SAHS Tennis Teams Win State Meet

Dick Smith, Don Eubank Defeat Harris-Day Duo for State Title

Santa Anna High School tennis doubles teams proved they are the best in Class B in the State when the local entries came home with the State Championship and the runner-up title Saturday.

For the first time in UIL competition, the team of Dick Smith and Don Eubank won over Tommy Harris and Terry Day to

take the Class B championship. Harris and Day had won the district and regional titles and were runners-up for the state title last year, setting a record by making four trips to the State tourney.

In the championship match Saturday morning, Smith and Eubank defeated their teammates 6-3 and 7-5 to take the title.

In their first match Friday, Smith and Eubank won over the Celeste entries 6-3, 7-5, then won two of three over Rocksprings, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4.

Harris and Day defeated the Thrall team 6-1, 6-1 in opening games, then won over Nazareth 6-2, 6-1.

Danny Guerrero lost his singles match to the Thrall entry in the opening round, 6-1, 6-1. The Thrall player, Johnny Cain, went on to win the State singles title.

Head Coach Two Teachers Resigning

Bill Jennings, head coach and athletic director at Santa Anna High School the past year, submitted his resignation at the Tuesday, May 8, meeting of the School Board. Also resigning is his wife, Judy, who is an elementary teacher.

The third faculty member to resign is Janie Dawson, another one-year faculty member who will devote full time to homemaking. She resides near Glen Cove.

Jennings, a Santa Anna native and graduate of Santa Anna High School, will return to Ralls where he will be employed with the Ralls school district.

In other business of the school board last week, bills were approved for payment totaling \$5,800 that included three new air conditioners for the elementary school, and summer improvement projects were discussed.

The Board approved the use of the school tennis courts for a summer tennis program, and appointed a Tax Board of Equalization for 1979.

Those named to the Tax Board are William Brown, Clint Day, Dick Longbrake, Patrick Hosch, Earl Simmons and Felton Martin.

A new motel is opening in Santa Anna this week. The Texas Ranger Motel located at Ranger Park will open for business Saturday, May 19, under the management of Lavell and Juanita Jones. Mrs. Jones is a sister of H. F. Fenton of Coleman who owns the property.

The Ranger Park building,

constructed in the late 1930's as a meeting place for former Texas Rangers and later owned by the City of Santa Anna, has been remodeled into the office and living quarters for Mr. and Mrs. Jones.

Ten new units of masonry construction are on the side of the

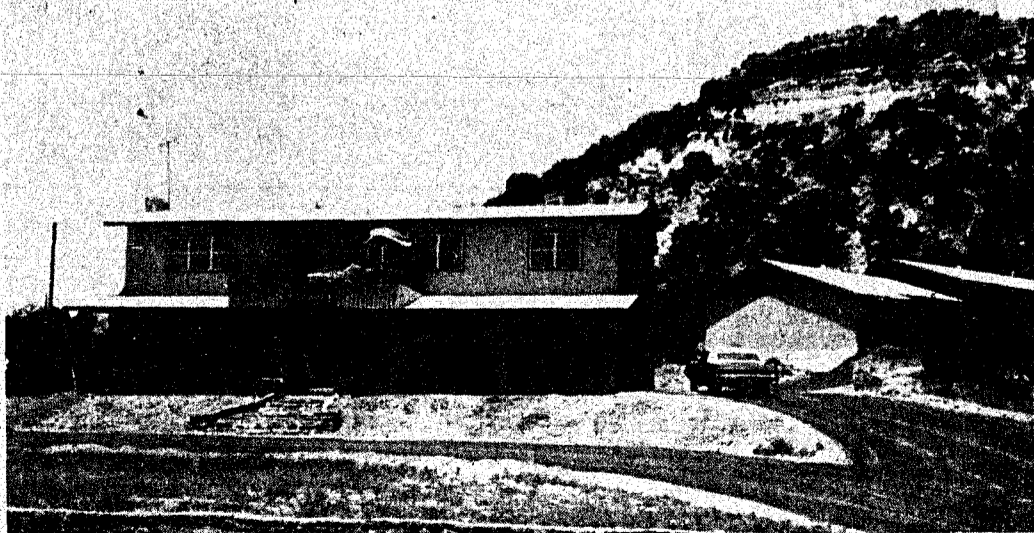
mountain just behind the main building.

The motel office features the rustic style of the original building and will be decorated with relics and pictures of early-day law enforcement officers. The natural rock floor, walls and large wood-burning fireplace remain as constructed.

The motel units are of modern design and construction with earth tones used in decorations. Each room has two double beds, color TV and individual heating and cooling systems.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones moved to Santa Anna from Abilene where he was in the floor covering business 31 years. She was also employed there. They are parents of two daughters, Deborah Schmidt, who lives with her family in Plano, and Brenda Jones, who is presently living in Abilene.

Although the motel opens for business this week, an open house for visitors to see the new facility is not planned until sometime next month.

Summer Swimming Classes Set

Santa Anna Children Included
In Program For All Ages

Swimming classes for Coleman County youngsters are planned during June upon completion of the new swimming pool in Coleman.

Leaders of the Summer Recreation Program announced this week the schedule for classes that start June 4.

For the two weeks of June 4 - 15, classes will be held from 9 - 10 a.m. for Intermediate Swimming and Advanced Swimming; two classes of Beginning Swimming

will be from 10 - 11 and 11 - 12 each weekday.

Advanced Beginners will have lessons from 12 to 1 p.m. Children enrolled must have completed at least one year in school to be admitted to these classes.

The next two weeks there will be classes in Junior Lifesaving and Advanced Lifesaving; and a new program for toddlers with a parent or adult. Children in this group must be out of diapers to be enrolled.

Children who have completed

one year in kindergarten and exceptional children will have classes during the weeks of June 18 - 29. Local children interested in the exceptional class must contact Betty Slaughter or Mrs. Ross Jones in Coleman for pre-enrollment. Other classes may enroll on the first day of the session.

Mrs. Charles Hosch is local chairman of the program and will furnish additional information to those interested. Plans have been made to transport local children by bus to Coleman for the classes. Cost will be 35 cents a day for the instruction plus transportation.






Miss Virgie Brown is very ill in Brownwood Community Hospital where she has been a patient about two weeks. She has been residing recently in a Brownwood nursing home.
