SAHS Boys, Eula Girls Tournament Champions

The Santa Anna boys basketball team won the local invitational tournament championship for the second consecutive year, defeating the Cross Plains boys 48-41 in the final game Saturday night. The Eula High School girls won their division championship over Eden 67-30.

The Santa Anna girls won the consolation trophy by winning over Mozelle 38-15, and Mozelle defeated Eden 50 - 40 for the boys consolation title.

Jim Clifton, son of the Don Cliftons, was named "Most Valuable Player" in the boys division of the tourney, and Holly Bersup of Eula was given the girls' honor.

Two Santa Anna players were named to the all-tournament teams. Dwayne Warnock was chosen for the boys squad, and Belinda Phillips was named to the girls all-star team.

In the first round of play, the

boys defeated Eden 53-25 with Jim Clifton scoring 23 points and Warnock adding 17. They won in the second round over Blanket 48 - 40 with Warnock scoring 17 and Clifton adding 14. Clifton, a 6'5" junior, made 16 points in the Saturday night game and was outstanding on defense.

Elder Tom Good, pastor of the Santa Anna Seventh-day Adventist Church, has started his ministry here and is also serving as pastor of the Coleman and Brownwood SDA congregations. He and his wife are making their home in Brownwood.

Mr. Good succeeds Elder R. D. Murray who has retired from the ministry but is making his home here. Murray was pastor here two years.

Good, a Coleman native, is a 1949 graduate of Coleman High School and attended Draughn's Business College in Abilene. He worked a number of years in different occupations, including oil field work, driver of a bread

C of C Auction Planned Saturday, December 22

One of Santa Anna's most unusual activities is being planned for Saturday, December 22, by the Chamber of Commerce. The auction to benefit the group will be held at 2 p.m. that afternoon on South Second Street, just south of the main downtown intersection. Tax Appraisal Board Named For Coleman Co.

County Clerk Glen Thomas has recently announced the election of five directors for the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District that will be established January 1, 1980. Selection of the five directors was by the taxing entities in Coleman County that includes the school districts, county and the cities of Santa Anna and Coleman.

Chosen for the board were Harold Bragg of Talpa, C. B. Drinkard and Bill Sneed of Coleman, Harold Pittard of

Novice and Barbara Kingsbery of Santa Anna.

The new group, established under the recent Senate Bill 621 for tax reform in Texas, will organize a single appraisal district for Coleman County. The duties of the group, and similar boards in each county in Texas, include organization of the new office and appointment of a board of equalization during 1980. After January 1, 1982 it will be mandatory that each taxing entity in the county start using the appraisals.

TWC Hearing Postponed On City Waste Disposal

AUSTIN— A Texas Water Commission hearing on an application by the City of Santa Anna for an amended wastewater discharge permit has been postponed.

A TWC spokesman said the hearing, scheduled Thursday of last week, was postponed after attorneys for the City and for the local downstream landowners protesting the application, began attempts to reach a compromise on the matter.

The city is seeking to amend its permit to increase its wastewater discharge to 150,000 gallons daily. The discharge is

from the treatment plant located about two and one-half miles southwest of town.

The treated effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary of Horse Creek, then into Horse Creek, then to Home Creek, and then to the Colorado River.

A new date for the hearing has not been set.

BIG SPRING— The Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed for a permit with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers to construct Stacy Dam.

In April the district was issued a permit by the Texas Water Commission to impound 554,000 acre-feet of water on the Colorado River in south Coleman County. The permit has been appealed by opponents and the first step in the process is a hearing in District Court in Austin January 31 and February 1.

Water district officials have decided to go ahead and apply for the construction permit now instead of waiting until all litigation is settled.

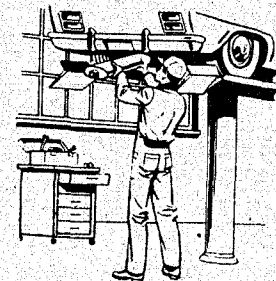

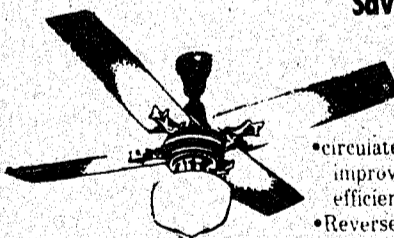

It is called Investment because that's what it really is. The members decide on a project they think can make money for the church. This money is not used locally, but to tell the story of Jesus in far away lands.

