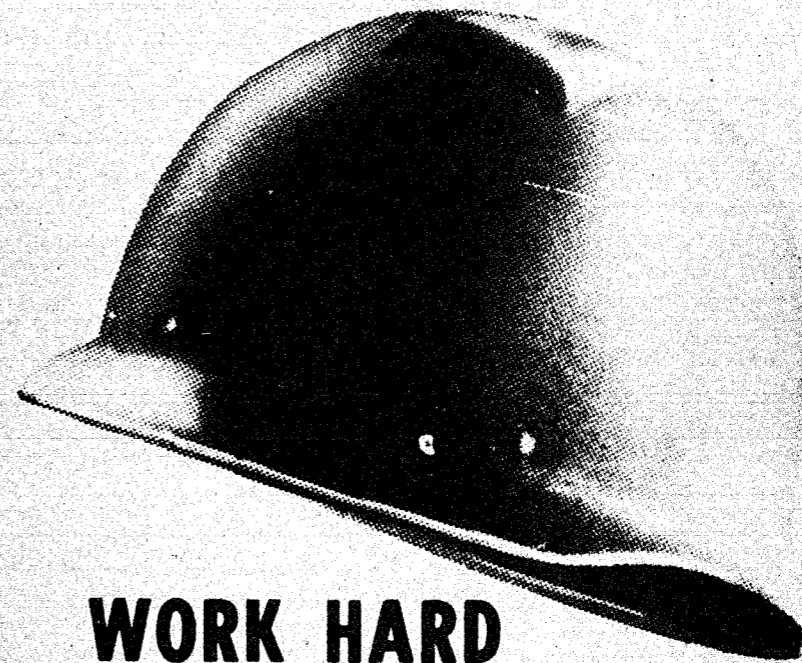
Brent Hamlin placed second in high jump.

VFD Membership Drive Starting Here This Week

The associate membership drive of Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department got underway this week with about 800 community residents contacted for donations to the department. Those making donations will be given membership cards and included on the list of contributors.

The VFD will use 1980 funds to purchase new equipment and maintain and operate the department.

Increased costs of fuel and equipment have made necessary a change in policy that will affect some rural residents. Starting this year, a charge will be made on fire calls to all rural

residents who are not associate members of the department. Although support is very good from city residents, many rural people do not respond to the membership campaign and are not helping maintain the department. According to VFD leaders, a majority of the fire calls are to the rural area, with the out of town calls costing more for fuel and damage to equipment as with grass and pasture fires.

Anyone missed in the drive may send donations to the VFD or deposit at Santa Anna National Bank. The drive will continue several weeks.

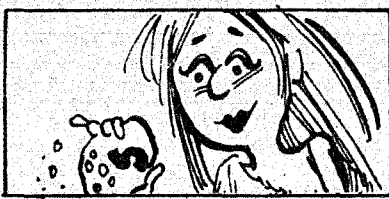



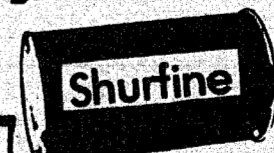
