### Mountaineers To Meet Water Valley In Bi-District Game Monday Night

The Santa Anna Mountaineer basketball team will be seeking a berth in the Region II tournament next week when they meet the Water Valley basketball team in Bi-District competition Monday night, February 25, at the Ballinger High School gymnasium. The game will start at 8 p.m.

The Santa Anna team is defending champion for District 24-B, losing to Eden in the Bi-District game last spring. The Mountaineers, coached by Pete Simmons, is entering the playoffs with a 23-8 record this season.

The Mountaineers had a practice game with District 9-B champions from Sands High School at Sterling City last Friday night, winning 50 -49.

Sands, ranked 11 in state polls, came to the game with a 28-2 record and a 25-game winning streak.

The game was close through the third quarter when Jim Clifton and Wayne Kuykendall

fouled out with Sands leading 49 - 42.

Bradley Wardlow and Danny Guerrero came from the bench to spark the team to the one-point victory, scoring the final eight points with Bradley making six and Danny two.

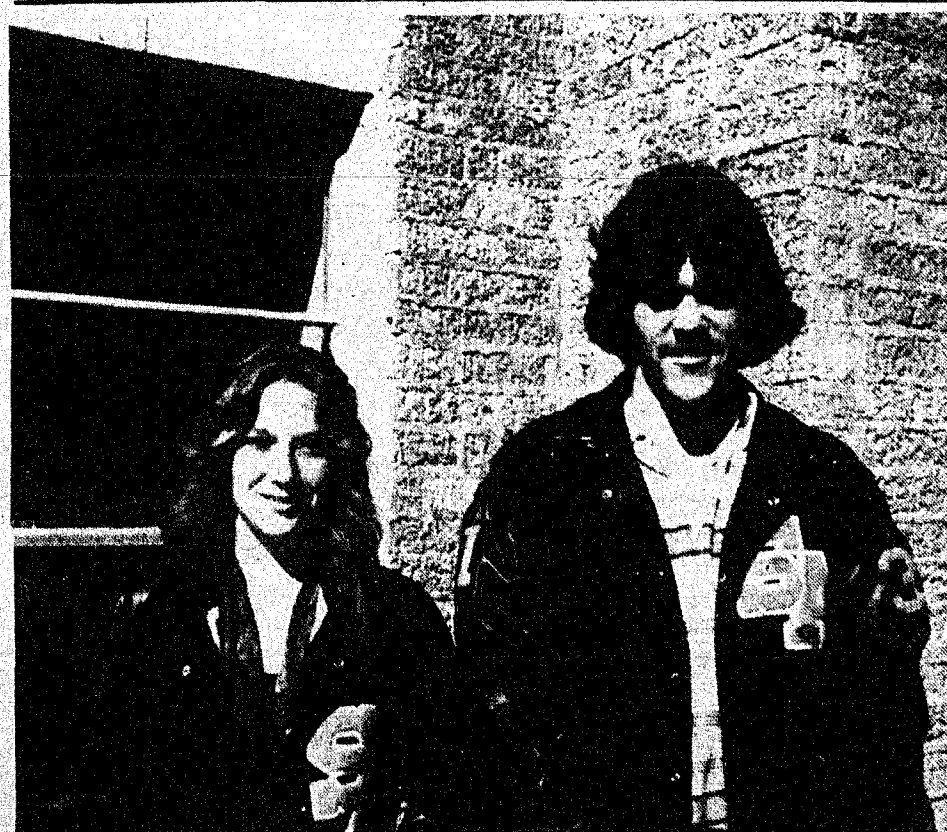
People interested in the work but wanting more information

## Voting Now Underway For Beef Referendum

A total of 372 beef producers registered to vote in the upcoming referendum scheduled for February 19-22. For Coleman County, this represents an 18% increase in beef producers registering compared to those registered in the referendum held in 1977.

According to the Act for the order to become effective at least 50 percent (nation wide) of those registered must vote in the referendum, and a majority of those voting must vote in favor of the order.

A producer wishing to vote by mail may request the county office to mail a ballot. No return postage will be provided. Ballots cast by mail must be postmarked before midnight February 22 and must be received at the county office before close of business on February 26, 1980.

Ballots will be issued only to eligible cattle producers who have registered to vote. Ballots will not be provided nor accepted prior to the voting period, except for the producers who requested to vote by mail (in which case the ballots will be mailed to producers to arrive on the first day of the voting period.)

