The Santa Anna girls golf team placed first in the district contest Monday, winning over the Novice girls, the only other district entry.

Teresa Rolfe led the local team and was medalist in the tourney, having the best score of the day. Others on the team are Janice Cupps, Eva Siller, Nellie Siller and Angie Day.

The Santa Anna boys were second in the boys division, with Mozelle winning first. Those on the SAHS team are Mike Wetsel, David Strickland, Rusty Buzzard, Danny Guerrero and Steve Chance.

Both the boys and girls are eligible to compete in the Regional meet at Abilene later this month.

City, School District Elections Held

School Board Election

Only one incumbent was returned to the Santa Anna School District Board of Trustees in the Saturday, April 5, election. Eddie Wayne Hart-

man, a two-term veteran, was one of the three persons elected to the Board.

Montie L. Guthrie III polled 206 votes, followed by Hartman with 176. Another newcomer, Donald Strickland, was the third

with 147 votes.

Other candidates were Polly Warnock with 143; Orabeth McIver with 124; and Glen Scarborough with 120. A total of 317 votes were cast Saturday.

Other members of the School Board are Joe Riley, Jay Weathers, Donnie Neff and Max Eubank.

Councilmen Elected

Scott Patterson, the only incumbent seeking re-election to the City Council, was approved by the city voters Saturday, elected for a new term. Leading the ballot was Patrick Hosch with 178 votes, and Eddie Jones was the third person elected with 125 votes. Patterson polled 142.

Others on the ballot were Lin Wristen with 95 votes and John Pearce with 96.

Children will meet in the kindergarten classroom while parents are meeting in the school cafeteria.

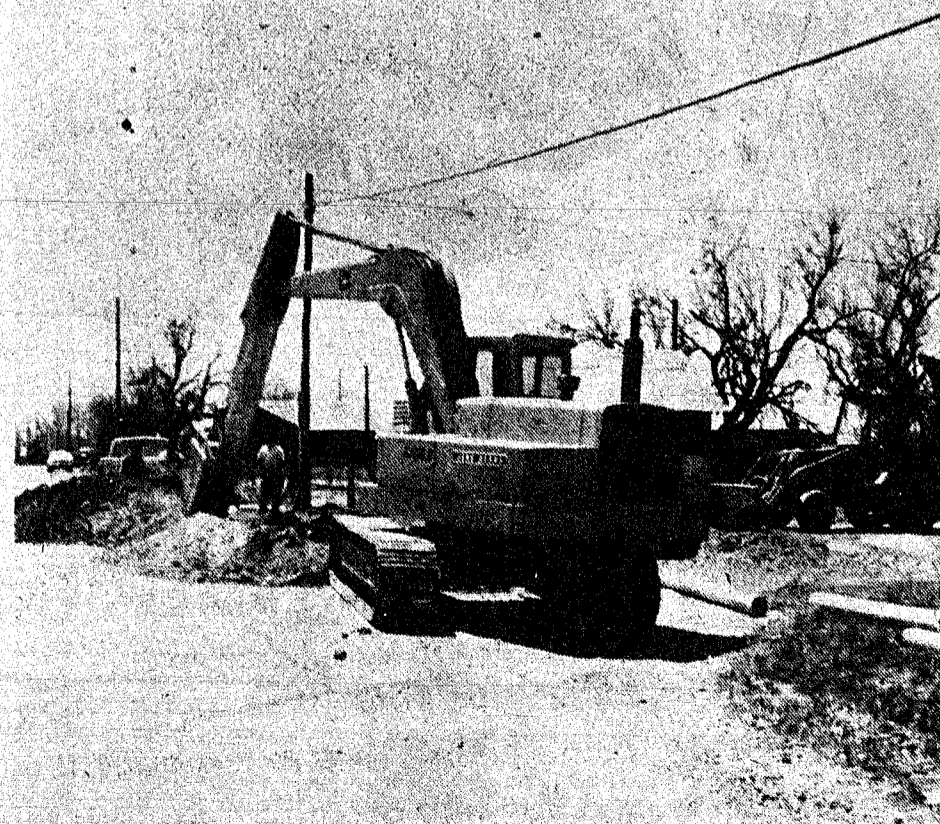
Walk-a-Thon Planned For Cystic Fibrosis Fund

