Santa Anna jumped to a 6 - 0 lead in the first quarter when Rusty Buzzard scored on a 20-yard run. Blanket was next to score, giving them a 7 - 6 lead.

A field goal by Buzzard put Santa Anna in the lead again 9 - 7 just before halftime.

### Father-Son Duo Honored By Cattle Breeders Assn.

Two Santa Anna ranchers and cattlemen were recently honored in Grand Prairie with induction into the American Cattle Breeders Hall of Fame. A. K. Buddy Neff and his son, Donnie Neff, were recognized for their participation and promotion of the American Cattle organization and production, a new breed recently established from Longhorn stock.

At the ceremony held at the Southwestern Historical Wax Museum, 25 cattlemen representing several breeds were inducted into the Hall of Fame. A photo and description of the individual breeds are displayed at the museum along with the names and pictures of the inductees.

Jim Suggs, Texas Railroad Commissioner from Kerville, conducted the ceremony for the Hall of Fame.

The Cattle Breeders Hall of Fame was formerly housed at San Angelo but has recently been moved to Grand Prairie as a permanent addition to the Historical Museum located in Interstate 35. The Hall of Fame

is a tribute to some of America's finest cattle and cattlemen and will serve as a living memorial to those outstanding Americans who have contributed to the cattle industry.

Inductees are selected from nominations made by leaders of the cattle producers organizations and represent all breeds of cattle. This is the second year for the awards program.

The Neffs started in the Longhorn cattle business at a young age and have recently been instrumental in establishing the American breed that is basically three-fourths Longhorn blood.

