Buffalo Reunion A Success

Many Former Students and Residents Take Part In Weekend Activities

The population of Santa Anna was increased by about one-third last weekend when former residents and students of the Buffalo Schools came to the community for the first reunion and homecoming. About 500 people were registered during

the two-day event held at the Civic Center.

Attendance was better than expected, with several families meeting here for reunions, and former students from the school coming from as far as California to attend the get-together.

Visitation and picture taking were on the agenda Saturday, with members of the classes of 1943 and 1944 meeting for reunions. Meals were served at

the Santa Anna school cafeteria.

At the Sunday meeting, a memorial service was led by Wilbur Lancaster of Bangs. Pete Curry of Lake Brownwood, one of the organizers of the event, was elected president of the

group, with another reunion planned for next June. Syble Gilliam Nichols of Casper, Wyo. was elected secretary. Leland Thompson was named head of

the arrangements committee for the next year, and Odie Griffith of Coleman will head the food committee.

City of Santa Anna, ISD Take Part in Tax Meeting

Representatives of the taxing entities in Coleman County met Thursday, June 12, at the District Courtroom with the Coleman County Tax Appraisal District Board to hear plans for the organization of the new tax district. Harold Pittard, chairman, led the discussion of the new project which was mandated by the Texas Legislature.

A proposed budget for the 1981 year was discussed, to include the staffing and operation of the county appraisal operating the county appraisal office and having the entire county re-appraised for the ten separate taxing entities.

Also discussed was the option of having an outside firm do the appraisal, then opening a county appraisal office to be used by the taxing groups.

Information concerning each entity's share of the cost was presented, and questions answered concerning plans for the county office that is to be in full operation by 1982.

Representatives were present from the City of Santa Anna, City of Talpa, City of Novice,

and the Santa Anna, Coleman, Novice, Mozelle and Talpa-Centennial school districts. City of Coleman officials met with the Tax Appraisal District Board in an earlier session.

Representing the City of Santa Anna were Mayor Thomas Hays and City Secretary, Mary Lou Jones. Those from the school district were Supt. R. C. Smith and Max Eubank, ISD board member.

Routine Business For City Council

Mayor Thomas Hays presided at the Thursday, June 5, meeting of City Council with all members present. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved, and accounts were approved for payment.

Wendell Sparkman, engineer with the Water Improvement Project, reported the project is 84 percent complete as of June 1. Work is continuing on the new water lines in town and at the filtration plant at City Lake.

Traffic signs for Santa Anna are to be ordered and installed soon. The Council also discussed needed repairs and improvements at the Civic Center.

The next meeting of the Council will be Thursday, July 3.