The Walk-A-Thon for the Cystic Fibrosis fund drive will be held Wednesday, April 16, according to Mrs. Pat Hosch, local chairman. The event will start at 10:00 a.m. at City Hall, and local senior citizens are invited to take part.

Each one participating is asked to enlist sponsors who will donate money for each block walked. Any number of sponsors may be enlisted, but the more people taking part, the more interesting the walk will be.

Funds from the drive will go to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation for treatment and research of the disease that affects one of each 1,600 children. At one time Cystic Fibrosis meant a life span of about four years; Today many children with the inherited and incurable disease live to become productive citizens.

Steer Roping School Underway at Allen Ranch

The sport of steer roping will be the only course of study at this week's steer roping school at the James Allen Ranch northeast of Santa Anna. The three-day school is expected to draw steer ropers from all over the United States.

James Allen and his sons, Guy and Gip, will be instructing the classes for the one-steer event—roping, tripping and tying—that is a feature of many rodeos in the west. Few area rodeos have steer roping as a large arena is necessary for the event. Two other three-day schools are scheduled in the coming months.

A climax of the school will be

a jackpot steer roping Friday afternoon. Other ropers will join the students for the afternoon's three-steer roping, with some 30 ropers expected from as far away as Wisconsin. Several former champions will be on hand including Sonny Davis, Buddy Cockerell, Sonny Wright, and Santa Anna's own Gip Allen.

Many area people have never seen the steer roping event, and spectators are welcome to watch the classes at any time. The public is especially invited to attend the Friday afternoon jackpot roping.

The Allen ranch is 10 miles northeast of Santa Anna on Farm Road 568.

Local Group Will Attend Public Hearing

A Public Hearing to gather facts for planning Senior Citizens services will be held at 11:00 a.m. April 14 at the Coleman County Nutrition Project in the High Rise Apartments in Coleman.

The Hearing, conducted by West Central Texas Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging, will be one of 19 held throughout the West Central Texas Council of Governments region. It will be open to all residents of Coleman County, but will be directed primarily at persons age 60 or over.

Included in the Hearing will be discussion about operation of Senior Citizens services under the Older Americans Act. National, State and local priorities will be reviewed with opportunity for input from the audience.

The bulk of the Hearing will be spent getting information from those present about the need of older persons. This information will be used by the Area Agency on Aging in preparing its Regional Aging Services Plan for the period beginning October 1, 1980.

Results of this Public Hearing will directly influence the future of Senior Citizens Programs in this County as well as in the West Central Texas Council of Governments region.

Mrs. Joe C. Barnes, local coordinator, would like to have a good representation of Santa Anna senior citizens attend the meeting. Transportation will be furnished, and anyone available to attend is asked to contact Mrs. Barnes by Friday of this week.

