Plan Bake Sale

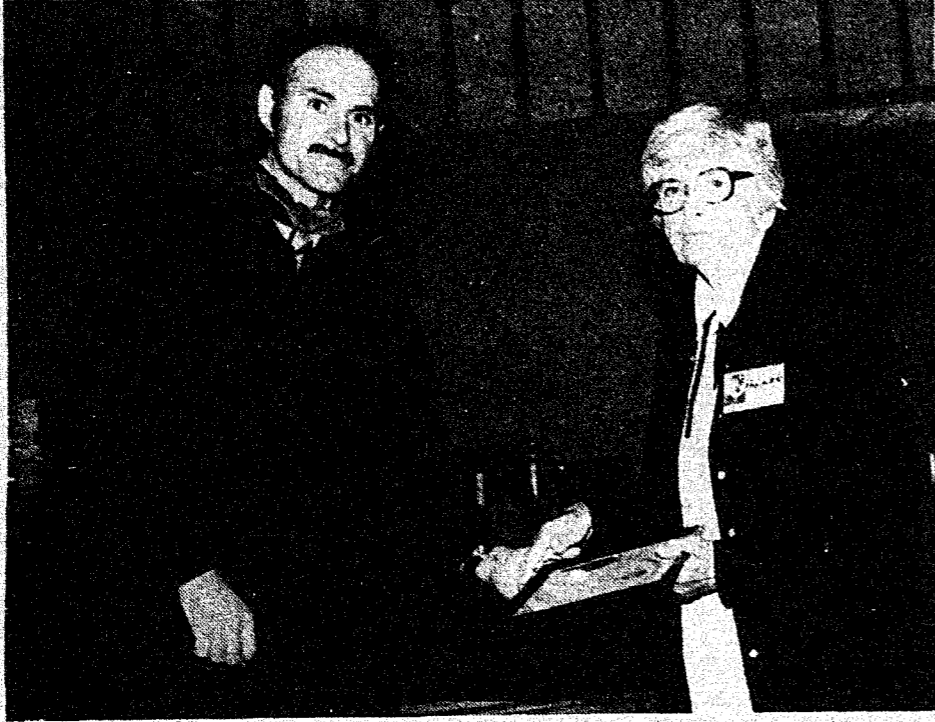

School, City Officials To Coleman Meeting

Leaders of the taxing entities of Coleman County will meet Thursday, June 12, at 8 p.m. at the District Courtroom of the County Courthouse with members of the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board to hear plans for the county Tax Appraisal Office to be established in 1981. The meeting Thursday night is for superintendents and members of boards of trustees, mayors and city councilpersons, county officials and others interested in the office that is to be established.

Making the presentation of the Board's purpose as established by the State Legislature will be Harold Pittard of Novice, chairman, and Barbara Kingsbery of Santa Anna, secretary. The proposed budget for the first year will be outlined, and questions answered.

Plans have been made to advertise for a Chief Appraiser

for the new office that is to be in full operation by 1982.

According to the new legislation, the County Tax Appraisal District will appraise all the county property and collect taxes for entities wishing to be affiliated with it. Each taxing entity will set their own tax rate using the new appraisals.

Taxing entities in Coleman County include the cities of Coleman, Santa Anna, Talpa and Novice; the County of Coleman, and school districts of Coleman, Santa Anna, Novice Talpa-Centennial and Mozelle.

Macrame Class Set Next Week

Two former Santa Anna ministers have been named district superintendents by the Methodist Church.

Jack Payne, pastor of Santa Anna United Methodist Church during the early 1950's, has been named Superintendent of the Weatherford District. He has served as pastor of the Arlington First United Methodist Church for the past 13 years.

Bobby Weathers, a Bangs native who was minister of the local Methodist Church for four years, has been named Brownwood District Superintendent.

He has served most recently as pastor of Meadowbrook UMC in Fort Worth.

The new appointments were made at the annual conference in Fort Worth last week.

