## 26th Annual Homecoming This Weekend

### Former School Administrator Among 1979 SAHS Honorees

The 26th annual Ex-Student Homecoming will be held Friday and Saturday, with a complete schedule of activities for the former students, teachers and guests who attend. Several hundred people are expected to attend.

A 2:30 p.m. downtown parade will open the activities, with ten floats and the band to take part. A pep rally will follow at Perry Gymnasium at 3 p.m.

The Homecoming football game with Miles will start at 7:30 p.m. Halftime activities will include crowning of the SAHS Homecoming Queen and presentation of the "Coming Home Queen".

Registration of former students will begin at 9 a.m. at high school, and a coffee will be held at the school cafeteria from 9 to 10:30 a.m. Musical entertainment by Jimmy Benton will be at the auditorium from 10 to 10:30.

Avis Chaffin McCullough of Bangs, the 1979 "Ex-Student of the Year", will be presented at the 10:30 program and business meeting. Classes meeting for reunions will sit in groups at

the meeting and be recognized.

Donnie Neff, Ex-Student Association president, will lead the business meeting that will include the election of officers for two-year terms. A memorial program will conclude the meeting.

The Band Booster Club will cater a buffet luncheon at 12 noon at the school cafeteria, and a number of classes will be meeting for reunions during the afternoon.

The homecoming will conclude with a dance Saturday night at the Civic Center (Armory) from 9 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. Music will be furnished by Mark Scott and his country-Western band from San Saba.

Other officers of the Ex-student group include Patrick Hosch, Pete Simmons, Debbie Horton Dean, Lucille Lowe Balke, Clint Day and Polly Little Warnock.

A special presentation and recognition is planned Saturday, October 20, to honor Cullen N. Perry of Brownwood, a former long-time Santa Anna school administrator and teacher. Mr. Perry retired from education last year after a long career that included serving as principal at Santa Anna High School from 1948 to 1955 and as superintendent from 1955 to 1975.

A Brown County native, Perry is a graduate of Bangs High School and Daniel Baker College and holds a masters degree from the University of Texas at Austin.

Following his resignation here he served as County School Superintendent and later worked with the Region XV Education Service Center in San Angelo. He is currently working part time with the Governor's Office of Energy Resources.

While living in Santa Anna, Perry was active in civic and community groups, serving as member and president of the Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club, and City Housing Committee and was a leader in United Methodist Church.

Mr. Perry and his wife, Martha, also a former Santa Anna teacher, are parents of two sons, Nelson, a mechanical engineer in Abilene, and Nonal Nolan, a lab technician with the State Health Dept. in Austin.

### Bangs Public School Teacher To Be Honored By Ex-Students

A 1929 graduate of Santa Anna High School, Avis Chaffin McCullough, will be honored Saturday as "Ex-Student of the Year" at the annual Homecoming. She will be presented at the Saturday morning program.

Mrs. McCullough attended SAHS for two years and was chosen "Most Representative Girl" as a senior. She is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Chaffin of Waldrip.

While attending Howard Payne University and majoring in education, she met and married C. W. McCullough of Gustine. During the early years of their marriage and while he attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth, he was pastor at a number of central Texas churches that included Harmony Baptist Church at Brown Ranch and the Shields Baptist Church.

The McCulloughs were in Baptist mission work 18 years, spending ten years in Colombia and four years both in Jamaica and Venezuela.

The couple, parents of a son, Don, of Dallas, and a daughter, Joy Parker, of Alta Loma and grandparents of six, returned to the States in 1962 and resided in Houston 12 years. They returned to Bangs in 1974, and in 1977 he assumed the pastorate of Bangs First Baptist Church. She is currently a special education teacher in the Bangs Schools.

### Ann Stewardson Dunaway '79 "Coming Home Queen"

The 1979 "Coming Home Queen" at the Ex-Student Homecoming will be Ann Stewardson Dunaway of Dallas, a graduate of the Class of 1959. She will be presented at halftime ceremonies at the Friday night football game, and introduced at the Saturday program.

Mrs. Dunaway, the daughter of Mrs. Tom Stewardson of Brownwood and the late Mr. Stewardson, attended Abilene Christian College following graduation, receiving her degree in education in 1963. She taught in the Dallas and Garland schools from 1963 to 1972. She received her MA degree from East Texas State University in 1979.

