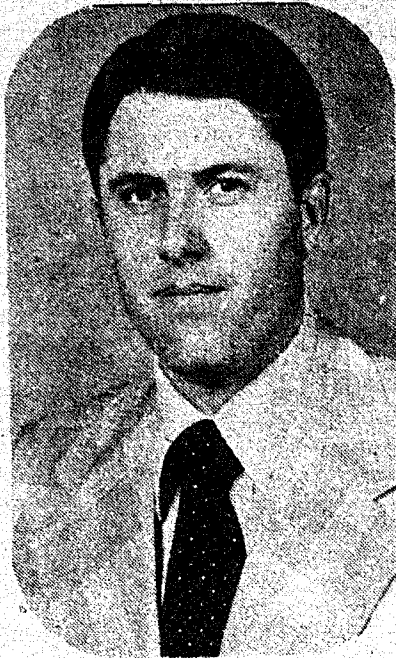

According to Mrs. Jones, the booklet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates, and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens.

The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

Information is applicable to property taxes collected by all levels of local government, including counties, cities and school districts.

Puppet Seminar Slated at FBC

A seminar on the usefulness of professional-quality puppets as effective instructional tools is scheduled at First Baptist Church in Santa Anna Saturday, March 22, from 12:30 to 4 p.m.

The three-and-one-half hour training session will be conducted by professional puppeteers from Puppet Productions, Inc. of San Diego, Calif.

Live performances will be used to demonstrate the effectiveness of puppetry, along with demonstrations and instructions in puppetry techniques.

Subject areas will include topics to improve performances and maintain high standards.

Churches from a 150-mile radius will be represented at the training session Saturday. The local church has an active puppet ministry that involves about 15 young people led by Susie Stanislaw and Ricky Jones.

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City Housing Information Outlined For Lions Club

Jesse L. Sparkman, director of the Santa Anna Housing Authority, presented the program at the February 26 meeting of Santa Anna Lions Club. He outlined the services and requirements of the local housing program.

Mr. Sparkman is in charge of rental and maintenance of the 62 units in town that include the downtown apartment complex and the duplex units in five locations.

The local program is governed by a Board of Commissioners appointed by the City of Santa Anna and has been in operation here since 1963 when the first duplex units were constructed. Approval has been made for an additional 24 units, with construction delayed while a site for the new development is chosen. These will be funded by Farmers Home Administration loan and the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Requirements for occupants

include having at least 20 percent of tenants in the low income bracket based on the median income of Coleman County. Other tenants pay according to income, number of dependents, based on current rental prices, with deductions made for elderly and disabled.

Preference is given families who have been displaced by governmental action, veterans, elderly families and the disabled.

Other factors considered in selecting tenants includes record of payment of debts, record of disturbance or destructiveness, and history of criminal activity.

Occupancy of the housing units runs over 90 percent, with often a waiting list for tenants. The local units include efficiency apartments in the downtown complex to three-bedroom apartments in the family units.

The local project has been of great value to Santa Anna as rental housing is scarce.

Hunting Season Safest in Years

The 1979 hunting season was the safest for Texas hunters since 1965, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Only 50 recorded hunting accidents were reported through the Uniform Hunter Casualty Reports filed by game wardens.

Of these accidents, nine were fatal. Shotguns lead the list of firearms involved in the accidents, with rifles a close second.

Eighty persons were involved in the accidents; 26 were 16 years of age or younger.

Sixteen of the accidents were classified as "hunter judgment" caused.

Among shooters hunting game animals and birds, deer hunting accounted for 12 accidents, quail and dove hunting accounted for eight accidents each.

Shooters in four of the accidents were reported to be graduates of formal hunter safety training courses. Two were graduates of the Texas Volunteer Hunter Safety Training program.

