Faculty Members Are Hired For 1979-80 School Year

Seven faculty members were hired at the Tuesday, August 14, meeting of Santa Anna School Board. The new staff members complete the local faculty for the coming school year except two remedial positions that are expected to be filled soon.

Dean Bass, a Santa Anna native and recent graduate of Howard Payne University, was chosen to teach in high school. The former staff member at Brownwood State School will teach history and English.

Terry Loehr of Brownwood will be teaching fourth grade. The Corpus Christi native taught last year at Cuero in south Texas. Her husband is employed with Swift & Co. in Brownwood.

Pam Aston Birdwell of Coleman will be Title I teacher in secondary level. She taught last year at Friendship near Lubbock.

Lois Ann Harper, a member of the school staff as aide last year, has been employed as Special

Education teacher in the self-contained classroom. She will take the position held by Betty Slaughter the past two years.

Margaret McGonagill will be a Title I teacher in elementary school. She and her husband are moving near Gouldbusk from Imperial where she taught the past year.

Chosen as teacher aides for the coming year are Barbara Patterson and Sharon Goodwin.

A recent resignation from the school faculty was Debbie Harris who was a special education teacher last year. She will be teaching in the San Saba elementary school this year.

In other business last week, budget amendments were approved and bills and accounts paid totaling \$3,000 for July.

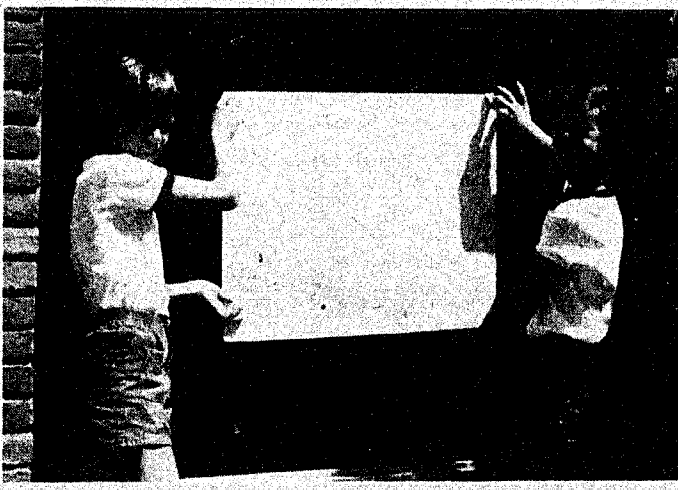
Services from Region XV service center were approved for the coming year. Films and audio-visual materials are furnished through the San Angelo center.

County Tax Appraisal Office Being Planned For New Year

The tax appraisal district and office as called for in Senate Bill 621 will include all taxing entities in Coleman County and will serve on a countywide basis.

The bill requires that all entities other than the county be a part of the appraisal district, and gives counties the option of joining or not joining in action last week the County Commissioners Court passed a resolution to make the county a part of the appraisal district.

With this action, all schools, cities and the county will be a part of the appraisal district.

The district will be effective as of January 1, 1980 and after January 1, 1982 it will be mandatory that each taxing entity in the county start using the appraisals. They could use the appraisals earlier if desired. All property in the county will come under the county wide appraisal.

The appraisal district will be governed by five directors, who will also serve as the board of equalization after 1982.

Directors will be elected by the taxing entities in the county. Each entity must submit to the

County Clerk before October 15, 1979 its nominees for the director positions. The number of votes allowed each taxing entity will be based on the amount of money on the tax rolls of each entity. Each board will submit its votes to the County Clerk before November 15 and the County Clerk will announce the results of the election by December 1.

The appraisal district directors will meet in January, 1980 to organize and start formulating plans for operation of the district, including decision on the appraisal and establishing of office.

The State of Texas will provide \$2641 for the district operation in 1980 and 1981, and it is expected that the local taxing entities will have to supplement the expense on a pro-rata basis in 1981. Starting in 1982 the full cost of the appraisal office will be borne by the local entities.

All property in the county will be appraised for tax purposes from the district office; however, each taxing entity will establish its own tax rate.

Registration Slated At HPU Fall Classes

Howard Payne University will open its doors for its 90th year Aug. 27-28 with registration for fall classes. First day of classes will be Wed., Aug. 29.

The university was established in 1889 by the Pecan Valley Baptist Association.

Students will be offered more than 400 courses in over 30 areas of study from the college of arts and sciences, the school of business, the school of Christianity, the school of education, the school of social sciences and the Douglas Mac Arthur Academy of Freedom.

"Gate Rate Hike" Sought By LSG

Lone Star Gas Company filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission recently seeking to increase its authorized city gate rate to \$2.21 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas—a 15 percent increase in the city gate rate in effect December 1978.

If the request is granted, the company would realize an additional \$40.9 million in revenue annually.