Blood Pressure Clinic Scheduled Today

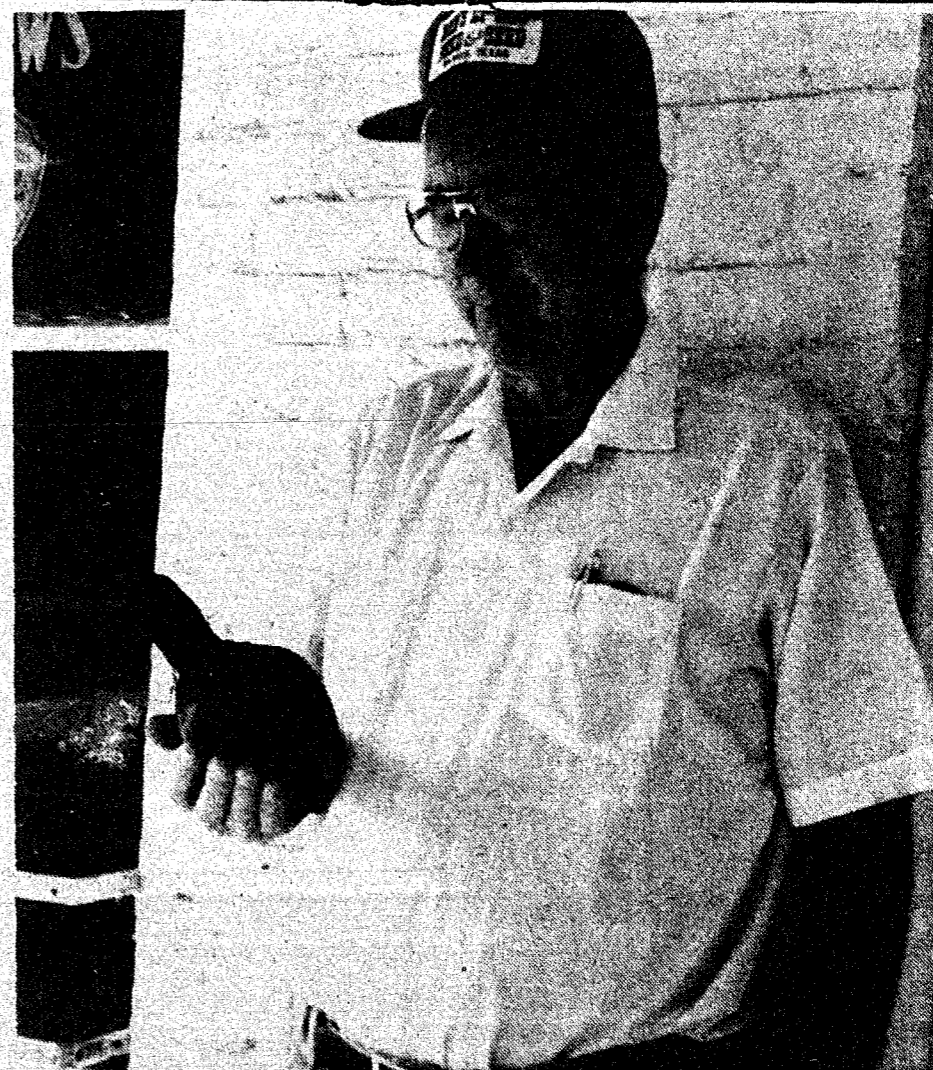

City Sales Tax Shows Decrease

City sales tax receipts in Texas were down slightly during the month of May, according to a report from State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office last week. Consumer caution about the economy and spending patterns were credited with the decrease.

The City of Santa Anna's sales tax collection ending May 30 showed only a one percent decrease from the same period last year, with \$2,101.64 collected for the month and a total of \$7,698 for the year.

The decrease was less than in the previous months, with a 14 percent decrease reported in March over the 1979 figure.

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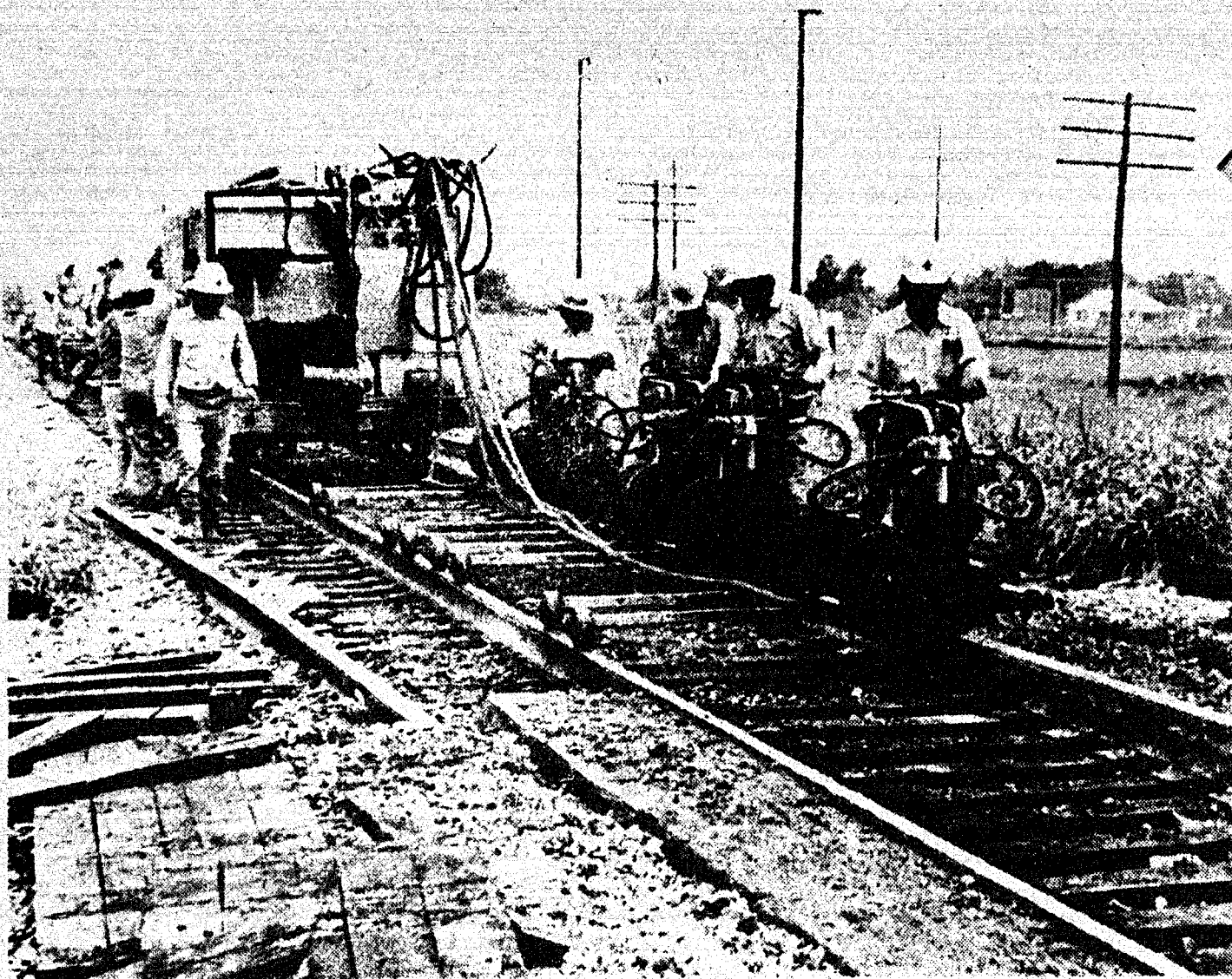

