Construction To Start Monday

Work Slated To Start Next Week At Lake B-wood Pump Station

Construction of the city water improvement project is expected to start Monday, August 7, according to Mary Lou Jones, city secretary. Final contracts with Farmers Home Administration and the construction company were signed Thursday at a pre-construction conference held in Abilene.

After numerous delays, the project is to start at the Jim Ned Creek pump station and extend to the new pump station at Lake Brownwood. Clouse Construction Co. of Odessa is contractor for the project, with sub-contracts

let for part of the phases that include new water lines in Santa Anna and remodeling of the present filtration plant at Santa Anna City Lake.

Several shipments of equipment and materials have arrived here in preparation for the project. Other equipment and workers will arrive this week.

The project was approved by city residents last year to provide adequate water for the city. During the drought last spring and summer, city water use was restricted as the water level dropped in Lake Brown-

wood to below the pump station location and emergency wells were drilled to supplement city water supplies.

The contract specifies completion of the project within 325 working days.

Local Woman Bitten By Cat Undergoing Rabies Shots

Mrs. Opal Cope has 11 more inoculations to go to complete the series of anti-rabies shots after being bitten by a cat at her home in Santa Anna recently.

Mrs. Cope, a nurses aide at Ranger Park Hospital, was bitten on the ankle by a neighborhood cat that had lived in and around the apartment complex at North Santa Fe and Third street. The cat bit Mrs. Cope as she was sitting on a stool on her back steps.

Although the cat was taken immediately to a Coleman veterinarian and the head sent

to the State Health Department laboratory in Austin for testing, it had decomposed too much to have an accurate test. However Mrs. Cope did not hesitate to start the inoculations as skunks are often seen in the neighborhood and there was a possibility the cat was rabid.

Mrs. Cope stated the shots are not as painful as she had feared, but the cost will be \$300 or more for the series.

The city is continuing to pick up stray dogs in town, and pet owners are again urged to have their animals vaccinated.

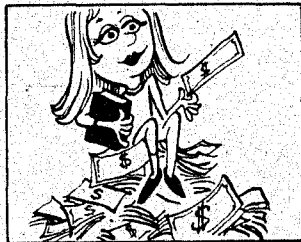

Over 7,000 coaches attended the annual convention.

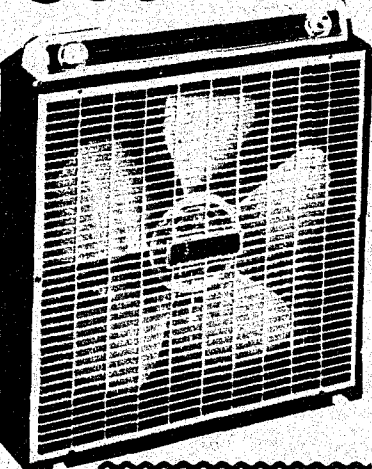

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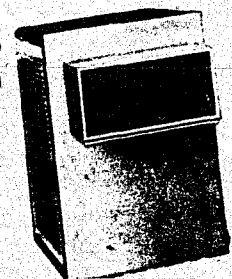
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Whon News

P&W Commissioners decided on Sept. 1 through October 21, 1979 and January 5 - 13, 1980 for the mourning dove hunting seasons in the North Zone; and Sept. 22 through Nov. 4, 1979 and January 5 - 20, 1980, for the

Parks and Wildlife Department biologists found an overall 10-percent increase in the state breeding population of mourning doves this year; however, even with the increase, the number of breeding doves still is below a 13-year mean.

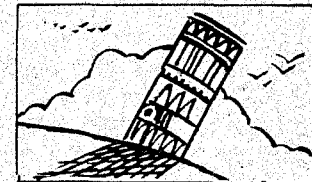

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State Comptroller Announces New Tax Form Available

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said he has authorized a simple declaration form for certain beneficiaries to use in lieu of an inheritance tax return for estates less than \$200,000.

Bullock said the declaration of no tax due from Class A beneficiaries will replace the additional step of filing a more complicated return and having the Comptroller's Office issue a no tax declaration.

A Class A beneficiary is defined as a person most closely related to the deceased person, including the surviving spouse, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, parents and grandparents of a deceased person are also included in the definition.

"The new form is an effort to cut down on the amount of paper-work for small estates on which no Texas inheritance taxes are due and make our inheritance tax division a little more efficient and responsive at the same time," Bullock said.

Work Credit Necessary For S-Security Benefits

Before any social security benefits can be paid on a person's record, he or she must have a certain amount of credit for work covered by social security, a social security representative said recently.

The exact amount needed depends on the person's date of birth or age at the time he or she became disabled or dies. The amount of credit needed ranges from a minimum of 1½ years to a maximum of 10 years. In 1979, the maximum amount of credit needed is seven years.

For retirement and survivor benefits, this credit could have been earned any time since 1936. But, for disability benefits, a certain amount of work credit must be earned in the period just before the person becomes disabled, the spokesperson said. (People disabled by blindness don't have to meet the recent work requirement.)

Since 1978, credits are based on a person's annual covered earnings. In 1979, a person receives one-fourth year of credit for each \$260 in covered earnings. A person gets a full year credit if 1979 earnings are \$1,040 or more.

This will increase automatically each year to keep pace with increases in average wage levels.

Before 1978, credits were earned based on covered wages paid in 3-month calendar quarters. Generally, a person received ¼ year of credit if he or she paid covered wages of \$50 or more in a calendar quarter.

A leaflet, Social Security Credits -- How You Earn Them, gives more detailed information about earnings credits. Free copies can be obtained at any social security office.

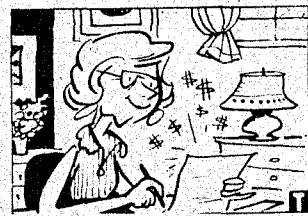

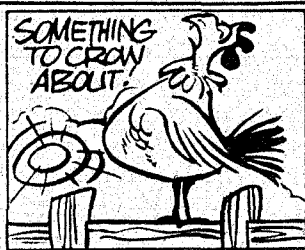

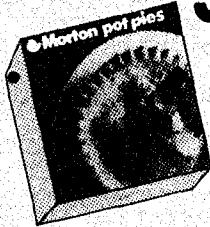
