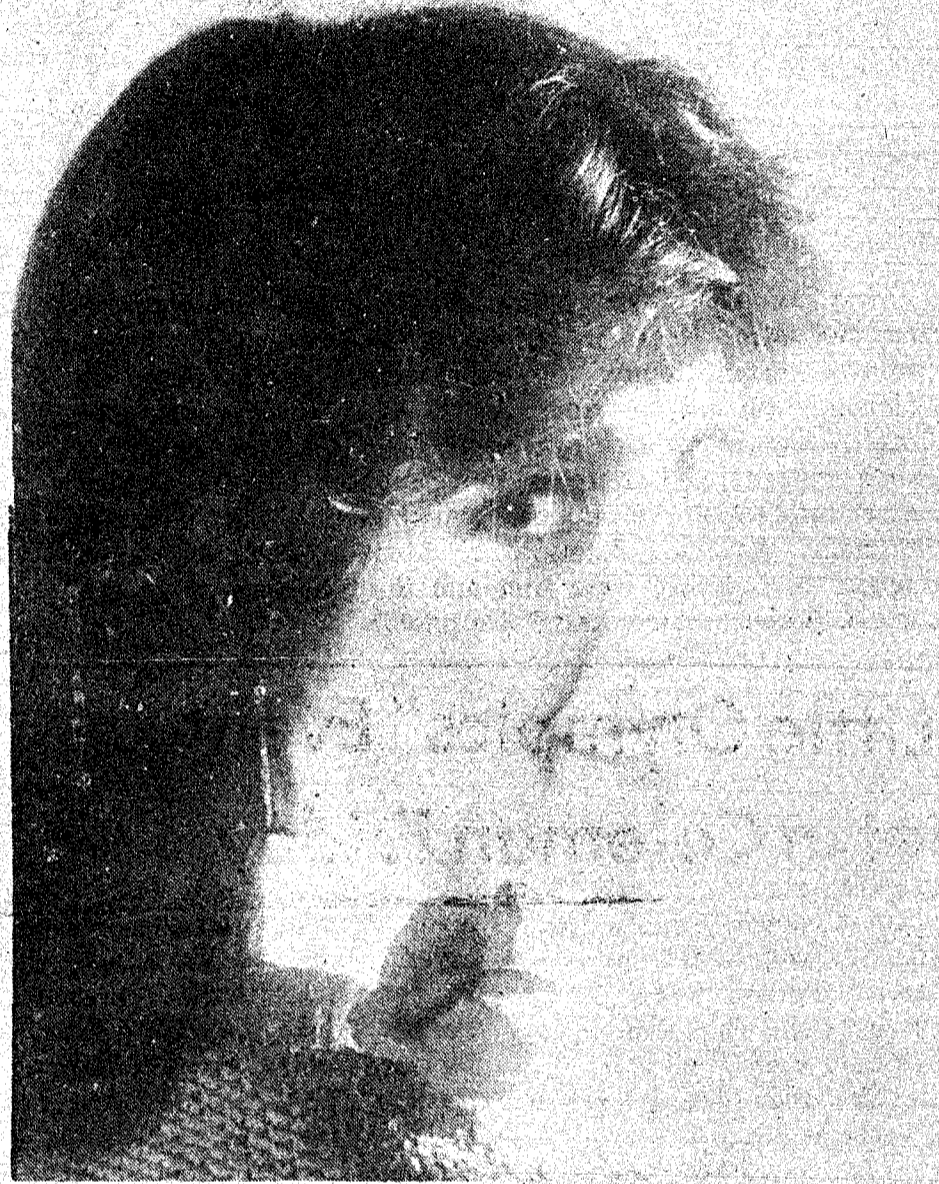
## Santa Anna To Have Entry In "Miss Texas" Contest

Santa Anna pet owners will have an opportunity to get their pets vaccinated for rabies at a city-wide clinic Saturday, May 10, at the Fire Hall. Dr. Cathy Pearce will be on hand from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. to vaccinate dogs and cats for rabies, and other vaccinations will be available for those requesting it.

This is the first rabies clinic in Santa Anna this year, and a good response is expected. Vaccination of pets for rabies is now a state law, enforceable by cities and counties, and proof of vaccination is required to license dogs in Santa Anna.

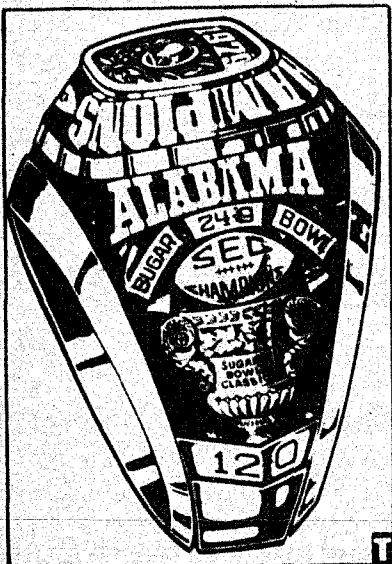

# Buffalo Facts, Events Told

## History of Buffalo Gymnasium Stirs Interest in June Homecoming

Buffalo High School was once a school housing more students than the Bangs School system at its height of prosperity.