Voting will be at the county office during regular office hours (8:00 A.M. thru 5:00 P.M.). Adequate space will be

provided to permit producers to mark their ballots in secret. Producers voting in person at the county office will place their own ballot in the ballot box and will have their name checked off the registration list.

The county office will maintain a sealed ballot box, which will be kept under observation during office hours and secured at all times until the ballots are counted.

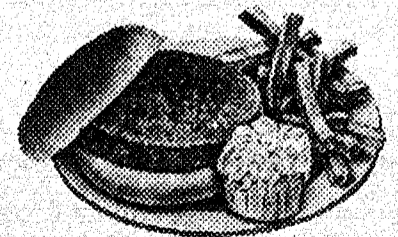

## Area Schools Plan Realtor Courses

Texas Real Estate Law provides for additional requirements to be met for licensure of salespersons and brokers beginning January 1, 1981, according to Dr. G. Norman Weaver, Executive Director of Tri-College Continuing Education and Vocational/Technical Training, an approved provider of the education experiences required by the Texas Real Estate Commission.

Weaver said present educational requirements, extending through Dec. 31, 1980 are 180 classroom hours (or 12 semester hours) of approved courses for the salesperson license and 225 Classroom hours (or 15 semester hours) plus two years experience for the broker license.

Beginning January 1, 1981, the educational requirements will increase by 75%, to 315 classroom hours (31 semester hours) for the salesperson and 540 classroom hours (36 semester hours) for the broker. The requirements will go through

two additional graduated steps terminating January 1, 1985 with only the broker license available for those entering the profession on or after that date, Weaver said.