Pastor of the Santa Anna church is Mike Alexander, starting his second year at the local charge. He also serves as pastor of the Valera, Rockwood and Trickham congregations.

During the convention last week, Alexander was ordained as an Elder by Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe. The Santa Anna charge is the fourth for Rev. Alexander who entered the ministry in 1974. Prior to that time he was an associate minister of a Fort Worth church and in youth work.

City Water Project Nearing Competition

The Santa Anna water improvement project is almost finished with July 9 the projected date for completion of the project.

According to a report from the engineering office of Wendell Sparkman, the contract total was \$1,794,029.95. The amount spent on May 31 totaled \$1,392,023.10, representing eighty-four percent of the amount.

The amount of retainage is \$118,379.93 which will ascertain proper working order and clean-

up. The water improvement project has been underway nearly a year and includes a new pump station at Lake Brownwood, renovation to the filtration plant northwest of town, and new water lines in town.

Santa Anna's Financial Report Is Published For Citizens

Although publication of the City's financial report is not required, several local citizens have been interested in making the information public and are having the report published in the NEWS. The report is available at City Hall, but few people would go by to see the records.

Also of interest to many people is the law suit between the City of Santa Anna and Carl Benton, Tom Stearns, et al, concerning waste water disposal

from the City Sewer Farm southwest of town.

According to Mary Lou Jones, City Secretary, the suit is still pending with no ruling made at this time. The city is not now assessing a fee to pay for the court costs and attorney fees, with funds already collected being kept to pay future costs of the suit. Other information concerning litigation is not available to the public as long as the suit is pending.

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KOLACZKY

- 6 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 pound lard (not vegetable shortening)
- 2 eggs
- 1 package or cake yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 1 cup evaporated milk
- Apricot or prune or any preserve for filling

Cut up lard into flour until it looks like coarse oatmeal with first four ingredients. Add eggs. Mix yeast with warm water. Add the milk and yeast into flour mixture and mix well. Make two large balls and refrigerate overnight. Next day roll out on floured board and cut out with any size glass or cutter. Make indenture in middle. Put a teaspoon or as much filling as desired on top. Bake on greased cookie sheet at 350 degrees for 10 to 12 minutes or until brown. When cool sprinkle with powdered sugar. (Makes about 100)

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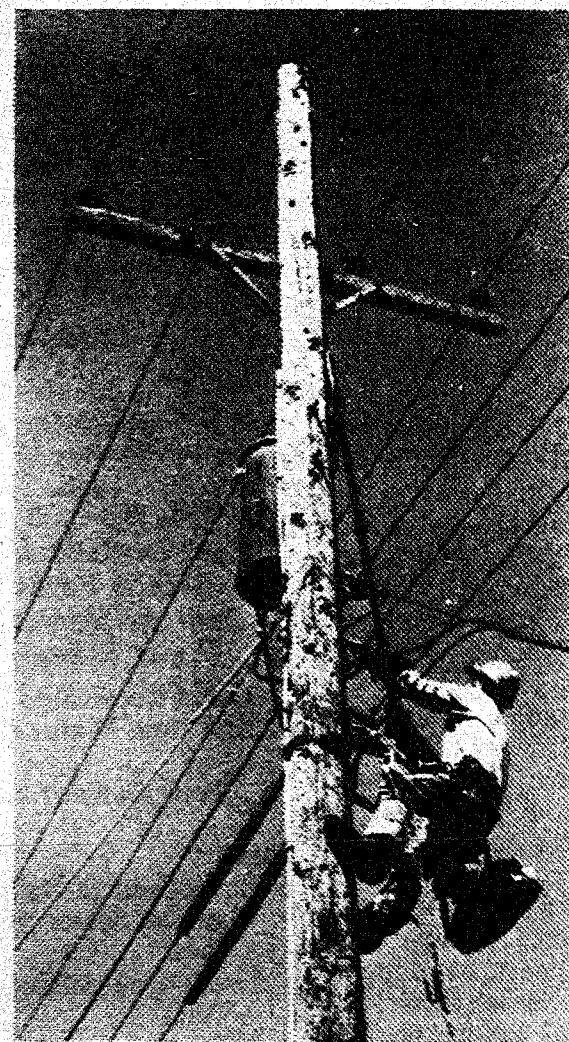

Early Santa Anna Events Recalled by David Neal

Almost 100 years ago-1883-Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Neal, with other neighbors, started out in covered wagons for the West, from Tennessee, having heard glowing stories of "cheap land."