"The increase is necessary," says Douglas W. Williams, senior vice president of Lone Star, "because of the sharply higher costs of buying gas in the field and the increase in the general costs associated with operating any business."

The city gate rate is the amount Lone Star Transmission Division charges the company's Distribution Division for gas delivered to residential and commercial customers and for distribution company-used and unaccounted-for gas. Transmission is the segment of the company that buys, cleans, stores and delivers gas to the cities.

The increase, based on the city gate rate in effect last December, is 29 cents per Mcf. The average residential customer's bill would increase approximately \$28 per year.

Lone Star's current city gate rate, established by the Railroad Commission in 1977 and based on a test year ending December 1975, allows Lone Star to recover only 85 percent of the increase in gas costs above \$1.1802.

As part of the application filed August 1, Lone Star is again requesting a 100 percent flow-through of gas purchase expense consistent with the rule-making request presently pending before the Railroad Commission. "As a result of the 85 percent flow-through restriction, Lone Star absorbed approximately \$13 million in gas costs in 1978 alone," Williams says.

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative

Due to the recent request by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. for rate increases, and the fact that this co., the Coleman Co. Telephone CO-Op Inc. of Santa Anna, Tx., concurs in Southwestern Bell's private-line (fx) type services and in WATS and long distance tariffs, there exists a possibility that the Texas Public Utility Commission may change those rates. Southwestern Bell has not requested a change in those rates, but the Commission may decide to change them.

But Christ, after having redeemed man from the condemnation of the law, could impart divine power, to unite with human effort. Thus by repentance toward God and faith in Christ, the fallen children of Adam might once more become "sons of God."

When a soul receives Christ, he receives power to live the life of Christ.