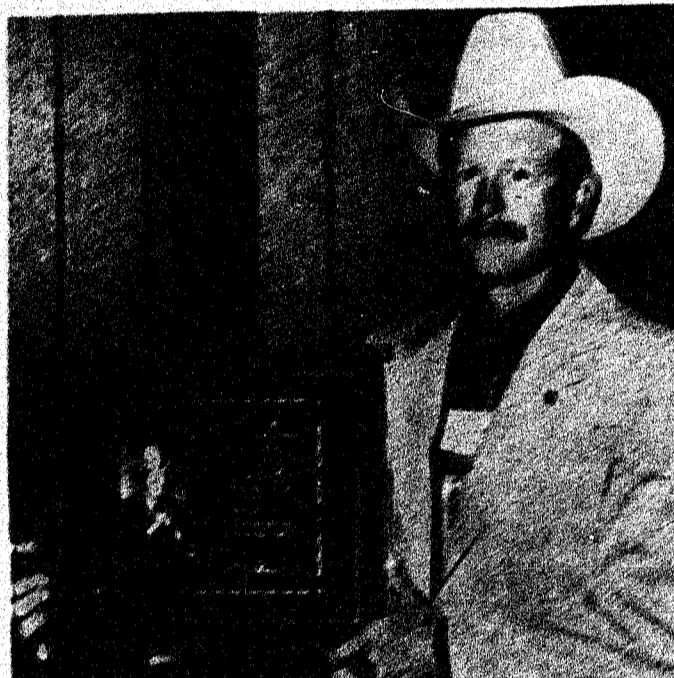

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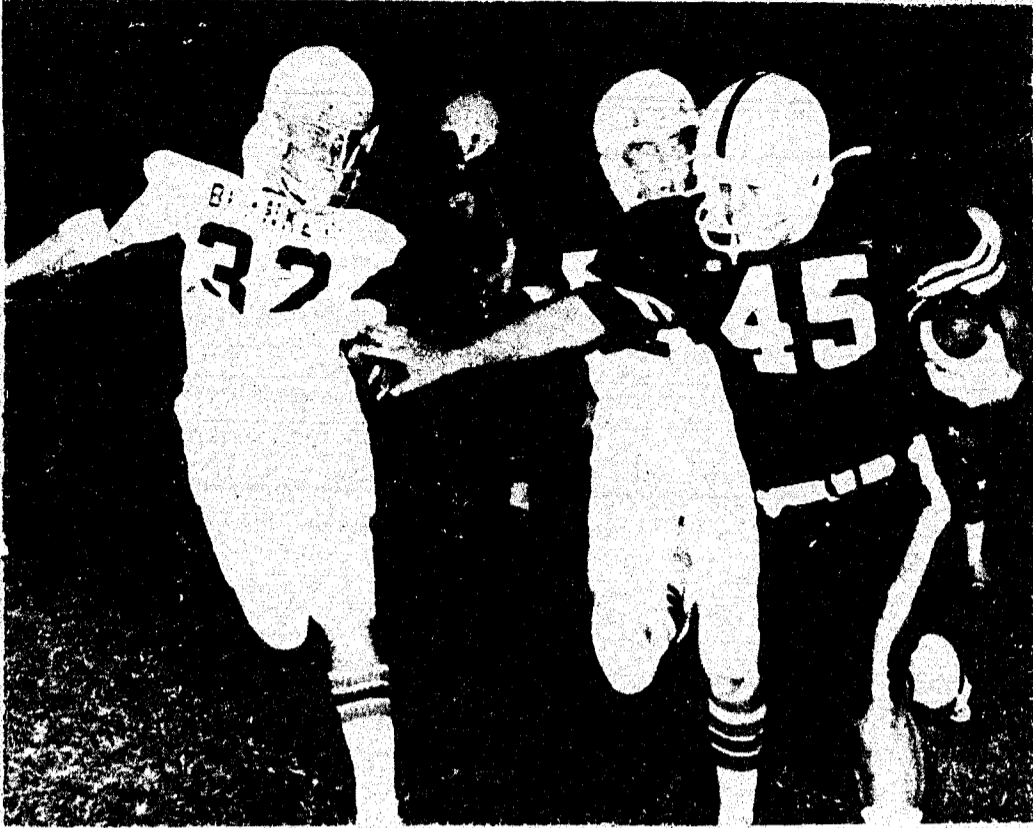

## Oil, Gas Well Completed Two Miles From Santa Anna

Reserve Oil Inc. No. 2 Milton Moseley is now a dual oil and gas producer. It is located two miles southeast of Santa

Anna in H. Starnes Survey 63.

Latest completion is in the regular field. Daily potential was 42 barrels of 28.2 gravity oil, pumping from perforations at 1,632-40 feet.

The well was completed in 1978 in the Santa Anna (Cross Cut) Field from perforations at 1,356-68 feet for an absolute, open flow of 2,220,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily.

Other wells staked in the community include a regular field project three miles northeast of Rockwood in the J. S. Martin Survey 217. It is the No. 1 Wilfred Ray Schulze, Brazos & Rice.

The planned 1,990 foot venture is located on a 433-acre lease.

Norman Pautsky of Wichita Falls will drill No. 3 O. H. Watson in the regular field eight miles southeast of Santa Anna.

The well has a proposed depth of 1,750 feet and is in Pleasant Young Survey 494. It is on a 175-acre lease.

## Higher Quail Bag Limit Approved For Local Area

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission at a public meeting in Austin Sept. 26 set a 20 quail per day bag limit in south and west Texas for the upcoming hunting season.

In response to biological surveys which showed unusually high quail populations, the commission sets limits of 20 per day and 60 in possession for counties under the department's regulatory authority in South Texas and Trans-Pecos.

These are the highest bag and possession limits allowed in Texas since the department first was given authority to set limits beginning in the early 1950s according to Don Wilson, quail species leader for the department.

Other regions, including Cole-

man County, also were given increased limits, with a 16 per day and 48 in possession limit established for much of the western half of the state and in 16 counties in Southeast Texas counties.

Wilson told the commission that outstanding quail production during the year warranted the increased bag limits to allow additional recreation from quail which would otherwise be lost to natural causes. Extensive research through the years has shown that quail populations are extremely cyclic and annual mortality is commonly as high as 80 percent in some years whether the population is hunted or not.

Quail season opens Saturday, November 17.

## People Can Find Justice In Small Claims Court

Have a grievance about "small" money?

For \$8 you can file a claim in a small claims court, reminds Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

Small claims courts provide a forum for swift, inexpensive justice--over anything from rose bushes destroyed by neighborhood dogs to "bad" checks, she says.

