### Underway Today

Volunteer blood donors will be going to Mountain City Center today from 1 to 7 p.m. to donate blood for the United Blood Services, the project sponsored by Santa Anna Lions Club.

A goal of 50 donors has been set for the drive that is proposed as the first of three during the year.

United Blood Services serves all area hospitals in a 30-county area. Over 900 transfusions are given each month with blood from the service, so a supply needs to be readily available.

Heading the Lions Club committee are Scott Patterson, Patrick Hosch and Pete Simmons. They will not only welcome donors from the area, but will be happy to have volunteers provide snacks and baked goods for those who give blood.

## February 4 is Deadline For Candidates To File

Monday, February 4, is the deadline for candidates to file for places on the ballot for the May elections. Coleman County had only one contested race early this week, with two candidates for the Precinct One Commissioner's post.

Those who have filed this week include H. F. Fenton, candidate for Sheriff; Billie Baker, re-election for County Tax Assessor-Collector; Jack Strickland, incumbent, and John Sprinkles, candidates for Pct. One Commissioner.

Pct. Three Commissioner

Howard Stephenson has not filed for re-election but has indicated he will do so. County Attorney Joe Dan LeMay is also up for re-ending his term of office this year.

In the district campaign, Gordon Griffin and Ernest Cadenhead of Brownwood have filed for District Judge, the post to be vacated by W. O. Breedlove. Assistant District Attorney Steven Ellis is seeking the position of District Attorney with Gary Price not seeking re-election.

## Renovations Are Required At Coleman County Jail

Inadequacies at the Coleman county jail are being considered by members of the County Commissioners Court with a decision on correction and improvements which could cost up to \$100,000.

A letter to Judge Pete Skelton and Sheriff H. F. Fenton, dated December 21, 1979, from the Texas Commission of Jail Standards, Austin, listed 31 specific problem areas, and set timetables for each to be corrected, one immediate, some in February, others in April and June

and the last by November 30, 1980. An inspection was carried out November 28, 1979.

Sheriff Fenton replied to the state commission, setting forth action, intent or status on each of the problem areas. In summary, he pointed out that 12 of the standards are currently in the planning stage, eight of the standards have been met, or are in compliance, and 11 of the standards are not feasible and variance has been requested. Variance can be requested. (See COUNTY JAIL, Page 8)

## ASCS NEWS

Beginning next week, beef producers began registering to vote in the referendum on a Beef Research and Information Order. The registration period started Monday, January 28, and ends Wednesday, Feb. 6, 1980. To be eligible to vote, a producer must register at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office. The voting period is scheduled for February 19-22.

The 1976 Beef Research and Information Act authorizes the national program under which cattle producers would be assessed to finance research and information activities designed to improve markets for cattle, beef, and beef products. The program will not be established unless producers voting approve the order by a majority vote.

The assessment rate of two-tenths of 1 percent (20 cents per \$100 value) will be made if the order is approved. Assessments would be made through a deduction by the buyer each time cattle are sold. Slaughterers would collect and send assessments to the beef board at the time of slaughter. The final assessment would include the accumulated total of all assessments paid by all owners of the cattle throughout the marketing process.

The assessment rate could not exceed two-tenths of 1 percent of the sale price of cattle for the first two years of the program operation. After two years, the assessment rate could be changed by the beef board.

They will be appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture and will administer the order, collect assessments, and conduct a beef and research information program. In addition, up to five non-voting consumer advisors would be appointed to the board by the Secretary. The board members would serve without compensation, but would be reimbursed for necessary and reasonable expenses. They would be appointed for a 3-year term.

based on average daily prisoner load.

For the 12 standards in the planning stage, the County has received a bid, not turn key, to bring these up to standard, except for the requirement of exercise areas. It is Judge Skelton's opinion that the entire project, when complete, may run close to \$100,000.

Judge Skelton also points out that the County does not have the \$100,000. He indicates that the funds can be secured through increasing taxes. He adds that to build a new jail is much more expensive, having been estimated at one million dollars some time back.

Both Judge Skelton and Sheriff Fenton are anxious for the state agency to approve any plans for improvement, so that the jail would meet minimum standards.