They stopped at Ennis, Texas, a couple of years, before moving on to Coleman county. Traveling some ten days in a wagon train, they made camp in The Gap, about where A. D.

Pettit's tank is now. Not much was in the Gap but a store and saloon.

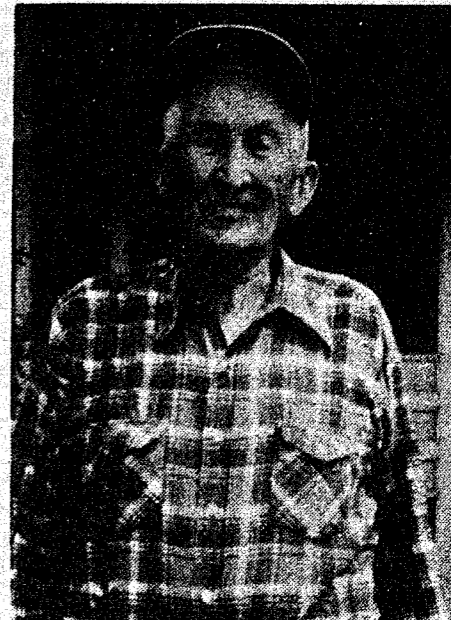
David was the Texas addition to the family, born in 1899; of the seven children in the family he has a sister and two brothers living.

David attended Santa Anna schools. He remembers his father freighted; he and a Mr. Freeman hauled the lumber from Brownwood for the Christian Church. He remembers that church was first held in the Grammer School, where the Armory now stands. One of the early churches in town; it is the only one in its original building.

The family lived on a farm in 1914, in the Longview Community. He remembers a store nearby named "Slip Up and Hich, run by a Mr. Hill.

Each little community had different names, and the old Madge store was in Bee Branch community, which was a voting box for Santa Anna at that time. About 1916 the D. C. Neal family bought the Madge Telephone Company, with Mr. and Mrs. John Oakes running the business, with about 45 customers on eight "party lines."

The Eureka Baptist Church was some four miles south of

Bee Branch School: Turn down another little country lane and find the Adventist Cemetery, on land which was given by Mr. Fox Casey, and a Mr. Quinn built the Adventist Church, near the cemetery, as was the custom in early days.

All surrounding communities met at different churches for singing and social "get-togethers." David was usually song leader.

He drove a school bus for Buffalo School some 16 years. Lots of muddy roads in early years. After some five years there were gravel roads, and another seven years before having pavement.

He is retired now and living in Santa Anna, enjoying memories of a Good Life.

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History Of Buffalo School

"Buffalo Flat" Children Educated Many Years In Community Schools

Malcom Hunter, an early settler in this area before Coleman County was established, built his home near Jim Ned Creek where Mud Creek and Buffalo Branch run together.

According to the early history of Coleman County as told by Malcom's son, W. W. "Bill" Hunter, Malcom went hunting southeast of their home where wild game was plentiful. While looking from a hill, later called "Bushy Top" and located about a mile due east of the site where the Buffalo School was later located, Hunter said to his son, "Bill, we will call this Buffalo Flat." Until the early 1900's that was the name of the fertile prairie land in that area.

Buffalo Flat was later given the nickname of "Poverty Flat", a name that still stands today among some former residents.

The Hunter place is known today as the Chap Eeds place. Families owning land in the surrounding area were the Tweedles, Powells, McDonalds, Kellys, Reeves and Bylers. Others were Forbess, W. F. Currys and J. J. Andrews.

