SAHS Regional Semi-finalists

Mountaineers Win Fourth in Tourney;
Jim Clifton Named to All-Star Team

The Santa Anna High School boys basketball team was a semi-finalist in the Region II-B tournament at Stephenville last weekend, winning fourth in the tourney. Goree High School won the regional title over Krum High School 60 - 56 and will represent Region II in the state meet this weekend in Austin.

The Mountaineers played a great game Friday night, defeating Bronte 54 - 52 after trailing as much as 11 points during the game. Bronte led the scoring the first three quarters, and Santa Anna went ahead with less than two minutes to play.

The Mountaineers lost in the second round of play to Krum by a 54 - 40 score, then lost in the final game to Huckabay 53 - 50 Saturday afternoon.

Jim Clifton, the tall Mountaineer post player, was leading scorer of the entire tournament with 64 points in three games. He was named to the All-tournament team at the closing ceremony. Clifton, a 6'4" junior, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Clifton.

Clifton led the scoring in the three games, making 21 points against Bronte, 18 against Krum, and scoring 25 in the game with Huckabay.

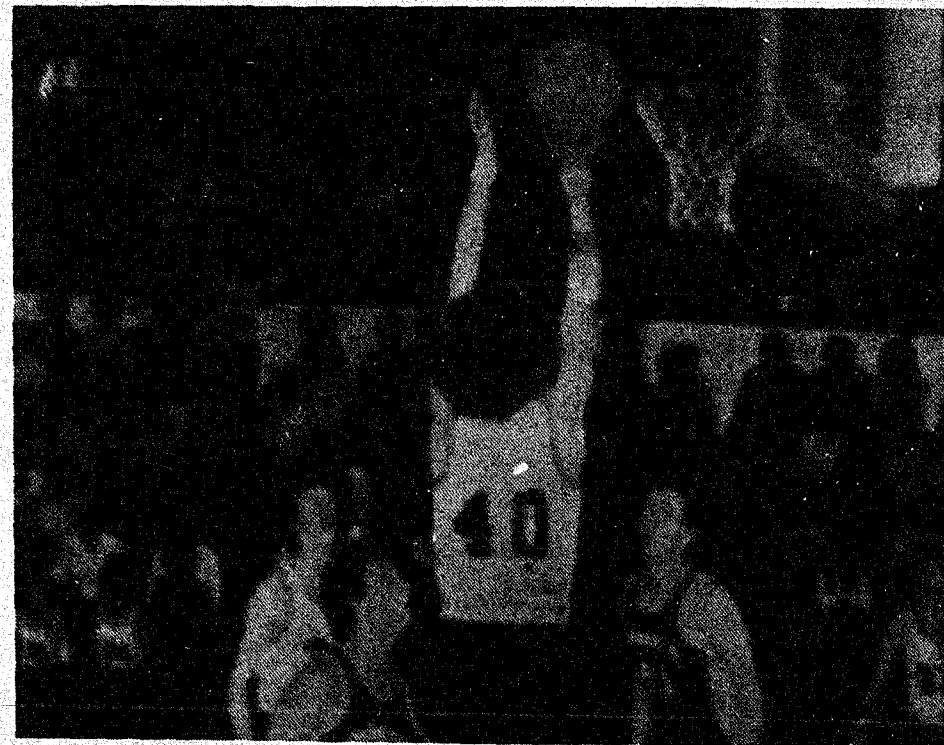

Prison N Ministry Encouraged By S-Day Adventists

Adventists are being encouraged to join their church's Prison Ministry Outreach, a service that is sponsored, directed, and financed by the laymen. The program started in August of 1971, when seven laymen from the Jamaica, Long Island, New York, Adventist church distributed Bibles and Bible lessons at the Queens House of Detention for Men in Kew Gardens. More than 300 volunteers are involved in the New York City jails, and another 200 are working outside the city.

With more than 350,000 men and women detained in the United States' 3000 prisons and jails, in addition to the 55 major Federal penitentiaries, it's vital that Christians share in the rehabilitation process. Approximately 50% of those in prison and training centers are youth under 20 years of age.

This prison outreach should not be left to professionals and chaplains, but religiously motivated laymen have a role to play and both they and the prisoners are equally benefitted.

It is good for churches of all beliefs to work for the welfare and spiritual needs of prisoners in all prisons.

Coleman County Second In State Oat Production

Despite a severe winter that damaged many crops, oat production in Texas was up in 1979, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

Coleman County was second in the state's total production, harvesting 526,300 bushels from 17,500 harvested acres. Yield per harvested acre in Coleman County was 30.1 bushels.