Should the county not make the improvements, it appears that the Texas Commission on Jail Standards could require that the jail not be used. In that event, Sheriff Fenton explains that the county would have to find some place, if possible, to take their prisoners. Then there would be a new cost of transporting prisoners and paying for their keep.

Sheriff Fenton reports that the average daily prisoner load for the jail is five.

The county jail was built in 1890.

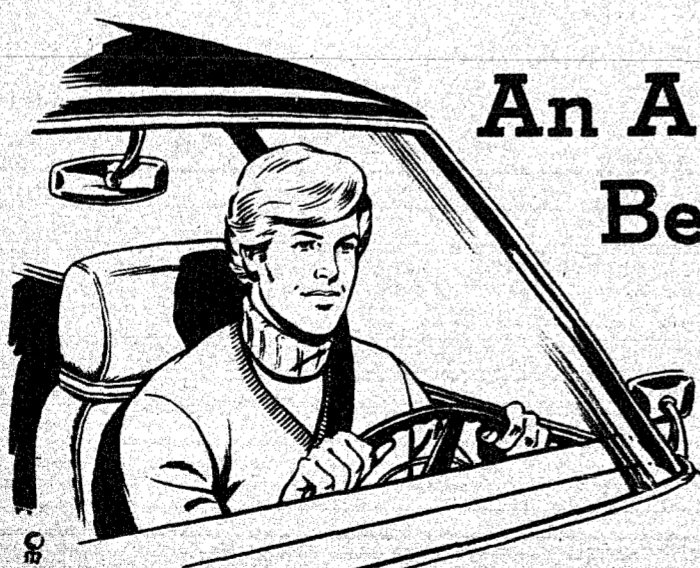

## Fomby Residence An Interesting Home

In our series of interesting homes in "my Home Town", we list the home of Mrs. O. B. Fomby at 408 Avenue C, as an outstanding older home. It is possibly the only complete concrete home in our area.

Sometime in the early 1900's, a famous architect, Frank Lloyd Wright, began building houses of cement. Mr. Will Bell liked the idea and built this one for his wife, in lieu of a storm cellar. It is a large six-room, modern home, built about 1918.

The little lady of the house, Mrs. Fomby, has an early American historical background, as she will be 94 years young, come March 14, 1980. She is mentally alert, only her eyesight is failing.

Mrs. Fomby was born Lela Belle Green, when the family of Joe H. Green and Callie Haley Green lived on the Jim Ned Creek in the Bee Branch community. The Greens had six

children, Joe, Essie, Myrtle, Lela, George and Allie. Lela is the only one now living. They attended the Eureka Church. She is a member of the First Christian Church.

She remembers when the family moved to a farm about a mile and a quarter from Santa Anna, when she was a teenager and attended the Santa Anna schools. She smiles as she reminisces about the parties, box suppers and ice cream suppers they attended in a buggy or on horseback.

Lela Green married W. M. (Will) Bell July 2, 1906, who had come to Santa Anna from Waller County. They lived on the farm several years before moving to town. Mr. Bell was connected with Banner Ice and Milk Co.

She has this clipping in her Bible, from the Santa Anna News, September 11, 1896 -- "New Barber Shop in town -- Go to Will Bell for first class

Mrs. Fomby lives alone in the concrete house with the interesting rock ledge at the front walk. The rocks are from the Santa Anna Mountain, probably quarried by the late T. T. Perry, a local stonemason.

Her home is full of interesting memorabilia.

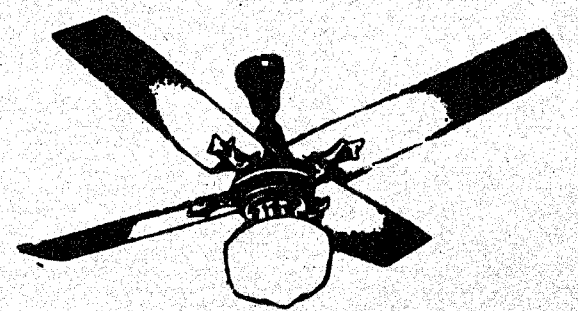