After the Civil War, soldiers were stationed at various places in this part of Texas to protect the settlers from the Indians who made periodic raids in the area. One of the places was Camp Colorado on the Jim Ned where several men were stationed for several years.

Soon after the forts and camps were established, settlers began coming to the area. Thirfty was established in the adjoining Brown County before Coleman County was established. People kept moving further west, settling in the Buffalo Flat country, an area located in both Coleman and Brown counties.

Realizing the need for a school in their community, several men met in the spring of 1893 to discuss the organization of a school district and raising money for a building. Those at the meeting were W. F. "Willie" Curry, D. W. "Webb" Curry, E. N. and Molly (Curry) Voss, A. J. and Charlie Reeves, C. F. Wilson, Lonzo McDaniel, R. M. Rainey, B. F. Tweedle and possibly one or two others.

The result of the meeting was a school building financed by private subscriptions and erected on a spot just north of where William and Aurelia (Tweedle)

Brown now live. The school was given the name of Buffalo. W. F. Curry and A. J. Reeves were trustees.

The school was located there three years, with teachers being Miss Lodie Williams (1893-94), Miss Blanche Baker (1894-95) and Miss Annie Brown (1895-96).

In order to serve the growing community, a new and larger building was constructed on the Lonzo McDaniel place with Curry, Reeves and R. R. Powell as trustees and Miss Annie Kidd (1897-98) as teacher.

The Cross Tank School was made up of Buffalo and Thirfty students and located about two miles northeast of the first Buffalo School, across the county line in Brown County on land donated by Riley Cross. Also financed by private funds, the first trustees in 1904 were J. J. Andrews, J. W. Shore and E. F. George. The first teacher was Estelle Duran, followed by Daisy Roberson (1905-06) and Jodie Franklin (1906-07).

The third school to make up the Buffalo School District was the Winn Ranch School, built on land donated by Welton Winn. The school was built to accommodate students from the immediate area, three or four miles to the west. It opened its doors in the fall of 1907 with Miss Maude Winn as teacher. The term was three months long with patrons of the school paying the \$25 per month salary of the teacher.

In order to provide a good education for the children, the Buffalo citizens called an election for the consolidation of the three schools, a pioneer action in this part of the state.

The election carried, and the three schools, Buffalo, Cross Tank and Winn Ranch, met in the fall of 1914 in a modern two-story, four room school building located at the first Buffalo School site on the Brannon place. Teachers the first year were Mr. Winn, Misses Lucille Grady and Kate Phillips. Teachers the second year were J. L. P. (Pierce) Baker, Misses Lucile Grady and Anzo Perry.

Among the accomplishments of the school were establishment of a manual training class that helped with construction of a teacherage and a water system. The class also helped with the addition of two more rooms to the building, remodeling that more than doubled the

size of the school building.

Using the Daniel Baker College gymnasium as a pattern, a gymnasium with a stage on the west and showers and dressing rooms was constructed in 1932 at a cost of only \$3,000, the first gymnasium in Coleman County.

During the intervening years and the Fry Oil Field boom, the school increased in size with 225 students coming by foot, horseback and bus in 1931-32. Eleven teachers were on the faculty. Trustees were W. J. Curry, Buford Curry and Brooke Peyton.

The gymnasium, built by the training classes and volunteer labor, became a main place of gathering. It was later a sports center and place for conventions, musicals and roller skating.

ing. It was lighted by gasoline-powered electrical plant until rural electrification came that way.

The patrons of the Buffalo school district provided for the needs of the school and its pupils, adding playground equipment and supplies. The manual training classes also learned to run lines for terraces and were pioneers in soil conservation.

After World War II with people moving away from the country and as production dropped in the Fry Oil Field, the high school was closed, with the Class of 1948 the last to graduate from Buffalo High School. Students went to Santa Anna or Bangs to complete high school after that time. The late Arlie Harris was the last superintendent of the school.

