Truck Slams Work Site; Five Men are Injured

Five men were injured about 7:30 last Wednesday night when an 18-wheeler tractor-trailer ran into a crew working on the water lines in

the southwest part of Santa Anna. Injured in the mishap were three of the construction company workers, the driver of the truck, and City Superintendent Darwin Lovelady.

According to witnesses at the scene, the truck struck a backhoe at the construction site and a city pickup. Most seriously injured was Apolina Gonzales, 28, an employee of Clouse Construction Co. of Odessa. Lovelady, who was near his pickup truck when the mishap occurred, received a fractured vertebra and bruises and abrasions. Driver of the truck, John Holliday of Sweetwater, Eugene Harris, foreman of the construction crew, and Samuel Renteria, an employee, were less seriously injured and treated and released from Brownwood Community Hospital following the accident.

Weathers Elected ISD President

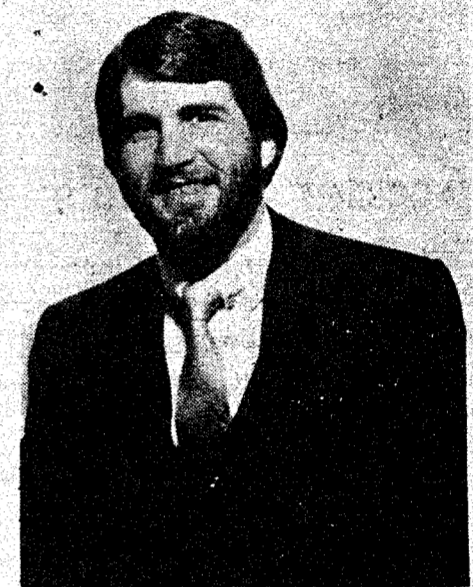

JoAnn and Loretta Collins and Robbie Clifton were qualifiers in the field events, with JoAnn winning first in discus and second in shot put. Loretta was first in shot put and second in discus, and Robbie was first in the high jump contest.

In the running events, qualifiers were JoAnn Collins, second in the 200 meter race; Bonnie Phillips, second in the 1600 meter run; and the relay teams

The Santa Anna City Sales Tax for the period ending March 27 showed a decrease, the same trend as indicated in the state.

The one percent sales tax for the month was \$674, making a total for the year of \$4,295.47. The figure for the year is nine percent below that of 1979.

