Summer Swim Program To Start Monday, June 9

The summer swimming program for Coleman County children will get underway Monday, June 9, at the Coleman Swimming Pool. Santa Anna children will be taken by bus to Coleman each weekday through June 20 for the classes, leaving the school at 8:30 each morning.

Children who have completed the first grade through advanced swimmers are eligible to attend the classes. The cost has not been announced but will be listed next week.

Mrs. Charles Hosch and Mrs. Gary Fleeman are in charge of the local group this year. Parents of children who plan to attend will be asked to ride the bus at least one day during the two week period, and will be assigned a day by those in charge.

Registration forms have been given school children, and they

must be completed and turned in when the children attend their first swimming class.

Grain Harvest To Be Light, Late

Despite the unusual weather conditions in our area, some grain will be harvested in the community this year. Grain planted in the fall did not sprout until mid-winter, then growth was hampered by lack of rain in the spring.

S. A. Mayor Responds To Concerned Citizens

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN

ART. 6252-17 of the Texas Municipal Law requires all governmental bodies to make accessible to the public all information collected, assembled, or maintained by that government. It requires all information in connection with the transaction of official business to be public information and available to the public during normal business hours.

In this act the legislature exercises its rule-making powers to prohibit secret meetings, except information deemed confidential by law, either constitutional, statutory or by judicial decision, which includes information relating to litigation of a civic nature and settlement negotiations, to which the political subdivision is a party, that the attorney general or the respective attorneys has determined should be withheld from public inspection.

Pursuant to the fundamental philosophy of the American Constitutional form of government, which holds to the principle that government is the servant of the people and not the master of them, it is hereby declared to be the public policy of the City of Santa Anna that all people are, unless otherwise expressly provided by law, at all times entitled to full and complete information regarding the affairs of the government and the official acts of those who represent them as public officials and employees.

A full financial statement is made monthly. A budget is prepared annually and is filed with the States Comptrollers office, and with the City Secretary. The records and accounts are examined and a financial statement based on such audit is prepared annually by Inge P. Maxwell, CPA, and is on file within 120 days after the close of the fiscal year as

required by ART. 1023a Texas Municipal Law and is public record.

On application for public information to the City Secretary, custodian of information, by any person the custodian will promptly produce the information for inspection or duplication, or both, in the office of the City Secretary. If the information is in active use or in storage and therefore not available at the time requested, the custodian shall certify this fact in writing to the applicant and set a date and an hour within a reasonable time when the record will be available for the exercise of the right given by the act.

The cost to any person requesting noncertified photographic reproductions of public records comprised of pages up to legal size shall not be excessive. The State Board of Control from time to time determines the actual cost of standard size reproductions.

It is not the intention of the City of Santa Anna to withhold information or limit the availability of public records to the public, except as expressly provided by law.

We will continue to publish in the newspaper of general circulation any and all information required by law. And will not withhold or limit the availability of information to the press. We will willingly answer any questions within the framework of our knowledge and responsibility.

Under the OLD law, cities were required to publish financial statements in the newspaper, but as you can see, that is not required now. But clearly, financial conditions and the report are PUBLIC records, meaning this is information which the public has an interest and a right to see.

The newspaper seems to be the most practical way to inform the taxpayers. We are interested and feel this is a reasonable request.

Article 1023a. Auditing of records and accounts; annual statements

a. Each incorporated city, town and village in this state, hereinafter referred to as "city" including any operating under a special charter, or home-rule city operating under a charter adopted or amended pursuant to Article XI, Section 5, of the Texas Constitution, or city operating under the general

laws of this state, shall have its records and accounts audited and a financial statement based on such audit prepared Annually. Any such city whose records and accounts are not audited annually by a person of officer prescribed by statute or charter provision, or by a person in the regular employ of such city, must engage at its own expense a Texas Certified Public Accountant or a public accountant holding a permit to practice

from the Texas State Board of Public Accountancy to conduct the audit and to prepare the financial statement required herein.

b. The annual financial statement of such city, together with the auditor's opinion thereon, shall be filed in the office of the city secretary or clerk of such city within 120 days of the close of the city's fiscal year and shall be a public record.

