The Santa Anna Independent School District Board of Trustees met Tuesday, November 13, at the school office for the monthly session. Eddie Wayne Hartman presided at the session. Members absent were Joe Riley and Jay Weathers.

Henry Colyer of Brownwood presented the auditor's report.

The Board approved the sale of two extra buses, and the textbook committee for the 1980-81 year was appointed.

Molly Fawcett of Marble Falls was hired to teach Title I remedial subjects in the primary grades. The Board approved the transfer of \$1,500 to the Athletic Fund.

Votes for the County Tax Board were cast, with the local school district having 1,110 votes

Wednesday Morning Fire Destroys Business Landmark

A major fire in Santa Anna Wednesday morning destroyed the Truck Harbor restaurant and station, leaving only the shell of the rock and metal building. Santa Anna Volunteer Firemen were out in full force to fight the blaze that started about 8:15 a.m.

According to a report at presstime, the fire started in the kitchen stove and spread to the ceiling. Firemen were not able to extinguish the fire as it ignited the area between the roof and ceiling and could not be

extinguished. There were no injuries in the fire although a number of customers were in the cafe at the time of the fire.

The restaurant and station were currently operated by Linda Pickett of Bangs. The building and property are owned by Guthrie Oil Co. of Brownwood. The building was built in the late 1940's by the late F. Z. Payne and had been in operation most of the time since that date. The service station was not in operation but plans had been made to open it in the future.

Ex-Student Football Game Slated Saturday Afternoon

The pre-Super Bowl football game slated in Santa Anna Saturday at 2 p.m. will match the Santa Anna Ex-students and the Bangs Ex-students. The game, a benefit for the Santa Anna Booster Club, may set the game of football back a few years, as most of the local players have not competed in contact sports since graduation from SAHS a number of years ago.

Monday night the local teams traveled to Bangs where the varsity girls won 28 - 27 with

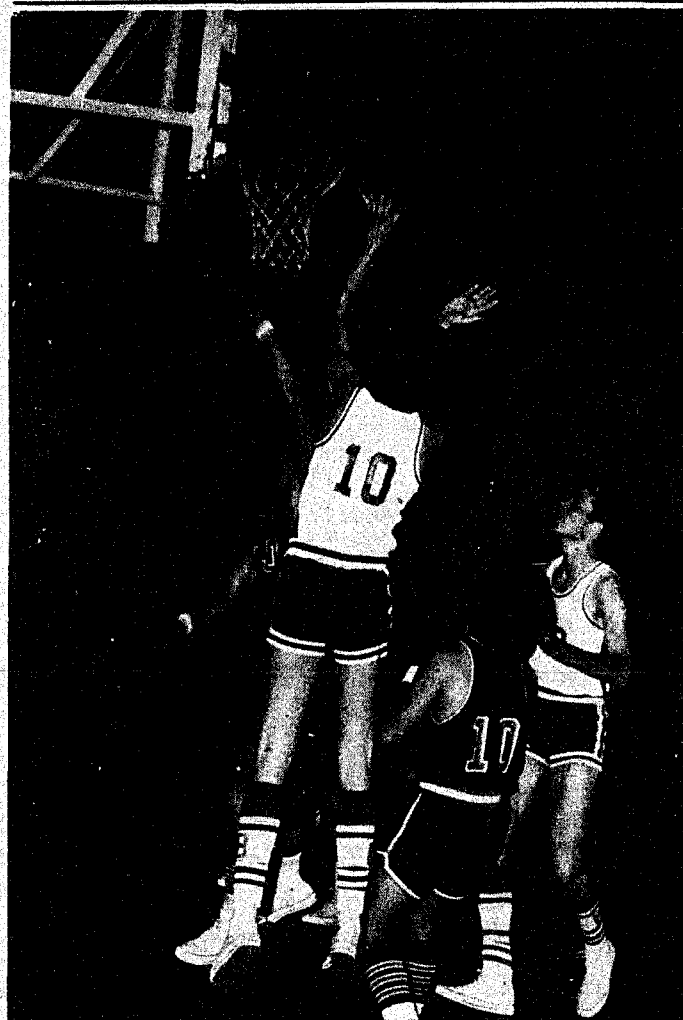
Robbie Clifton scoring 12, Holly Smith scoring 8 and Belinda Phillips making 4 points.

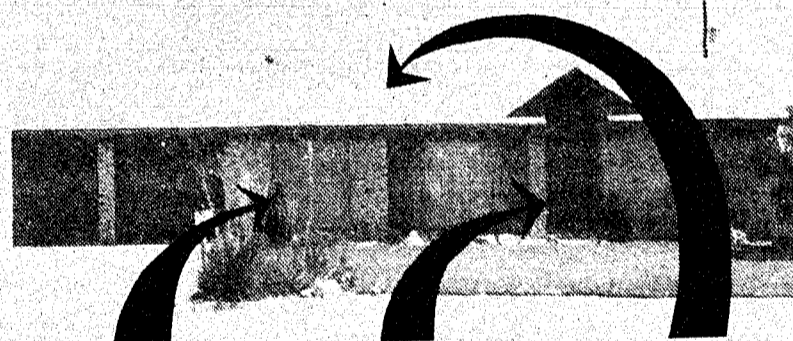