Area Rancher Buried June 15 In Coleman

Roland Williams, 73, died at his home south of Santa Anna Saturday, June 14, after a long illness. Funeral services were held Sunday in Henderson Funeral Chapel in Coleman with Rev. Paul Smith of Coleman Community Baptist Church and Rev. George Havens, Baptist evangelist, officiating. Burial was in Coleman City Cemetery.

Mr. Williams was born March 16, 1907 in the Shields community, the son of John A. and Willie (McElrath) Williams. He attended the Shields schools and graduated from Santa Anna High School in 1925. He married Iris Dixon in Santa Anna June 27, 1931. A lifetime resident of Coleman County, he was a stock farmer and a Baptist.

New Rail System Being Installed Through Area

Residents of the community have had to detour several blocks when crossing the Santa Fe Railroad during the past week. A new rail system has been installed along the main track, and traffic was stopped at different times as the work progressed.

The new line is a continuous rail, welded every quarter mile. The new line runs from Sweetwater to Brownwood, a distance of 112.7 miles. Total cost of the project is expected to be \$18 million.

A crew of Navajo Indians from reservations in New Mexico and Arizona is laying the new line. There are 248 Navajos in the two gangs that are working on the project. They live in camp cars provided by Santa Fe or in their own travel trailers.

The new rails are 136 pounds per yard, replacing rails that are 115 pounds. The new line will provide a faster, smoother ride without the joints of the former rails.

The crew completed work in Santa Anna this week, continuing toward Brownwood.

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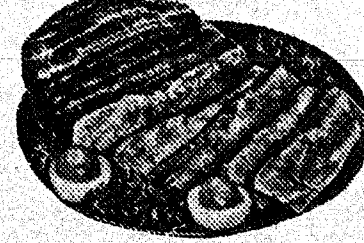

Building Temps Due A Change

Proposed changes in the federal "Emergency Building Temperature Restrictions" program (EBTR) would give building managers greater flexibility in conserving energy, it was announced by the U. S. Department of Energy today.

Under an alternate plan, building owners would be permitted to cool their building to 74 degrees Fahrenheit, rather than the present 78 degrees. In winter the temperature could be upped to 68 degrees, rather than the current 65 degrees.

The proposed regulations would permit a building manager to use an alternate plan, if that plan would achieve an energy savings equal to that resulting from full compliance with the current regulations. The current regulations remain in force until final rules are published this summer.

Action that could be taken include reducing lighting wattage, changing hours of building operations, installing insulation and weatherization, among others. The proposed regulations were published in the Federal Register on May 27, 1980. A 30-day public comment period ends on June 26, 1980.

Changes Are Proposed In Dove Season

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has proposed a change in the federal regulations that would allow the department the option of dividing the state into three zones for dove hunting the coming season.

Currently, the 60-day mourning dove season is set according to a two-zone arrangement, with the North Zone opening September 1 and the South Zone

opening on the first Saturday after September 19.

The proposed three-zone plan would feature a Panhandle Zone covering the Panhandle and South Plains, a Central Zone, consisting of most of the state's midsection, and a Rio Grande Zone which would stretch from the Trans-Pecos southeast along the Rio Grande including South Texas.