Ann and her husband, DeWitt Dunaway, a Dallas attorney, are parents of a son, John David, a first grade student. For the past several years she has been a volunteer in the Dallas In-

## Arson Suspected

### In Grass Fire

Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Dept. were called to the Liberty Community Tuesday of last week to extinguish a grass fire on the left-hand right-of-way about a mile and one-half south of U.S. 65. The fire burned grass and weeds along the road but did not damage. Firemen had to make two trips to the scene during the day.

According to a VFD spokesman the fire is the latest of many grass fires in that immediate area during the past four or five years. The VFD has been called several times each year to grass fires in a two to three mile radius.

Firemen are asking residents in the Liberty area to report any suspicious acts and note suspect of arsonists. The extended dry weather has made pasture fires a hazard.

The VFD made two calls during the week to the Co-op Gro where the hay pile caught fire. No damage was reported in either case.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers met their match Friday night and lost 27 - 14 to the Eden Bulldogs in their district opener. The Eden team had been winless this season before dropping Santa Anna to a 3 - 3 record.

Playing before Eden's homecoming crowd, the Bulldogs scored in the second quarter on a two-yard run, and kicked the extra point.

Santa Anna evened the score before halftime when Rusty Buzzard passed to Wayne Kuykendall for a TD. Buzzard added the PAT for the 7 - 7 score.

Both teams scored in the third stanza with Santa Anna scoring on a 32-yard play by Buzzard who also kicked the extra point. Eden broke loose in the fourth quarter with two more touchdown passes to give the Bulldogs the victory.

Eden led in first downs with 21 to Santa Anna's nine. The Bulldogs also led in total yardage with 362 yards to 195 for the Mountaineers.

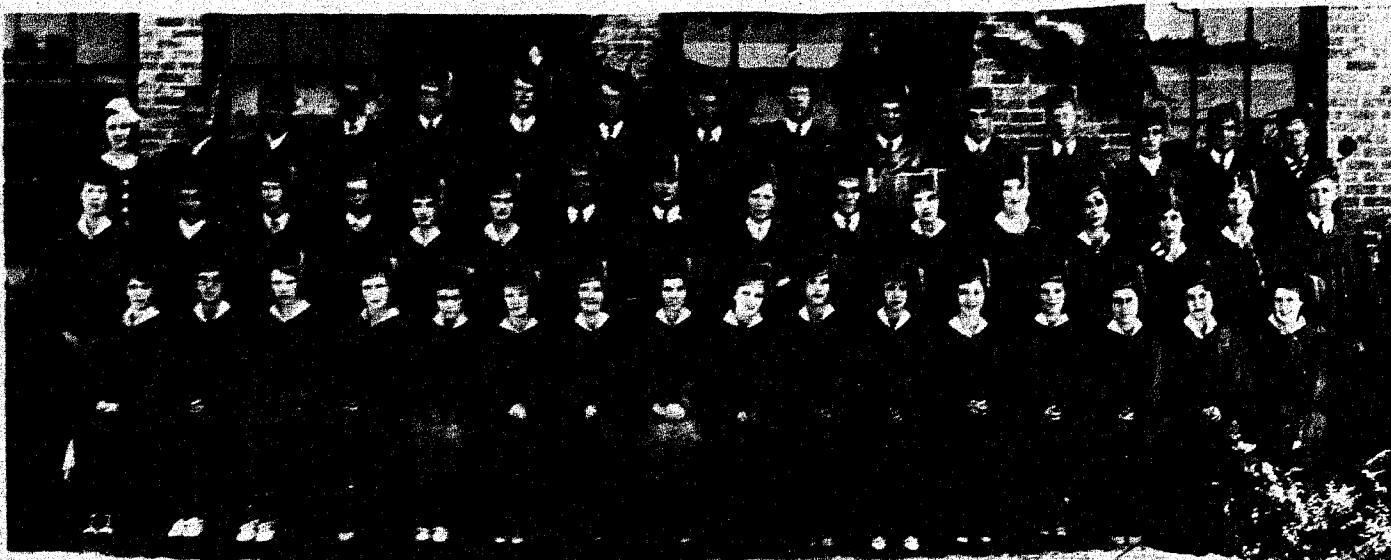

**And Enoch walked with God: and he was not; for God took him. Gen. 5:24.**

Of Enoch it is written that he lived sixty-five years, and begat a son. After that he walked with God three hundred years.... After the birth of his first son, Enoch reached a higher experience; he was drawn into a closer relationship with God. He realized more fully his own obligations and responsibility as a son of God.

