James and Guy Allen Qualify For Roping Finals

James and Guy Allen of Santa Anna will compete in the National Steer Roping Finals at Laramie, Wyoming September 8 and 9. The top 16 steer ropers in the world will compete in the rope, trip and tie event with ten steers each to decide the national championship.

Guy Allen, son of James and Ann Allen, was the 1977 National Steer Roping Champion, and James has been a consistent winner and contender for the title several times.

James and Guy are the only father and son to compete against each other for the championship. Guy is going into the finals ranking about tenth, and James is close behind. The National Champion is the roper with the best average at the finals.

James and Guy competed against each other in 1977, with James winning fourth in the average. Ropers will be from six western states with Texas having nine; Oklahoma having three, and one each from Oregon, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico.

Although the one-man event is not common in Texas because of the large arena required for the sport, most of the competition is at rodeos in Oregon, Wyoming, Nebraska and Washington.

School Starts in Santa Anna

School Enrollment is Down From 1978 First-day Figure

The new school term started in Santa Anna Tuesday, September 4, with enrollment down from the first-day figure last year. The high school enrollment was down from 120 to 101, with the new figure reflecting the size of the freshman class that has only 16 students and the smallest high school class in years.

Total enrollment Tuesday was down 27 students from kindergarten through grade 12.

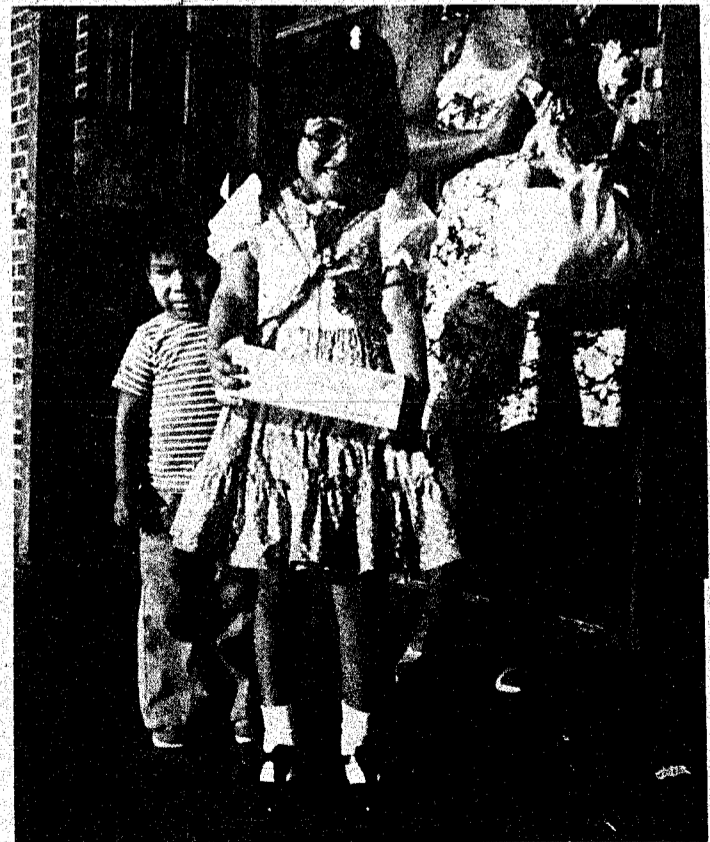

Dove "Cook-off" Set During County Fiesta

The first annual dove cook-off was held last year in conjunction with the "Fiesta de la Paloma" celebration in Coleman. A total of fourteen entries were prepared and judged by a team of judges who awarded first place to Tom Calawa of Baird and second to David Rush of Coleman.

In an effort to make the 1979 dove cook-off more interesting for spectators, rules have been changed so that contestants will cook their dove dishes on the fairgrounds. A special "Unusual Cook-site" award will also be presented for the most colorful and unique cooksite. Spectators who wish to taste the dove dishes will be allowed to do so.

