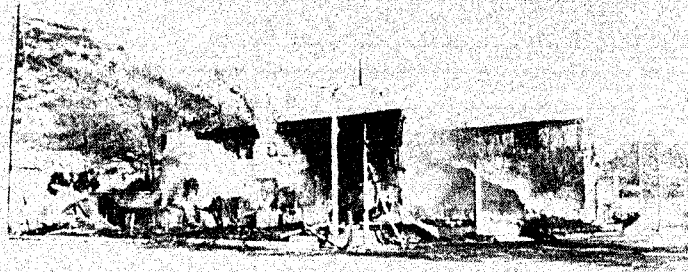

A former faculty member at Denver City High School, Mrs. Holcombe was presented at half-time ceremonies of the Denver City-Slaton homecoming game Friday night, October 19; honored at a luncheon; a post-game reception, and a breakfast on Saturday morning for ex-students.

Mrs. Holcombe was the first Spanish teacher at the school where she taught for 17 years and organized the Los Amigos Spanish Club, one of the largest organizations at DCHS. She started the Student Council at the school, as well as a foreign student exchange program which is still in effect at the school. Under this plan, students from other countries spend their senior year at the West Texas high school.

Although she knew she was to be recognized, the extent of the activities was a surprise to Mrs. Holcombe, and she admits to being overcome with emotion to all the tributes.

Throughout the many tributes, she was described as a "vicious and gracious lady and one of the most popular and most loved instructors ever in the school system of Denver City." Many ex-students related how their teacher had helped them. Also present were Denver City officials.

A native of Santa Anna and the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Gene Harvey, Mrs. Holcombe graduated from Santa Anna High School and received her B.A. degree from Howard Payne University. She did

"Year of the Child" Is Closing Soon

Social Security A Part Of Retirement

People planning ahead for their retirement should be aware that social security was never intended to offer a complete retirement income, Priscilla Tercero, social security district manager in Brownwood said recently.

Social Security benefits provide a partial replacement of earned income lost or reduced because of the retirement, disability or death of a worker.

Some pension experts estimate that retirement income should be 60 to 70 percent of pre-retirement earnings in order for a retiree to maintain a standard of living similar to that before retirement.

Social Security benefits generally provide 25 to 60 percent of pre-retirement earning, depending on the individual's earnings over the years. With an eligible husband or wife, benefits would be 37½ to 90 percent of the worker's previous earnings.

People can supplement social security retirement benefits with income from company pensions, insurance annuities, savings, stocks and bonds, individual retirement plans, or other investments.

The important thing for a worker to remember, Ms. Tercero said, is that social

security is not the total answer. It is a base upon which each worker should build his or her retirement plans.

More information about social security retirement benefits, as well as about disability and survivor benefits, can be obtained at any social security office.

Coleman County's Young Ranch, established in 1879, will be among those honored in the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program this year, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Owner of the Young Ranch is Mr. Roy Deane Young of Burkett.

The honorees have been invited to attend a special awards ceremony being planned in their honor November 14, in the Texas Capitol Rotunda. Governor Bill Clements will be on hand to welcome the participants to the ceremony where Dr. Dorman Winfrey, director of the State Archives and Library is also expected to speak.

Highlight of the program will be the presentation, by Commissioner Brown, of certificates of honor affirming the fact that the

properties being represented have been maintained in agricultural production for at least 100 years by members of the same family.

County judges and county Historical Commission chairmen have also been invited. "These persons have been very helpful to the Department in locating the families whose land qualified" Brown said. Nearly 1,300 Texas families have been honored since the program began in 1979.

In addition to the official certificate, each family will receive copies of the Texas Family Land Heritage Registry, Vol. V, which will contain background information on each of the some 49 properties honored in 1979. The fifth volume of the registry will also contain entries on properties which will be enrolled during 1980.



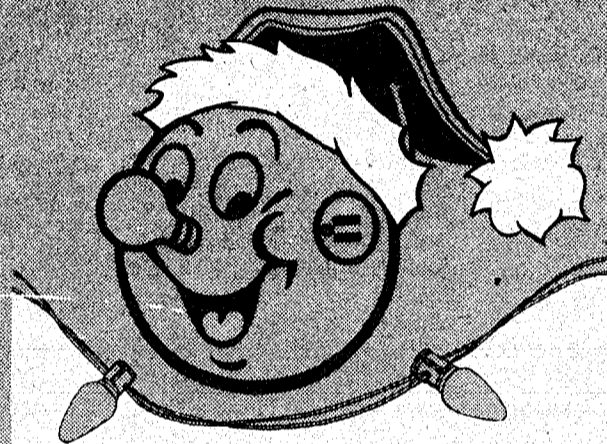

Weather Creates Hazards For Hunting

Very little rainfall since early August has created potential fire hazards for both hunters and landowners in northwest Texas.

An excess of moisture last spring and summer furnished the ingredients for lush weed and brush growth. This growth is now turning brown and dry.

The dry conditions also contribute to nose problems, especially for bird dogs. Hunters using dogs should carry enough water to allow the dogs an occasional drink.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department suggests anyone hunting during this dry period follow the rules of fire prevention, especially no camp fires near brush or grass and no smoking afield.

Another hint to prevent fires is to drive vehicles on established cleared roads. Side trips through weeds or grass in newer model vehicles with catalytic converters increases the potential for wild fires. These pollution control devices became red hot while the vehicle is operating and can stay hot after the engine is shut off.

Hunters usually check with the landowner to determine the location of birds or game and this is a good time to locate water sources on the property in case of a fire. Also, carry an extra shovel which can be used to cover or smother a small fire.

Hunters should be especially careful on windy days, since a fire can cover ground faster than a person can run.
