposed reservoir in Coleman, Concho and Runnels counties.

The motion was filed Wednesday by Fred Werkenthin, an attorney representing the Lower Colorado River Authority.

The next step will be a reply by the other side, the Colorado River Municipal Water District, which wants to divert more than 36 billion gallons of water a year

from communities below the proposed dam.

The LCRA claims the project will adversely affect the downstream water supplies and hydroelectric power generation. "The principal issue is whether there is sufficient unappropriated water to support the permit," Werkenthin said.

After the CRMWD make its reply to the LCRA's motion for rehearing, "then it's up to the commission to pass on the motion," Werkenthin said. He said a decision by the commission would take "about 45 days in all."

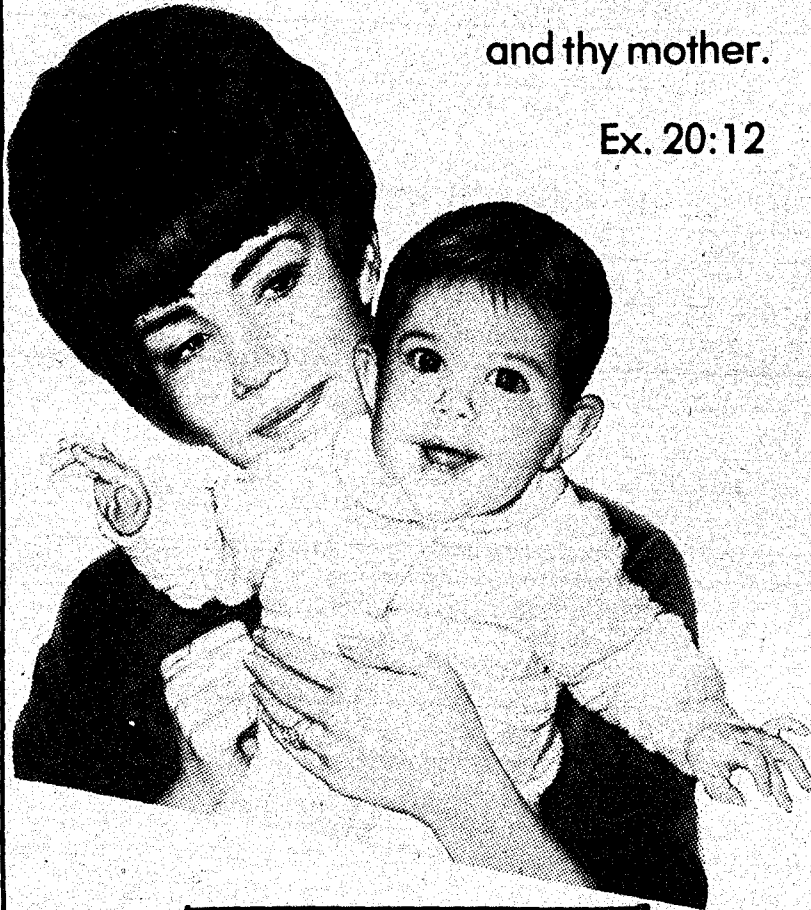

Emergency Loans Are Available Through FmHA

Emergency loans for farmers and ranchers are available through the county office of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Mr. Harold D. Kennedy, FmHA County Supervisor, said this week.

Mr. Kennedy asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the tornado, April 10, 1979, make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at the Rhone Building, Coleman, Texas.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of five percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until January 17, 1980 for physical losses.