The school was located nine miles northwest of Bangs and eight miles northeast of Santa Anna and originated through the consolidation of three small schools. Those schools were Cross Tank on the J. J. Andrews place in Brown County not far from the Coleman County line, Buffalo on the Richmond place in Coleman County near the Brown County line, and Winn Ranch School on the Welton Winn place in Coleman county.

The two story frame building called Buffalo High School opened its doors in 1915 with three teachers: Mr. Winn, Miss Lucile Grady (Smith), and Miss Kate Phillips.

Later, Bee Branch, Longview, Liberty, Sand Creek and other school consolidated with Buffalo giving a large student body for a school of that time.

The lumber from Bee Branch was later used to build the Buffalo Gymnasium, the first gym in Brown or Coleman county. The building was a popular sports center as well as a center used for singing conventions, plays, musicals, and political gatherings.

The rapid growth of the school during the Fry Oil Field Boom made it necessary to increase the teaching staff to eleven plus special instructors. Other buildings were also added and the gym was given an added touch of native stone around the walls.

Buffalo was noted at one time

for its athletics having an outstanding eleven and six-man football team, as well as, basketball and track teams. The "Buffalo" girls were also recognized for their basketball and volleyball abilities with team and individual trophies to show for their efforts.

One of the most noted athletes who attended the once prominent school still resides in the Buffalo Community in Brown County northeast of the school site. This man, Leo George, is well known to area residents and is remembered by some for his great track record.

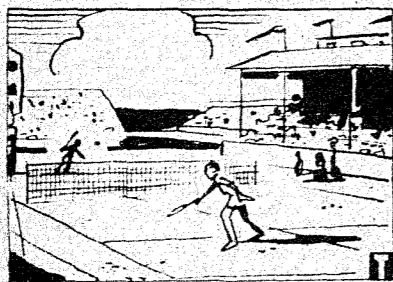

# San Saba Reports Gold And Silver Deposits

Nearby San Saba County has been named in a newly published report by Texas scientist Robert Benson, as one of twenty counties in the state having gold or silver deposits.

Benson spent several months digging through state mining records to pinpoint the location of past precious metal discoveries. "At the turn-of-the-century, quite a bit of prospecting was done in Texas. Gold was selling for about twenty dollars an ounce and it was just not that profitable," Benson said.

Texas is not usually regarded as a gold or silver state, but according to the report, at one time Texas ranked 8th among the gold producing states. Benson feels that the impact of the petroleum boom after the turn-of-the-century, relegated gold and silver to a back seat in the state. "If there is one thing that can clearly be seen when you look at the history of gold and silver prospecting in Texas, its that an enormous amount of territory was not even touched. With gold hovering around the \$800 an ounce mark, that may all be changing soon," he said.

The report examines the concentration of gold and silver deposits across the state and describes methods of prospecting and recovery. These methods range from simple panning to using metal detectors. "Full scale mining ventures may not be feasible for the average Texan, but the idea of a small operator with limited funding making a profitable strike is not that far out," he said.

Benson has had a lot of response to the report and said that most people are using it as a way to add fun to weekend trips. Since most of the known deposits are located either in West Texas or Central Texas, everyone can get to a prospecting area in a few hours.

"For an idea of what is possible, one Central Texas county reported ore that assayed at better than eleven ounces of gold per ton. At today's prices, that's about \$8800 worth." One ton of ore is about the amount that will fit in a box two feet along each dimension. The report lists dozens of active and inactive mines and prospects across the state. For example, the Presidio mine in the Shafter mining district has produced \$4.7 million in gold and more than a billion dollars worth of silver since 1883.

John Grandy, an official with the wildlife group, called for a federal program to "train shepherds and solve the labor shortage on the range."

He went on to say the sheep and goat industry was "economically troubled" and the coyote was the scapegoat!

\*\*\*

Fran Lipscomb, a Washington-based spokesperson for the Society for Animal Protective Legislation, had some even more choice ideas on predator control. She suggested coyotes be provided with birth control measures as an alternative to current predator control methods.

She also favored use of guard dogs whose "highly intensive eyes" can scare dangerous predators away from livestock without killing them. Another scheme Lipscomb favored was recruiting "hordes of backpackers who regard it as a privilege to sleep in the open, walk long distances and carry their food with them" as "future American shepherds."

Those thinking coyotes are a vanishing breed need only to come to our area where the large "wolves" are often seen and more frequently heard howling in the distance on still nights.

S-Security Numbers Needed For Students

Students planning to work this summer who do not have their Social Security numbers should apply for them now, according to Priscilla Tercero, Branch Manager in Brownwood. Every employer will have to request each working student's social security number in order to deduct taxes from the pay check.