Statewide, oat production totaled 16,800,000 bushels, up from 1978's yield of 13,760,000 bushels. Harvested bushels per acre registered a significant gain, Brown said. In 1978, the average yield per acre was 32 bushels, compared to 42 bushels in 1979.

Although oat production in 1979 exceeded 1978 totals, Brown said both year's productions were below 1977's "bumper" crop. Brown attributed the decrease to severe winter freezes that heavily damaged crops in much of the state.

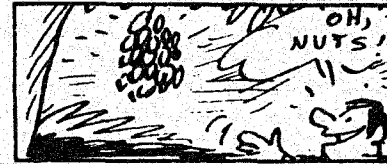

The law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul. Ps. 19:7.

The laws which God gave His ancient people were wiser, better, and more humane than those of the most civilized nations of the earth. The laws of the nations bear marks of the infirmities and passions of the unrenewed heart; but God's law bears the stamp of the divine.

Says the psalmist, "The law of the Lord is perfect." How wonderful in its simplicity, its comprehensiveness and perfection, is the law of Jehovah! It is so brief that we can easily commit every precept to memory, and yet so far-reaching as to express the whole will of God, and to take cognizance not only of the outward actions, but of the thoughts and intents, the desires and emotions, of the heart. Human laws can not do this. They can deal with the outward actions only. A man may be a transgressor, and yet conceal his misdeeds from human eyes; he may be a criminal,—a thief, a murderer, or an adulterer,—but so long as he is not discovered, the law can not condemn him as guilty....

The law of God is simple, and easily understood. If the children of men would, to the best of their ability, obey this law, they would gain strength of mind and power of discernment to comprehend still more of God's purposes and plans. And this advancement would be continued, not only during the present life, but during eternal ages; for however far he may advance in the knowledge of God's wisdom and power, there is always an infinity beyond.

Since "the law of the Lord is perfect," every variation from it must be evil.

Obedience was the only condition upon which ancient Israel was to receive the fulfilment of the promises that made them the highly favored people of God; and obedience to the law will bring as great blessings to individuals and nations now as it would have brought to the Hebrews.

Howards' Grandson To S-Africa Project

Stanley Howard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Howard of Coleman and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Howard of Santa Anna, left Coleman last week bound for Secunda, South Africa for a new assignment on a project converting coal into gasoline, diesel and other fuels.

Howard left New York by plane, bound for the Azores and on to Secunda, which is about 94 miles southeast of Johannesburg. He will be there 18 months.

An engineering graduate of Texas A&M University, Howard is with Chicago Bridge and Iron, a firm primarily in the petroleum related industry. Production of petroleum storage tanks, off-shore platforms, tank and storage vessel construction, waste disposal units, and of course, coal plants, represent much of the firm's activity.

The project Howard will be working with is the second coal-gasification plant in the world, the other being in that area. This project is to be

completed in a year and the third and fourth projects are already on the drawing board.

Howard has been with the firm three years, but this is his first experience in the coal-gasification field. He will replace an engineer who has been on the job there and the assignment came up rather quickly.

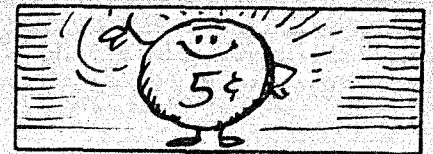

S-S Retirement Income Intended as Supplement

Although social security will be an important part of your retirement income, it should not be the sole source.

Social security is intended to provide a floor in income protection, a base upon which you can build to maintain your lifestyle in retirement, or for your family if you die or become disabled.

Authorities suggest that between 60 and 70 percent of pre-retirement income is needed to maintain the average person's lifestyle in retirement. Social security benefits replace from

30 percent of pre-retirement earnings for high earners and to 55 percent for low earners.

Priscilla Tercero, social security branch manager in Brownwood, said that people planning their retirement income should make sure they know how income will affect their social security benefits.

In general, income usually associated with retirement and nonwork will not affect your social security benefits, Tercero said. This includes savings, insurance, and income from rent, pensions or investments.

However, there is a limit as to how much you can earn and still get social security benefits, since retirement is the basis upon which the benefits are paid, Tercero said.

People under 65 can earn \$3,720 in 1980 without affecting their social security benefits. People 65 and over can earn \$5,000 in 1980. Earnings over

the limit result in benefits being reduced \$1 for every \$2 excess earnings. At age 72, the earnings limit does not apply.

"Before you retire, you should check to see whether a particular type of income will count as earnings for social security purposes," Tercero said.

She noted that people who reach 65 in 1982 or later and delay retirement past 65 earn special credits. Their benefit increases by three percent for each year they delay retirement past age 65 to age 72.

Tercero also said that social security benefits increase automatically with increases in the cost of living, and are tax-free.
