## Santa Anna News Changes Ownership

Woodson Newspapers, Inc. have purchased the Santa Anna News and Brown County Gazette from Lenora and W. T. Hays, and have taken over operation of both newspapers after the transaction was signed last Thursday.

Woodson Newspapers are made up of newspapers at Brownwood, Stephenville, Waxahachie, Alice, Miami, Okla., Baxter Springs, Kan., and Early. All papers are daily with the exception of Baxter Springs, which is a semi-weekly and

Early which is a weekly. They expressed their desire to continue the operation of the two weeklies just as they have been in the past.

Mr. and Mrs. Hays have been in Bangs for 15 years operating the Gazette and have owned the Santa Anna News for ten years, purchasing it from Johnny Valentine. Mr. and Mrs. Hays plan to remain in Bangs and continue to operate the commercial printing business in Santa Anna.

## Coal Processing Plant Under Construction

Preparation plant for the coal mining project at Rockwood is sixty percent complete, according to John Anderson, project superintendent of Brown-McKee, contractors and engineers

of Lubbock. Sverdrup and Parcel and Associates of Salt Lake City, Utah is in charge of engineering. Al Walsh is project manager and inspector for the Utah company. The framework for the

processing plant is complete, a building 40 feet square and 60 feet high. It will have corrugated metal sheeting siding.

The coal will be unloaded in a large building west of the washing plant, going by flume to the processing plant. It will then be carried by a 150-foot radial conveyor to the stockpiling place.

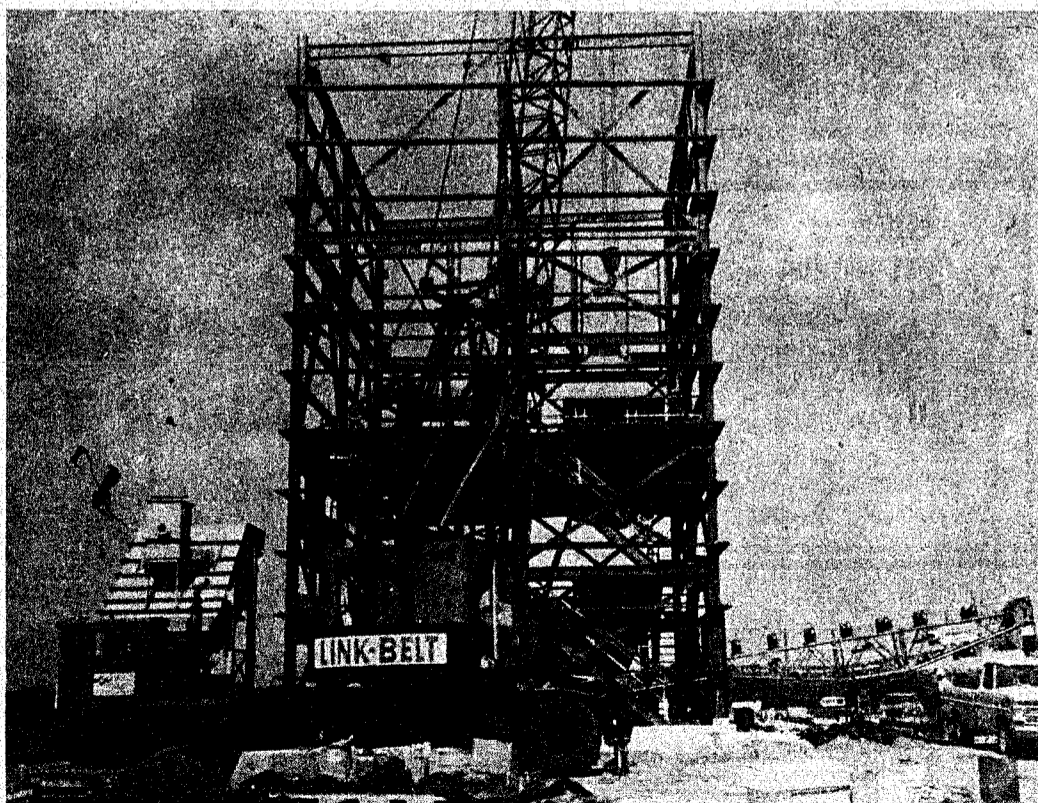
Water for the project is from two wells on the site. There will be two reclaiming ponds, each 300 feet in diameter and 30 feet deep, from which water will be reused.

