Three Coleman County students are in Waco this week attending the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar held at Baylor University.

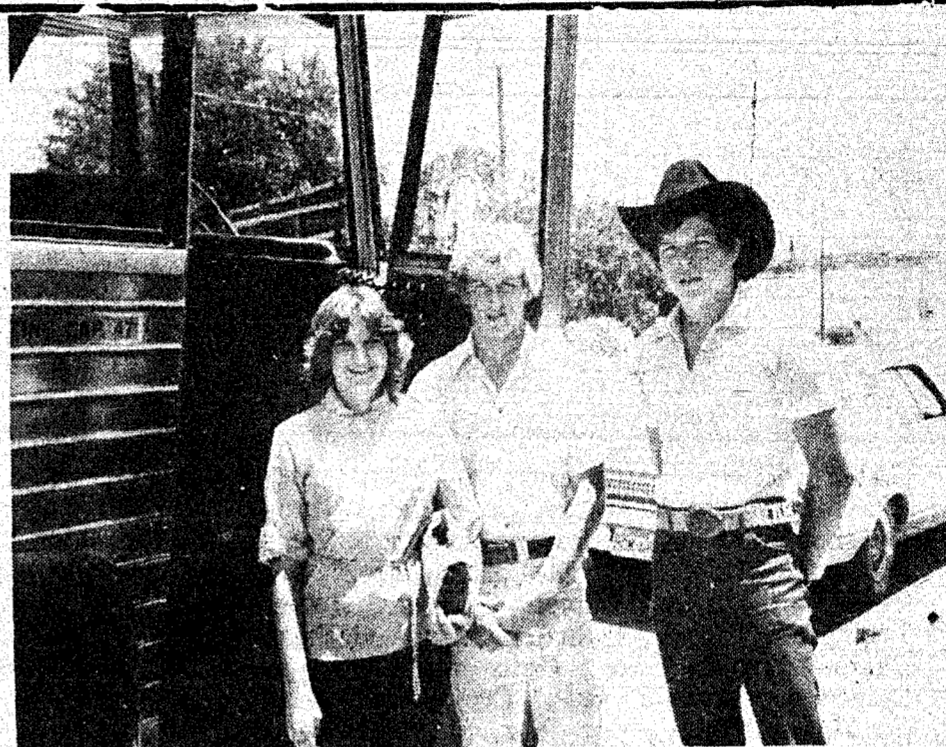

## Cases of Parvo Dog Virus Reported in Santa Anna

Parvo virus has struck Santa Anna dogs. Several cases of the new disease have been diagnosed in town. The new disease has killed a number of dogs in Brownwood and Abilene recently and is just noted here.

According to Dr. Kathy Pearce, local veterinarian, there is no cure for the disease. Once a dog gets sick, the only treatment is to relieve the

symptoms and hope for recovery. Inoculations for the disease take several weeks to be effective, with a two-shot series to be given three weeks apart.

The vaccine for the virus will be available at the July 19 rabies clinic at City Hall. Dr. Pearce will be on hand from 9 to 11 a.m. to vaccinate pets for rabies and have the Parvo vaccine available for those wishing to immunize their dogs.

## Santa Anna L-League Team Wins District Championship

The Santa Anna Mets, Coleman County Little League Champions, claimed the District 28 championship in Breckenridge Friday night.

After winning over Cisco in a close game 4 - 3 on Tuesday

night, the Santa Anna bats came alive. On Wednesday night they had six hits and 11 bases on balls and defeated the Baird team 18 - 2. Ramon Vasquez had a two-run homer in that game.

In the championship game, the Mets defeated Breckenridge 12 - 0 with 10 hits in the game including a grand slam homer by Ramon Vasquez. Russell Williams pitched a one-hitter in the final game with 13 strikeouts.

The Santa Anna Mets represented Coleman County in top form, playing error-free ball in two of the three tourney games. They finished the successful season with a 15 - 2 record, advancing as far as the team was eligible.

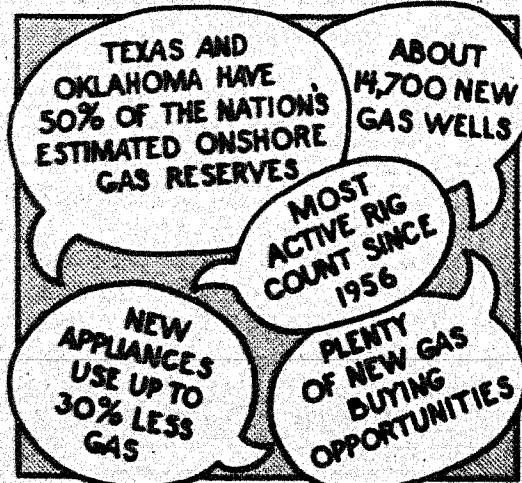

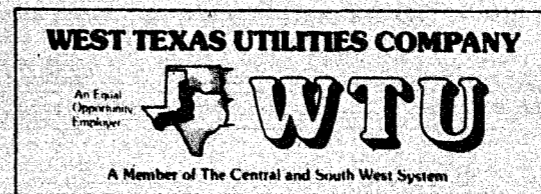

## We Shall Not Take the Name of the Lord in Vain

Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain; for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain. Ex. 20:7

The reason for this command is given: we are not to swear "by the heaven, for it is the throne of God; nor by the earth, for it is the footstool of his feet; nor by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Neither shalt thou swear by thy head, for thou canst not make one hair white or black." All things come of God. We have nothing that we have not received; and, more than this, we have nothing that has not been purchased for us by the blood of Christ.


Burning works of passion should never be spoken, for in the sight of God and holy angels they are as a species of swearing.

This commandment not only prohibits false oaths and common swearing, but it forbids us to use the name of God in a light or careless manner, without regard to its awful significance. "Holy and reverend is his name." All should meditate upon His majesty, His purity and holiness, that the heart may be impressed with a sense of His exalted character; and His holy name should be uttered with reverence and solemnity.

## Census Round-up

### Now in Progress

Census takers are making their rounds in this area, calling at households which have not mailed back their 1980 census questionnaires. They are making telephone calls at most households which have mailed back incompletely filled out questionnaires.

Billy Yarbrough, Manager of the district office, says the round-up should be completed in the next few weeks.

"You can easily tell if someone who knocks on your door is a census taker," the manager advises. "We all wear red, white, and blue identification cards with the U. S. Department of Commerce seal and 'census Enumerator, Official Credential' printed on them, and each bears the wearer's signature. Census takers also carry large portfolios boldly lettered 'U.S. Census - 1980' against a red, white, and blue background. The portfolios contain maps, questionnaires, and other supplies."

Householders should promptly report to the police anyone who claims to be a census taker but cannot produce this identification.

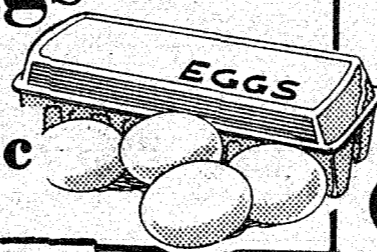
