Last-minute Touchdown Gives S-Anna 14-13 Win

The Friday night football game at Goldthwaite was no place for the faint-hearted, as the last half-minute of the game was a real "cliff-hanger." The Santa Anna Mountaineers rallied after a less-than-perfect first half and went ahead of the Eagles 14-13 with 20 seconds remaining in the game.

Quarterback Rusty Buzzard passed to Wayne Kuykendall in

the endzone for the winning touchdown.

Santa Anna was beset with fumbles and penalties during the first half of the game, making only one first down before the mid-point. Goldthwaite scored a touchdown early in the first quarter and made the PAT for the 7-0 lead. They came back in the third period for the second

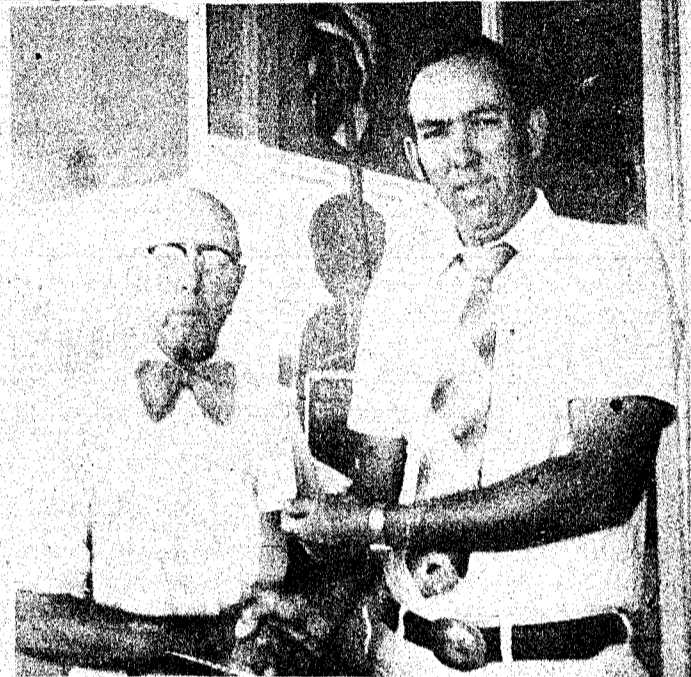
Pete Simmons, music director of the church, will be song leader for the revival. Services will be at 7 p.m. each evening except Sunday. A nursery will be provided for small children.

Saturday has been designated "Youth Night", with all young people in the community invited to attend. Sunday will be "Family Day" with a covered dish dinner to be served after the morning service.