The Chamber of Commerce expects a large crowd to participate in the dove festival activities this year due to the extensive advertising that is already underway. Coleman has received mention in the Calendar of Texas Events and in the "Texas Highways" magazine, September issue. It is the dream of the directors and officers of the Chamber of Commerce to add more and more activities each year to the Fiesta so that tourism in the area will be stimulated.

4. Recipe may or may not be printed for display. If the cook prefers to keep his or her recipe confidential, he may do so.
5. Doves will be cooked on the site. Electricity will be available but all entrants must furnish all necessary equipment and supplies including other fuel if

The next phase of the project to get underway will be construction of new water lines in Santa Anna. The new system has been staked along the streets and construction is to start soon. Also planned is a new pump station at Lake Brownwood.

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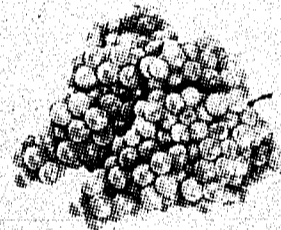

Several Drilling Sites Staked in S-Anna Area

Master Drilling Co., Inc. of Abilene has spotted a wildcat location in Coleman County, five miles southeast of Coleman.

Site for No. 1 M.A. Ward is in Walter Fosgate Survey No. 487. Proposed depth is 3,400 feet.

Brazos & Rice No. 1 Boenicke, in the Brooks & Burleson Survey 2, A-1426, wildcat one mile northwest of Trickham, total depth 1,766 feet.

Paul C. Teas Jr. of Dallas will drill No. 1 G. & T. McIver as a proposed 2,000 foot wildcat in Coleman County.

Location is four miles northwest of Trickham on a 110 acre lease.

It is in the Pleasant Young Survey, A-727.

W. E. Burgess of Graham spotted No. 1 Woodruff & Hughes in the Davis-Bell (Bre-

neke Sand) Field three miles west of Santa Anna.

The planned 2,900 foot venture is located on a 118 acre lease.

Drillsite is in Section 3, Block 1, GH&H Survey.

Spotted in the regular field two miles southeast of Santa Anna was Reserve Oil Inc. of Dallas No. 4 J.B. Bass.

Slated for 1,950 feet, it is in H. Starnes Survey 63.

The lease is composed of 87 acres.

Proler Energy Inc. of Houston No. 22 Vaughn will be drilled two miles west of Trickham on a 937 acre lease in the regular field.

Drillsite is in the A.S. Lipsom Survey 80.

Proposed depth is 1,995 feet.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Santa Anna Independent School District has published the accompanying Notice of Tax Increase to comply with Article 7244c, Civil Statutes of the State of Texas.

IT DOES NOT, HOWEVER, REPRESENT A TAX INCREASE, BUT RATHER AN INCREASE IN THE TAX RATE PRODUCED IN THE STATE REQUIRED FORMULA PROVIDED FOR IN ARTICLE 7244c.

The Truth In Taxation Tax Laws of 1977 require that tax offices annually publish a calculated rate to reflect the tax rate required to collect the same revenue within three percent (3%) that was collected the prior year.

With the passage of House Bill 1060 that grants homestead exemptions, the mathematical formula by which all tax units must use will always reflect that a lower rate will be projected than what the true rate will be to produce the same amount of revenue. This is true with the Santa Anna Independent School District. Our calculated rate is \$.76. The school will need and the Board proposes to operate again the coming year at the rate of \$.82. From \$.76 to \$.82 appears to be an increase of eight percent, but in reality it is a reduction because of the lesser amount of tax dollars that all people claiming homestead exemptions will be paying.

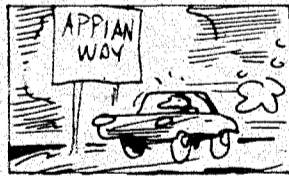

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Meals on Wheels Needs Financing

The Meals on Wheels program in Santa Anna is in need of funds, and donations to the program are sought. Only a few churches are now actively supporting the program.

Sponsored by churches and not receiving any money from state or federal agencies, the program provides the noon meal five days a week to about ten local senior citizens.

