Mountaineers Upset By Novice Hornets; Champions To Be Decided Next Week

Santa Anna's hopes for an uncontested district basketball title were shattered Friday night when the Novice Hornets won a close game with the boys team which put the title in a play-off situation.

The Hornets won 54 - 52 in a home battle that proved anyone can win at any given time and place.

Playing without senior starter Wayne Kuykendall, the Mount-

aineers got in foul trouble early in the game, with Jim Clifton and Rusty Buzzard "sitting it out" most of the second half of play. The Hornets played their best game and gave Santa Anna some real competition after an easy district schedule.

A playoff game between the two teams will be held next week, with school officials meeting Wednesday night to set

the date and time. The game will be played at the Coleman High School Gymnasium.

Clifton led the Mountaineers in the Friday night game with 23 points. Buzzard and Jerry Don Culpepper each scored 10.

The Novice girls cinched the district title by winning over Santa Anna 45 - 28. Holly Smith led the local team with 11 points, while Robbie Clifton and Belinda Phillips had 10 and seven respectively.

In games with Rochelle on Tuesday, the girls won 34-21 with Clifton leading with 15 points.

The Mountaineers had an easy 84 - 16 victory with Clifton leading with 16 points. Three Junior Varsity players, David Strickland, Ernest DeLeon and Ricky Anderson, played with the Varsity squad Tuesday night and each scored points for the team.

The regular season ends for Santa Anna when they host Lohn Friday night in 6:30 games at Perry Gymnasium.

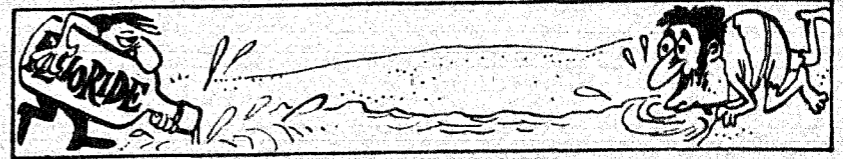
Music Festival Set In Coleman

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Local Quilts Are Donated To Rehab Center Auction

More than \$200,000 was raised from the sale of 114 handmade quilts and afghans donated to the West Texas Rehabilitation Center for Rehab '80.

Because not all of the donated needlework was displayed on the air during the telethon January 26, the bidding was extended through January 31 with the quilts and afghans displayed at the Center in Abilene.

A steady stream of visitors viewed the quilts and afghans, inspecting the delicate handwork and bidding as much as \$2,000 for a single quilt.

No full-sized quilt was sold for less than \$100, and most brought \$300 or more. Afghans sold for approximately \$100 each.

Quilting clubs, senior citizens groups and individuals from West Texas and Oklahoma contributed coverlets to WTRC. Local donors included the Tricham Quilting Club and Lucille Seratte of Santa Anna.

Rehab '80, the tenth annual telethon benefitting WTRC, raised more than \$800,000 in gifts and pledges. This year's budget for the facility in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder will be approximately \$2.7 million.

In 1979, more than 7,000 handicapped children and adults were treated at the West Texas Rehabilitation Center without charge.

Former Resident Seeks Settlement Of Injury Suit

A change in venue has been granted in the damage suit of Harvey E. Salazar vs Peebles Gun Shop of Arlington. The suit is seeking settlement for damages caused in an accident east of Santa Anna in November 1978 when Salazar, a former Santa Anna resident, was injured in a shooting accident.

The suit alleges a gun Salazar was removing from a gun case discharged, causing injuries and partial disability. He is alleging negligence against the gun shop and is asking for settlement for the disability plus medical expenses and loss of wages.

The plaintiff is represented by the law firm of Scarborough, Tarlpey and Scarborough of Abilene and locally by Johnson, Jones and Autry of Coleman.

Salazar, 27, currently resides in Arlington. The change of venue was requested by the defendants, with the change of venue hearing held in Coleman.

**Downward Slide
For Fur Prices**

Wholesale fur buyers have told the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department they have been paying less for prime hides in recent weeks because the market is glutted with too many hides.

That factor, combined with strikes of tanners in New York and Canada, is causing prices to drop about 33 percent, and in some areas, as much as 50 percent. In Texas a raccoon hide which formerly brought \$35 will now sell at a top price of only \$20.

Joe T. Stevens, the department's furbearer program leader, said he contacted major fur industry publication executives who said a declining demand for furs in the European market and overloaded U.S. inventory combined to cause falling fur prices.

Caught in the middle of the squeeze are many Texas trappers who are angry over the U.S. market situation. According to Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens, many have simply stopped trapping in protest.

Still others are stockpiling their pelts until the close of the season in hopes that prices will increase. Trappers are prohibited from selling pelts after Feb. 5, and licensed retail fur dealers have only until Feb. 15. The only exception is muskrat pelts, which may be sold by trappers until March 20 and by licensed retail fur dealers until March 30.

Time Comparison Is Given For Ed-Entertainment

In the last few years 100,000 persons have learned to read, but what are they reading? Radio and television sets are found in almost every home, but what do the people hear and see?

It has been estimated that there are five radios for every American home, and listening amounts to 21.2 hours per week. The presses turn out 60,000,000 newspapers per day, and the average American spends 4.2 hours each week reading these. Television—the "biggie"—claims a whopping 26.5 hours per week of the viewer's time.

Compared with the classroom, the average American by age 18 will have attended school 11,000 hours, but will have spent 19,500 hours watching TV. The 18,000 murders, and the 350,000 commercials he has seen, have made a lasting impression on him. Many educators, whose teaching career spans the period since national television began in the early 1950's, claim they have seen a decided difference in the behavior of youth.

Seventh-day Adventists feel concerned about the educational needs of the children and youth. Each year they are conducting more Five-Day Plans to stop smoking, more vegetarian cooking classes, more weight-control clinics, and more prophecy seminars. They hope these will give the radio and TV sets a rest and more family togetherness.

ASCS NEWS

Beginning last week, beef producers started registering to vote in the referendum on a Beef Research and Information Order. The registration period began Monday, January 28, and ends Wednesday, February 6, 1980. To be eligible to vote, a producer must register at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office. The voting period is scheduled for February 19-22.

The 1976 Beef Research and Information Act authorizes the national program under which cattle producers would be assessed to finance research and information activities designed to improve markets for cattle, beef, and beef products. The program will not be established unless producers voting approve the order by a majority vote.

The assessment rate of two-tenths of 1 percent (20 cents

per \$100 value) will be made if the order is approved. Assessments would be made through a deduction by the buyer each time cattle are sold. Slaughterers would collect and send assessments to the beef board at the time of slaughter. The final assessment would include the accumulated total of all assessments paid by all owners of the cattle throughout the marketing process.

The assessment rate could not exceed two-tenths of 1 percent of the sale price of the cattle for the first two years of the program operation. After two years, the assessment rate could be changed by the beef board, with USDA approval, but could not exceed five-tenths of 1 percent. It is estimated that, at the two-tenths of 1 percent level, about \$40 million would be collected annually.

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