Elementary classes were held at Buffalo for the last time in 1952-53. Teachers were W. D. and Birdie Page. The large one-story brick school building

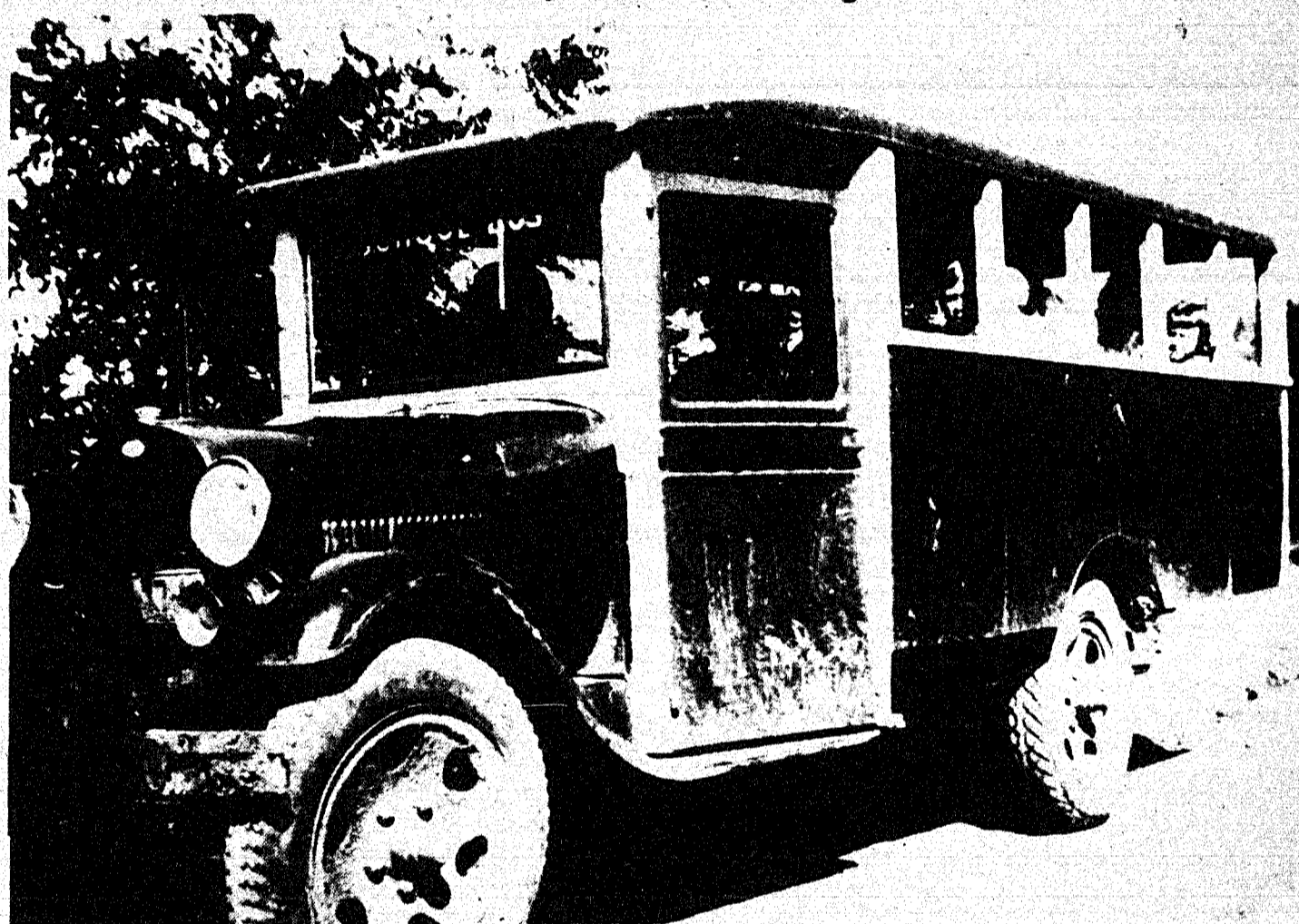

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