New Book Given To City Library

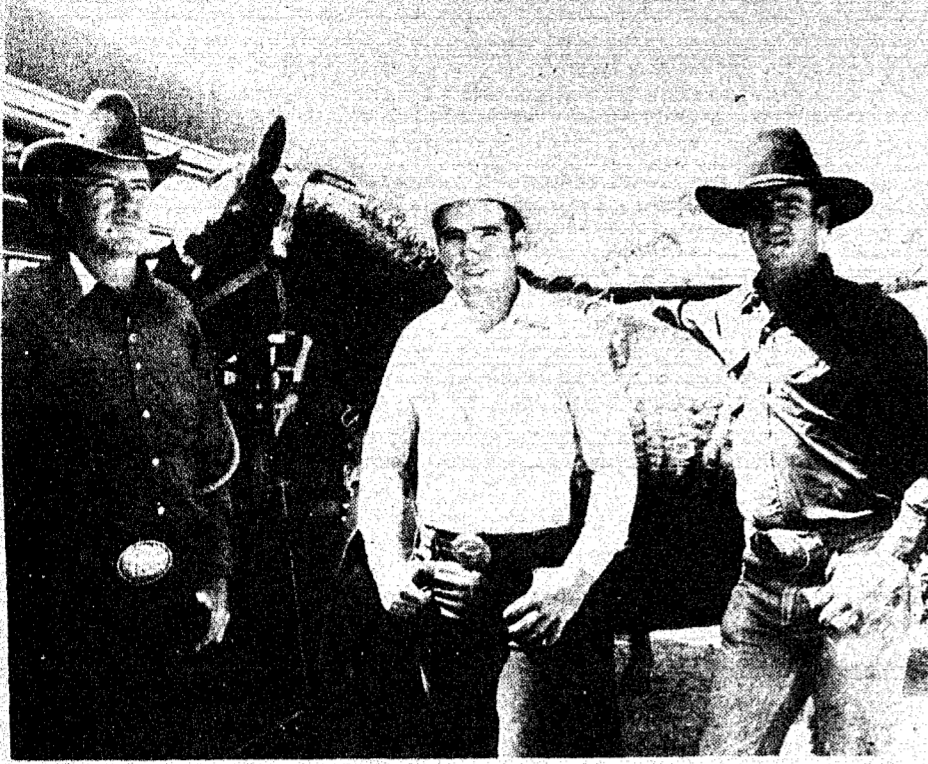

Steer Roping School Held; Jackpot Ropings On Friday

Eight steer ropers from four states were at the James Allen Ranch last week for the Allen's Steer Roping School. Instructing the class were James Allen and sons, Guy and Gip, all professional steer ropers.

Classes were held all day Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, with the students roping and tying the steers in front of a camera and video tape. The students, and their instructors had 150 steers for their practice sessions, learning the finer points of roping, tripping and tying as a contest sport.

The school ended with a jackpot roping for the students, with Mel Potter of Marana, Arizona the winner with a 35.2 second total on two steers.

In a professional jackpot steer roping Friday afternoon, Gip Allen was winner of the average with a total of 78.8 seconds on four steers. Potter was second with 79.0 seconds, and Paul Howard of Hereford was third

with 81.0 seconds. Several former champion ropers were among the group competing in the Friday afternoon event.

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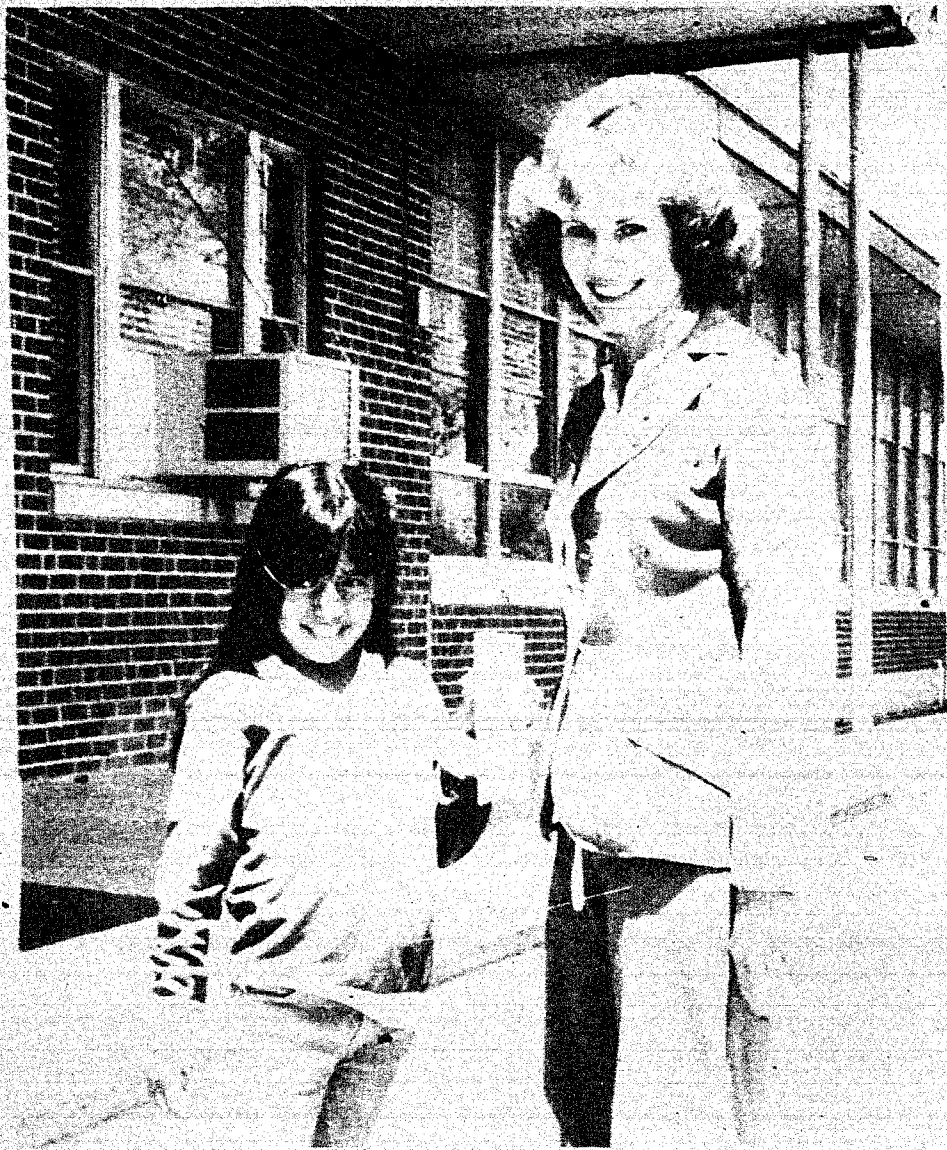