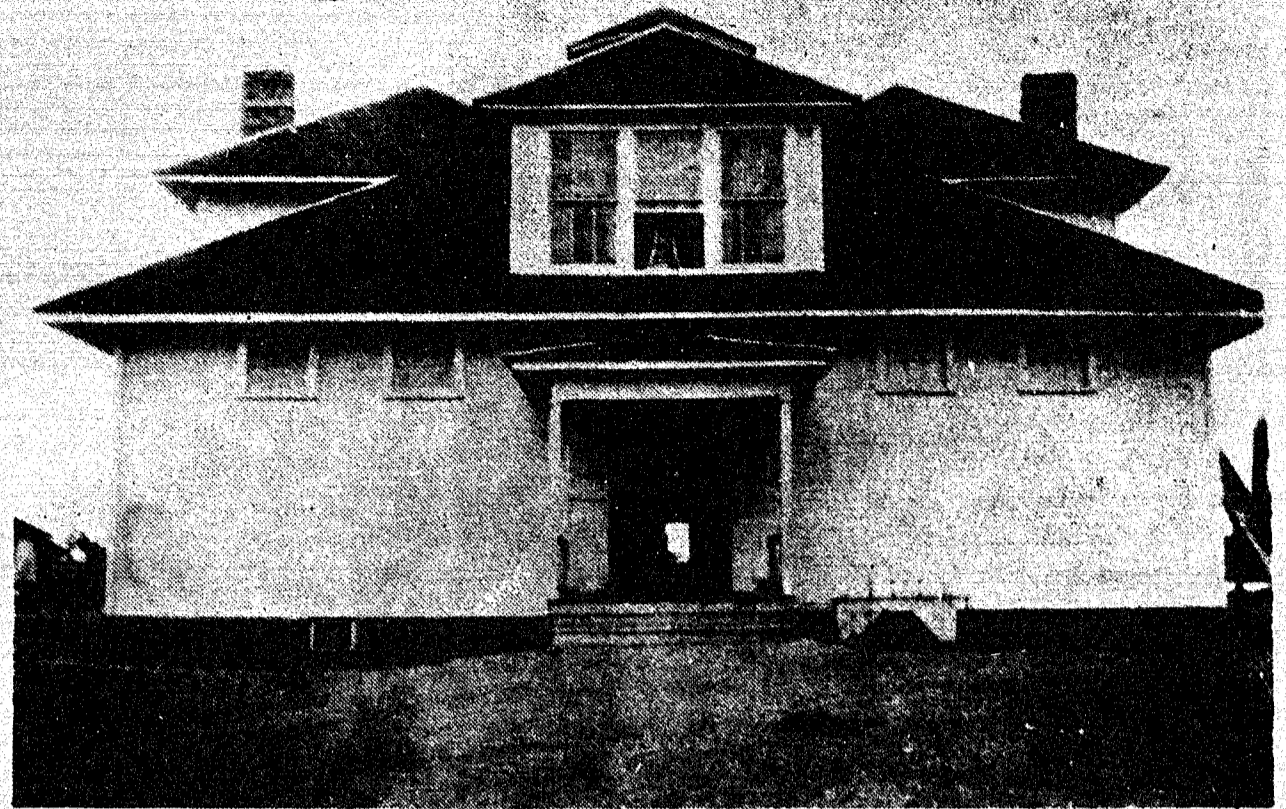

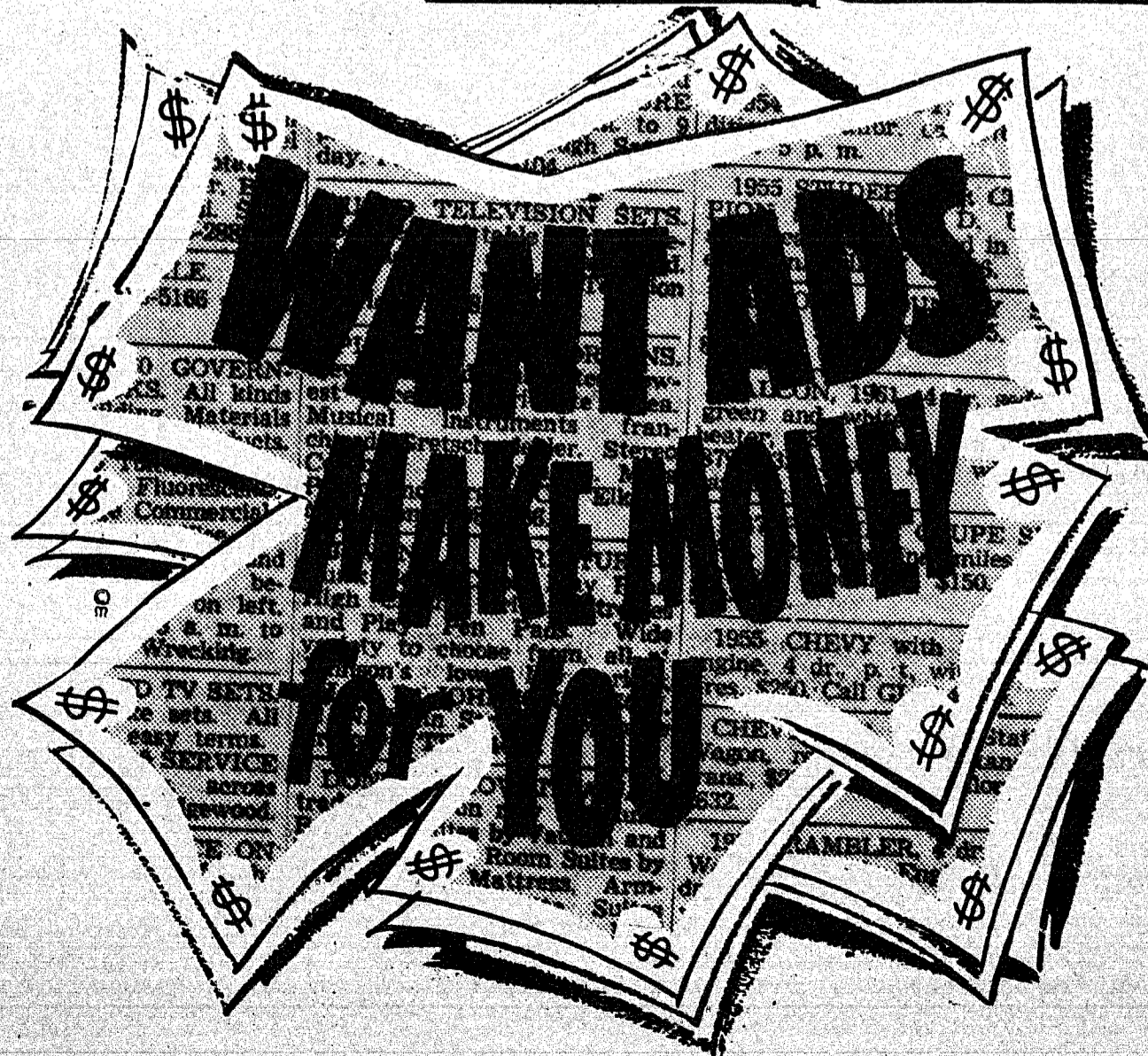