People receiving the meals pay from 80 cents to \$1.40 per day for the meal, according to

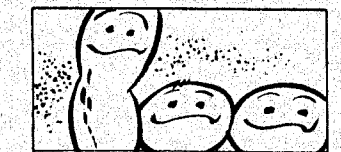

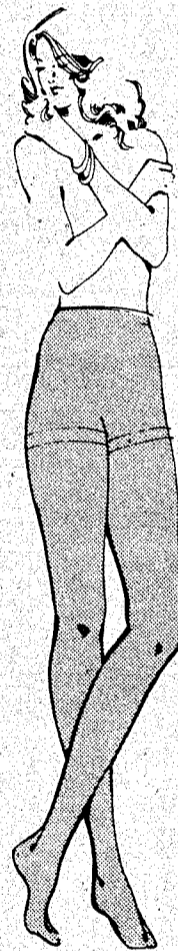

Low default rate maintained by Texas A&M students

COLLEGE STATION — Colleges and universities are often wary when the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare launches an investigation. In one case, however, HEW simply wants to know how Texas A&M University achieves such a low default rate in the National Direct Student Loan (NDSL) program.

Texas A&M's rate of 4.72 percent is more than twice as good as the 10 percent goal to which HEW's Office of Education aspires. The national average has surpassed 17 percent.

Because so many students have defaulted on their loans, HEW is interested in the reasons why Texas A&M has such a successful rate of return on former students' loans.

President Jarvis E. Miller says the lion's share of the credit belongs to the students and their parents. "We are blessed to have a student body composed overwhelmingly of individuals who are highly responsible and take their obligations seriously."

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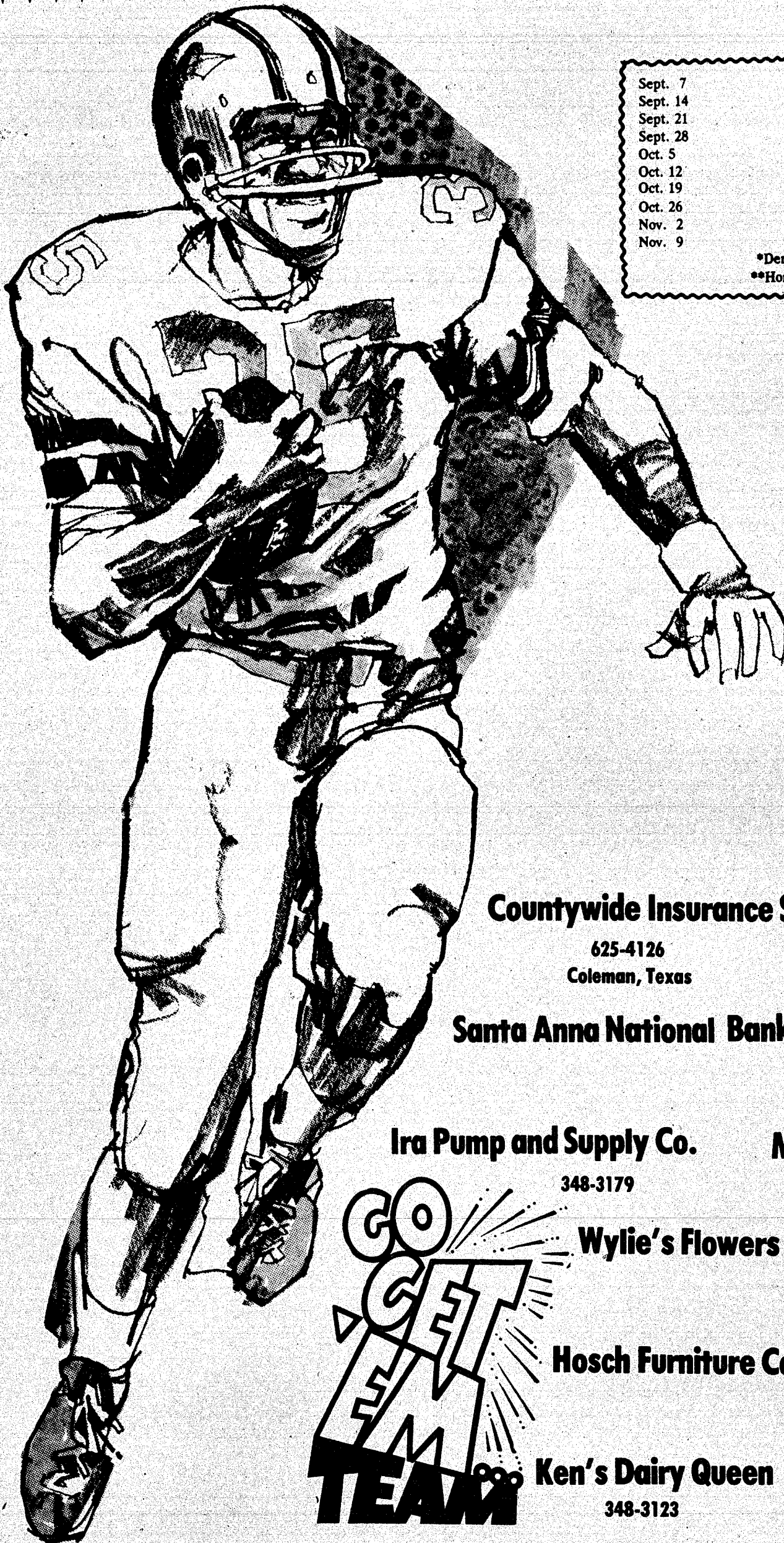