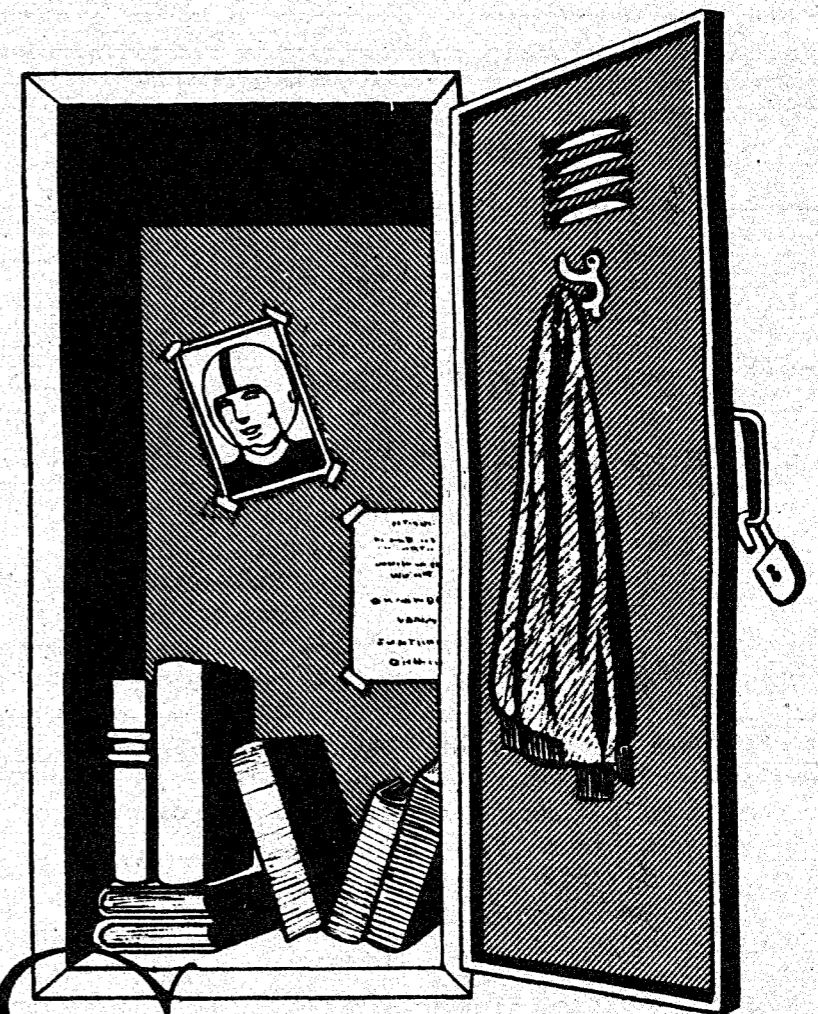

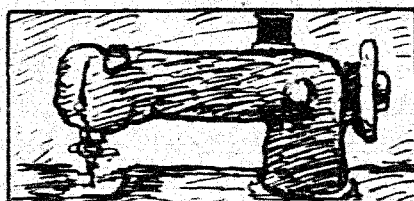

The Scouts will be joined by several members of the Cross Plains Troop and have special guests to present programs during the weekend. The local Troop has a membership of 21.

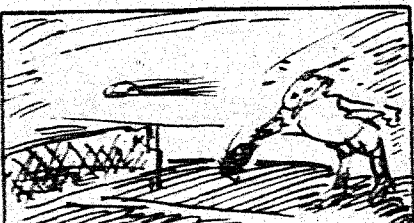
Photo Sessions For Directory For 1st Baptists

AUSTIN—Lower Colorado River Authority attorney Larry Smith confirms the LCRA has taken the first steps in appealing an Austin district judge's ruling in favor of the Stacy Dam project in South Coleman County.

Smith says the LCRA has requested that a copy of the transcript from the trial court be sent to the 3rd Court of Appeals in Austin.

Once that is done, briefs will be filed in the case, Smith said. He added he expected those briefs to be filed in six to eight weeks.

District Judge Herman Jones on March 26 upheld a Texas

Water Commission ruling granting the Colorado River Municipal Water District a permit to build the reservoir.

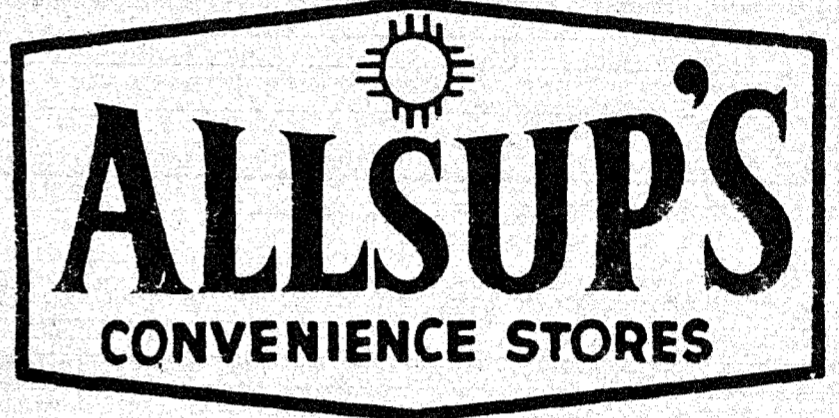
LCRA and several other entities had opposed that permit.

Smith said a motion for rehearing on the matter has been overruled.

That motion contain 15 to 20 points of error on whether there is sufficient water available for the appropriation to Stacy Reservoir, whether granting the permit is in the public interest and whether TWC member Dorsey Hardeman should have been disqualified from voting on granting the permit.

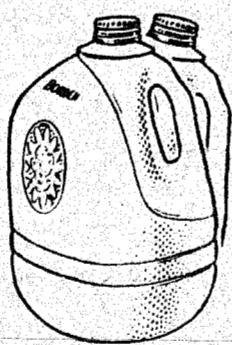

Leath Seeks Gas Tax Relief

Congressman Marvin Leath said today that the 10 cents per gallon tax which the President seeks to impose as a Gasoline Conservation Fee would be another burden on farmers and thus add to the cost of producing food.

The increase in the tax on gasoline will be the result of an added import fee the President has imposed on imported oil. "I'm against this tax for anyone and am supporting efforts to block the tax," Leath said, "but in the meantime I want to see that if the tax is imposed we can get relief for those existing gasoline excise tax exempt users. This would include farmers and states, county and municipal governments."

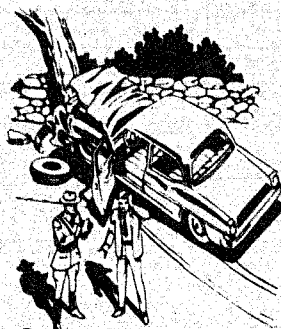
Leath has joined in sponsoring legislation to provide a refund on this tax to these groups.
