

New Program **For Brucellosis Control Explained**

A new multi-area plan for brucellosis control in Texas is now in effect with new regula-tions for moving cattle, explains Roger Blackburn, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Blackburn said the new program divides the state into two sections. The Class A area includes about 130 counties in the western part of the state, which is relatively free of brucellosis. The Class B areawhich lies east of Class A-consists of counties which have historically had more problems with the disease, he said.

Brucellosis, or Bangs disease, is a highly contagious disease which affects cattle and other animals, as well as humans. In people, it is called undulant fever.

Blackburn said that in cattle the disease may cause abortions, weaker calves, lower milk production and sterility. Failure to control the disease could result in more restrictions conerning interstate movement of Texas cattle.

Under the new regulations, he explained that all breeding cattle-male and female-18 months or older will be eiligible for testing. Female dairy cattle officially calfhood vaccinated between three and six months of age would not be tested until they are 20 months old. Female beef cattle vaccinated between three and 10 months of age would not be tested until they reach 24 months of age.

Extension Service Offers Communities Budget Aid

As Texas commuinities struggle to provide essential services like sewer and water systems, the question is always the same: "What's it going to cost?"

Such communities now have the opportunity to determine these costs without spending thousands of dollars in consulting fees.

By using budgeting assistance from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, local leaders can determine the most costefficient methods of providing such services as fire protection, sewer systems, solid waste disposal, health clinics, water systems, ambulance services and transportation for the elderly.

How much will an ambulance service in our rural area cost? Which is more economical for us, a green box dumpster garbage collection system or a house-to-house system? How should we route our school buses in order to save money and yet provide efficient service?

"We don't make these decisions for community leaders, but provide them with budget facts and possible alternatives," points out Dr. James I. Mallett, Extension Service state leader in community development. "From that information they can make a decision, not by guess or estimate or politics, but by hard, solid data.

"The tide has turned and Americans are beginning to move back to the rural areas." conteds Mallett. "Rural development efforts directed toward creation of rural job opportunities have been quite successful, and now many areas which experienced a population decline from 1950 to 1970 are beginning to grow."

These new residents are bringing to their rural homes a demand for the type of highly developed community services they learned to expect in the cities.

"Association with these new residents and exposure to travel and the communications media have made even long-term rural residents desirous of the same type of public services enjoyed by urban residents," notes the Extension officer. "However, these increased demands are coming at an inopportune time. There may be more people in the area but there's not-more property, and property tax money is a key source of revenue for local governments."

Faced with inflation and increased cost of technological advances occuring in equipment and management systems used to provide community services, local leaders want to know the most cost efficient way to provide these services.

"In addition to preparing cost budgets, the Extension Service can aid local communities in determining point-of-origin locations and cost-efficient routing systems for such services as garbage collection and school bus pick-up," notes Mallett.