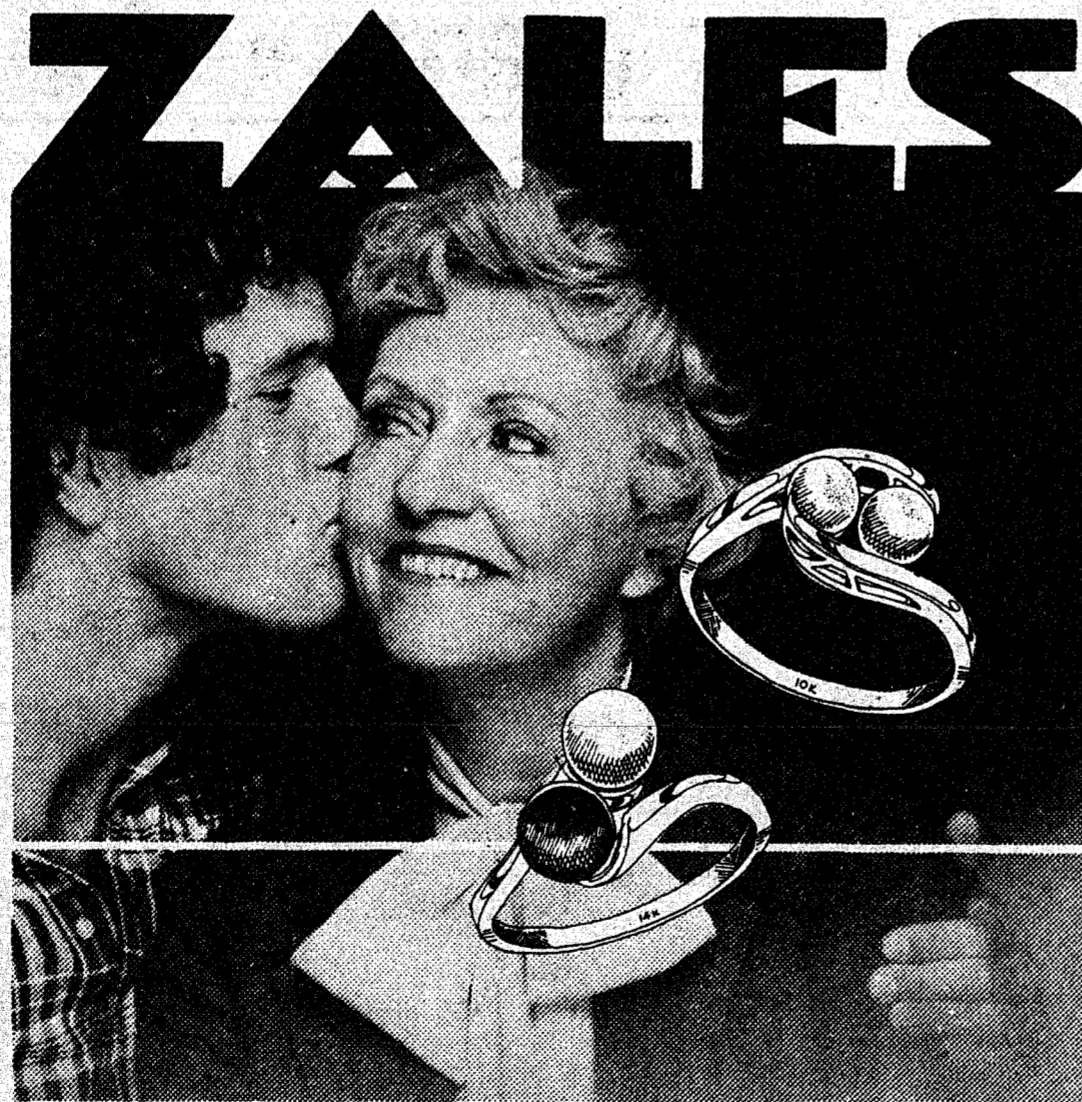

Turkey Hunting For Spring '80

With the spring turkey gobbler season starting this weekend, Texas Turkey hunters are gearing up for what should be a productive season.

The spring hunt will be legal in 62 counties this year including Coleman County, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The hunt this year is April 12-27, and the limit is one gobbler per hunter.

Biologists believe this year's spring gobbler season should be at least average or better, with a considerable holdover population of birds from the past two years of good hatches. A generally mild winter across most of the state's turkey range may have helped the birds, but some losses may have occurred because of dry conditions.


Many Texans find turkey hunting more difficult and challenging in the spring, as the gobblers usually have to be lured to within range by calling, a procedure requiring some patience and skill.