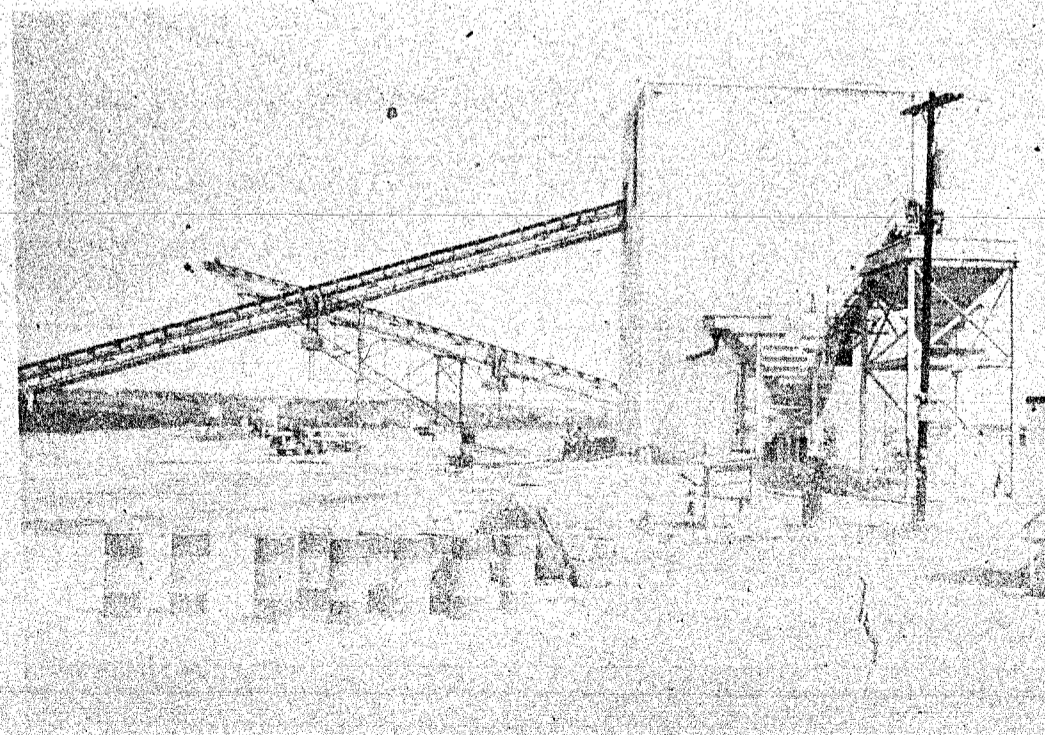
Mining Started At Rockwood

Engines and equipment at the Rockwood Coal Mine will be tested this week in preparation for getting the plant in to production, bringing into being Coleman County's newest industry.

Excavation of the bituminous

coal started about two weeks ago at the site two miles southwest of Rockwood. Amistad Fuel Co. of San Antonio is owner of the company that will furnish coal for the Longhorn Cement Co. plant in San Antonio. The first shipments of coal to San Antonio are expected by mid-October.

Six men are currently working with the excavation of the coal that is about 15 feet below the surface and in a layer of approximately 30 inches. Strain Construction Co. is sub-contracting the strip mining.

The processing plant and first pit are located on the McFarlane Estate property. The second pit,

to be opened soon, is on the Bryan Estate property. The company holds leases on over 1,000 acres of land in the area.

The multi-story processing plant was built by Brown-McKee Contractors, and equipment was designed and built by Sverdrup and Parcel and Associates of Salt Lake City, Utah.

At the present time about 30 men are working at the site.

Coal mining is not new to the Rockwood area, as coal was mined just west of the town in the 1880s. However the new endeavor is expected to have quite an impact on the community and county.

The Mountaineers came to life in the fourth period but were five minutes into the quarter before tailback Duane Warnock ran for the first Santa Anna TD. The two-point conversion was good. The winning touchdown came after a determined drive and was completed on a fourth down play with five yards to goal line. The two-point conversion was unsuccessful, but the Mountaineers had the victory.

Despite the first half lag, Santa Anna ended the game with ten first downs to five for Goldthwaite. The Mountaineers led 143 to 97 yards rushing, but were behind the Eagles 38 to 53 yards passing. Santa Anna completed four of 12 passes while the Eagles completed two of eight.

The victory brought Santa Anna to a 2 - 1 season record and dropped the Eagles to 0 - 3.

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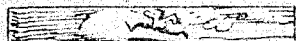

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Horse Show Slated During Fiesta

The Coleman County Fair, known as the "Fiesta de la Paloma", will feature a horse show again this year on Saturday, September 29.

This year's show will be different from the others, however, as a new concept in horse shows for this area. This show will be fun, says Roger Blackmon, Coleman County Extension Agent. This year's show will feature as the main award in each age division a Super Horse award. There will be three "super" horses selected, and their owners will receive a leather show halter (with silver) and lead shank. The three age divisions will be Junior Youth - 14 and under; Senior Youth - 14

- 18; and adult or open - 19 and over. All exhibitors will compete together in the halter show.

Trophies will be presented through third place in each class. A Grand Champion mare and gelding will not be selected; neither will an all-around or performance horse be chosen. Rather, the 6 point system will be used to select a Super Horse in each age division.