Enoch's righteous life was in marked contrast with the wicked people around him. As he came forth from these divine communings, even the ungodly beheld with awe the impress of heaven upon his countenance.

We, too, are to walk with God. When we do this, our faces will be lighted up by the brightness of His presence, and when we meet one another, we shall speak of His power, saying, Praise God. Good is the Lord, and good is the word of the Lord.... And those who will be translated at the close of time, will be those who commune with God on earth.

## Dam Hearing Delayed Until After Holidays

Saying he fears he has "touched" the tar baby," State District Judge Herman Jones Friday set a hearing on the Stacy Dam dispute for Jan. 31, 1980.

Jones isn't sure that he will be the judge who will hear arguments in the complex case, but his handling of pre-hearing matters makes him a likely candidate.

The Lower Colorado River Authority, City of Austin, Lake Travis Improvement Association and the Garwood and Lakeside irrigation companies filed suits seeking to stop construction of the dam near Ballinger. They say the project would restrict

water needed downstream on the Colorado River.

Jones consolidated the suits, which appeal the Texas Water Commission's approval for the Colorado River Municipal Water District to build the dam.

The reservoir created would cover 19,000 acres in Coleman, Concho and Runnels counties and would serve the cities of San Angelo, Big Spring, Midland, Odessa, Snyder and Stanton.

Water commissioners approved a permit for the dam May 25 after nine months of hearings.

Jones said he hopes the lawyers will submit adequate written briefs and avoid lengthy court arguments. He optimistically scheduled only two days for arguments.

Attorneys for the Colorado River Municipal Water District and the Water Commission sought Friday to have the Lake Travis Improvement Association struck as a party to the appeal.

They said the association which has about 4,000 members living in the Lake Travis area west of Austin, has no legal standing or interest in the case. Jones disagreed.

Among about 70 errors they say the water commission made, dam opponents contend that commissioner Dorsey Harden should have been disqualified from voting on the dam application.

Hardeman is a former state senator from San Angelo and longtime supporter of the project.

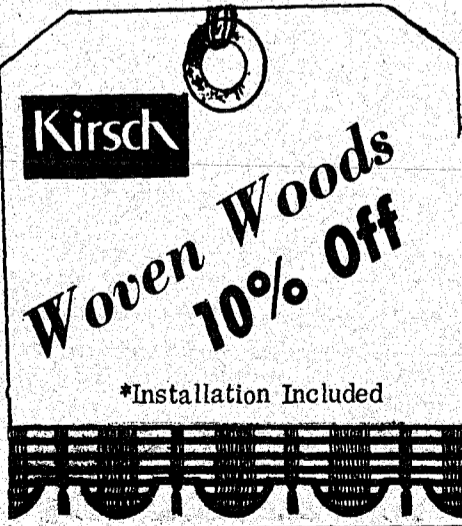

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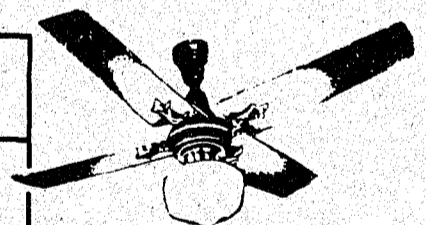

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## Drilling Locations Staked In Santa Anna Area

Several locations have been staked for oil and gas wells in the Santa Anna area in recent weeks.

Norman Pautsky of Wichita Falls will drill two wells six miles south of Santa Anna. The No. 2 Tom Kingsbery will be a 1,500 foot venture located on a 506-acre lease in the J.A.H. Cleveland Survey 495.

The No. 3-B Kingsbery in the same survey is planned for 1,750 feet on a 189 acre lease.