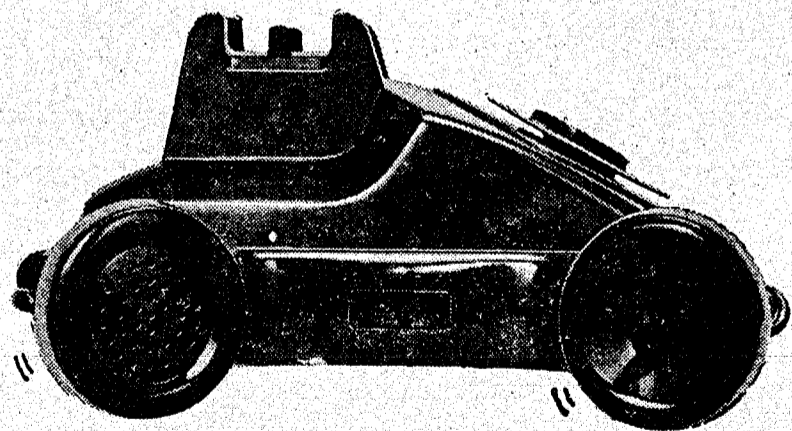
A number of the members of the church had a project and from time to time watched the dollars and cents grow "for the Lord" as they say.

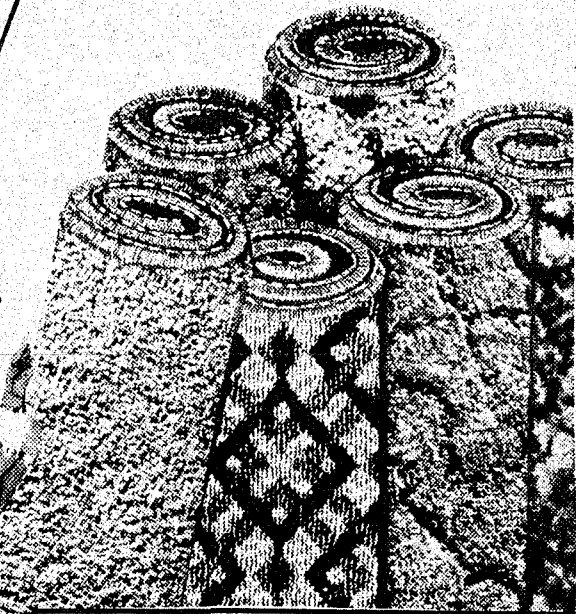

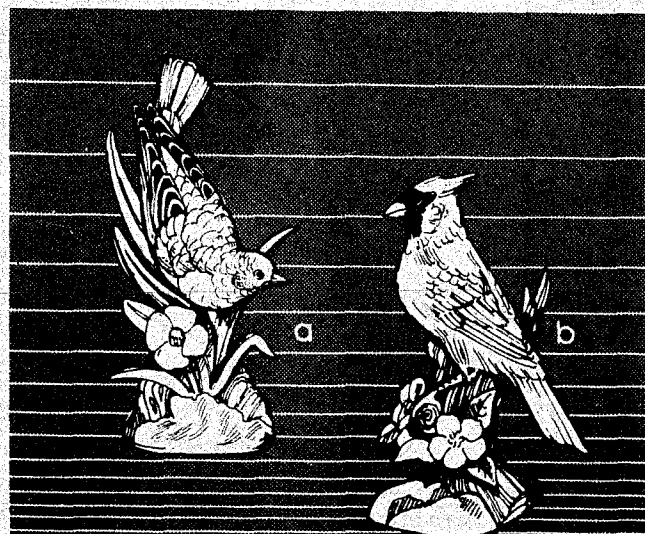

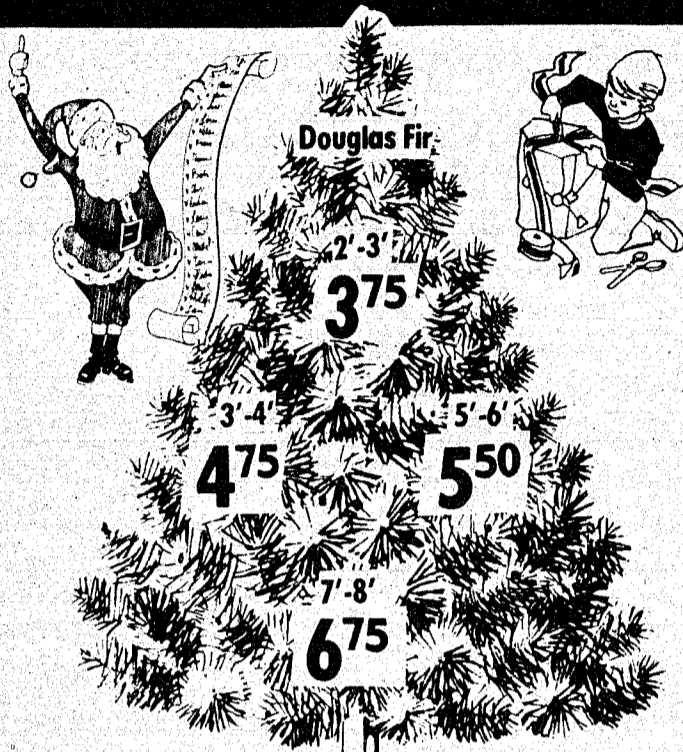