There are some 25 men now on the payroll, most being local men working one shift. There are three contractors on the job, Tom Hays Enterprises of Santa Anna, Watson Construction Co. of Santa Anna and Row-Wall Electric Co. of Lubbock.

Stripping for the coal will probably start October 1, and it will be hauled by truck to San Antonio for the Longhorn Cement Co. following the processing.

Amistad Fuel Co. of San Antonio is owner of the project. Joe Williams, president of the Texas Aggregate Co. and the Zeus Corp. of San Saba, began development of the project in 1974 with core drilling in the

# Saturday Morning Mishap Takes Life of Santa Annan

A young Trickham man, Freddy Kay Fellers, 20, was killed instantly early Saturday morning, July 14, in a vehicle accident near Silver Valley in north Coleman County. Injured in the mishap was Randy Watson of Coleman, a passenger in the Fellers pickup truck. He is hospitalized in Coleman in satisfactory condition.

According to reports, the late model Ford pickup collided with a truck trailer loaded with sheetrock that was stalled on the highway. The driver of the truck was unsuccessful in flagging the on-coming vehicle. The accident occurred about 6 a.m. as the two young men were enroute to Abilene to work.

Born in Merka December 13, 1959, Freddy was the son of Vera Estel Hannah Fellers and the late James Edward Fellers. He had lived in the community five years and was a 1978 graduate of Santa Anna High School. He was a member of the football team and awarded All-District honors as linebacker during his senior year.

He was an oilfield worker and employed with Triv. Drilling Co. of Abilene.

Funeral services were held Monday, July 16, at Santa Anna First Baptist Church with the Rev. Howell Moran of Trickham and the Rev. John Stanislaw, pastor, officiating. Burial was in

# Rate Hike Is Requested By Lone Star Gas Co.

Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, J. C. Wilkerson, has filed for an application for a gas service rate increase which would raise residential customers' bills in the city of Santa Anna about \$2.61 per month during the summer and \$4.61 per month in the winter.

The figures are based on typical residential usage of 8,000 cubic feet. Under the present rate, the average bill for that amount would be \$22.56.

Wilkerson said the company needs \$30,721.00 of additional revenues to meet its costs of operation and to earn an adequate return on the company's rate base in the city of Santa Anna. For the twelve months ended September 30, 1978, based on actual revenues and expenses, Lone Star had a revenue deficiency of \$4,701.00. Wilkerson said rising costs are the reason why the company's earnings are deficient.

The largest single cost of the utility's operations throughout its pipeline network to 33 cities and towns in Texas is the cost of purchased natural gas. In 1978,

Lone Star spent \$41,764.00 on gas purchases for the city of Santa Anna. By 1978, that cost had risen to \$78,127.00.

Summer rates for Lone Star customers will be in effect for consumption between meter reading dates in May and October. They are designed to reduce the customer's cost approximately 25 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas used during that period.

Under today's request, commercial customers would also have an increase in service rates.

"Lone Star has long been dedicated to giving its customers the best possible service at reasonable cost. To maintain this commitment, Lone Star must be permitted to earn a reasonable rate of its investment in Santa Anna. Lacking this, we and our customers suffer twice. First, we could ultimately be unable to maintain or expand our facilities in this area in response to customer needs. Second, those who depend upon us for natural gas service could experience year-round curtailments were

Lone Star no longer able to compete successfully for important new reserves of natural gas," Wilkerson observed.

# Santa Anna ISD Board Has Meeting On July 10

## School Tax Exemptions Defined For Tax-payers

The four rural school districts in Coleman County, Santa Anna, Mozelle, Novice and Talpa-Centennial, have delayed implementation of the Agriculture-Use Valuation for taxation for the current year. Boards of the school districts have noted that the current valuations on agricultural land within the districts is near, or in some cases lower, than the recommended rates.

Another controversial change in the House Bill 1060 concerning school taxation is the definition of residence homestead exemptions. Previously the homestead exemptions have been for reasons of forced sale or a creditor's sale in bankruptcy, but currently are given for taxation purposes. Also included in that definition are acreage exemptions which have been dropped in HB 1060 version, with the new definition

of a residence, including a mobile home, that does not include the previously defined 200 acres for a family or 100 acres for a single person.

The current exemption includes only one or two acres actually used for the residence.

John Skelton, Tax Assessor-Collector for the rural districts, has extended the sign-up period for the exemptions until July 31. Property owners who have not claimed their \$5,000 or \$10,000 homestead exemptions may do so until that time. The office is located in Coleman west of the Courthouse.