W. M. Durham Jr. of Comanche will drill two projects on the C. F. Campbell 133-acre lease four miles northeast of Santa Anna in the Dunham and Young Field. Both are slated for 2,475 feet and are in the Mary Ann Fisk Survey 630. They are listed as No. 10 and No. 11 Campbell.

Four projects are slated in the regular field five miles



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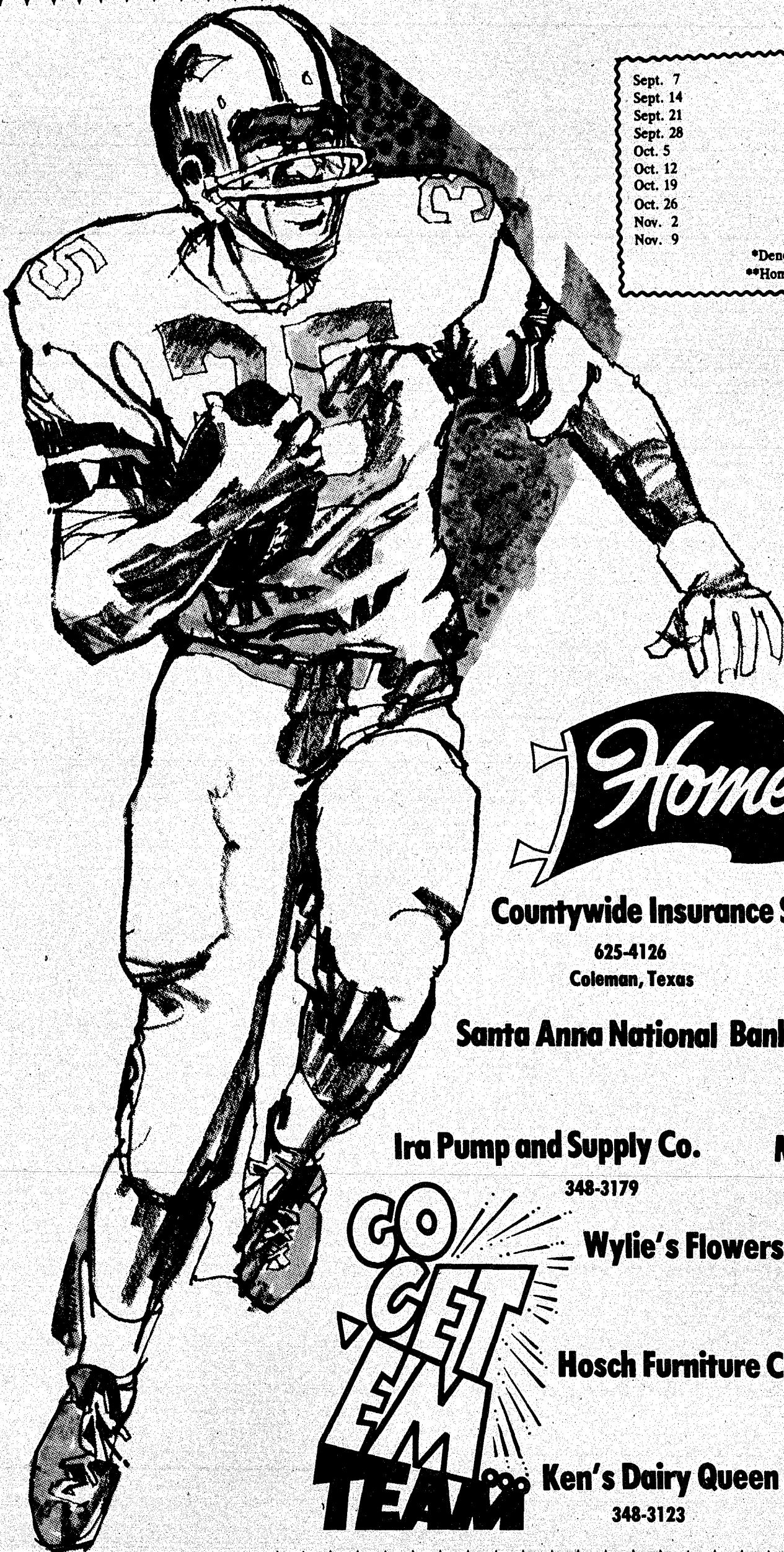