Exhibitors may show their super horse at halter and in three selected performance events. Exhibitors may enter other horses in other classes if they wish.

The entry fee is \$4 per class. Programs and entries are available from the County Extension Office in Coleman. Entries may be made on show morning prior to 8:30 a.m.

Jo Ann Snodgrass of San Angelo will be the horse show judge. A walk-trot western pleasure class will be featured for youngsters under nine years of age.

The adult division is new, and it is hoped a large group will participate.

Special TV Show To Air Sunday

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Wells Are Completed In Santa Anna Area

Red River Valley Oil & Gas Partnership completed two Coleman County Regular Field wells five miles northeast of Santa Anna, on the Jim R. Gardner lease.

No. 5 Gardner is located in Absolom Williams Survey 655.

It is pumping from perforations in the interval from 2,376½ to 2,430½ feet.

Daily potential was 47 barrels of 28.2 gravity oil, plus 65 barrels of water.

No. 6 Garner is located in the

same survey.

It had a daily potential of 52 barrels of 28.2 gravity oil, plus 79 barrels of water.

The well is pumping from perforations at 2,386 to 2,432 feet.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 2,461 feet, total depth.

Norman Pautsky of Wichita Falls will drill No. 1 Tom Kingsbery in the regular field seven miles southeast of Santa Anna.

The planned 1,500-foot venture is located on a 506-acre lease.

Drillsite is in the J.A.H. Cleveland Survey 495.

More Screwworms In West Texas

Lab identification of five screwworm samples collected Sept. 7 through 14 in Big Bend area counties along the Mexican border points up the danger of a severe fall build-up.

Dr. James E. Novy, director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Laboratory, says the year's first cases were found in Val Verde and Presidio counties in this period. An additional three were counted in Jeff Davis County.

A total of 32 cases have been tallied in 13 Texas counties this year. All the late summer cases have been in the Big Bend area.

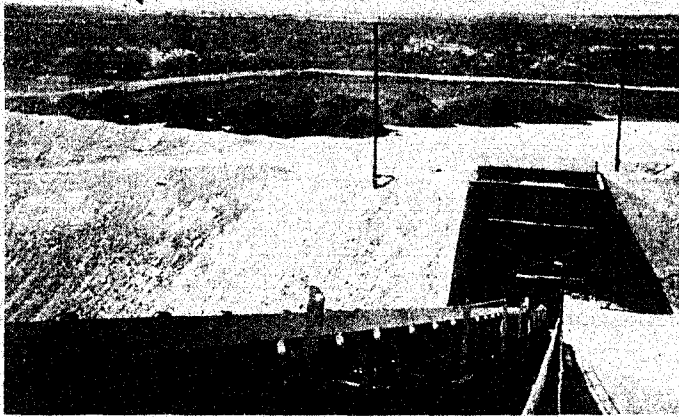
Pump Station Under Construction

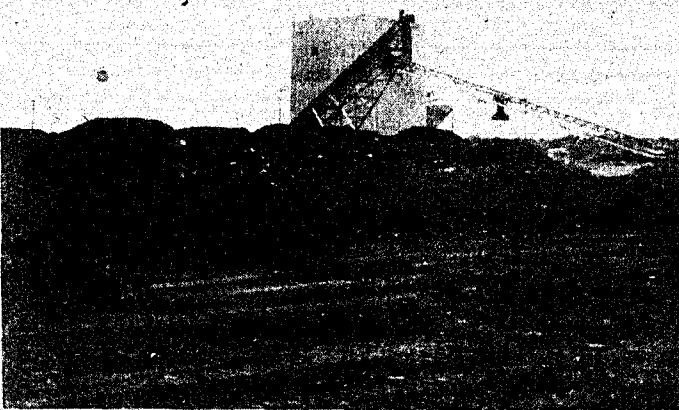

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Game Violations Heavy During This Season

With a lot of birds and record number of hunters, game violations have been the heaviest in many years, according to Game Warden Roy Winburne.