In keeping God's commandments there is great reward, even in this life. Our conscience does not condemn us. Our hearts are not at enmity with God, but at peace with Him.

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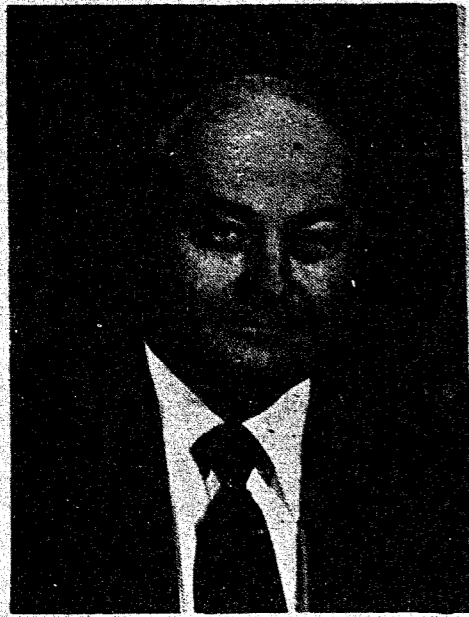

Service Center A Busy Place

The Adventist Community Centers have been very busy the last three months. The one in Santa Anna is located across the street from City Cleaners, and the center in Coleman is located behind the Adventist Chapel at corner of South Pecos and College, which is operated by Mrs. Luther Walraven who lives in Coleman.

The District Court should not be a political forum nor center of power for any individual or group. Its sole purpose is to provide a source of justice for the people. Should he be elected, Cadenhead plans to make himself available in all three counties so that each case may be heard expeditiously, whether by jury or by the Court. Every effort will be made to accommodate attorneys in order that their clients may be better served. The criminal docket will be given the attention accorded it by statute to help insure law and order.

The District has very competent attorneys and related officials, according to Mr. Cadenhead. His obligation as a Judge would be to work with them to give the public the type of Court they expect and deserve.

Enchanted Rock A Unique Spot For Excursion

Texans looking for a unique outdoor excursion this spring or summer should consider a visit to Enchanted Rock State Park near Fredericksburg, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The park site is dominated by a massive mound of granite rising 400 feet above the scenic, rolling Hill Country terrain 18 miles north of Fredericksburg in Llano and Gillespie Counties.

The site is rich in legends attributed to Indians who once roamed this area, and scientists theorize that the sounds made by the granite expanding and contracting with temperature changes prompted the Indians to believe the area was hunted or enchanted.

The site was designated as a Natural Landmark by the U. S. Department of the Interior's National Park Service in 1971.

To expand this recreational resource but prevent exploitation of it, the master plan for the park calls for development which will cause a minimum of disturbance to the site's valuable archeological and geologic resources.

