## A Unique Spot

## For Excursion

Texans looking for a unique outdoor excursion this spring or summer should consider a visit to Enchanted Rock State Park near Fredericksburg, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.
The park site is dominated by a massive mound of granite rising 400 feet above the scenic, rolling Hill Country terrain 18 miles north of Fredericksburg in Llano and Gillespie Counties.
The site is rich in legends attributed to Indians who once roamed this area, and scientists theorize that the sounds made by the granite expanding and contacting with temperature changes prompted the Indians to believe the area was hunted or enchanted.
The site was designated as a Natural Landmark by the U. S. Department of the Interior's National Park Service in 1971.
To expand this recreational resource but prevent exploitation of it, the master plan for the park calls for development which will cause a minimum of disturbance to the site's valuable archeological and geologic resources.
Construction planned for the site includes a headquarters/interpretive complex, surperintendent's residence, tent camping area, day use area, group picnic area, a trail head shelter, parking and restrooms.
Hiking to the top of the rock along designated trails will be continued under the master plan, but park visitors are not allowed to pick up or disturb the rocks, plants or other natural features at the site.

The park is located on Ranch Road 965 about 18 miles north of Fredericksburg. Entry fee is $\$ 2$ per car, and primitive campsites cost $\$ 3$ per night. Office hours at the park itself is 10 p.m.

## Medicare Charge Raises Question

Many people who have Medicare protection are not sure just what is meant by "reasonable charges," states Priscilla Tercero, Branch Manager of the Brownwood Social Security office.

Under the law, payment of benefits under the medical insurance part of Medicare is based on reasonable charges for covered services or supplies.

People probably would have less trouble understanding this term if they thought of it as the "allowed" or "permitted" charge. But that is not the complete story either.

The reasonable charge for a medical service is determined by the Medicare carrier for each year. First, the carrier determines the customary charge by each doctor and supplier for each separate service or supply. This is generally the charge most often made.
Then, the carrier figures the prevailing charge for each covered service or supply. This charge is a figure high enough to cover the customary charge on three-fourths of the bills submitted the previous year for each service or supply.

Only the amount Medicare can pay is limited; the amount a doctor charges is not limited.
Medical insurance pays 80 percent of the reasonable charge after the $\$ 60$ annual deductible has been met. If the doctor accepts assignment, then the total charge for the covered service will be the reasonable charge approved.

When a Medicare claim is submitted, the reasonable charge approved by the carrier will be the lowest of either the customary charge, the prevailing charge, or the actual charge.

Billy Yarbrough, manager of the Census District Office for this area, asks that if yours is one of the missing, that you fill it out and mail it today. Don't make the Census Bureau come calling for your census form.
Every person must be counted, the manager said, whether by mail or personal visit by a census taker, and the cost of the census goes up with every household that must be visited. The completeness and accuracy of the census depends on the cooperation of every household and every individual in filling out and returning the questionnaire.

## Saying Grace

## During Decade

A national Gallup poll in 1962 indicated that 62 percent of the families followed the practice of saying grace before meals. A similar survey last year showed a shift away from saying grace before meals has occurred. Only 57 percent of the families follow the practice now.
The poll showed that grace said before meals was more frequently in households where the family members were less educated. Of the respondents, with only a grade-school education, 72 percent say grace before meals, whereas only 54 percent of those with a college education replorted this practice was carried out in their homes.
The older the respondents the more likely they were to say grace - 65 percent of those 50 and older compared with 42 percent of those between 18 and 24.

The report says grace is said in more households where the income is under $\$ 3,000$ a year, and 19 percent less where income is $\$ 20,000$ or more. Protestants say grace more than Catholics do, and families in small towns more than those in larger cities.
