The second quarter was a defensive battle for the teams, then after halftime Buzzard ran in from the three for the second TD, but the PAT failed. A field goal attempt in the fourth quarter also failed.

Santa Anna led 15 to five in

first downs, and also led the Wildcats with 120 yards rushing and 106 yards passing. Santa Anna made 7 of 20 passing attempts.

Coach Roger Goodwin praised the entire team for the fine defensive effort Friday night.

## City Council Approves City Gas Rate Increase

J. C. Wilkerson of Lone Star Gas Co. met with Santa Anna City Council Thursday, October 4, and at the third reading, an ordinance was approved granting the company a rate increase.

The increase to residential and commercial customers will be 8.76 percent of the current rate. The increase was first requested in August, but postponed until this month.

A traffic sign ordinance was read and approved in agreement with the State Traffic Safety Department where new traffic signs will be installed in Santa Anna. The project results from a survey made here, and will be financed by a grant to the city. About 100 new traffic signs will be installed.

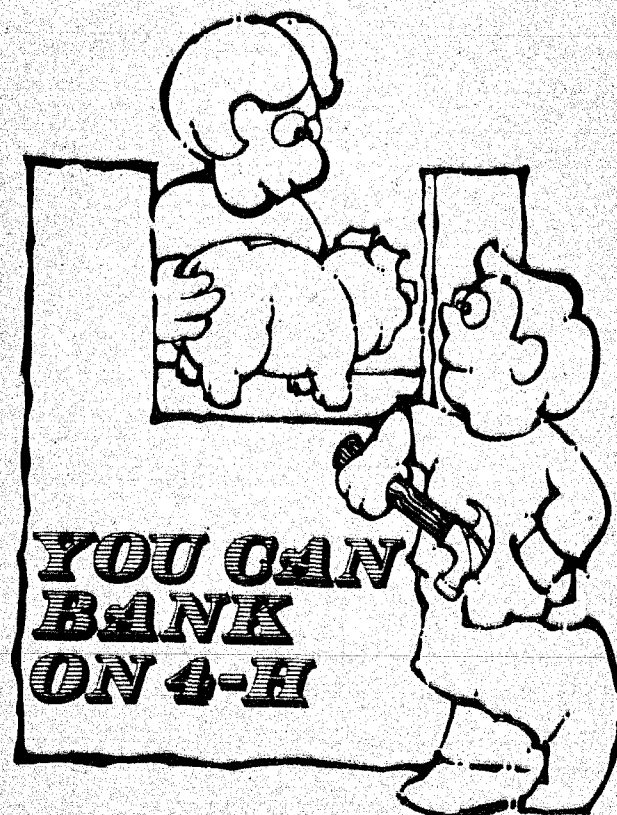

## Girl Scout Executive Sets Meeting Here Monday

Heart of Texas Girl Scout executive director Donna Fincher will meet in Santa Anna Monday, October 15, with parents of girls interested in Girl Scouting. The meeting will be at First Baptist annex at 10 a.m.

The purpose of the meeting Tuesday will be to discuss program opportunities afforded by the Girl Scout organization

and program and to determine the level of interest in making Girl Scouting available in Santa Anna.

Miss Fincher said that contacts from Santa Anna residents indicate there is some confusion about how girls may join Girl Scouts, and who has the authority to represent Girl Scouting here.

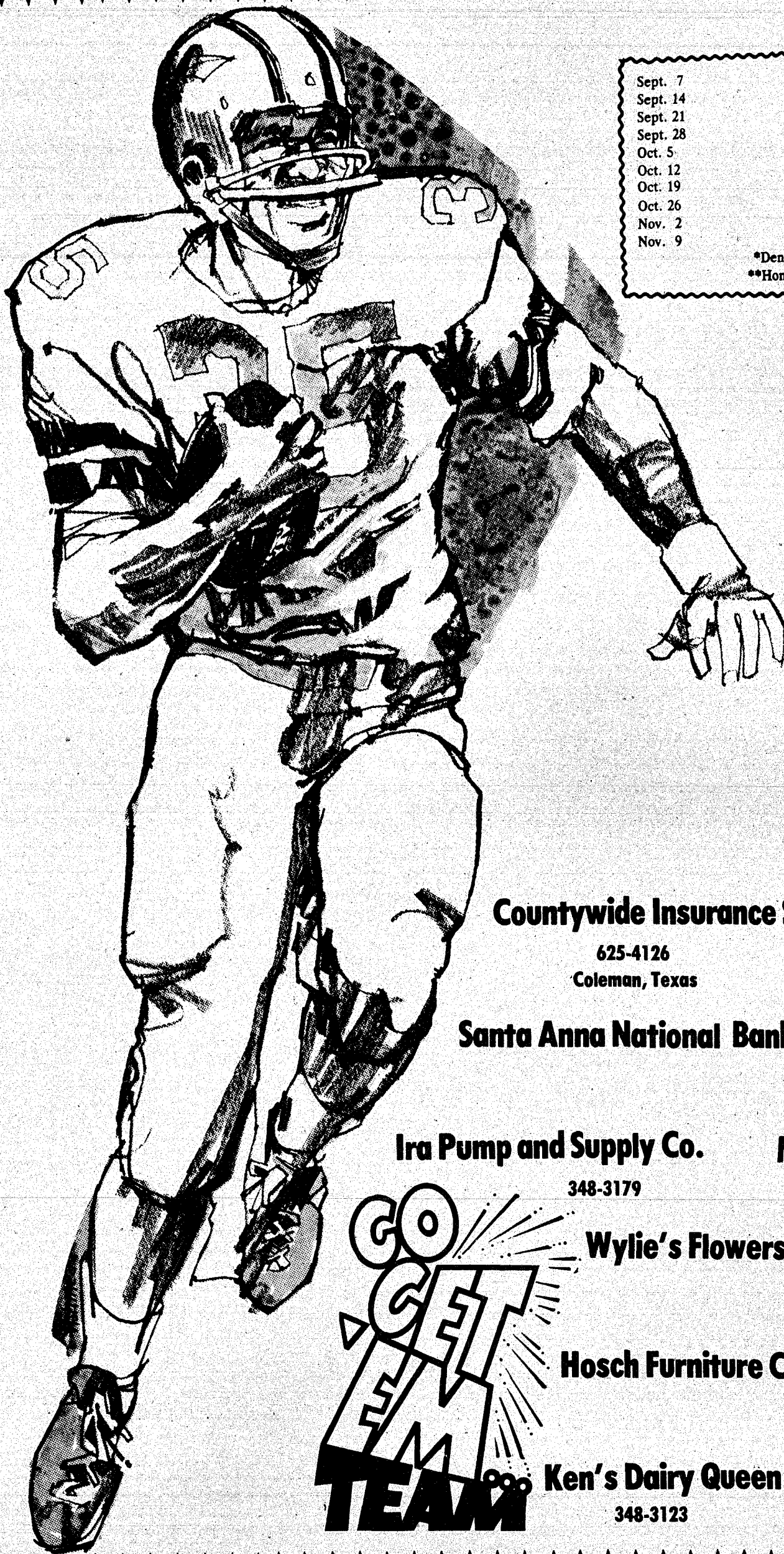
