Santa Anna Boys Team Wins Bi-district; To Compete in Regional Tourney Friday

The Santa Anna Mountaineer basketball team won the Bi-district championship Monday night when they defeated the Water Valley Wildcats 51 - 50 in Ballinger. Basketball fans got their money's worth at the game that saw the lead change several times and the last quarter a come-back for the

Mountaineers.

Jim Clifton led the scoring with 24 points, mostly in the final quarter. Rusty Buzzard scored 11 points before fouling out of the game in the final stanza. Brad Wardlow had eight points, Jerry Don Cul-

pepper three, and Wayne Kuykendall and Dwayne Warnock, two each.

Danny Guerrero entered the game when Kuykendall fouled out, and was perhaps the hero of the night when he made a foul shot that gave Santa Anna the needed difference during the final minutes.

Scoring was slow in the first quarter, with Santa Anna lead-

ing 8 - 5. Water Valley was ahead 23 - 19 at halftime and 39 - 36 at the end of the third quarter.

Steve Ellis A Candidate For 35th District Attorney

Steve Ellis, Assistant District Attorney of the 35th Judicial District of Texas, has announced that he is a candidate for the office of District Attorney of the 35th District, which includes Brown, Coleman and Mills Counties. Ellis is seeking the position now held by Gary Price, who is not running for re-election.

"I am a candidate for District Attorney because I want to continue to serve the people of this District and give them the honest, hard working, fair, and efficient representation they deserve and expect from this office."

Ellis graduated from Baylor University in 1973, where he was elected as the Outstanding Senior Man. While at Baylor, he was listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities, and was president of the Baylor Circle of Omicron Delta Kappa, national honorary leadership society.

Upon graduation from Baylor University School of Law, Ellis was appointed Assistant District Attorney for the 35th Judicial District of Texas. At the end of the current term, Ellis will have served as Assistant District Attorney for almost five years.

"I have had the necessary experience in all phases of felony prosecution, including working with law enforcement officers in the preparation of cases, presenting cases to Grand Juries, and trying cases before both judges and juries. Since I have represented the State in the prosecution of

hundreds of felony criminal cases in the time that I have been Assistant District Attorney, I feel that I am qualified for the office."

Ellis is a member of the Texas District and County Attorney's Association, the American Bar Association, the State Bar of Texas, and is a member and past president of the Brown County Bar Association.

Ellis has been very active in both civic and religious affairs in the community. He is a vice-president of the Brownwood Kiwanis Club, and a member of the Brownwood Municipal Airport Board. He also serves as a Sunday School teacher and as a member of the Personnel Committee at the First Baptist Church in Brownwood.

Ellis is married to Debby Ellis, also a lawyer, who is a Vice-President and Trust Officer at the First National Bank in Brownwood.

Former Teacher Is Buried Here Last Monday

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at First Baptist Church for Stella McDaniel, 95, of Bangs who died Sunday, February 25, in Brownwood Community Hospital after a long illness. Rev. John Stanislaw, pastor, officiated at the services with interment in Santa Anna Cemetery under the direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Miss McDaniel was born in Brown County November 13, 1884, the daughter of David L. and Elzada (Lewis) McDaniel. Her family was among the early settlers here, coming to Santa Anna in 1887. She attended the Santa Anna schools, graduating with the Class of 1902. She was thought to be the oldest living graduate of Santa Anna High School.

She graduated from Sam Houston State University at Huntsville and spent most of her lifetime in education, teaching English at Santa Anna High School and later at Baylor University, the University of Texas, Texas A&I, and other colleges. She worked ten years with the Welfare Department, retiring in 1960.

She was a recognized leader in the teaching profession and was included in various publications such as "Leading Women of America", "Famous Women of America", "Who's Who in Education", and "Professors in American Colleges and Universities."

She also held membership in the Eastern Star.

She became semi-invalid in 1972 and in 1975 entered a Bangs nursing home where she resided until her death.

Survivors are a sister-in-law, Mrs. Otto (Edna) McDaniel of Kenedy, six nieces and two nephews.

Pallbearers for the services were Freddie Dodson, William Brown, Joe C. Barnes, Billy Barnes, Elton McDonald and Claude Langford.