Dove program leader Jim Dunks said the proposed realignment is intended to provide the department greater flexibility in setting seasons responsive to local situations. One reason is to allow a slightly later opening date for areas in North Central Texas where hunters periodically complain

about the body and feather conditions of birds bagged. The delay is not expected to alter the harvest significantly.

The opening of the Central Zone would be the first Saturday after September 8. Actual dates would vary from Sept. 9 through 15, depending on the calendar year. The season would end November 7 through 13, unless the option of splitting the season was chosen.

The proposals represent a departure from tradition, but hunters are requested to evaluate carefully the potential seasons and how they are affected. The public may comment on the proposal by writing the Parks and Wildlife Department.

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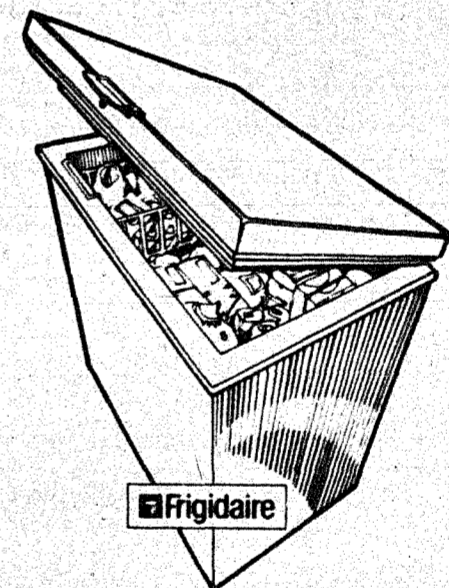


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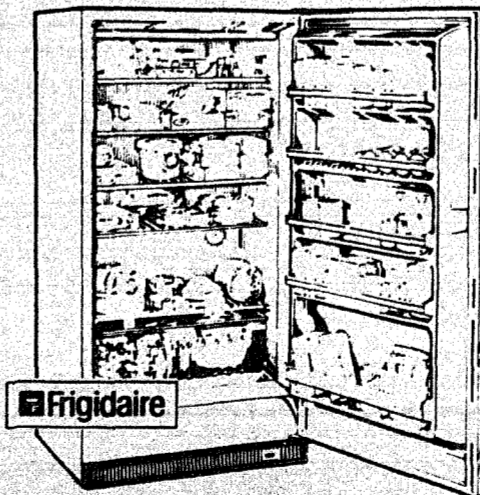

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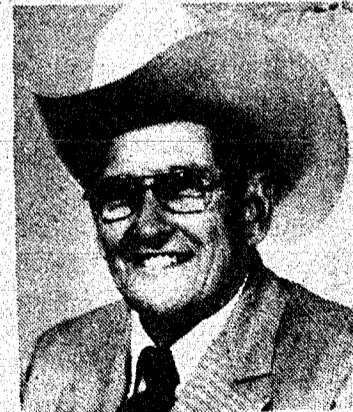

Juneteenth Is State Holiday

The emancipation of Texas slaves on June 19, 1865, will be celebrated as an official state holiday. The 66th Texas Legislature approved the addition of "Juneteenth" to the calendar of formal state holidays, beginning this year.

Cecil E. Burney, Chairman of the Texas Historical Commission, said, "June 19 has long been informally celebrated by Texas Blacks as a popular summer holiday, and it is appropriate that all Texans observe the official holiday celebrating the end of slavery in our State in 1865. This is equally an opportunity to appreciate the contributions of Blacks to Texas heritage."

Juneteenth recalls the post-Civil War Reconstruction era, and commemorates the 1865 freeing of Texas slaves by Union General Gordon Granger. Granger arrived at Galveston June 19 to proclaim U.S. authority over Texas in the name of President Andrew Johnson. Granger also declared the freedom of Black slaves and announced that officers and men of the Confederate Army would be paroled.

By the turn of the century Black communities in Texas celebrated Juneteenth with enthusiasm and ceremony paralleling traditional July 4 festivities. An Austin newspaper of the 1890s reported the "patriotic and appropriate" commemoration of Juneteenth.

With this year's official recognition of June 19 as a state holiday, many Texas communities and organizations are planning similar Emancipation Day programs.

Students on S. S. Must Attend School Full Time

Are you a student 18 to 22 getting social security checks? If so, don't forget these payments can be made only if you are enrolled in school full time.

If you attend a college or university, you qualify if you meet the full-time standard for day students. If you attend high school or a trade or vocational school, you are "full time" if the school considers you so and you're enrolled in a course lasting at least 13 weeks, and your scheduled attendance is at least 20 hours a week.