### Without City, Rabies Tags

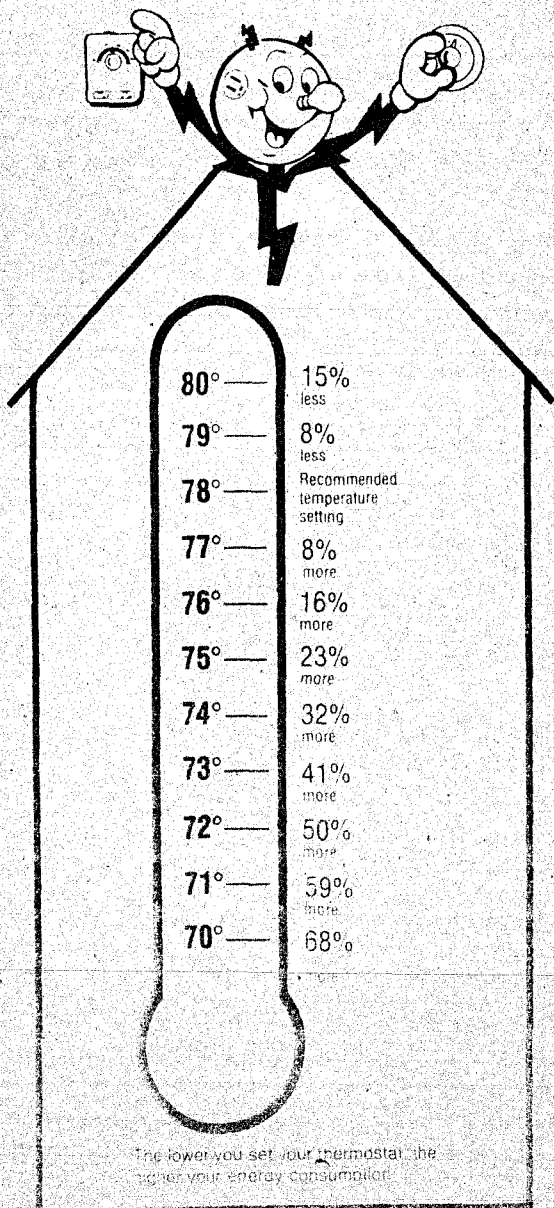
About thirty dogs were registered for their 1979 city license tags during the special vaccination and licensing project Saturday at City Hall. The Saturday effort more than doubled the number of legally registered dogs in town.

Starting Monday, July 16, dogs running loose in town without proper license and vaccination tags were being picked up and impounded. Owners may claim their dogs by purchasing the \$1 registration

tag and having their dogs vaccinated for rabies. Dogs not claimed within three days will be destroyed.

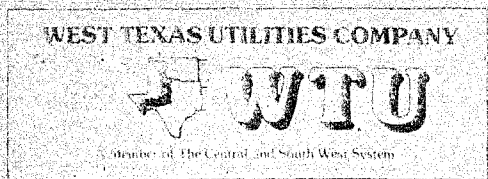
The strict enforcement of the dog ordinance is brought about by complaints of numerous stray dogs in town and the threat of a rabies outbreak in the community. Neighboring communities have had confirmed cases of rabies in past months.

The city dog tags are also available at City Hall with proof of rabies vaccination.

## Farm and Ranch Safety Week Proclaimed

The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special farm safety campaign. This year marks the 30th annual National Farm Safety Week, co-sponsored by the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This annual rural safety event begun in 1944 to help reduce farm accidents impairing wartime food and fiber production.

The theme for the week is "Personal Protection -- A De-

fense Against Injury." In his proclamation, Judge Skelton said "for years many industries have relied on personal protective equipment to help reduce the number and extent of on-the-job injuries. The proclamation also points out that farm safety leaders believe that had protective equipment -- safety helmets, goggles and safety shoes -- been worn, it is estimated more than four of every ten injuries could have been prevented or reduced in severity.

Most farmers wear baseball-type caps given them by feed, seed and equipment dealers, because they are comfortable to wear and free, but give little head protection.

Farmers are urged to protect their heads, protect eyes, protect hearing, protect lungs and hands and skin.

The 1978 total of 152 state-wide non-traffic farm fatalities was the lowest count on record. Other than traffic, two-thirds of all Texas fatal farm causes and number of fatalities include fires and burns - 30; drownings- 27; falls - 23; firearms- 22; and tractors - 18.