Mrs. McCormack is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Anyone over age 18 can sue--and anyone can be sued--in a small claims court.

You can sue another person or any business.

It doesn't matter under what legal form the business operates, either. You can sue a man in business for himself, a partnership or a large corporation.

### HOW SMALL IS 'SMALL'?

For the \$8 fee, you can ask for a judgement on any problem involving \$150 or less.

Also, if wages or labor are the issue, you can sue for up to \$500.

### WHERE IT IS

Each Texas county has a small claims court. Call the county courthouse for more information about the small claims court in your county.

### HOW IT WORKS

There are no complicated papers to file in a small claims court.

Hearings are informal--with each person involved in the dispute standing face-to-face before a judge.

Since no formal pleadings are required, you don't need a lawyer, although lawyers are allowed.

Judges in small claims courts are justices of the peace, and they decide each case, unless either party requests a jury.

Each person involved in the dispute must speak for himself. There are no technical legal rules about what evidence the judge can hear.

He decides the case on the basis of what he hears in court.

## Entries Increase For State Fair Contests

With 24 states, including Hawaii, and two foreign countries represented, entries in the 1979 State Fair Pan American and Junior Livestock Shows are up five percent from last year. The shows run October 5-21 at Fair Park.

Five percent may not seem like much of an increase, but with Livestock Director Don Clark expecting inflation and fuel shortages to create an overall 10 percent decrease in entries this year, that's a pretty good response.

"With beef cattle prices so

high, I thought more people would be selling rather than showing. And the high fuel prices, as well as the shortages, were factors indicating a possible decrease," explains Clark.

Clark has no explanation for some of the increases, such as the 60 percent jump in Angus beef cattle entries. But the 45 percent gain in the Pan American Open Swine category could be credited to market prices and an influx of new breeders.

"People come to our livestock exhibitions for three main

reasons: it's a marketplace (a good place to buy), it's a prime place to advertise their products, and it's an educational experience because they can compare their breed to other breeds," says Clark.

And the entrants are coming from as far away as Bogota, Columbia, South America. Monterrey, Mexico, also is represented. Livestock owners living outside the continental United States contract with "custom fitters" who feed, train, groom and show their animals in the United States.