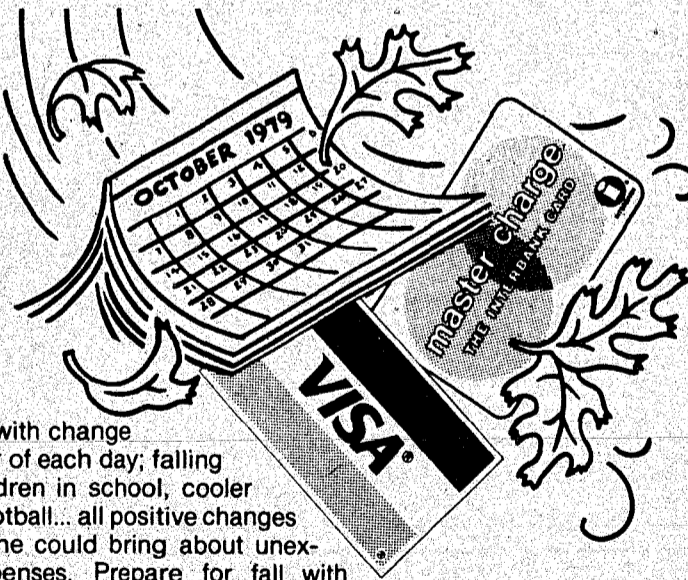

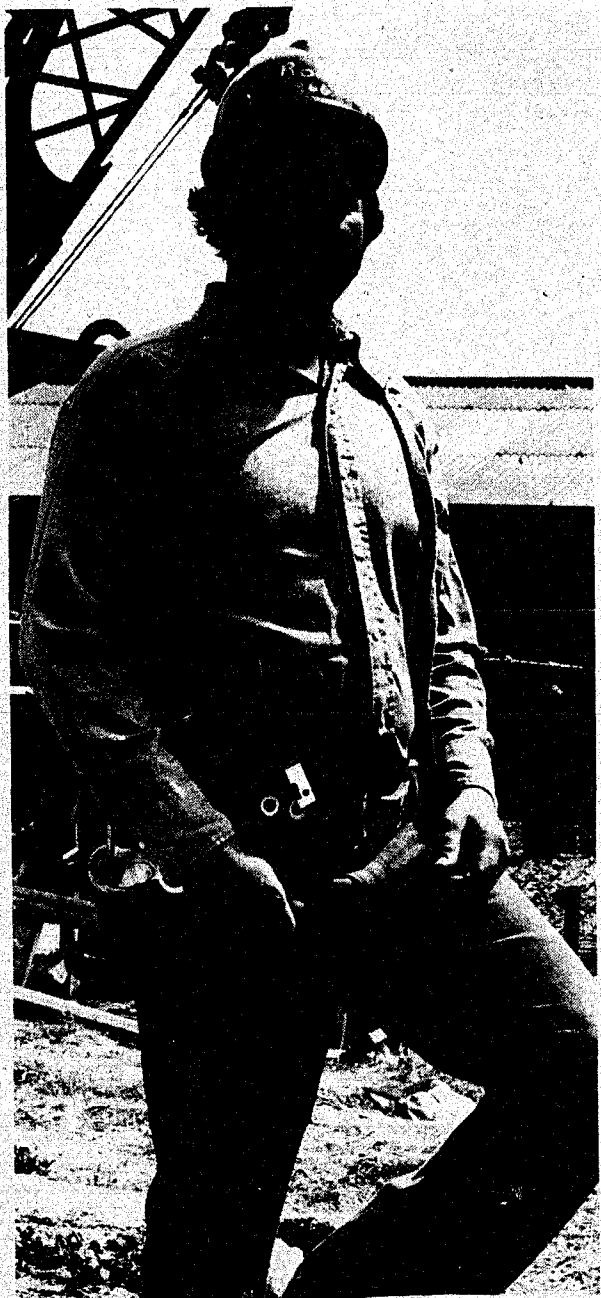

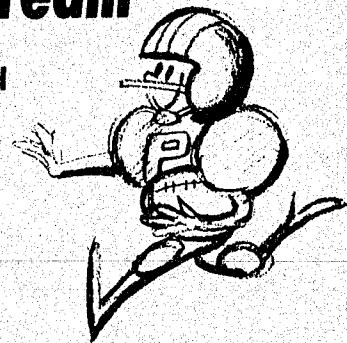

MBFA Foundation's Retirement Living Center of Abilene is one step closer to groundbreaking ceremonies due to passing Abilene's Zoning Commission scrutiny and gaining City Council approval at a recent Council meeting.

Two hundred and fifty ground-level efficiency and one and two bedroom apartments are to be constructed on a recently purchased seventeen acre tract near the Mall of Abilene in the southwest portion of the city on Winters Highway at Buffalo Gap Road.

Those retired persons living in the complex will be offered an optional three meals daily, although each apartment unit will feature a complete kitchen. Housekeeping services will also be offered in addition to enclosed premises with a 24-hour security guard and easy access to transportation. Transportation will also be furnished to apartment dwellers on a planned basis.

Utilities will be provided, with the exception of telephone services. The rooms will feature wall-to-wall carpeting and draperies with individually controlled heat and air conditioning. A swimming pool is included in the plans.

The retirement complex will require no down payment, entrance fee or life lease agreement of its occupants. Plans are also being made for later construction of offices for the West Central Texas Home Health Agency, which is part of the home health care ministry of this not-for-profit Christian Foundation operating in 134 West Texas Counties for the past ten years.

The Foundation plans to begin construction on the complex before the end of the year with completion, once construction is begun, within the period of a year. Total cost of the project has been estimated at approximately \$6,000,000.

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Parents' Interest A Key In Sports Activities

Parents' interest in their children's sports is vital—as it is in all aspects of child development, says a family life education specialist.

Interest means responding to your child's feelings—and sharing his wins and losses, explains Dorothy Taylor.

Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Interest also means being honest, and it means always avoiding "put downs".

Finally, interest means knowing six key facts about sports:

1(Know that pre-adolescents and immature boys and girls have growing bones that cannot take hard blows, so injuries can occur frequently in contact

sports.

2(Know that all competitive sports pose threats of major injuries.

To help cut down that threat, be sure all events are properly monitored, and make sure each child has protective equipment.

3(Know that the competitive spirit is very much a part of our national fabric—and in appropriate amounts, it promotes healthy growth and achievement.

4(Know that losers realize quickly they have little support.

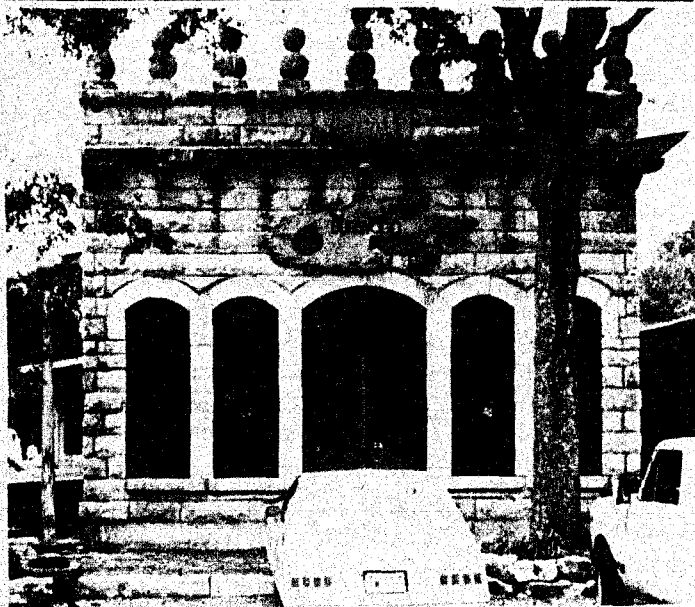
Sympathize with the pain felt in defeat, and admit that winning would have been more fun. However, do not promote the "win-above-all" feeling—that only makes the pain of losing more severe.

5(Know that children link