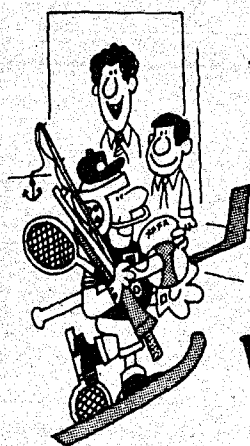

## SSA Discusses Change Of Retirement Age

Public discussion of the question of raising the social security retirement age has caused some concern among people who are thinking of retiring within the next few years. They are wondering if they will have to change their plans at this late date.

Such fears are groundless. Any notion about changing the social security retirement age envisions the measure as a far off action to deal with problems in the future. It should not affect people who are approaching retirement today.

The idea has been discussed in the light of what may well be a new ball game. Increasingly, aging and the aged are being viewed in terms of expanding opportunities rather than diminishing goals. Anti-discrimination laws based on age recognize the individual nature of the process of growing older. Everyday, more stereotypes of older people are being exposed.

The idea of increasing the social security retirement age has been discussed from several angles. The Congress recently passed a law making mandatory retirement under age 70 in private industry illegal. At the same time, it is widely recognized that the social security system, which makes it possible to retire at age 65 (62 with reduced benefits), sets a standard that practices in the private sector.

The idea is also mentioned in connection with the growing size of the aged population. As a result of lower birth rates and longer life spans, it is expected that the ratio of social security beneficiaries to workers will be about 2 to 1 at the turn of the century rather than the present 3 to 1.

With an increasing number of older people in the U.S., there will be significant shifts in various social priorities. Older people will doubtless want to work longer, the idea of more than one career may not be as unusual, and money now used for child-rearing and related expenses will probably be available for expenses associated with aging. Whatever the outcome of the

issue it is sure to be the subject of continuing debate. But it should not cause undue concern to workers who already have a substantial amount of work under social security.

The present social security standard of age 65 was not arrived at through any measuring stick involving ability to work or the number of people reaching that age. It was copied, along with the basic idea of social insurance, from the already-established systems of Europe. Germany's Bismark is said to have selected age 65 in 1895 for its social insurance system's retirement age.

The law today provides for a reduction of benefits for early retirement at age 62, and an increased delayed retirement credits for people who reach 65 after 1981 from one percent to three percent for each year after age 65 a person delays retirement.

For example, a person who retired at age 68 gets a 9 percent increase in benefits.

A widow can get benefits at age 60 on her deceased husband's work record. While these are paid under the survivors insurance part of social security, they are considered early retirement benefits for a group generally without independent work skills or experience.

# Oil Boom Stories Remembered

## Oil Boom In Fry Community Had 3,000 Men Employed

Editor's Note: This article was furnished to the Gazette by Joe Brooke of Bangs. It was published in the Wed., May 22, 1974 edition and is the history of the Fry oil boom.

Although the land has long since reverted back to cattle and farming, oldtimers in western Brown County still remember the great but short lived Fry oil boom of the mid 1920s.

James Day, a Brown County native now professor of English at the University of Texas in El Paso, recently reported on the 1926-27 boom to the West Texas Historical Assn. It turned cow pastures into a sprawling burgeoning oilfield where 3000 people worked during the daytime, and a tent and shack town where they slept at night...the ones who took the time to sleep.

It was not Brown County's first oil discovery, but it was the most spectacular. Earlier oil findings had set up the Crosscut, Blake and Childress fields in 1916 and 1917 and during the early 1920s came the Ranger, Cisco and Desdemona booms in neighboring counties.

Three hopeful entrepreneurs, Jim Quinn of Coleman, Bert Ehorn of Wisconsin and William B. Lester of Dallas, formed a partnership April 7, 1926, and leased drilling rights on 876 acres, 614 of them belonging to three Fry brothers on Jim Ned Creek. C. W. Hoffman and K. F. Page spudded in their well June 1. The 20th day, at 1276 feet, the well blew out, setting a fire and destroying the drilling rig but nevertheless establishing a new field. Within three days oil scouts and lease hounds had sewed up all available acreage in the vicinity at prices up to \$40 an acre, a huge sum in those days. More than \$200,000 in lease money moved into farmers' and ranchers' accounts.