Benefits can continue during a summer vacation of up to 4 months if you were in school full time before it began and you intend to return to school in the fall. If you're not sure, have your benefits stopped to avoid an overpayment. Should you change your mind and return to classes, you can get back payments later.

Unless your student benefits started in 1980, you should have received by now a "Report of Student Beneficiary at End of School Year" to complete. If

you have not already done so, promptly complete the top of the form. Then give it to your school registrar who will complete the bottom portion and return the form to the Social Security Administration.

It is important that the form be completed and returned, even if there is no change in your status. If this is not done, your benefits will stop, and an investigation will be made to determine whether all past payments were correct.

If you work in 1980, you can earn up to \$3,720 and receive all benefits due. If you earn over this amount, \$1 in benefits generally will be withheld for each \$2 in earnings over \$3,720.

Earnings for the entire year must be counted, including earnings in months before your benefits started and in months after they end.

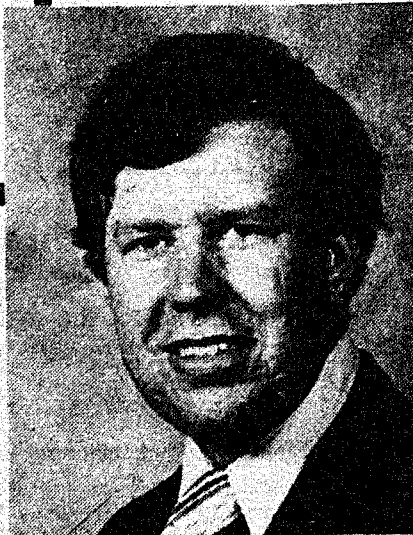

Rural Homes Are Eligible For Funding

A rural homeowner whose home needs repair may be eligible for a loan and/or grant from Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Farmers Home Administration makes home improvement loans to families who may need or cannot afford a new house but need some work done on their present house to bring it up to minimum property standards. It also makes loans to low income home owners to remove health and safety hazards from their dwellings.

A borrower's income is the key to the type of assistance for which he is eligible.

Generally, repair loans and/or grants are made to families with an adjusted annual income of \$7,000 or less. These loans may be used to remove health

hazards by repairing roofs, providing a sanitary water or waste disposal system that meets health department requirements, installing screens, windows, insulation, or taking steps to make the home safe.

These families can borrow up to \$7,000 with interest rates at 3 percent or less and repayment up to 20 years.

Home improvement loans are

made to families with a higher adjusted annual income not to exceed \$15,600 per year at 13 percent interest rates. These loans may be used for additions of extra rooms or modernizing the home.

The Coleman County office of Farmers Home Administration is located in the Rhone Building, Concho Street, in Coleman. Office hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Changes Are Listed In School Menu Patterns

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has issued rules that will change lunches served to children in school starting next fall.

The rules based on recent surveys of children's eating habits and nutritional needs, encourage schools in the national school lunch program to tailor meal and portion sizes to the eating habits of children. This measure is expected to reduce plate waste among younger children and better the nutritional needs of older children.

These rules are the second and final part of a major change in school lunch meal patterns, originally proposed in 1977. The department implemented interim regulations in August 1978 to field test the proposed changes, and also solicited public comment. Today's final

regulations reflect findings about the impact of the meal pattern changes gathered during the test phase.

The rules recommended that schools serve different sized portions of food to children of different age groups.

The new rules also require schools to increase the required servings of eggs and dry beans to make them nutritionally equivalent substitutes for meat and the other meat alternates, and to increase the number of bread servings required to provide children with the higher levels of iron and other nutrients specified in the 1974 RDA's.

Under the school lunch program, meal patterns are used to insure that lunches served across the nation meet

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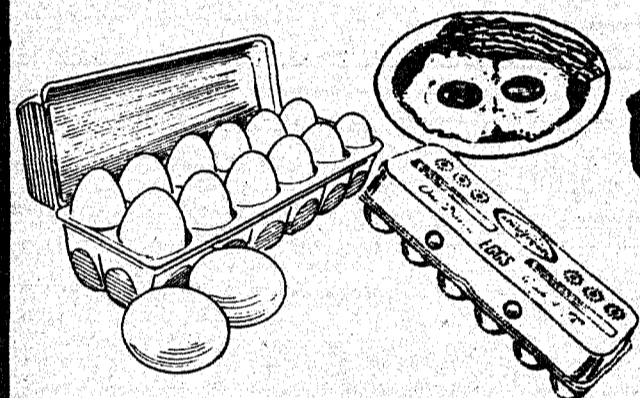


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