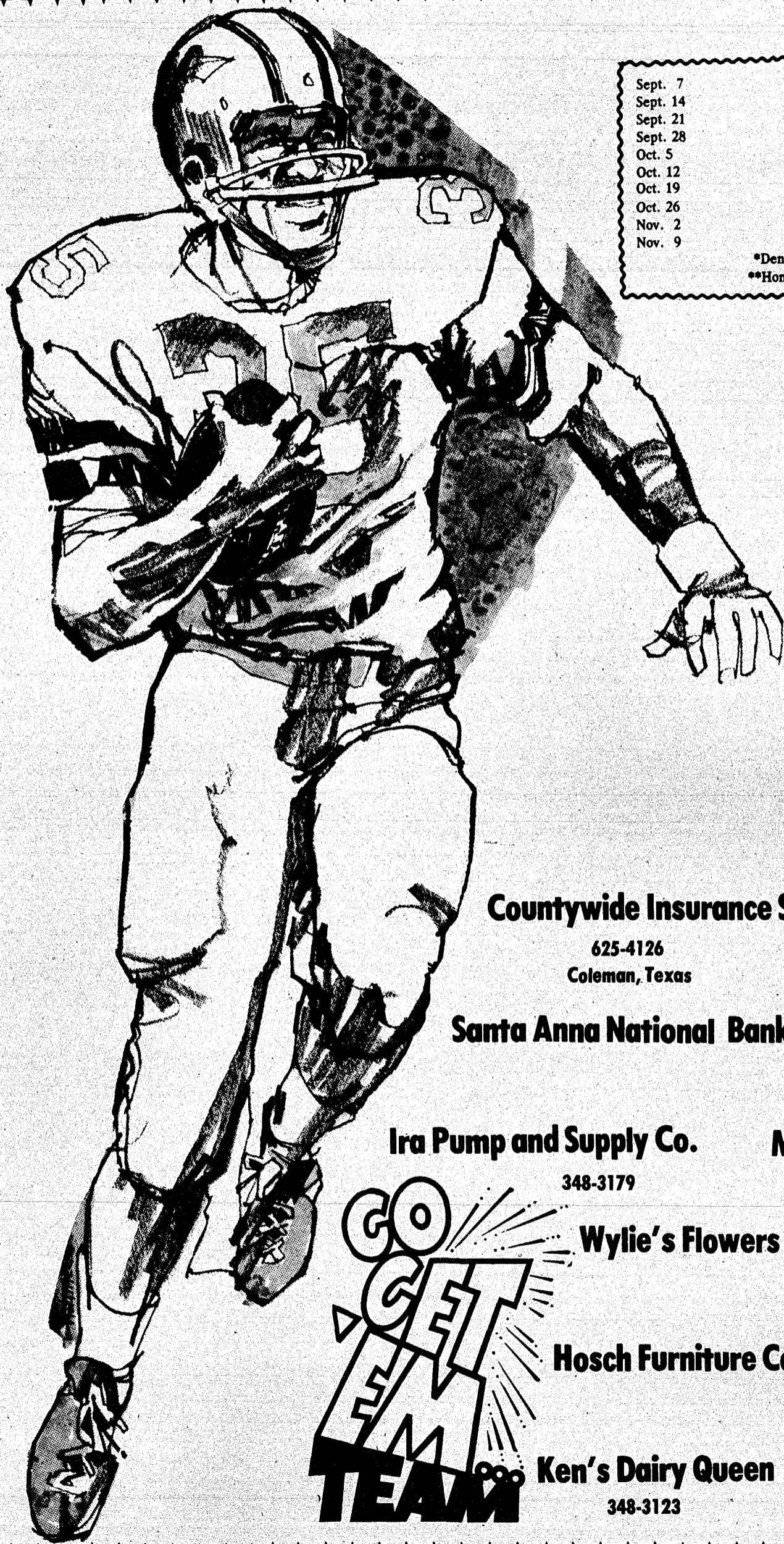



## Local SDA Church Assists With Radio Ministry Fund

More than half a million dollars will be collected by the Seventh-day Adventists throughout North America next week to go toward the support of the church's worldwide radio ministry.

Voluntary contributions will provide about 12 percent of the annual budget for the program, "The Voice of Prophecy." The broadcast is now heard more than 1,200 times a week over 800 stations.

"Radio is the quickest, cheapest way to talk to the world," says the 85 year-old H.M.S. Richards, Sr., now speaker emeritus of the broadcast.

The local Adventist church will be active in raising funds to keep this broadcast on the air.

Statistics of the office reflect that for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1979, interest earned on State funds amounted to an astonishing historical high of \$177,989,495.64, which is an increase of \$50,443,307.14 or an increase of 39.5% over the

previous year's earnings.



**"Fire Prevention Week"  
Set October 7 - 13**

Fire Prevention Week October 7-13, 1979, marks the 69th year that fire safety has been the subject of a national observance.

County Judge W.W. Skelton has proclaimed the week for Coleman County at the request of the Coleman County Farm Bureau.

In his proclamation, Judge Skelton said "it all started on October 9, 1911, when Fire Prevention Day was inaugurated. The date of October 9 was chosen because it marks the anniversary of the so-called "Great Chicago Fire of 1871" - the conflagration which killed 250 people and destroyed 17,430 buildings at a cost of \$168 million, and the fire which started people thinking in terms of fire "prevention" rather than only of fire "fighting".

Fire Prevention Week is sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association.

Victor Cardinas, President of the Coleman County Farm Bureau said "fire is one of our biggest fears around rural homes and farmsteads. Because of the usual remote location and the presence of plenty of combustible materials, farm fires tend to be extensive and costly." Prevention of fire should be the first concern of all farmers, ranchers and their families, he added.

Farm Bureau has several programs designed to help curtail fire losses. The county Farm Bureau, in cooperation with the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies sponsors the attendance of local volunteer fireman to the annual Texas Fireman's Training School each summer in College Station. More than 1,600 volunteer firemen have attended under Farm Bureau sponsorship during the past fourteen years.

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
