the final score.

The Mountaineers won by a whopping 89 - 10 with the second team playing most of the final three quarters of the game. Jim Clifton was leading scorer with 21 points, and Rusty Buzzard had 15.

The local boys have an

unblemished district record and are seeking their second consecutive district title. The girls have lost two district games, with the league presently led by the Novice girls.

Track Season Starting Soon For SA Teams

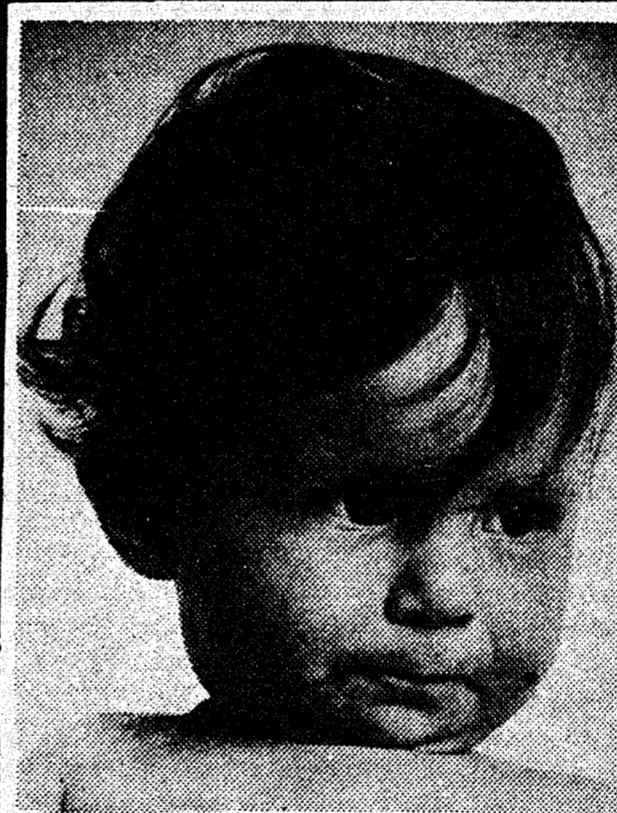
Plans for the 1980 track season for Santa Anna High School are being made, according to Roger Goodwin, SAHS Athletic Director and coach.

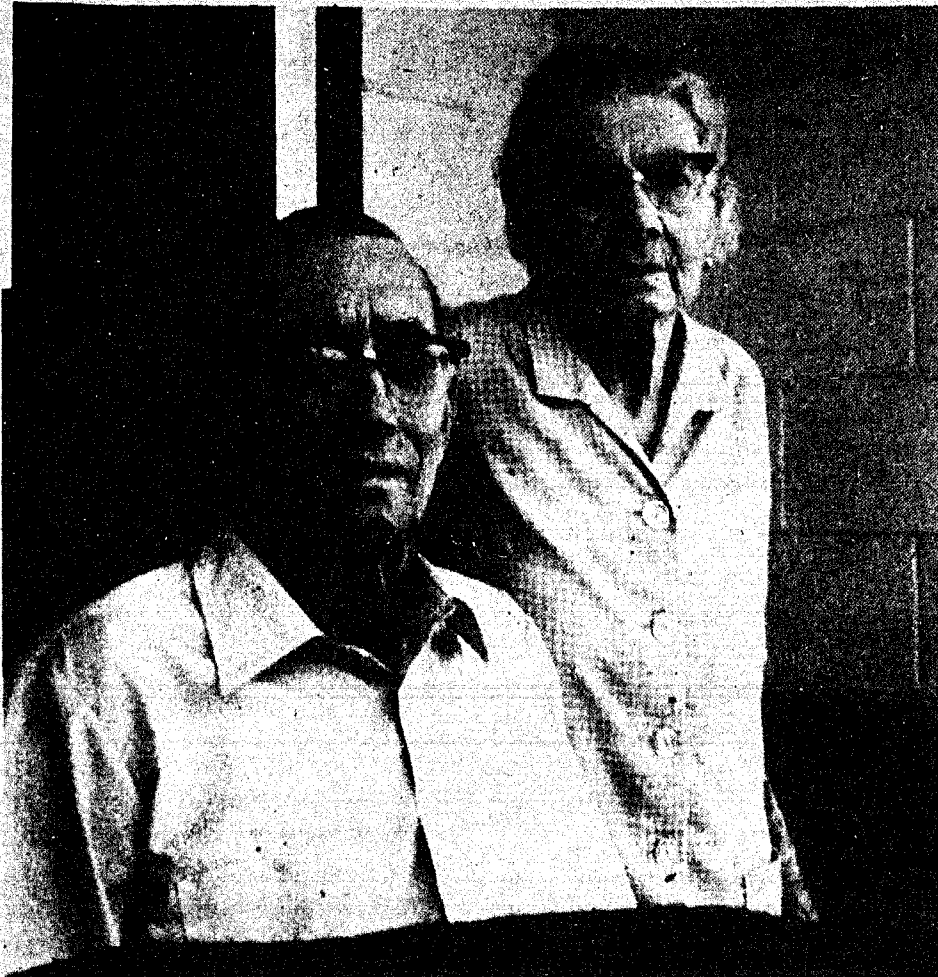



Wool and lamb producers must submit their sales slips from 1979 wool and unshorn lamb marketings and file an application before incentive payments can be received. You have until January 31 to file and avoid late payments.

The support price for 1979 shorn wool marketings is \$1.15 per pound and \$1.94 per pound for mohair. Pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool through payments on unshorn lambs.

Shorn wool payments are based on a percentage of each producer's returns from sales. The percentage is the amount required to raise the national average price received by all producers for shorn wool in 1979 up to the support price of \$1.15 a pound. Shorn wool prices averaged between 80 and 85 cents per pound in 1979.

Mohair payments will be calculated in a manner similar to wool. However, these payments probably will not be necessary in 1980 as it appears that the average market price received by producers in the open market will be higher than the support price.

As of this writing, 73 local producers have filed for their 1979 wool incentive payments.

Overseas the church supports mission schools, leper colonies, clinics, medical launches, emergency air service, dispensaries, hospitals and relief units that are often the only facilities available to thousands of needy persons.

The annual World Service Appeal is the only public appeal for funds made by the Adventist church. Each year approximately 10 percent of the total budget for Adventist world welfare programs is received through community World Service Appeal.
