Traffic Sign Project Approved For City

Weldon Brown, a representative of the Texas Traffic Safety Program, met with Santa Anna City Council Thursday where the contract for traffic sign project was approved. A total of \$2,134 will be provided the City of Santa Anna for 157 new traffic signs to be installed according to state and federal regulations. The funds for the project will come from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with the sites recommended by a State Engineer.

Mayor Thomas Hays presided at the meeting that was attended by all Councilmen. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and bills and accounts for the previous month approved for payment.

Glenda Cook met with the Council with recommendations for a city park, and the auditor's report was studied, showing the City to be within the budget for the year.

A report showed the city water project to be 75 percent completed, with July 10 the projected date for completion.

A request for additional fire

hoses and a light for the Fire Station was approved upon recommendation of Fire Department members.

The next regular meeting of the City Council will be Thursday, June 5, with the public welcome to attend.

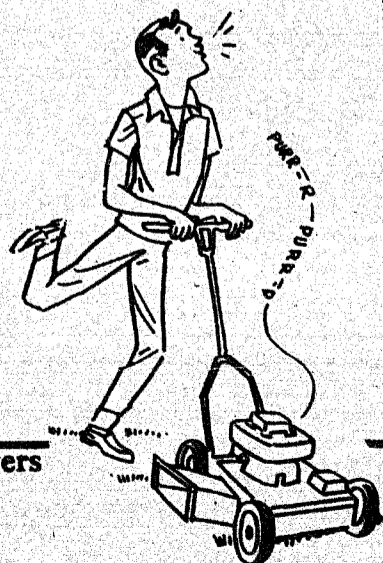

Ted J. McCaughan, 73, of Fort Worth died Saturday, May 10, in St. Joseph's Hospital in Fort Worth. Funeral services were held at Santa Anna United Presbyterian Church Tuesday, May 13, with interment in Santa Anna Cemetery under direction of Henderson Funeral Home. Dr. John F. Elliott, pastor of Calvary Presbyterian Church of Fort Worth, and Rev. Hugh W. Sanders of the Santa Anna church, officiated.

Mr. McCaughan was born August 25, 1906 in Starr, Texas, the son of James L. and Annie (Soules) McCaughan. He was a 1923 graduate of Santa Anna High School and married Louise Boyd in Santa Anna December 25, 1928.

The Monday rainfall was followed by an additional half-inch Tuesday, and made a total of 3.81 inches for the month of May.

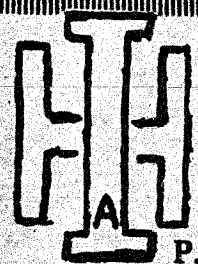
A heavy hailstorm in the Gouldbusk, Rockwood and Whon area damaged crops and homes in its path.
