Rusty Buzzard was third in the district singles event.

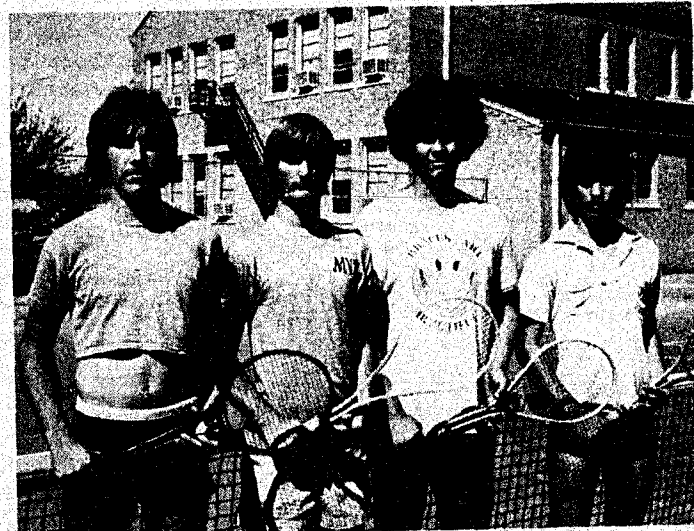
Santa Anna made a clean sweep of the junior boys events,

# Perry Stonework Shows Artistry

## Rockwork By The Late T. T. Perry Decorates Several Local Locations

When most people pass away and are buried, there is sometimes little more than a memory with which to remember them. Perhaps a picture painted, a quilt pieced or a published book, but most of those things may be put out of sight or gradually deteriorate with time.

A Santa Anna resident of early years left his mark on the community that many years later attests to his work and profession. That man is the late T. T. Perry, stonemason.

Perhaps the most publicized edifice to his credit is the former Santa Anna Gas Co. building that has been moved and reconstructed at the historic town of Salado, but his work as a stone mason is still evident throughout the area—a memorial to his artistry and craftsmanship.

Thomas Temple Perry was born March 12, 1853 in Murfreesboro, Tenn. At the time of his marriage to Mary Elizabeth Bond in 1885 he was employed with the Southern Pacific Railroad as a stone mason building piers and other rock work for railroad construction. The couple's first home was in converted boxcars on a siding at Spofford Junction, Kinney County, in far southwest Texas.

Perry worked on the construc-

tion of the famous "High Bridge" across the Pecos River.

Moving to Santa Anna about 1889, the Perry's purchased land in the southwest part of town from G. W. Mahoney and built a home in a grove of oak trees, which still stands today.

The railroad had come through Santa Anna in the mid-1880's and the town was beginning to grow at the foot of the mountain. Mr. Perry went to work here quarrying and "dressing" each stone for each structure. Besides the gas company building he built the Overby building just west of the Lions Club building, that is now owned by Dr. C. M. Henner of Tennessee. One of the distinct features of his work were hand-carved coigns atop the buildings.

Other local masonry crafted by Mr. Perry and still visible include the large rock barn on the McCaughan place south of Santa Anna, built for the late Mr. T. Culverwell, and retaining walls around the former Riley home (now the home of Miss Sarah Barnetzke) and the former Culverwell home (the present home of the M. R. Pollocks).

In the local cemetery stands the thick stone wall around the L. L. Shield block with stone entry steps made on the west side, built by Mr. Perry.



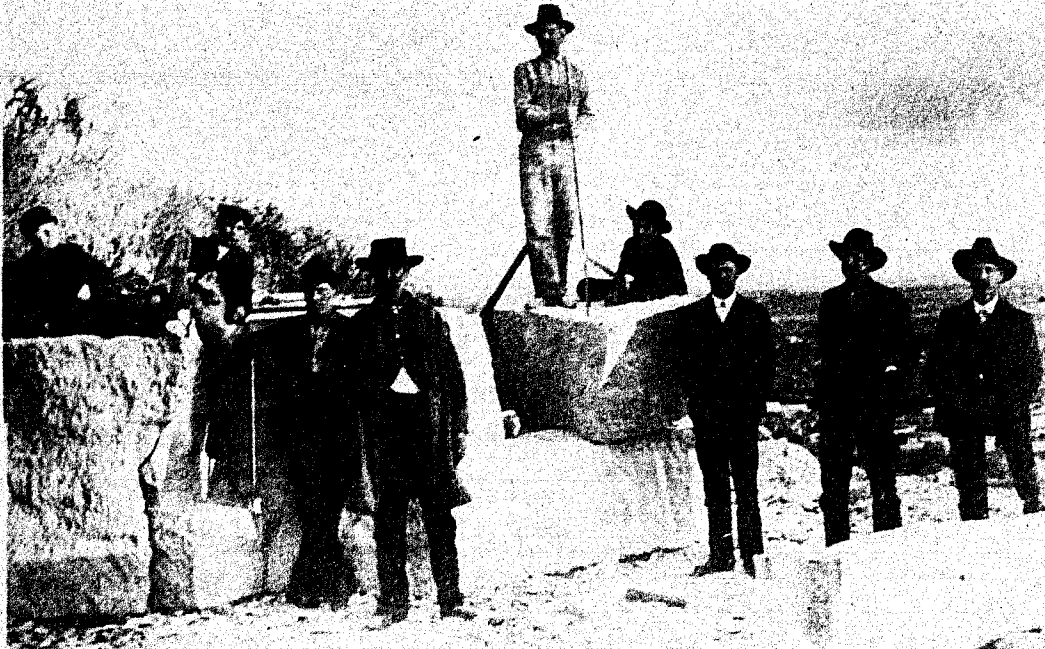
DECORATIVE STONE AT BASS HOME

On the Perry-Caton lot in local cemetery, he fashioned stones for a corner flower bed and a rock "cradle" for the grave of Mrs. Perry's mother. The cradle stone completely outlines the grave from base of the headstone with raised foot section for an urn display.

Mr. Perry worked in construction of the ranch house and barns for pioneer rancher, G. W. Mahoney. In later years he did the rockwork on the Neely Evans home north of town, now the home of James and Evelyn (Evans) Cliett.

The old rock school building in Santa Anna, a landmark in its day, was built with Mr. Perry's help. He quarried and dressed many of the corner stones in the community including corner stone used at the Ranger Park building.

The rock school house at Shields, now plastered and used as a community center, and the recently-raised rock school building at Doole were also of his construction.

### New Treatment Is Instigated For Screwworm Program

The second week of April brought the first two applications of the Screwworm Adult Suppression System (SWASS) in South Texas, says Dr. James E. Novy, director of the Screwworm Laboratory.

A 150-square mile area near Sullivan City on the Starr-Hidalgo County line is the first to receive an operational SWASS treatment. Each treatment consisted of one pound per square mile or approximately one pellet for each six acres.

Novy says the SWASS system was applied in this area after one screwworm case was detected and follow-up entomological studies revealed a large wild screwworm population.

The SWASS system uses a

chemical attractant coupled with insecticide in a feed bait. Screwworm flies die soon after feeding on the bait.

SWASS was developed over a several-year span by the Science and Education Agency unit at the Screwworm Laboratory. It was extensively tested on the Island of Curacao and in Jeff Davis County, Texas.

Novy again asks livestock and pet owners to watch their animals for signs of screwworm infested wounds and to submit samples of any worms found in wounds to the laboratory, P. O. Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. Prompt reporting is important to allow the Program to respond quickly in order to control the outbreak.