Construction planned for the site includes a headquarters/interpretive complex, superintendent's residence, tent camping area, day use area, group picnic area, a trail head shelter, parking and restrooms.

Hiking to the top of the rock along designated trails will be continued under the master plan, but park visitors are not allowed to pick up or disturb the rocks, plants or other natural features at the site.

The park is located on Ranch Road 965 about 18 miles north of Fredericksburg. Entry fee is \$2 per car, and primitive campsites cost \$3 per night. Office hours at the park itself is 10 p.m.

Medicare Charge Raises Question

Many people who have Medicare protection are not sure just what is meant by "reasonable charges," states Priscilla Tercero, Branch Manager of the Brownwood Social Security office.

Under the law, payment of benefits under the medical insurance part of Medicare is based on reasonable charges for covered services or supplies.

People probably would have less trouble understanding this term if they thought of it as the "allowed" or "permitted" charge. But that is not the complete story either.

The reasonable charge for a medical service is determined by the Medicare carrier for each year. First, the carrier determines the customary charge by each doctor and supplier for each separate service or supply. This is generally the charge most often made.

Then, the carrier figures the prevailing charge for each covered service or supply. This charge is a figure high enough to cover the customary charge on three-fourths of the bills submitted the previous year for each service or supply.

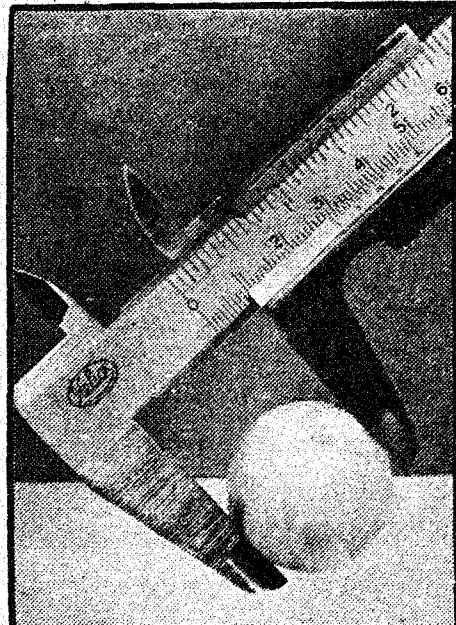
Only the amount Medicare can pay is limited; the amount a doctor charges is not limited.

Medical insurance pays 80 percent of the reasonable charge after the \$60 annual deductible has been met. If the doctor accepts assignment, then the total charge for the covered service will be the reasonable charge approved.

When a Medicare claim is submitted, the reasonable charge approved by the carrier will be the lowest of either the customary charge, the prevailing charge, or the actual charge.

For more information about Medicare, get in touch with any social security representative.

Billy Yarbrough, manager of the Census District Office for this area, asks that if yours is one of the missing, that you fill it out and mail it today. Don't make the Census Bureau come calling for your census form.

Every person must be counted, the manager said, whether by mail or personal visit by a census taker, and the cost of the census goes up with every household that must be visited. The completeness and accuracy of the census depends on the cooperation of every household and every individual in filling out and returning the questionnaire.

Helpful examples on how to mark the answers to the questions are given on the yellow instruction guide furnished with the form.

Saying Grace During Decade

A national Gallup poll in 1962 indicated that 62 percent of the families followed the practice of saying grace before meals. A similar survey last year showed a shift away from saying grace before meals has occurred. Only 57 percent of the families follow the practice now.

The poll showed that grace said before meals was more frequently in households where the family members were less educated. Of the respondents, with only a grade-school education, 72 percent say grace before meals, whereas only 54 percent of those with a college education reported this practice was carried out in their homes.

The older the respondents the more likely they were to say grace -- 65 percent of those 50 and older compared with 42 percent of those between 18 and 24.

The report says grace is said in more households where the income is under \$3,000 a year, and 19 percent less where income is \$20,000 or more. Protestants say grace more than Catholics do, and families in small towns more than those in larger cities.