Within two weeks a vast amount of royalty had been sold.

Farmers and ranchers who had made a good living but little more suddenly found themselves sporting a strong bank account.

A contemporary newspaper account of the feverish drilling scene described "a scent of gas almost everywhere" and pipelines crisscrossing like spiderwebs across the land.

Oil booms and mud always seemed to go together, and the peak of the Fry boom mid-1926 to mid-1927 coincided with a rainy cycle. It usually took eight horses to pull a boiler across the field and some heavy work required teams of up to 30 horses or mules. A typical teamster worked himself and a two horse team for \$8 a day, scraping locations, pits and roads.

Jesse Shore told Day, "Model Ts came from everywhere, met at the crossroads and went running off in every direction."

Ike Mullins told him "There is no way in the world for me to tell you how many people were out there. There were just people, people, people, every kind you could think of."

The percentage of good wells was phenomenal. Of 1044 drilled in Brown County that year, 514 were producers. Texaco drilled 79 wells on the Mrs. R. M. Lowe lease in the Fry field without getting a single dry hole.

Brooks Dozier, a driller for the J. K. Hughes Co., set a county record by drilling the Hughes No. 3 in just nine days. It flowed 3000 barrels a day. But before Dozier could move his rig, a careless drunk pitched a cigarette into a pool of oil and burned all his equipment.

By July 1927, the Fry field had 340 producing wells and had tallied up 3 1/2 million barrels of production.

The town of Fry sprang up on the west side of Jim Ned Creek. It had two streets, Brown Coleman, named for the two

counties and Jim Ned. An old photograph shows tents, shotgun houses with screened porches, drilling rigs and Model Ts. The town had the conventional grocery, drygoods and drug stores, plus the typical boomtown assortment of bootleg joints, dancehalls, gambling houses and brothels.

Prohibition was particularly hard to enforce in the oilfields, though the sheriffs of Brown and Coleman counties tried. A contemporary newspaper reporter described the raid made by Coleman Sheriff W.R. Hamilton April 10, 1927, on an establishment on Mud Creek. He confiscated 200 bottles of beer and sent off empty-handed a carload of customers who arrived minutes too late. But he missed a carload of women who had driven off just minutes ahead of the sheriff with most of the place's supply of drinkables.

One gambling episode which went into court involved one Charlie Pratt, who got into a game in a tent set up for craps. He lost his money before he discovered the dice were loaded. Caught, the proprietor invited him to come back that night and play with unloaded dice. Pratt did, but presently he caught the proprietor slipping the loaded dice back in again. Distraught, Pratt pulled a pistol and retrieved his losses without further resort to the dice. The proprietor then filed charges against him for armed robbery. When the case came to trial the judge ordered a verdict of not guilty, observing that all the witnesses against Pratt were gamblers and therefore their word was not to be trusted.

A great deal of waste and pollution was an inevitable by product of the early oilfields. The oil flow down Jim Ned Creek sometimes was 12-14 feet wide. It finally prompted the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission to send representatives out to admonish the oil companies about despoiling a stream.

Oil prices dropped in 1927 and the Fry boom quickly lost steam. From a peak of 3000 men in the field, the work force dropped to 300 by the following April. Oil continued to be pumped at a diminishing rate for another decade, Day said, but the cream had been skimmed in the first year. Other oil booms came and went and Fry was forgotten in the backwash.

Little is left to mark the scene today except the foundation posts of a refinery, a scattering of old pipe and rusted cable, and some stone foundations of houses, adorned by rusted tin cans and sparkling fragments of glass.

The land has long since gone back to what it was before the boom: crops and cattle.

## Deadline Near For Employers To File Return

October 31, 1979, is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 Social Security and withheld Federal income taxes for the third quarter of 1979, and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service said. If the quarterly liability (reduced by any deposit during the quarter) is \$200 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to those employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until November 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can obtain one from local IRS offices. IRS Publication 15, "Circular E—Employer's Tax Guide," is also available at local offices.