Students under the age of eighteen may have their parents obtain their social security numbers for them; those over eighteen must apply in person. However, whether the student or the parent applies, some valid record of the student's birth, such as a birth certificate, and some evidence of identity, such as a driver's license or a report card, must be shown. A variety of documents may be used and local Social Security offices can assist in determining those acceptable. A call ahead of time may save extra trips to the Social Security office.

Once the required form is completed and signed and the birth and identity have been shown, a social security card will be mailed to the student's home in approximately four to six weeks.

Students may feel it is not important to have a social security number for summer employment or to pay social security taxes on temporary or part-time earnings. However, disability can strike at an early age and taxes paid on these earnings may play an important part in providing disability coverage at that time.

In most jobs the employer will automatically deduct the tax from the student's wages, but in other jobs, the employer may not be aware students also

benefit from paying social security taxes. Working students should inform their employers they wish to have social security tax deducted from their paychecks. The employer is then to match this amount. A student who happens to be self-employed and earns \$400 a year should also pay social security taxes.

The Brownwood Social Security office is located in the 300 North Main Building near the traffic circle. The office is open Monday through Friday, except national holidays, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and the phone number is 646-7533.

Clean Air Week To Be Observed

Gov. William P. Clements has proclaimed May 4-10 Clean Air Week in Texas, focusing attention upon air pollution caused by automobiles.

The Governor urged industrial leaders, organizations, businesses, government agencies, and individuals to pledge themselves to more effective action for clean air for ourselves and future generations.

This year's observance marks the second year that the Texas Air Control Board (TACB) and the American Lung Association have emphasized reducing automobile emissions.

TACB Executive Director Bill

Stewart said that newer cars are contributing less pollution with each model year as federal motor vehicle emission controls grow stricter. However, because of inadequate mechanical adjustments and/or maintenance, the full potential for vehicle emissions controls is not being realized.

Stewart cautioned motorists against attempting to increase gas mileage by tampering with or removing the emission control devices or by using leaded gas in cars designed for unleaded gas.

"Often it is not the emission control devices that are res-

ponsible for poor gas mileage, but someone's attempt to make

the car run better by removing them.

"New cars equipped with catalytic converters are designed to emit very low levels of pollution; however, the use of leaded gas in the cars ruins the catalyst and causes the car to emit large amounts of pollution."

Stewart urged all Texans to realize that the dangers from motor vehicle pollution to human health and general well-

being are real and to act now to diminish the impact as much as possible.

## Vision Quest Wagon Train Passes Through Area

A century after most wagon trains made their western treks, another group of wagons and riders passed through our community, this time traveling eastward.

Early this week over 100 young people and adults from the Vision Quest program of Tuscon, Arizona came through central Texas as they traveled from Tuscon to Pennsylvania.

The entourage included about 70 delinquent teenagers and staff members from the program that works with troubled and delinquent adolescents in several states.

Young people from 15 to 20 from the state of Pennsylvania are making the six-month trip that is planned to teach the troubled youngsters community responsibility and participation.

A select group of 20 boys compose the "Rough Riders" that travel a day ahead of the larger group. They arrived in Santa Anna Saturday afternoon and camped on the Earl Simmons place east of town on the banks of the old Santa Anna Lake. They rested Sunday and left Monday morning for a day's journey through Bangs to near Brownwood.

The main body of the group, boys and girls from 15 to 18, came through Santa Anna Monday afternoon after spending their idle day near Valera.

The wagon train is well staffed. Two veterinarians travel with the group to keep the horses and mules in good condition; a nurse is in the group to care for minor emergencies among the people. The senior member of the staff is a wagon-builder who constructed the wagons for the train and attends to maintenance.

Not all is horse-and mule-drawn, however. A large goose-neck trailer pulled by a pickup truck carries extra tack and gear and any lame animals. A van is equipped as a cookhouse for the larger group.

Tents and bedrolls are used for sleeping.

There are two wagons with the Rough Riders and seven wagons in the larger group. Over 50 horses and mules provide the power for the vehicles.

"Eggie" Eggleston, director of the group, is making his third wagon trip with the program, with this the longest attempted. The group left Tuscon March 1 and will average 15 to 17 miles a day. The young people in the group chose to make the trip, and only one boy has been returned to Arizona after failing to conform to the program.

Professional teachers conduct classes for the teenagers each day, helping with remedial work and preparing those who choose to take their high school equivalency test. Many of the young people are counseled for careers in trades.

Each teenager is assigned chores and given responsibilities.

According to Eggleston, seven of ten young people enlisted in the Vision Quest programs are rehabilitated and become productive citizens. The six-year-old organization competes with the official correction system by contracting their services to the states of Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico and latest Pennsylvania.

Religious training and participation is also provided, with religious services held regularly