One out-of-town trio paid heavily for their two-day hunt north of Santa Anna. Winburne reports the trio had more than 100 doves, some quail, and three turkeys. He stated they had about double the daily bag limit and possession limit on doves, and that quail and turkey are not in season. Nine charges were filed against the three in Justice of Peace Court in Santa Anna, and they were fined over \$1500.

Most of the hunting activity has been on weekends. Six other game wardens were in the county opening weekend, assisting Winburne, and four were here the past weekend.

The most common violation, Winburne reports, has been exceeding the bag limit or being in possession of quail.

Regarding the deer and turkey

season which opens in this county November 17, Winburne states that conditions are excellent. There are a lot of deer, a good acorn crop and he expects horns to be heavy. The turkey populations appear to be the heaviest ever.

Sharyl Fuller, Ann Croft and Roger Goodwin are faculty sponsors of the 38-member class.


Mrs. Sliger, 81, Buried Here Sept. 13

Dark Continent, is no longer quite that. However, much of it is still what might be termed dark. Nairobi is a large city of more than 800,000 population, and has many very modern buildings and businesses.

It was interesting to see people out in the streets, just standing or meandering along, almost any time of day or night. Most of the streets are barely two-lane thoroughfares, and driving is on the left instead of the right, which is very confusing when a car seems to be coming directly to you, then veers to the left!

A ten-day trip took us to the large Mara game preserve which covers the southern part of Kenya and northern part of Tanzania. Two days in this park were very interesting and profitable. Twenty-four large wild animals were seen out in the open -- of course we stayed well within the van in which we were travelling.

From there we visited Seventh-day Adventist schools, colleges and hospitals in Kenya and Uganda. The hospital in Ishaka was badly used by Ahmin's soldiers. The hospital was ransacked and Dr. Birara's car and garage were burned. Also in Uganda we visited several churches, all manned by Africans.

At Kendu Bay we visited the East African Press, where books and magazines are published for the churches in Kenya. The school near Kisii was an interesting one.

Some time ago in the political turmoil in the Near East the Adventist College in Beirut was closed and a new location about 200 miles northeast of Nairobi was decided upon. The place is under construction now, homes for workers being erected, and it is expected to open as a college the first part of 1980 at Eldoret.

High spots of the trip was a dip (of hands) into Lake Victoria and the beginning of the Nile River. A little later a train ride to Mombasa gave a visit to the Indian Ocean.

At Mombasa we were interested in a short visit to a Hindu Temple and also to a Moslim Mosque. In the temple we viewed Siva, the Hindu god. We were told the people bow down to Siva, a 15-inch-high beautiful little China figure. In the mosque we found neither chairs or table. There a few elderly men, all dressed in white, sat around on the floor. One younger man was kneeling in prayer. Much of Nairobi population are Muslims. Of course we removed our shoes to enter each of these buildings.

Stacy Dam Hearing Set October 5

The pre-trial on the appeal of the permit granted the Colorado River Municipal Water District for the Stacy Reservoir has been set for October 5.

Herman Jones, judge of the 53rd District Court in Austin, has accepted the assignment as the hearing magistrate. Those appealing the decision of the Texas Water Commission to CRMWD a permit to impound a 554,000 acre-foot lake at Stacy, 25 miles southeast of Ballinger on the Colorado River, are: the Lower Colorado River Authority, the Garwood-Lakeside Irrigation

District, the City of Austin and the Lake Travis Property Owners Association.

Judge Jones is expected to set for the actual appeal on the basis of briefs submitted by the litigants. The Attorney General will be defending the suit on behalf of the State of Texas, and the CRMWD will participate as a friend of the court.

O.H. Cole, general manager of CRMWD, said that attorneys for the District remain confident that the permit will be upheld by the courts.