### STORING GASOLINE



### Corps Plans

### Closing of Parks At Some Lakes

The Corps of Engineers announced the temporary winter closing of some of its park areas to improve operation and maintenance activities at reduced cost, yet keeping open sufficient facilities to satisfy the needs of the public.

At Lavon Lake, near Wylie, Texas, two camper service areas located in Little Ridge and Collin Parks will be closed from October 1, 1979 to March 30, 1980. Winter campers desiring electrical hookups can be accommodated in Lavonia and East Fork Parks at the Lake. The day use areas and launching ramps in Little Ridge and Collin Parks will be available to the winter visitors.

At Grapevine Lake, near Dallas, Texas, the Corps plans to close Twin Coves and Park and portions of Oak Grove and Murrell Parks from October 1, 1979 to March 30, 1980.

At Sam Rayburn Lake, near Jasper, Texas, the Corps plans to close Rayburn Park and portions of Twin Dikes Park, San Augustine Park, Powell Park, Jackson Hill Park, Hanks Creek Park, Cassell-Boykin Park and Ebenezer Park from October 1, 1979 to March 30, 1980. Winter visitors can and will be accommodated in all parks at Sam Rayburn Lake, except Rayburn Park.

At B. A. Steinhagen Lake, near Town Bluff, Texas, the Corps plans to close portions of Magnolia Ridge, Beech Grove, and Sandy Creek Parks from October 1, 1979 through March 30, 1980.

Colonel Donald J. Palladino, District Engineer of the Fort Worth District, U. S. Army Corps of Engineers which operates 19 lakes throughout Texas, explained that the winter closures are "an attempt to reduce Federal expense while trying to provide a quality recreation experience to our visitors."

## State Grant Received For Energy Program

The State of Texas has been awarded a grant of \$191,200 for Training and Technical Assistance in association with the Dept. of Energy's Weatherization Assistance for Low-Income Persons Program in Texas, it was announced today by G. Dan Rambo, Regional Representative for the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE).

The grant will assist the State in improving the quality of workmanship that is essential in realizing the maximum amount of energy savings from the installation of weatherization materials.

The Texas Program is part of a nationwide effort to reduce energy consumption and improve the dwelling unit environment of the low-income persons in the nation.

In addition, banks that make seasonal line of credit loans, including loans to fuel oil dealers, may change up to one and one half (1 1/2) percent over the minimum published prime rate.

The previous maximum allowable rate on guaranty loans was 12 percent.

## Color-Coding Incorrect At Comanche Peak Plant

Texas Utilities Generating Company reported today that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission issued a notice of violation involving color-coding of electrical cable at the Comanche Peak nuclear power plant, according to Bob Campbell, Texas Power & Light president.

The quality assurance organization of Brown & Root, contractor at the plant near Glen Rose, had determined that a quantity of electrical cable, some installed and some still in storage, had been color-coded improperly.

Specification called for the cable to have solid-colored jackets. It was found by Brown & Root that in addition to solid color, the jackets also had a white stripe.

According to standard procedure, the improperly color-coded cable was to have been labeled and separated from the rest of the cable.

When the inspection determined that this procedure had not been followed for all the cable involved, the notice of violation was issued.

In the NRC report, a previous inspection finding involving a failure to follow proper inspection procedures for a number of cable tray supports was resolved.

The inspector reported that the supports in question had been reinspected according to requirements.

The report, which was prepared by an NRC inspection team and involved 92 man-hours, covered welding and piping activities in a total of seven safety related piping systems. No items of non-compliance or deviations from commitments were identified.

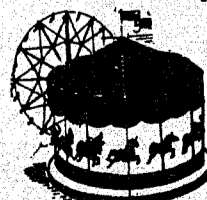

## Sewing Contest Set In S-Angelo

The District Contest of the "Make it Yourself with Wool" competition will be held Saturday, November 17, at Angelo State University. In Texas this contest is sponsored by American Sheep Producers Council, Inc.; the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers; The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Auxiliary; Delaine Sheep Breeders Association of Texas; Fabric Mart and Cloth World in San Angelo; and Texas Angora Goat Raisers Association.