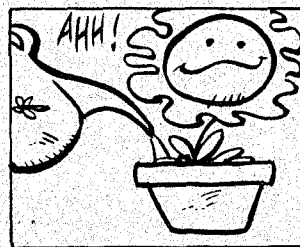

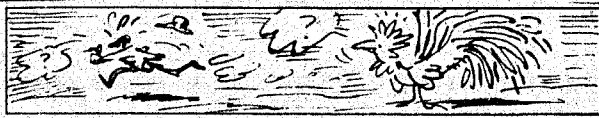

Marguerite B. Snyder, Member of the Texas State ASC Committee, has been appointed by Secretary Bob Bergland to serve a two-year term on the national Advisory Committee on Foreign Animal and Poultry diseases for the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Advisory Committee, headed by P.R. "Bobby" Smith, Assistant Secretary for Marketing and Transportation Services, serves to bring the experience and knowledge of the livestock and poultry industries to bear on the problems related to prevention, control, and eradication of foreign animal and poultry diseases that gain entry into this country.

The new appointee and her husband, James L. Snyder, have been involved in farming and ranching for 28 years. Their home is located in Baird. The Snyders are members of the Callahan and Shackelford County Farm Bureaus, the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers, and the National Cattlemens Association.

Mrs. Snyder gained State prominence in agriculture when she became the first woman in Texas to be appointed to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Com-

mittee in November of 1977, filling the position left vacant by Charles Stenholm who is presently serving in the U. S. House of Representatives. Mrs. Snyder gained national attention when she was elected to the Board of Directors of the National Rural Center (NRC), in June of 1978. The NRC, headquartered in Washington, D.C., is an independent, non-membership, non-profit organization endowed by grants and private foundations to develop policy, alternatives, and to provide information which can help rural people and their communities to achieve full potential.

Speaking of her new appointment, Mrs. Snyder said, "I am happy to be more deeply involved in this area of agriculture." "Our country must be on constant guard to prevent the entry of animal diseases which do not occur in this country, and be prepared to deal with those diseases that do gain entry."

Spring Season Turkey Hunters Harvest Gobblers

The 1979 spring turkey gobbler season in Texas has been termed a success by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, although hunter participation and harvest declined in some areas.

In all, hunters harvested approximately 3,000 gobblers during the nine-day April season which was offered in 57 counties.

Each year for the past several years the number of counties offering a spring hunt has increased. In the spring of 1980 hunts will be offered in all or portions of 62 counties, and the season will be extended from nine to 16 days.