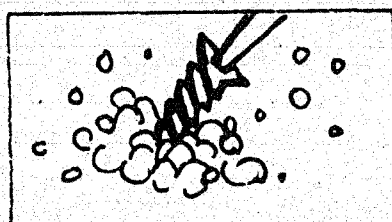

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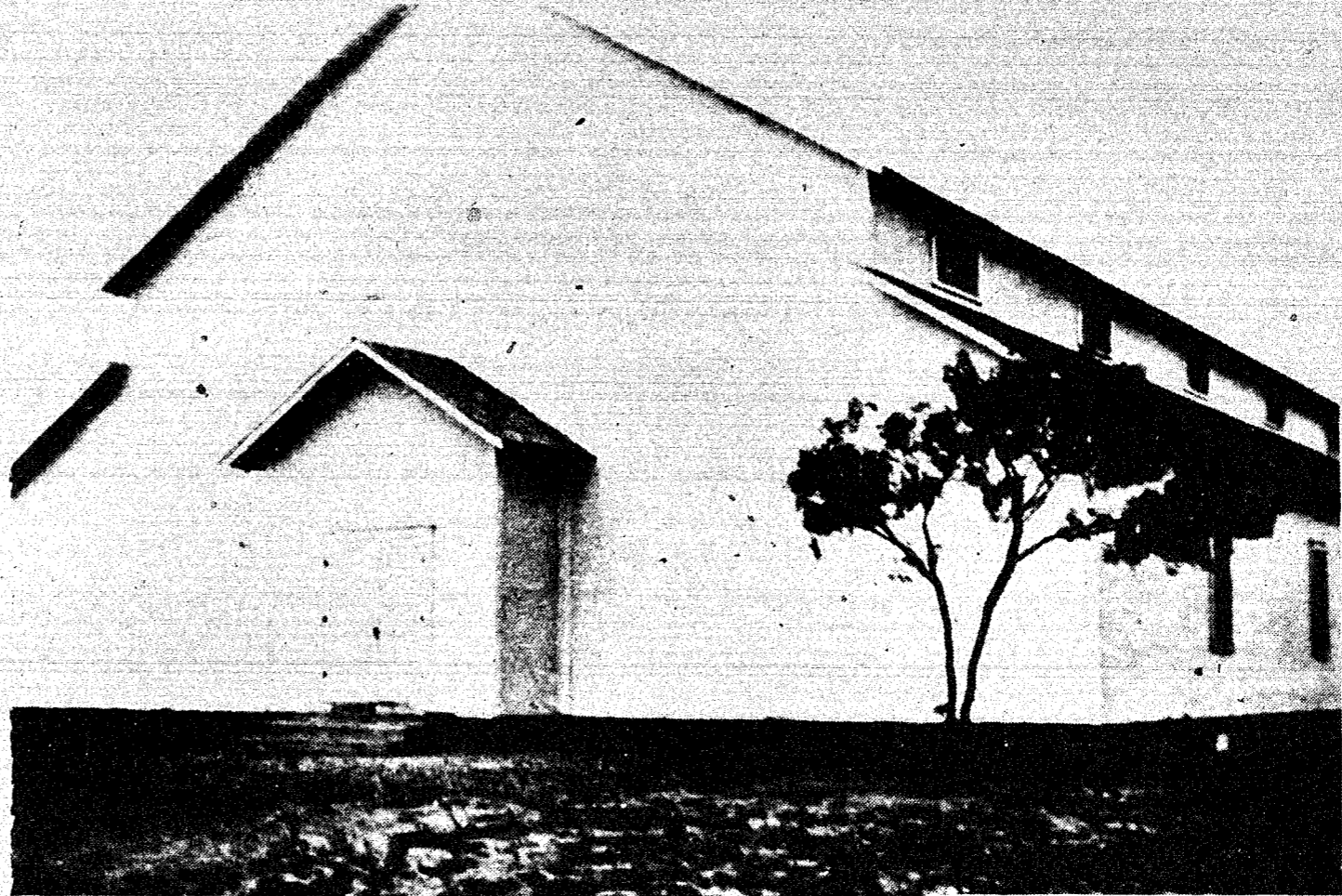

Hold Census Forms Until Deadline

"Don't mail back you 1980 census form until April 1!" says Manager Billy Yarbrough of the census district office. Although they are accepting the questionnaires which are being mailed back, the Census Bureau wanted them filled out and mailed back on April 1. That is Census Day, the day of the official count of the U.S. population. It is important that every questionnaire list all persons living in the household on that day, that it does not list anyone who moved away or died a day or so before, but does include anyone who just moved in or a baby born on that day.

"Enumerators are still making their calls, dropping off a questionnaire at each household," the manager said, "so it may be that you have not received yours yet, but enumerators should complete their calls

within another week."

The manager suggests that filling out the questionnaire be made a family project, with everyone supplying the correct information about himself or herself, adding a word of caution: "Don't pick up a pencil and start marking until you have read the yellow instruction guide carefully. And be sure to use a pencil, so if you make a mistake, you can easily erase it."

The manager called attention to the telephone assistance number printed on the address label. The number is to be called if help is needed in answering some questions or if a questionnaire in Spanish or other language help is wanted. The number to call is: 800-592-4477.

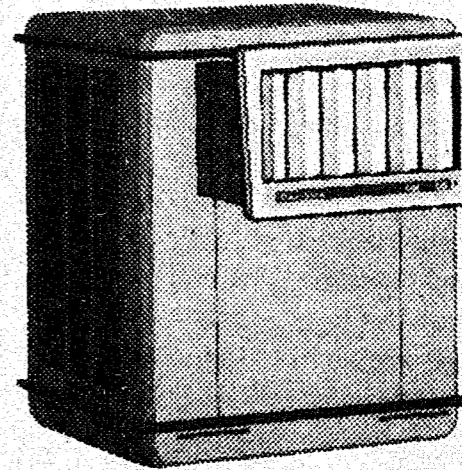

Have you ever been faced with needing more money than you have, in order to do what you want? I can assure you that most of us stay in that type of dilemma most of the time.

The ASCS County Committee was faced with that similar problem last week when they reviewed requests filed for cost-share assistance under the Agricultural Conservation Program. A total of 114 requests were filed, which amounted to cost-shares in excess of \$105,000. How much money did the county committee have? How about \$38,128! Now there's a situation that is not easily handled.

When you consider that the \$105,000 represents only 50 percent of the cost involved in performing the conservation practices, it is evident that the expense of performing this type of work is extremely expensive. The producer, of course, must bear the other 50 percent or more in order to protect and conserve our soil and water resources. Of greater significance even is the fact that there are many producers in the county who carry out thousands of dollars of conservation work each year who have not requester cost-share assistance. These producers are to be commended for their efforts in carrying out a very complicated situation.

It is regrettable that there is not sufficient funds appropriated each year to assist all producers who want to carry out conservation practices on the land which they tend. We often find our available funds shorter and shorter each year to assist in the work that is being done.

With public funds being involved, the county committee considered applications for approval which would hopefully result in additional conservation above the amount farmers generally would carry out with their own resources. In addition, the committee first considered those producers who have not received cost-share assistance in the prior two years of the program.