The age categories for the contest are: Pre-Teen (10-13), Junior (14-16), Senior (17-24) and Adult over (24). To be eligible, the garment must have been completed after January 1 of the current year and the fabric must be loomed, knitted, felted or yarn of 100% wool or a minimum of 60% wool and no more than 40% synthetic fiber.

Contestants will be judged on their poise and presentation, the coordination of the fabric to the pattern, suitability of the garment to the contestants age as well as their skill in sewing.

The entry deadline is November 3 which is two weeks prior to District Competition.

## Range Field Day At Gibson Ranch

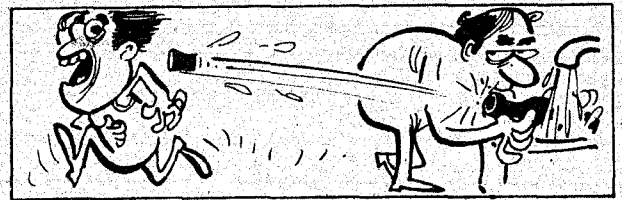

## Austin Hearing Postponed On Wastewater Permit

The Texas Water Commission has continued a hearing until December 6 on an application by the City of Santa Anna for an amended wastewater discharge permit.

The city is seeking to amend its present permit to increase the discharge of treated domestic wastewater to 150,000 gallons per day.

The discharge is made from the treatment plant southwest of Santa Anna, a half-mile west of U. S. Highway 283.

The treated effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary of Horse Creek, then into Horse Creek, then to Home

Creek and then to the Colorado River.

The hearing Thursday, October 4, was held in the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building, with Mayor Thomas M. Hays and Harold Feldt, attorney representing Santa Anna, present. The hearing was continued at the request of the attorney representing persons protesting the application that includes local landowners downstream from the treatment plant.

The current permit for release of wastewater is to expire in November, but will continue in effect as long as the permit is in debate.

### U.S. GENEROUS TO A FAULT

By the end of Fiscal Year 1980, the federal debt will exceed \$900 billion, with the annual interest on that debt in excess of \$60 billion. As inflation eats away at our quality of life at an annual rate of nearly 15 percent, and as taxes, both local and federal, continue to rise, it is no wonder that taxpayers are frustrated and angry. The Federal Reserve, in frantic desperation, has driven the discount rate to 12 percent, and the prime lending rate nears 15 percent. This will obviously drive many borrowers out of the market, slow down economic development, housing and investment; but it will not in my judgment do one single thing toward abating inflation. Instead, it will increase unemployment, increase the inflation rate and vastly expand government welfare expenditures. Once again, I repeat what has been said almost weekly — we must balance the federal budget.

In several previous letters, I have discussed areas for specific savings, and there are many. There is one area, however, that is unparalleled in its absurdity — foreign aid. In earlier years, when the U.S. had a strong, stable economy, there was at least reasonable justification for much of our foreign aid. Today, however, with all our domestic economic problems, inflation and high taxes, we can hardly justify many of the expenditures we send around the world. Although many of these foreign subsidies are indeed in our best national interest, a great many are more than suspect. We need desperately to sort out the good from the bad and did so to a small extent during this Session, but not nearly good enough. Fiscal Year 1980 authorizations will exceed \$9 billion.

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Since 1948, we have poured our tax dollars into over 112 foreign countries. Not only do many of these nations receive outright grants and loans from our government, but many of them also owe billions to our large international banks, on the policies of our federal government. It is estimated that through 1980, Soviet bloc countries alone will have a total public and private debt to Western nations, primarily the U.S., in excess of \$100 billion. True, many of these credits are to encourage export of U.S. goods, but the key question is at what cost to the United States are these programs being offered to the communist nations.

What is equally alarming, however, is the rate of growth in credits to these nations as compared to their real economic and industrial growth and their deteriorating ability to repay these loans, even if they intended to. It is somewhat irritating, too, that while our prime rate is nearing 15 percent, the Export-Import Bank extends credit to these states at 8.25 percent. Even though many of us hate to admit it, the huge multinational corporations that trade with these communist nations consistently place their profits above the patriotic interests of America. I believe we must reassess all of our foreign grant and loan policies and