A postcard survey conducted in 24 of the 57 counties which had a spring hunt this year revealed a four percent decline in harvest in Edwards Plateau

counties. Hunter success was good, with 43 percent getting a turkey, but the number of hunters declined in the sampled counties by 14 percent.

Both the number of hunters and success ratio in the Possum Kingdom ecological area dropped in the 1979 season, by 13 percent and 12 percent, respectively.

Glenn A. Boydston, coordinator of technical programs, said sampling over the past three years indicates the spring hunts offer good recreational opportunity with negligible impact on the resource.

It is generally more difficult to bag a gobbler in the spring than the fall, and consistently successful hunters usually are those who are extremely patient and adept at using a call, Boydston said.

Hunting, Fishing Licenses Soon Available For Year

The new 1979-80 Texas and fishing licenses are now available at license vendors and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices. The licenses become valid on Sept. 1, 1979.

Also available at no cost where licenses are sold is the 1979-80 Texas Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations booklet.

All 79-80 licenses will be valid for the year ending Aug. 31, 1980, including the resident hunting license for \$5.25; resident fishing license for \$4.50; or, the combination hunting/fishing license for \$8.75.

Non-resident small game license is \$37.75 and is required of out-of-state hunters after small game such as quail, prairie chicken, pheasant, dove, and similar species. Out-of-state hunters after bigger game such as deer, antelope,

be required to purchase the non-resident/general hunting license for \$100.75. The general license (\$100.75) will allow hunters to hunt all legal Texas species during the regular open seasons.

All licenses are printed on waterproof, tear-resistant paper and each hunting license contains tags for buck and antlerless deer and turkey. If the license holder is successful at bagging one or more of these species, the date and month of the kill on the correct tag must be marked out in ink or cut out and the tags attached securely to the carcass prior to transporting or moving the carcass. The place and county of harvest must be filled in at this time.

There are spaces on the back of the hunting license for affixing a white-winged dove, archery, or federal migratory

Not if you want to slash your utility bill in half in some Texas areas.

Air conditioning accounts for up to 50 percent of all home energy used in some areas of Texas, says Dr. Jane Berry, a housing and home furnishings specialist.

You can use them as "helpers" to your air-conditioning system -- or in place of it.

Dr. Berry is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Here are two types of fans to start with -- in deciding which will do the best job in your home:

CIRCULATING FANS

Circulating the air inside the home makes you feel cooler because it speeds up evaporation of moisture from the skin. These fans "help" air conditioning 88 or work alone.

VENTILATING FAN

Use ventilating fans without air conditioning -- they need open windows. Fans that ventilate do two things: they exhaust hot, stagnant indoor air to the outdoors, and they bring cooler outside air into the house.

WHY FANS?

Texas is rediscovering the fan. Many Texas residents already report that using the "right" fan lets them run air conditioners at higher settings—or simply turn them off—and still stay comfortable.

Safety Hints That May Save A Life

Once the automobile was virtually alone on the road, but today other highway users, such as motorcyclists, are there in ever-increasing numbers, requiring all to share the road safely.

More than five million motorcycles are registered, compared to less than one million 15 years ago.

To help prevent multi-vehicle accidents, which are the car drivers fault 70 percent of the time, motorists can take the following precautions suggested by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation:

1. Be prepared at intersections to yield the right of way to oncoming motorcycles.
2. When being overtaken by a cycle, maintain lane position and speed, allowing the cyclist to complete the pass and assume his proper lane position as quickly as possible.
3. When passing a motorcycle, allow a full lane to the motorcycle rather than crowding in the same lane. Also avoid premature returns to the original lane since a cyclist is extremely vulnerable when an auto forces him to the right or off the road.
4. Proper use of signals is a must. Both motorists and motorcyclists can prevent critical situations from developing by communicating their intentions to other highway users.
5. In developing proper search patterns in traffic, the motorist should always be on the lookout for the unexpected and expect motorcycles to appear in traffic at any time.

These few tips can tip the scales in favor of safety, and perhaps save a life.
